New England Lions bring Santa to North Dakota women's prison

Shortly before Christmas, "Santa" paid a visit to the Dakota Women's Correctional Rehab Center. Inmates at the state women's prison were treated to a visit with the old bearded gentleman, and each was given a sack of peanuts and candy.

Each inmate was also given the option of having her picture taken with Santa. Many of those pictures find their way back to the homes of those inmates, where they are enjoyed by family members

members.

Each year since the facility opened, the New England Lions have brought Santa to the Center. "You can't believe how much this means to these women," one of the inmates said. "They've been asking for weeks, 'Is Santa coming this year'?"

Some of the inmates have been there since the Santa visits began. Others were "first-timers" this season. But nearly all of

them enjoy the visits, and the bag of goodies.

One of those first-timers said she was very familiar with the work of the Lions. She had been involved in one of the organization's major sight preservation projects before getting into drug related trouble and finding herself in prison. "I really

hope I can work with the Lions again after I am released," she said.

The New England Lions have been Santa's helpers for several years before the prison was located in New England. With funds donated by community businesses, the Lions purchase peanuts and candy. Just before Christmas, 25-30 Lions gather to "sack candy." It's a time of fellowship and fun for the members, who enjoy putting smiles on the faces of kids of all ages.

Again this year, goodie sacks were distributed to the students at the New England school following their annual Christmas musical program. Santa was well rehearsed, having just hours before, spread his Christmas joy to the inmates at the prison. "This was a highlight of my life," he said following the stop at the prison. "These girls really seemed to appreciate it."

Santa also visited the Tumbleweed Day Care Center with more sacks of candy. The joy and awe displayed on their young faces, although different than the expressions of gratitude given by the inmates, also help understand the joy of giving, and the true spirit of Christmas.



My wife and I have a large family, which includes our grown children, grandchildren and now a great grandchild. Our encouragement to them always is to treat each other as we treat our best friends. We ask them to remember when you need help and support; you can always turn to your family.

Our Lions Code of Ethics asks us and I quote, "To be careful with my criticism and liberal with my praise, to build up and not destroy." The Lions Creed asks us and I quote, "To always see the best in others and give the best that I have."

These messages are similar to what we have tried to teach our family. They're just

common, decent thoughts.

Where am I going with this? On Oct. 27-29, 2006, the Dickinson Lions Club with the help of some others hosted the North Dakota State Lions Convention. From what I have heard from many including our Leader Dog presenter Lion Leonard Quinn and International Director Dr. Beverly Roberts, this was a very fine convention with a superior friendly atmosphere.

However, when all was said and done, this convention was short on money to pay for the expenses. The income was too low

to meet all the expenses. Why? This was not the fault of the planners. The people (Lions) worked very hard to have a solid convention, one that would encourage all to want to go to another one.

I believe we need to do a paradigm shift and look at what has been happening. We have nearly 3,400 Lions in North Dakota and yet only 221 Lions registered for this convention. What is the purpose of the State Convention? Is it leadership development, a convenient venue for State meetings (Eye Bank, ND Foundation, and PDGs), district meetings, social, educational, inspirational, motivational? Should we change the focus since all North Dakota districts are now holding Spring Rallies?

Many of us who registered early did so at the cost of \$25 per person. This amount was charged at the direction of some of you folks at the PDG level. How can anyone possibly come up with a great convention with 61 percent of those in attendance paying \$25? Remember, you were provided with an icebreaker on Friday; breakfast, lunch and dinner on Saturday; and breakfast on Sunday.

I have heard from some of you who are PDGs through e-mails from the sec./treas. of the NDPDG Association. It is really unfair for some of you to work so hard at finding fault with the planners. No, there is nothing fishy going on, no one is cheating anyone, and no one is mismanaging funds. I can't believe I am seeing these things printed and sent in an email by some of us who think we are Lions. If there is a fault, it is mine. I believe we should never have a convention of any kind unless we can count on at least 15 percent of our Lions members participating. Fifteen percent of 3,400 is about 500 Lions.

What has happened to Lions in North Dakota that only about 6.5 percent attend our state convention? Our hosts, the Dickinson Lions, were concerned about low registration, but my optimism helped them believe we would have not less then 350 Lions at the convention. This number would have solved the income problems, but it did not happen.

Once a convention is planned and organized it cannot be unplanned to meet the shortfall of dollars created by too small an early registration fee and too few people registering. If my family was as helpful and supportive to each other in time of need as we have been as a Lions organization, I wonder where we'd be. No family grows up without some growing pains and no organization ever works just the way each of you think it should. Let's see what we

can do to keep the focus on "We Serve" and the next time someone needs you, please, just be there. By the way, the North Dakota Directory has in it a section entitled the "Memorandum of Understanding". The answer to our problem is on page 102.

Thank you to all Lions Clubs in 5NW for your attitude about Lionism. Shirley and I have enjoyed the thirty-three club visitations we have made through December 2006 and look forward to more in 2007. It is really great to observe how each club has set its focus on helping their community, our state and International Lions activities.

I'm asking each club to begin the process of electing new officers for the 2007-2008 year at this time. All PU-101 forms, which include all newly elected officers needs to be in my hands by the end of March, 2007. I will need copies for both District and International use. Also, thank you to all the club secretaries for the timely manner in which your Monthly Activity Reports and the Monthly Membership Reports have been sent in.
