Hall of Fame recognizes Barsness

The Minot Lions are pleased to share our excitement in honoring Lion Olger Barsness. He received the honor of Hall of Fame member from the North Dakota Past District Governors. Past District Governor David Blackstead made the presentation at the Dec. 17 meeting of Minot Lions Club. Lion Blackstead is the current executive secretary to the North Dakota Past District Governors Association.

Lion Olger Barsness exemplifies service to community. He continues to have high energy, enthusiasm and positive attitude. He is a credit to the Minot Lions Club and to Lions International as he makes a constructive difference for others. This is based on his continuing service to Lions Clubs International at the age of 95.

Lion Olger is a past district governor, Minot Lions past president and a member for 53 years. The Minot Lions Club inducted him into Lions Clubs International in January of 1954. He has served in an officer or committee member for most of those years. A Melvin Jones Fellowship was awarded in 1989.

Noteworthy for Lions has been his participation in 13 state conventions, 18 multiple district conventions and international conventions at Phoenix, Ariz.; Las Vegas, Nev.; Toronto, Canada; Miami, Fla. and Nice, France.

He has been credited with many new members to Lions and was an integral part of the organizing of clubs at Velva, Drake, Towner, Sawyer, Magic City at Minot, Beulah, Burlington, Fountaine Hills in Ariz., Westhope, and Ahwatukee in Ariz. credits Olger with numerous additional members.

Lion Olger and his wife, Viola, celebrated 70 years of marriage prior to her death. They reared three daughters and one son and have 12 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren.

Family and church are very important to Lion Olger. He has been active in his

church and is also proud of his family.

Olger was a farmer and then a baker, owning his own business. He first was a baker in Velva, at the Velva Bakery. He then moved to Minot to conduct his business at Minot City Bakery. The list of achievements and participation identifies his service in the North Dakota Bakers Association, serving as president in 1970-71. He retired from business in 1974. Olger continues to bake specialty breads for his church dinner food sales.

Lion Olger Barsness was and continues to be active in other organizations. Some of those memberships and affiliations are: Bethany Lutheran Church; Norsk Hostfest;

Sons of Norway; Elks Lodge; Moose Lodge and Eagles Club. He was Minot Housing Authority chairman in 1972; served on the Salvation Army Advisory Board for 20 years and served the USO.

In past years, Lion Olger continued to be recognized for selling more light bulbs during our annual light bulb sale than any other member of the club. Light bulbs are no longer a fund raiser. He now places his support for the more recent fund raisers such as the German Feast and the Garlic and Grape Festival. He continues to collect eye glasses from the community. Since the inception of this project he has worked unselfishly by helping to clean, sort, bag, catalog and ship thousands of pairs of eye glasses for distribution through charitable groups in Central America. Lion Olger's presence as a Lion has been felt not only in North Dakota and Arizona, but in other countries through this activity.

Lion Olger has promoted fun as well as service during weekly club meetings in various ways. One of those is through the collection of loose change for Lions funds. He has promoted caring for needy individuals in our community through the purchase of eye glasses.

Lion Olger remains active in service to community and serves as a role model for the younger (which is all of us) Lions. He rarely misses a weekly Lions meeting and is frequently the first Lion in the door and the last one to leave each meeting. In the hurried pace of daily life, packed with work, responsibilities to our families and our best efforts to serve our neighbors and our world, we sometimes forget to reflect and reevaluate. But reflection is necessary in the life of every business, organization and human being and it is important to set aside a quiet, peaceful time for that purpose.

Fortunately, the coming of the New Year every Jan. 1 offers us the perfect opportunity to look back and look ahead. As you look back on our year of leadership, now half completed, I know that you will recall it as a year of milestones and celebrations.

We have had good reason to celebrate. The year 2007 was the 50th for Leo Clubs, the 20th for women in Lions Clubs and the 90th of our association. Perhaps the greatest reason to celebrate has been the growth of our worldwide membership, which has increased by over 3,300 since July 1. This is the largest net growth the association has had, in many years, for this period.

The reintroduction of October growth has also helped with an increase in membership. A trend toward better retention of our members also contributes to this increase. In addition, our worldwide presence continues to grow in both breadth and depth. Lions in each constitutional area have succeeded in establishing new clubs where none existed before.

