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

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




ABOUT WORLD DIABETES DAY 14 NOVEMBER

We Serve At the Agricultural and **Commercial Show**

Lions District 413 - Zambia

As an annual service activity, the Lions District 413 Zambia conducted a medical camp during the agricultural and Commercial Show held from 31st July to 5th August 2019 in Lusaka. The main objective of holding the medical camp was to provide free medical screening services to all the people that attended the Agricultural Show. Services provided were for sight, hearing, prostate cancer, breast cancer, diabetes, HIV and retinoblastoma.

The team invited the following partners to provide screening for various ailments (AIDS Health Foundation, Beit Cure Hospital, Vision Care, Diabetes Association of Zambia, Cancer Diseases Hospital and Patricia Jere Cancer Foundation).

Participation by Lions and Leos were 64 from the first day of the camp till the end, and over 822 people were screened.

Lions District 413 - Zambia

The first ever African Lions International Forum had its first inauguration meeting in Lusaka Zambia.

The meeting, for Lions drawn from across Africa, was held from the 25th to 28th of September, 2019, at Mulungushi Conference Center, which brought together nearly 700 Lions members from all over the World including the International President Jung Yul Choi, and spouse Mrs. Seung-Bok. Also among the People who were in attendance are Immediate Past International President Gudrun, 2nd Vice International President Brian Sheehan, Past International President Kajit Habanananda and Jitsuhiro Yamada, Prof. Joseph Obenga, PDG Gloria Lassey, and Past International Directors (Steven Glass, Manoj Shah, HOB Lawal, Alexis V. Gomes, Hastings Eli Chiti).

After Africa was granted the 8th Constitutional Area status, the All Africa conference changed its name to Africa Forum, and the last All Africa Conference was held in Morocco.

The All Africa Conference was the initiative of the



past International Director, Julian Musikanth of District 411, South Africa, who served 1987 to 1989.

The objective of the All Africa Conference was to unit Africa Lions with a common goal of growing membership in Africa.

It was also meant to increase the number of service projects especially sight related projects, to enhance the visibility of the Lions in Africa.

The Conference was also aimed at championing the creation of a constitutional area on the African continent.

Initially, the Conference had no logo, but a logo was launched at the Conference held in Tunisia in February, 2014.

Hosting Districts are at liberty to design their own logo based on the main logo.



The Lions Women's Symposiums (Formerly known as the Lions Family and Women Symposium Program) was officiated by Mrs. Esther Lungu during the First Africa Forum, who is the current First Lady of the Republic of Zambia and Founder of the Esther Lungu Foundation Trust. Since assuming office as First Lady in 2015, Mrs. Lungu has utilised her distinguished position to reinforce her passion for uplifting the wellbeing of humanity which she has been doing for more than 23 years.

The First Lady has leveraged her position to focus on the economic empowerment of women living in rural and hard to reach areas. She advocates for the empowerment of women and girls; maternal and child health; and for persons with disabilities. Mrs Lungu has joined global leaders to press for the elimination of child marriages, discrimination against persons with disabilities; and elimination of gender based violence.

Through her Foundation, Mrs. Lungu is co-financing food processing equipment for women in agriculture; low cost boarding houses for girls' education; drilling of boreholes for clean drinking water and uplifting the lives of children with disabilities.

The First Lady is a member of the Organisation of African First Ladies Against HIV and AIDS. She is also a member and patron of the Stop Cervical and Breast Cancer First Ladies Forum, Lafarge Foundation in Zambia and SOS Children Villages in Zambia.

Her significant contribution to the health sector prompted the Medical Association of Zambia to confer her with an award for her advocacy work on health for rural communities. She has also been recognised by the World Federation of Hemophilia for supporting persons with hemophilia in Zambia. Hemophilia is a bleeding disorder which occurs when a person has an abnormal expression of a protein on his or her genes and it is hereditary.

