Bismarck North Star and Prairie Rose Lions Renovate GPAD Cabin

Last March two Bismarck Lions clubs collaborated to put into action their motto, "We Serve," and at the same time bolstered the mission of the Great Plains Assistance Dogs for America Foundation (GPAD).

The resulting service project was the perfect blend of "Spring housecleaning" and home improvement. The Bismarck North Star and Prairie Rose Lions combined their skills, talents, volunteer time and their clubs' charitable funds to renovate Apartment 925, originally constructed in 1991, at Jud.

Three months, \$984.00, and 299 volunteer hours later, Apartment 925 (also known as the two Lions clubs' adopted cabin) is now a much more appealing temporary home for the students and their family members that live in the apartment during the three weeks that they are expected to live on-site, train and bond with their new service dogs.

Since March 15, North Star Lions have painted the entire interior of the 572-square-foot cabin, installed a new door lock, replaced weather stripping on both exterior doors, adjusted two interior doors, repaired the bathroom sink drain, installed new track for the closet door in the bedroom, installed a new kitchen ceiling light fixture (also replacing a fluorescent bulb with an incandescent one), re-tiled both the kitchen and bathroom floors, purchased a gently-used hide-a-bed and cover, and raised a handicap-accessible ramp.

Between March 15 and June 1 seven North Star Lions, including Project Chair Lion Larry Tosseth, Lion Jim Bumann, Jim Bumann, Jr., Lion Dave Charles, Lion Don Jorgenson, Guest Myron Rosene, and Lion

Jim Selby, donated a total of 213 volunteer hours to the renovation of the cabin.

After spending nine hours repairing the bathroom sink drain and painting on March 15, Myron Rosene, a retired

Master Plumber, was inducted into the North Star Lions Club at their regular May membership meeting.

The North Star Club contributed \$855.00 of the total \$984.00 home improvement costs spent to renovate the cabin.

Since March 15 four Prairie Rose Lions members have spent a day helping the North Star Lions paint the interior cabin walls and another cleaning; with the majority of their volunteer hours spent on planning, designing, sewing, purchasing and mounting various styles of window treatments for the seven cabin windows.

Prairie Rose President Bev Charles, and Club members Lori Newgard, JeAnne Selby and Carole Tosseth have volunteered a total of 86 hours between March 15 and June 1. Forty-eight hours, or 56 percent of their volunteer hours was spent designing and sewing window treatments from fabrics donated by Lion President Charles. The Prairie Rose Lions contributed a total

of \$129.00 of charitable funding to this service project.

The seed for this service project was planted at the 2007 State Lions Convention at Jamestown, with an invitation to "come tour our facility some time." Following State Convention, North Star Lion Larry Tosseth and his wife Carole (who joined the Prairie Rose Lions in the weeks following State Convention) accepted the invitation, detoured through Jud, and toured the GPAD facility enroute to their home in Bismarck.

Lion Larry was so impressed with the program, training process and mission of GPAD that he presented a volunteer proposal to the North Star Board of Directors at their next meeting. Board members also shared Lion Larry's vision and enthusiasm and asked him to make a

presentation to the general membership. Lion Larry had requested and received a "wish list" of priorities from GPAD officials; he shared the list with club members as part of his presentation. As the old cliché goes, "And the rest is history."

Prairie Rose Lions Carole Tosseth and JeAnne Selby returned from that first nine-hour day of painting (and tour of the GPAD facility) last March as enthusiastic as North Star Larry Tosseth had been following his first facility tour. Lion JeAnne also was asked to give a short presentation to the Prairie Rose Board of Directors at their late March board meeting. This was followed by an illustrated presentation (including slides of the cabin) at their April general membership meeting. The North Star Lions wanted help with the window treatments for the cabin; the consensus of the Prairie Rose Board of Directors,

On Saturday, Oct. 11, we will be running in the Baltimore Marathon as a member of the Tissue Banks International "Run for Vision."

