The Lions motto, "We Serve" was evident throughout the two-day 2008 State Lions Convention held in Bismarck October 24 - 25.

Although successful North Dakota State Lions conventions consist of numerous meetings, keynote addresses, informational or motivational breakout sessions and an ice breaker, the 2008 event offered several first-time opportunities for service as well.

Service Opportunities: Those not attending Friday board or committee

meetings volunteered, folding and stamping Chapter newsletter inserts for the West Dakota Red Cross Chapter, while other Lions participated in the Diabetes Stride Walk. The Stride Walk, chaired by PDG Carla Bender, and staffed by Bismarck Prairie Rose Lions, continued Saturday morning, October 25. The proceeds from the Stride Walk, along with half of the silent auction proceeds, will benefit diabetes research and Camp Sioux, a North Dakota camp for children with type I diabetes.

The silent auction, co-chaired by PDG Tim and Region 2

Chair Lynell Thueson, raised a total of \$2,125. The Thuesons thank the many Lions, clubs and businesses across the state that contributed items for the successful auction. The other half of the silent

auction proceeds will benefit Great Plains Assistance Dogs of Jud.

INSIDE INTERNATIONAL

As a rule there are few issues, especially emotional issues, that are debated and decided at the annual district meetings of the three North Dakota Lions districts. These meetings are held during the North



Dakota State Lions Convention each year. This was not the case this year, however. A 2/3rds majority vote by each district on the issue of redistricting (changing from the current three districts to two) was required in order for the redistricting process to continue. The results of the voting were: DISTRICT 5NE

PASSED UNANIMOUSLY DISTRICT 5NC PASSED UNANIMOUSLY DISTRICT 5NW DEFEATED---YEA 8, NAY 26 (unofficial)

The motion on redistricting that each district was asked to consider in essence was: "Two of the three North Dakota districts must attain a net gain of 75 members by March 31, 2009. If that bench mark is not attained the districts will moved forward with redistricting."

The reason for the redistricting proposal is primarily that all of our association constitution and bylaws documents (LCI, MD5 and the districts) require that a district maintain a minimum of 1250 members and 35 clubs in order to be in good standing. As of October 31, the three North Dakota districts were all well below this requirement.

Another reason for complying with constitutional requirements is economic, pure and simple. At least 1250 members and 35 clubs are needed in a district for it to be financially sound. The districts that are below standard are the districts that create the need for dues increases at all levels. Districts that are below standard are being subsidized by districts that are above standard. Districts that are below standard have limitations in the amount of expenses that are paid by LCI for district governor training. In addition, substandard districts cannot endorse a candidate for International Director. And the list goes on

The position of Lions Clubs International is to not force districts to redistrict if they are below standard, but rather to allow the districts to police themselves and be responsible stewards of the constitution and bylaws. As a result of this position, our three districts have been in a substandard posture for, in some cases, 15 to 20 years. The redistricting proposal was designed to finally correct this flaw.

The reason given by some District 5NW leaders for their rejection of the redistricting proposal is that they feel they will be able to bring their district up to standard by chartering new clubs and pursuing an aggressive membership drive.

So now what??

District 5NW has made its decision as explained above. Districts 5NE and 5NC have at least two options. They are:

1. Do nothing. Just continue as before.

2. Become one district.


Based on a small sampling of Lion leaders in districts 5NE and NC there seems to be strong interest in looking into the possibility of becoming one district by eliminating their common border. If this happens it would become part of the Multiple District 5 redistricting proposal that will be acted upon at the MD5 convention next June in Minot and, if approved, forwarded on to the LCI Board of Directors for final approval.

IONS SEE FRUITS OF THEIR LABOR

Members of the Garrison Lions Club got a pleasant surprise during their regular monthly meeting Monday night. The club received a check for just over \$3,200 -- its share of the profits of the Souris Valley Garlic & Grape Festival. The event was Sept. 20 in Minot.

In presenting the check, Josh Ressler of the Minot Magic City Lions, said, "It's money that clubs can go back to their communities and do something with."

The Garlic & Grape Festival is a oneday event featuring food laced with garlic, wine tasting, crafts, entertainment and education. Lions clubs in District 5NC Zone 3A sponsor the Garlic & Grape Festival. Those clubs include Minot, Minot Magic City, Plum Valley, Sawyer and Garrison.

For the festival, the Garrison Lions developed a garlic butter laced potato with a variety of condiments, including a garlic-spiced taco mixture. After a number of prototypes were taste-tested, club members came to a unanimous decision on what garlic-flavored product would be served. Club members voted to call the dish "G-SPUD" or Garlic Sakakawea Potato Under Development. The product was made-to-order for customers by Garrison Lions Club members at the festival.

Those who participated in serving the G-SPUD agreed the festival is something the club will take part in again.

"This was a lot of fun," Don Gackle said of the process of developing the product and taking part in the festival.

Ressler concurred.

"It's about having a good time and doing it for a good purpose," he said.

Club members will determine at an upcoming board meeting how or where the proceeds will be spent locally. But those in attendance approved \$100 for expansion of the North Dakota Heritage Center, \$100 to North Dakota Leadership Seminar (leadership training for high school sophomores) and \$150 to Great Plains Assistance Dogs in Jud.

