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

At the state convention in Fargo last year I challenged the Lions of North Dakota to expand their horizons and increase their commitment to the noble cause of our great organization. The slogan for this two year expansion effort you will remember is:

THINK BIG

As we begin year two of **THINK BIG** in North Dakota, it would be useful to review what happened in year one. LIONS IN ACTION was launched as a major fund raising tool for the Lions Foundation of North Dakota, Inc. PDG Ed Grunett of Hazen was the creator and driving force behind this program which was a food booth at the Ralph Engelstad Arena in Grand Forks. The booth specialized in North Dakota products including buffalo sandwiches and Norwegian lefse. In addition to many others, Dennis and Salli Lou Anderson should be recognized for their roll in the day to day operation of the program.

The TSUNAMI relief project last January and February was the first time in the history of North Dakota Lionism that a coordinated, statewide fund raising effort was conducted for a single cause. Spaghetti feeds and other projects were organized by about two-thirds of the North Dakota Lions clubs which resulted in an impressive \$60,000 donation to tsunami relief by the Lions of North Dakota. This bit of creativity came from **Craig Wollenburg** of Rugby.


The first year of **THINK BIG** was indeed a great success. The Lions of North Dakota can be proud of doing some things they've never done before. CONGRATULATIONS!

Year two of THINK BIG is upon us and beckons for even bigger accomplishments. What will those accomplishments be?

We are currently in the middle of a **KATRINA** relief fund raising program, similar to the tsunami effort. North Dakota District Governors Chuck Whitney (NW), Marian Johnson (NC) and Al Kahlbaugh (NE) are managing a statewide drive with a goal of \$60,000 to be completed by October 31. 

Notice to Clubs in District 5NE

The following motion will be brought to the floor at the District 5NE annual meeting Oct. 29th as part of the North Dakota State Lions Convention, to be discussed and voted on by the club delegates attending the convention:

Club dues for District 5NE shall be raised by \$1 per member per year, from \$6 per year to \$7 per year, or \$3 to \$3.50 per semiannual billing period. This dues increase will take effect Jan. 1, 2006.

4-Building Better Lions Through MERL Team Involvement. PID Joe Marcheggiani felt strongly that declining membership was not the problem. He seemed to feel that lack of leadership was the problem. We need a real MERL Team Plan. We need a team at the multiple district, the district and the local level that will build a plan and follow through with each and every club. We need to be leaders who are passionate about what we are doing. Many clubs in attendance shared the same type of frustration we hear in our areas each time we meet and discuss this topic. We must lead. He shared the following statement from Helen Keller and I quote, "The best and most beautiful things in the world cannot be seen or even touched. They must be felt with the heart." He encourages us to look to the horizon and beyond. How can we help others?

The luncheon speaker on Friday, 9-23-05. was Karyn Buxman, a highly sought after humorist and expert in therapeutic humor. She helped us look at laughter as a really positive medicine. Some of her humor had the nearly 3000 people present rolling in the aisles.

Saturday had us involved again in various sessions in a strong learning mode. On this day I took part in several powerful topics. Let me share some with you.

1—A Positive Approach That Will Enhance Our Future. PDG Richard "Dickie" Ferrucci had developed a power point presentation that seemed really accurate to me. He compared

what we do in lions to what people do in operating a business. He built this presentation around the market, the product, sales promotions, advertising, and public relations. He asked each of us to understand that the club we belong to isn't my club. I am a member of this club. I need to help it grow and leave it for my children and grandchildren.

2-Lead and Excel as a VDG. First Vice President Jimmy Ross presented this topic which was exciting to me. He wants us to be a cheerleader, a motivator and an encourager of service. He wants each club to do what they are excited about. What is their mission? Serve! He wants to know what he can do to help each of our clubs in every district. He believes clubs will grow if and when needs are met by the customers (members). He wants the 2006-07 theme to be "WE SERVE". He was exciting to listen to and was motivated to be our future leader

The Saturday evening closing session featured Willie Jolley who is one of America's leading motivational speakers. He built his presentation around five ideas.

a-Wake up and dream.

b-Show up.

c-Stand up.

d-Step up.

e-Make up your mind not to stop until you reach your goals.

He had a really great message which he presented through speech and music.

Last but not least we had the pleasure of hearing from the International President, Ashok Mehta. He and his wife were both introduced and he shared his passions with all of us.

Wow! This was a great experience! Perhaps many of us will plan to attend the forum next Sept 14-16, 2006, in Columbus, Ohio.

Lion Membership Retention

All Lions members not just the club membership chairmen, need to think about retention.

It is easier to keep new members than to do additional recruiting. That is why all clubs and members need to understand why new members leave and what we need to do to keep new members active.

Retention figures tell us that 50 percent of all new members drop out within three years for the following reasons: boring meetings, cliques, and lack of involvement.

Keeping this information in mind, Lions members should strive for informational, fun meetings. Members need to have a reason to attend a meeting and to take something home with them each time. This equates to working on having a good meeting program, a meeting agenda, and an active tail twister to spice up the meeting, and fellowship before and after the meeting.


Club membership chairs are encouraged to conduct orientation sessions within their clubs for all new members and their sponsors. Materials are available from the district or Lions International. The orientation sessions should stress what is involved in being a Lion, goals of International and the local chapter, fund raising, donations, member involvement, opportunities for leadership, responsibility of the sponsor, etc.

Clubs are also encouraged to hold club retreats for all club members early in the year. This retreat should focus on reviewing club programs for fundraising, meetings, and donations, identifying problems, surveying members' input, and establishing goals and direction for the club.

Membership retention is the joint responsibility of club members and officers, as well as the new members' sponsor.

Note: International has made a club retreat a requirement for achieving 100 percent club status for the year.

The Monthly Activity Reports should be sent at the same time to me, the zone chairman, and to Vice District Governor Carla Bender (it says "points chairman" on the form-ignore that, and send it to VDG Carla). I appreciate all of the work that you secretaries do, and I know that you will come through for me.

Each new year begins like every new morning-full of promise and possibilities, with bright hopes and goals. Many of the rural clubs in farming communities are just getting going now, and still competing with a late harvest. As you meet, set some definite goals for your group this year. I will be visiting with many of you soon. The October visitation schedule looks like this:

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


