MD5 redistricting is a go

At its regular fall meeting in New Orleans, the LCI Board of Directors approved the Multiple District 5 redistricting proposal. This action paves the way for a redesigned MD5 to begin operation on July 2, 2010.

The primary change that redistricting brings to MD5 is to reduce the number of sub-districts from nine to six. Saskatchewan will now have two sub-districts instead of the current four, North Dakota will change from three sub-districts to two and South Dakota will remain the same with two sub-districts.

The MD5 redistricting proposal

has been under consideration for nearly two years. It began with the formulation of a step-by-step process, which was done by the MD5 Long Range Planning Committee. All steps in the process were approved by the MD5 Council of Governors with final MD5 adoption of the proposal secured by an overwhelming vote of the delegates to the 2009 MD5 convention in Minot last June. The proposal was then approved by the LCI Board of Directors Oct. 2, 2009.

There are many reasons for the redistricting of MD5 chief of which is declining membership. Our Association constitution and bylaws require sub-districts to have a minimum of 1250 members and 35 clubs. Currently, eight of the nine

sub-districts in MD5 are below the membership requirement.

The time period between October 2, 2009 and July 2, 2010, will be used to reorganize. Large amounts of planning and decision making will be required to provide for a smooth transition to the newly formed sub-districts. For this reason it is very important that clubs make every effort to be represented at the various conventions and conferences that will be held during this transitional period. The time had come for Multiple District 5 to pursue redistricting. I encourage all Lions to view this event as a positive move forward and a means to reinvigorate our great cause.

Team effort takes over recycled eyeglass program

Used eyeglasses still welcome

The Minot Lions Club has handed off two of the three parts of the ND Eyeglass Recycling Program to the Bismarck Lions Club.

The Minot Lions Club will continue as the collection site and do the first sort prior to forwarding used eyeglasses to the Bismarck Lions Club. The Bismarck Lions Club, in conjunction with the Missouri River Correction Center, will do the washing, sanitizing and hand drying prior to reading the prescriptions and bagging the glasses.

The Minot Lions Club has also transferred its two eyeglass reading machines to the Lions Eye Bank in Bismarck for use of the Lions Eye Bank, Bismarck Lions Club and the Missouri River Correction Center or other volunteers willing to read glasses under the direction of the Bismarck Lions Club. The Missouri River Correction Center will use the eyeglass project as part of the preparation process for re-entering convicts from the ND Penitentiary into society.

The Minot Lions Club recently shipped approximately 39,000 pair of glasses, which had been sorted by the Minot Lions Club, to the Bismarck Lions Club. The shipment was made up of glasses ready to be read as well as glasses needing to be washed and dried at the Bismarck facilities.

A special thank you to Cross-Country Courier for taking care of the expenses related to the shipment. Your help is always welcome.

The Minot Lions Club wishes to thank the Bismarck Lions Club for spearheading these two very important and time-consuming parts of the ND Eyeglass Recycling Program. The club also continues to encourage Lions Clubs as well as other sight minded organizations to continue collecting used eyeglasses and sending them to the Minot Lions Club for the initial sort. Currently, the ND Eyeglass Recycling program has processed in excess of 650,000 pair of glasses over the last eleven years and with the help of the Bismarck Lions Club.

State Historical Society Foundation to discuss partnership with Lions Clubs at convention

Staff from the State Historical Society of North Dakota Foundation will have a booth at the State Lions Convention to visit with Lions members and to display the architect's model of the expanded North Dakota Heritage Center.

At last year's state convention, delegates passed a resolution for each local Lions Club to make a five-year pledge to financially support the expansion of the Heritage Center. "This support provided great leverage with the North Dakota legislators in May when they approved \$39.7 million in state funds for the project," says Bill Schott of Bismarck, a longtime Lions member and a SHSND Foundation development officer. "We want to thank everyone we see at the convention this year for their support."

In addition to the state allocation, the \$51.7 million budget will require the Foundation to raise \$12 million in private and federal funding. Schott will speak at this year's convention asking Lions to help with providing contacts across the state for the Foundation's History's Heroes Program, which is seeking 10 individuals, families or communities from every county in North Dakota to pledge \$10,000.

Schott says throughout the year state Lions have been promoting the expansion in their home towns and at club meetings. Each club has received a case statement and expansion DVD, and detailed information about the project, which adds 97,000 square feet to the state museum on the Capitol grounds. State Lions members also showed their support in Bismarck between January and May when the North Dakota Legislature was in session, including Bruce Schwartz of Bismarck, Past International Director of the North Dakota Lions Clubs, and Chuck Esser of Mandan, a member of the Bismarck Lions Club, who testified at hearings. Many other Lions attended hearings and contacted their local legislators to support the funding.

Schott has been coordinating the statewide fundraising effort between North Dakota service clubs. He has been working with Don Walz of Bismarck, SHSND Foundation Trustee, to involve all statewide service clubs to support this campaign. Contacts have been made to Sertoma Clubs, Optimists, Kiwanis groups and more.

