#### Do You know Your X From Your BeReal, Insta, Or TikTok?

If you don't understand the title, you are not reaching the young adults that we need. 91.56% of Americans are on social media, but not all are on the same one. Twitter is now X, and Facebook is fine for most of us, but it is not reaching into the youth culture of America. BeReal, Instagram, Snapchat, YouTube, and TikTok are the platforms being used by most people twenty-nine and under. Thirty- to Forty-nine-year-olds use YouTube, Facebook, and TikTok the most, while those over Fifty are mostly limited to Facebook and YouTube.

The platforms that different age groups use differ drastically. Using the proper platform to target the right group is vital to get your message out to them. Not doing so is akin to using the wrong language. Trying to get retirees to sign up for your extreme snowboarding competition will probably work just as well as getting twenty-year-olds to your bingo and big band bonanza. Both are great events, as long as you don't mix up the participant sign-up sheets.

Now we come to the crucial part of understanding how to deliver the message to your target audience. The Platform Algorithm. The algorithm is what determines who will see what you post, how often they will see it, and how long they have to look for your post before they find it. Each platform has its own rules for what you have to do to get to the top of the feed. Being at the top of the feed means if the one you want to target is only online for just a few minutes, they will see your message. Facebook, for example, wants you to post daily with items that get likes, comments, and shares to move up in priority for viewers. The more interactions your post gets, the more important they will rank it.

If you have a Lions page that is not posting regularly, it is essentially a dead page. Keep your social media presence active and aimed at the public, not just your members. Many of us struggle with this because it has not been a regular part of our lives like it has for people who have always had it as their information source. If we want the legacy and service of the Lions to continue into the future, we need to be reaching the Lions of the future.

- 3. They need a "why". This will take time, but the more of Lionism around the world you can expose them to and ask them what is important to them, the soon they can move from joining Lions to being a Lion.

I hope that you have all three of these! If you don't, talk with your Club President, or give me a call. I'm happy to talk with any person or club about this. We will talk about using the names list next month. Until then, thank you for being a friend to another Lion. Thank you for the jobs you undertake to better your community. And thank you for the why that you are pursuing.


#### **Reading Action Program**

Several years ago, Greentown Lion Tom Moor took up that challenge and asked our Club to join "The Dictionary Project." These dictionaries are given to 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students and they are not "just a dictionary." The book that Greentown Lions purchases is called "A Student's Dictionary." It also includes: biographies of U.S. Presidents, the Declaration of Independence and U.S. Constitution, facts about countries, maps of the seven continents, information about the 50 states, facts about planets, weights & measures, sign language and much more! Students at Eastern Elementary, Millerview Amish School, and Bethany Fellowship School are always so excited when it is their "turn" to receive this educational book – and the teachers actually do use them as part of their classroom learning. It is a book that students keep for their very own and we have had students tell us they still have their dictionary using it in high school. Greentown Lions have purchased over 1,710 dictionaries for 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students. Inside the cover of each book, we stamp Compliments of Greentown Lions Club.



It is very hard for a child to tell you if they are having problems seeing well, as they have always seen this way and may think it is normal. However, recent studies have shown that as many as 25% of all children have a vision problem significant enough to affect their performance in school. These issues can include near sightedness, far sightedness, and lazy eye. Students in Indiana have their vision screened in 3<sup>rd</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup> grades.

### Westfield Lions Deliver Dictionaries to Third Graders