State Convention

Redistricting THE PROS AND THE CONS

First of all there seems to be some confusion so I will spell it out the best I can here and if you still have questions please don't hesitate to call or e-mail me.

First of all contrary to what we were told at the district meeting we are not classified by Lions Clubs International as "An Illegal Entity", when I contacted Nancy Gearhart manager for the English Language Department at Lions Clubs International this is what she told me.

"In response to your specific question about terminology used to describe districts that do not meet the constitutionally required membership minimum, the association uses "districts with less than 35 clubs/1250 members in good standing" when referring to these districts in general and "districts with less than 35 clubs/1250 members in good standing for over two years" when referring to the districts that have not met the membership requirement for two years or more. This is the

Replacement phrase for "transitional districts". "To my knowledge, the Association does not use the term "illegal entity" to describe these districts."In good standing" references the clubs and members not the district, as we discussed."

Now there were some that had questions regarding the ability to nominate an International Director as a district with less than 35 clubs or 1250 members we CAN NOT!!! Also due to the fact that we are below the level of 1250 members our District Governor does not have the expenses of their spouse paid for to the International Convention by Lions Clubs International, on the other hand I asked this question of Nancy Gearhart a little over a year ago and I will give you now what she sent me so that you can see what I'm telling you comes from Lions Clubs International.

"Dear Vice District Governor Trotter,

We discussed districts with less than 35 clubs and 1,250 members a month ago. I promised to send you an answer to your question, "If a district in this situation increases its membership before June 2008 will the association pay for the travel expenses for the DGE's spouse to attend the DGE Seminar and international convention in Bangkok?"

The answer is no. Districts below 35/1250 and provisional districts showing a marked achievement in net membership gain in a full fiscal year will have the transportation expenses for the spouse of that year*s district governor to attend the DGE Seminar and the international convention reimbursed as a special recognition of efforts for that fiscal year in retention of members as the first step toward membership growth."

Now Lions Clubs International is aware that Multiple District 5 is looking at redistricting but they are not telling us that we have to do this as long as each district and the Multiple District is paying it's bills which we currently are but as you've seen due to the decreasing membership we have had to increase dues in certain areas

If your club has a special event coming up that you would like me to attend please notify me as soon as possible as I am finishing my visitation schedule and I would hate to get an invitation to your club and already be scheduled to be at another. 

TRIPLE T CAN HELP SOLVE MEMBERSHIP WOES

Lions Clubs are researching ways to effectively recruit, involve and retain members. It has become increasingly evident when time and financial commitments are expected volunteers are reluctant to become members of service club.

Research by several well-known sociologists has suggested serviced clubs can be successful in recruiting, involving and retaining members if new approaches that complement the needs and life style of current generations are met. A program recently developed by a group of Lion leaders has used this research to develop an interactive, multi-media presentation that has received very positive reviews.

Transfusion, Transition, Transformation (also referred to as Triple T or TTT) has been presented in 19 states and 4 Canadian provinces using qualified trainers. The interactive, multi-media approach allows involvement by the participants as well as visual (DVD) examples of the nine modules presented. PDG Jim Jaggers of Oregon offers testimony as to the success of TTT, which also reflects comments from many other evaluations received. "The work PDG Steve Thomson has done with the Triple T program in District 36-0 has turned the corner...We just need to keep up the momentum. For the first time since 2002, District 0 has a positive net gain...and the establishment of two new clubs. More importantly, the Lions who have participated in TTT have helped move the District forward with a 'can do' attitude. DG Sharon Elder is committed to continue the work with TTT and it is incorporated in the Multiple District 5 year plan."

Bob dedicated more than 24 years of his life as a Gateway Lion serving people with sight loss, in many ways. He was instrumental in forming the yearly "Bowling for the Blind" program in Fargo. He participated in the Lions All Star Basketball fundraising event and provided a kind listening ear when one was encountering rough times. However, most noteably were Bob's contributions of providing transportation. When he was not able to drive himself, his wife or other Gateway Lions Club members were inspired

by him to provide rides. Bob drove people to doctor appointments, Vision and Braille Support Group meetings, and even assisted them with grocery shopping. He also made arrangements to rent a van and trailer to "hit the road," and drove us to the Adult Summer Camp near Dawson, the Annual NDAB State Conventions, and other NDAB functions. Bob often encouraged the Gateway Lions to help subsidize the cost of chartering a bus to transport participants to Ski for Light in Deadwood, South Dakota. This yearly January event is a program of cross-country skiing benefiting adults who are blind, visually-impaired, and mobility-impaired. His usual parting words were, "Hey Kiddo, if you have somewhere you need to go, just let me know." As you can see, Bob's commitment to those who needed assistance was evident by his actions.

Bob did not seek nor want recognition, but nonetheless was given numerous awards by the Lions and was named a Melvin Jones Fellow recipient in 2002. Only three months after receiving the Service Award at Fargo, Bob died Sept. 9th, 2008. He is sorely missed by all of us and his spirit will continue to inspire many. Our sympathies are with his beloved wife Virginia, his extended family and fellow Lions members.