Make Your Mark

In partnership with the International Diabetes Federation (IDF), we're asking Lions to make their mark by organizing a Type 2 diabetes screening in their communities.

A diabetes screening can be the first step to detecting the possibility of diabetes—confirmation that a person has diabetes requires further medical testing.

Getting started:

- Choose a date and location for the screening.
 Possible locations include schools, libraries, community centers or medical facilities.
- Arrange for medical equipment, medical personnel and referral services. Partner with healthcare professionals to carry out joint diabetes screening projects, and adhere to the appropriate healthcare laws and regulations when conducting screenings. Many healthcare regulations require blood tests to be conducted by a licensed healthcare professional.
- Let your community know about the screening by

sending out flyers, contacting your local newspaper and posting about the event on Facebook.

On the day of the screening:

- Keep the screening room clean and organized.
- Offer free transportation for those who lack access.
- Assist with record-keeping functions.
- Provide informational materials to further educate the public on diabetes.
- Encourage participants to post their "blue thumbs up" on social media using the hashtag #LIONSFIGHTDIABETES

After the screening:

- Report your event on MyLion so it can be counted toward our goal of screening one million people.
- Send letters of appreciation to everyone involved, including healthcare professionals, community leaders, medical companies, etc.
- Contact people in the community who found out they may have diabetes, and provide further information about next steps and local treatment facilities.

How I Serve Through Diversity

There are as many ways to lead as there are to serve. But among the many leadership philosophies, "servant" is a term seldom heard.

I recently sat down with International President Jung-Yul Choi to discuss his leadership philosophy: servant leadership. Despite a long flight from the Republic of Korea the day before, and a long day of meetings ahead, he welcomed me with a question he has asked so many times over the years: How can I help you?

What does servant leadership mean to you? Servant leadership is humble leadership. Humility is so important.

A great leader knows that they succeed only when they support the success of their team. They understand the strengths of their members—and also their needs. Whenever I meet Lions, I always ask, "How can I help you?" I think that's something that can help everyone.

Encouragement is the greatest motivator. A pat on the back. A few words. Empower the people around you by supporting them. Give them the power to achieve and let them show you how much they are capable of.

Why is servant leadership important to you? I became a Lion in 1977—that's 42 years already! At every step of my journey, in leadership and as a Lion, I see how servant leadership has helped me to achieve my goals.

As a district governor, membership and clubs grew across my district. When the 95th international convention came to Busan in South Korea, it was the largest convention in Korean history.

These are great successes I have been part of. But it was only by servant leadership—only by supporting and encouraging my team—that so much was accomplished.

How does your message of "We Serve through Diversity" apply to leadership? Our world is incredible in its diversity. We are all beautiful and unique in our experiences, abilities and culture. But we cannot let our differences divide us.

Top to bottom—that's how servant leadership works.

It's not easy to unite all the members of your club, your district or our association. But if we really want



to change our communities, and the world, we must unite. We must find harmony. We must all work together. Because we are all in this world together.

As Lions, we share the same mission. To achieve our mission we must embrace diversity. To achieve our true potential as Lions, we must embrace it. I truly believe that diversity is our greatest strength.

Why do you think that ongoing training and professional development is important for Lions? We are the greatest volunteer organization in the world. And why? Because of our members and their clubs. Who grows our membership? Club members. Who serves our communities? Clubs.

And how do we keep our members happy and our clubs healthy? Strong leadership.

In my experience, when someone with training becomes a leader there's a big difference. When we train Lions, we help them find the tools they need. We help them develop the unique skills that it takes to be a service leader. And then something special happens.

They become even more service-minded. They become even more willing to participate in service activities. They become even better Lions who are ready to lead their clubs and our communities, our districts and our world.

What are some practical ways to start becoming a servant leader today?

Top to bottom—that's how servant leadership works. It means I support my district governors. It means that district governors support their club presidents. It means that club presidents support their members. If we can do this at all level of Lions, I believe that we will see extraordinary results in our membership and leadership.