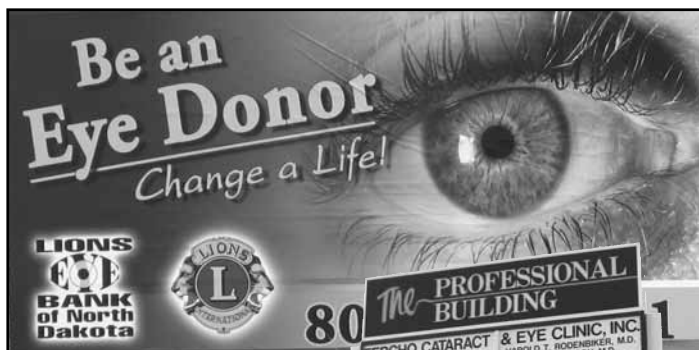

Lions State Convention seminars are announced

The planning committee for the 2008 State Lions Convention has announced the list of seminars which will be available at the "Caribbean Nights" Lions gathering at the Ramkota Hotel Oct. 24 and 25. All of the sessions listed below are on Saturday the 25th, and there are both Lions-based programs, and those of community interest.

Although the schedule may be tweaked a little as the convention draws near, the following informational programs are tentatively listed at 10:15 a.m. to 11. Magic City Lion Josh Ressler will explain the North Dakota Leadership Seminar, an outstanding program for high school students across the state. North Star Lion Ron Rebinistch of Basin Electric will discuss the development of wind power in North Dakota, and PDG Chuck Whitney of Bowman will report on the fun at the MD5 Youth Exchange Camp in Medora, which was hosted by 5NW this last July.

From 11 to 11:45, Minot Lion Terry Narum will tell us of his continuing quest to re-cycle as many eyeglasses as there are people in North Dakota (... he's getting closer!). Nathaniel Humphrey of Game and Fish will discuss the current lead-in-game controversy and other outdoor topics, and the students from University of Mary, Dickinson State University, and UND, will inform us about starting Campus Clubs.

In the afternoon from 2:15 until 3 p.m. the visiting International Director Patty Hill will host a Question and Answer session. Mandan Lion and optometrist Dr. Long will tell us of his trip to Hungary, and North Dakota Parks representative Doug Prchal will take us on a tour of great destinations in the state.

Is this everything of interest? By no means! The re-districting of the state, cutting us down from three Lions districts into two, promises to be a hot topic in the district and state meetings, as well as the hallways.

There are other interesting developments as well. Can you believe we might put

together a Lions chorus? A Stride Walk for Diabetes? A work project for those of you who would rather DO than LISTEN? Details on these last three options will be available in next month's ND LION!

Until then, the convention committee desperately needs the registrations to be sent in so we can plan more effectively. We are trying a new approach — registrations are separate from food costs, enabling convention attendees to choose only those meals which they wish to attend. Please refer to the registration blank printed in this issue for more information. Remember that if your club is sending in registrations as a group, EVERY FIFTH REGISTRATION IS FREE. No names are necessary now, but names, food choices, and additional food costs must be sent in by Oct. 15. But we need the registrations sent in as soon as possible so we can figure out how many Lions will be in attendance.

experience. To watch how Lions move up the chairs on the steps of leadership. It was wonderful to watch out-going International President Mehendra from Sir Lanka as he handed out awards and make

as well as the general membership, was that Prairie Rose wanted to provide that help.

Both North Star Project Chair Lion Larry Tosseth and Prairie Rose President Lion Bev Charles agree that the governing boards and general memberships of both clubs needed little persuasion to sign on to this service project. Said North Star Lion Larry, "Our club members were so receptive to the project and so willing to provide the support of both their volunteer time and club dollars." Prairie Rose President Lion Bev Charles adds, "When the North Star approached us for help with the window treatments, it just seemed like a natural fit of the missions of Lions clubs and GPAD."

The mission of the Great Plains Assistance Dogs Foundation is "to assist individuals living with disabilities to gain greater independence and opportunities by the use of trained working assistance dogs." The GPAD provides service dogs to those who are wheel-chair-bound, those with emergency medical needs, as well as response dogs for those who have seizures or more debilitating diabetes, and therapeutic dogs for nursing homes or home-bound individuals.

At various times throughout the past three months, as the North Star and Prairie Rose members have called GPAD staff

to set up work days or request additional information pertinent to their projects, at least four of the GPAD staff members have praised the volunteer efforts of Lions members. According to Vicki McMahon, GPAD Kennels and Maintenance, "The Lions have done an excellent job of renovating the cabin; it's really nice now. And we were happy to hear that both clubs are discussing additional projects to further improve the cabin."

Both Lions clubs have already identified additional opportunities for service projects at the GPAD facility. Although the Prairie Rose members have two