Without a doubt, this great news is due to three factors:

*Our innovative programs to recruit women, young people and entire family groups;

*The enthusiasm with which Lions the world over have embraced the challenge to change, and

*The hard work and imagination of the staff at international headquarters.

I say, "Bravo!" to all. I expect this most positive trend to continue into 2008 and that membership reports will give us even more reason to celebrate in the next Lions year.

The celebration of our 90th anniversary at the international convention in Chicago last July was certainly an exciting event, but there will be even greater excitement at the 2008 International

Convention in Bangkok this coming June.

There we will celebrate the successful conclusion of Campaign SightFirst II (CSFII), which is poised to meet and exceed its goal of raising US\$150 million to fund the continuation and expansion of the SightFirst program. But your club's participation is critical to our success.

With more than US\$125 million raised, we have achieved 80 percent of our minimum goal. Until we reach this minimum goal, many millions of people will not receive life-changing SightFirst services. In the coming months, lead your club's efforts to do all it can to ensure that we will celebrate CSFII's success this June. CSFII is our most ambitious and wide-reaching initiative in Lions' history and one that is at the heart of our mission as Lions: to save sight.

In thinking about the future, I hope that you are also planning for the leadership of your club after your year in office is completed. And at the district level, you should be also be aware that Lions Clubs International took some key first steps to further outline the position of Second Vice District Governor, a position that is used effectively in many multiple districts worldwide. Many of us see this position as key to easing the workload of district governors while providing a training ground for more future leaders.

Your club may wish to do something similar by creating "assistant" roles for your club's officers or committee chairperson positions, and to reserve those spots for younger or newer members. I have seen this successfully done in Germany where some clubs have "Assistant Treasurers" or "Assistant Secretaries" etc. reserved for newer members or the 'next generation' as some call it. Taking such steps not only will ensure a strong and vigorous chain of future leaders, but it will also help ensure better retention through enhanced member involvement.

You have my thanks for all you do as well as my very best wishes for this holiday season and for another year of successful service in 2008.



New Process for Monthly Membership Reporting by Clubs

Effective April 2008

Overview & Frequently Asked Questions

Overview

Beginning in April 2008, there will be a change in the submission dates for clubs to report their monthly membership reports (MMRs). These reporting changes will apply both to clubs that report their membership transactions online (though the online WMMR system) and for clubs that submit paper MMRs to international headquarters. As explained below, the overall goals are to (1) enable LCI to produce more timely cumulative monthly membership reports, and (2) provide more consistency and accuracy between the LCI cumulative monthly member report and Club Billing Statements and District Financial Recap reports.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: What exactly will be the changes to monthly membership reporting?

Currently, membership reporting is released by LCI on a one-month lag. For example, the May Cumulative Membership and Club Summary Report is released on June 29th and utilizes transactions (adds or drops) that are created through on the 28th of June. As such, the "May" report has transactions that were created from May 28th through June 28th 4:00 PM (local time in Oak Brook).

Under the new membership reporting process, which will become effective in April 2008, reports will be released as of the most recent calendar month end. For example, the May report will have transactions that were created from May 1^{st} – May 31st. The report will be generated 5 days after the last day of the month.

Q: Why were the changes necessary?

This will allow the association to report membership on a timely basis.

Q: Will the due dates change for monthly membership reporting?

Yes, for clubs that report online through the WMMR system, transactions must now be entered by the **last day of the current month.** And for clubs that file paper MMR reports, they must submit paper MMRs to LCI by the **20**th of the current month.

Transaction entered on the WMMR will be reported in the current month. For example, transactions entered on July 7th will be considered a "July" reporting.

Mailed reports, must be received by the 20th of the month, to be included in that month's cumulative report. Reports, received after that date, will be recorded in the membership system with the current month; however will be included in the next month's cumulative report.

Lions Clubs throughout the world have had a distinguished record in the area of Cultural/Community project. The mission statement encourages Lions Club to cultivate the human qualities and values that stimulate individual creativity, enliven the community, and animate the human spirit.

Lions Clubs International believes that person can come to an authentic and full humanity through the cultivation of those natural qualities and values, which will enhance the development of the human person, the good of their community, and society in general.