And small things matter too. Speak kindly. Give encouragement. Recognize accomplishments. We all need it.

As your international president, wherever I go, I'm there to serve you. I'm going to do everything I can to help you succeed.

Knowing Your Risk Is the First Step to Preventing Type 2 Diabetes

Diabetes is a global health epidemic. This chronic condition currently affects close to half a billion people worldwide and is set to impact one in nine people by 2045. One in two people currently living with diabetes has not yet been diagnosed, which means that their condition is not under control.

Left untreated, diabetes can have devastating consequences on a person's health and well-being, causing a number of serious complications that can impact harshly on the finances of individuals, their families and the economies of nations. Diabetes is responsible for more than four million deaths each year and is a leading cause of blindness, heart disease, kidney failure and lower limb amputation.

Type 2 diabetes is the most common type of diabetes, accounting for up to 90% of all cases and the vast majority of those who are undiagnosed. Unlike Type 1 diabetes, which is diagnosed most commonly in children and young adults, Type 2 diabetes can be prevented in many cases.

The cornerstone of Type 2 diabetes prevention is the adoption of a healthy diet and increased physical activity. Several studies conducted around the world have shown that the risk of developing the condition can be significantly reduced by adopting healthier lifestyles. The most important risk factors for Type 2 diabetes include excess body weight, lack of exercise and poor nutrition.

The first step to preventing Type 2 diabetes is knowing your risk.

This November, as part of global awareness activities to mark World Diabetes Day and Diabetes Awareness Month, the International Diabetes Federation (IDF) is proud to partner with Lions Clubs International to help halt the continued rise of Type 2 diabetes by encouraging everyone to learn about their risk for the condition through a simple online test.

Brief questionnaires have been shown to be simple, practical and inexpensive ways to quickly identify people who may be at a higher risk of Type 2 diabetes and need to have their level of risk further investigated. IDF has developed a Type 2 diabetes online diabetes risk assessment that aims to predict a person's risk of developing Type 2 diabetes within the next ten years.

The test is based on the Finnish Diabetes Risk Score (FINDRISC) developed and designed by Adjunct Professor Jaana Lindstrom and Professor Jaakko Tuomilehto from the National Institute for Health and Welfare, Helsinki, Finland. Thanks to Lions International, the IDF online test has been made available in 12 languages.

Our shared goal is to have at least one million people screened for Type 2 diabetes by the end of November 2019.

IDF, representing over 240 national diabetes associations in more than 160 countries and territories, has been leading the global diabetes community since 1950. The Federation is engaged in action to tackle diabetes from the local to the global level — from programs at the community level to worldwide awareness and advocacy initiatives. IDF's activities influence policy, increase public awareness and encourage health improvement, promote the exchange of high-quality information about diabetes, and provide education for people with diabetes and their healthcare providers.

Our joint initiative around prevention of Type 2 diabetes forms part of a wider IDF-Lions International collaborative alliance aimed at tackling diabetes at the global level. In 2018, IDF and Lions International signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) through which the two organizations committed to achieve a series of common goals:

- Prevent Type 2 diabetes and improve the quality of life for all people living with diabetes
- Raise diabetes awareness and provide education where needed
- Develop holistic diabetes service projects to improve care
- Elevate the issue of diabetes onto the national and global political agenda
- Increase access to diabetes care, medication and diagnostic equipment

IDF and Lions International aim to achieve the objectives of the partnership through joint programming, capacity development, campaigning, advocacy, research and data and knowledge management.

At the signing of the MoU, IDF President Professor Nam H. Cho said, "Diabetes is fast becoming a global health emergency. Without concerted action to slow down the advance of this serious and debilitating condition, diabetes will overwhelm healthcare budgets everywhere. This is a timely and welcome partnership. Lions Clubs International is a dynamic movement with a vast and influential network. It has an impressive track record in bringing about positive change and health improvement. Our

organizations are ideally placed to collaborate and make a difference for the many millions now living with diabetes and all those at risk."