I encourage all clubs to appoint a Cultural/Community activities chairman, establish a club website, and identify cultural activities to benefit the community. Clubs should consider specific cultural needs of handicapped, elderly, and youth when planning activities. Don't forget to take pictures and send them to Lions International as well as The North Dakota Lions newspaper.

Such activities to consider include: arrange an art exhibit. Sponsor a photography contest, donate books to a local library or a school RIF program. Sponsor an outstanding citizen award, 'provide cultural opportunities for a physically or mentally challenged person. Sponsor a current or historical clothing fashion show for a fundraiser, collect good used jackets to provide for needy kids, arrange a food festival featuring local or ethnic foods, create a fundraising meal (i.e.: pancake breakfast, fish fry, spaghetti dinner).

Build community pride by organizing a hands-on service project to beautify or improve your neighborhood or community (adopt a park, adopt a zoo, plant trees). Sponsor a public speaking contest, help with the local library in organizing a reading club for children, work with school to help provide or maintain musical instruments for student usage, sponsor local sporting events (basketball, hockey, volleyball tournament), or support community theater by organizing a drama festival or help build sets, or make costumes for theatrical productions.

Some things done in other countries include support art festivals, dance workshops, concerts and literary contests. Feature their history and restoration of buildings, fountains and artwork. Charity concerts and seminars are popular cultural activities, folk and tribal dance performances, choirs, festivals, parks and parades.

An award will be given to a club within our district that has been most active in organizing Cultural/Community activities. The award will be granted on the basis of service to others (Activity organized and implemented to benefit people's knowledge, attitudes, values and mutual understanding and cooperation), involvement (activity should take an active interest in the civic, cultural, social or moral welfare of the community), originality (Develop activities that are fresh, new and exciting in ways that will draw community interest and participation of members), and public relations (encourage Lions Clubs to enhance their public image by publicizing Cultural/Community activities through news media and other avenues.)

Q: Will this eliminate the LCI cumulative monthly membership reports being a month behind? Yes, the reports will now contain current monthly data, rather than being a month behind.

Q: Must club secretaries still report monthly?

Yes, to help LCI more accurately reflect membership numbers, clubs will still need to report monthly. Previous month's reporting can no longer be submitted past the month's cutoff date.

Q: Will the new reporting dates change the deadline for club charter applications?

The only change for charter applications occurs in the month of June. In order to be chartered in the current fiscal year, completed club charter applications need to be received at LCI headquarters by **June 20**th. Applications can be received electronically or by fax if necessary.

Q: When will the change in reporting be implemented?

The new reporting will be effective for membership reporting for the month of April 2008.


Q: How many clubs now report online through the WMMR system?

More than 70% of clubs worldwide now report online via the WMMR system. If your club would like to report online and thus be eligible for the latest filing date each month, please contact the Information Technology division by email at: wmmr@lionsclubs.org to receive a password and basic instructions.

the first filing deadline will be Nov. 15, 2008. is not possible, would you please mail So why am I mentioning this so early? Many clubs do not meet in the summer and then spend the fall getting up to speed. It will be easy to miss this important deadline. Also, there supposedly will be no paper form and all filings will need to be made electronically. The IRS suggests going to a local library, etc. if the organization has no Internet access. Additionally, the organizations filing will need a FID#. Thus organizations that do not currently have a FID# will need to apply for one. This can be done electronically or snail mail. Regardless, some lead-time should be allocated for acquiring the necessary information/documentation to file. More comprehensive and detailed information is available on the LCI website (if you have Internet access of course).

Membership

Membership has now become a critical issue. I have received notification from LCI concerning our 'Status' as a District. We have been under the minimum requirements for a district in good standing (35 clubs and 1,250 members) for over two years. This means: LCI will not pay for the DGE's partner to attend the International Convention; we can not sponsor a candidate for International Director and other LCI positions; we have less dues revenue (without increasing dues) to administer the district functions; we have a smaller pool from which to glean leadership talent and assist in community and district service projects. Each club will have already or will soon receive a letter from the District Membership Chair addressing these issues. The Cabinet meeting Jan. 12, 2008, will also address these issues.