Virginia Nelsen, executive director of the SHSND Foundation, says the expanded North Dakota Heritage Center will make a wonderful gift to the people of North

This abbreviated monthly report is being written less than one week after returning home from the hospital where I had a totally unexpected but very necessary emergency surgery. My initial reaction after returning home and suddenly realizing my monthly governor's report was due was to call the publishing company and tell them they would not be receiving a report from me for this month. After I gave it some more thought, I decided that there were a couple of issues that I needed to get out to the members of 5NE.

State Convention

I have addressed the issue of attendance to the state convention by the respective clubs in my previous reports. And I again take this opportunity to encourage each and every club in the district to send at least one member to the convention in Mandan at the end of this month. (Each club is allowed on voting delegate for each 10 members in your club).

At the coming state convention there will be several important decisions which will have to be made. In no particular order I would name the following: Assuming approval by the International Board of Directors of our request for redistricting, a new constitution will have to be approved. We need the approval of Lion Steve Johnson of the Grand Forks Lions club as 2nd Vice District Governor for the 2009-2010 year. We will also have to select the 2nd Vice District Governor for the coming year with Directors to the North Dakota Eye Bank Board and the North Dakota Lions Foundation Board.

Certainly the more clubs we have represented at the convention, the better off our district will be. Each delegate can then go back to your own club and report directly to your membership. And while I will not attempt to quantify the importance of it, this is a great opportunity to meet new Lions from around the district and state. My first state convention certainly provided me with a new awareness to just how great the Lions organization is. It is my sincere hope to see a tremendous turnout in Mandan.

Youth Exchange Camp

The Lions Youth Exchange Camp, 2011, will be at Wesley Acres Camp near Valley City. All District 5NE clubs are asked to begin thinking about how they want to support the camp and, we hope, interact with the campers.

The camp will need financial support, volunteer Lions to act as counselors, clubs to help us arrange community service projects, and, most important, clubs and club members to share hospitality with youth. Host families will be needed for international youth, too.

Remember; each district in our MD5 is eligible to send a minimum of two campers. A total of 40 youth, 20 from our MD5 and 20 from around the world, will live and learn together in our own United Nations for a week in July 2011. You will want to be a part of the experience.

Dues

It has come to my attention that there seems to be some question as to just how much one must pay over and above the local dues charged by the clubs within 5NE. Each club determines the amount of its local dues and is not included in the figures that follows. The dues owed to Lions Club International (LCI) is \$39 per year with one-half of that amount due in July based on the Monthly Membership Report (MMR) filed by each club Secretary as of June 30 and the second half due in January based on the December 31 MMR.

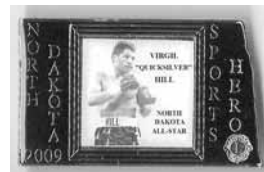
The dues paid to the 5NE Treasurer totals \$17.50 per year and are collected at the same time and like manner of the LCI dues and based on the same MMR's. A breakdown of the \$17.50 is as follows: 5NE-\$8; MD5-\$4; ND Lions Newsletter-\$4; ND State Convention-\$1 and ND Lions Hall of Fame- 50 cents. I trust that this will answer any question regarding the dues paid within 5NE.

There is one other cost that is assessed to each club and is not based on the number of members within the club. Each club has been billed a total of \$5.75 to pay for the MD5 Club Officer Bond.

Visitation

Needless to say, my surgery has somewhat complicated and delayed my visitation plans. Fortunately I had scheduled no visitation that required cancellation. I will not schedule any visitations until I am cleared by my doctor. Once I am cleared to travel I may ask some clubs of a visit within a short period of time. However, I will not visit any club without first receiving the ok of the club president.

As most of you know the little 8-year-old girl, Lilli Mann is losing her eye sight. She was going to China for stem cell treatment. It was brought to my attention by a PDG that we ND District Governors should help Lilli get a host family in China to help with needs such as an interpreter lodging, transportation, etc. Visiting with 5NE's Governor Wayne Westlund, I would be the contact person for the three district governors as this was a state project.

China is one of the newest countries in Lionism. At that point I knew this was not going to be an easy task. I started gathering information from the mother of Lilli. I also received help from LCI. Yoshiko Merz, a Chinese speaking employee at LCI, made contact with the Quinguo Lions club in China. Lion Richard Chu, Vice President of the club, e-mailed me with his phone number. I called him at 6 p.m., not knowing it was 6a.m. in China. He spoke very good English and he stated that the Quindao Lions were going to help Lilli and her family while in China. This is such a great humanitarian effort on behalf of the Chinese Lions Club and Lion Richard Chu. I certainly hope that everything goes well for Lilli and that she will get her eyesight restored after she receives the treatment. I can certainly speak for all Lions in N.D.; our prayers are with this little 8-year-old girl.

Tree Bowl

PDG Carla Bender was invited to accept an award on behalf of the District 5NC Lions Volunteer Organization Tree Award for 2009. She was unable to attend because of a previous commitment; therefore I was invited to accept the award on her behalf. This presentation was held at the Fargo Dome on September 19. Nominations were received from across the state and the award winners were recognized by the North Dakota Forest Service and NDSU.

On July 12, 2006, the small community of Coleharbor was hit by a terrible storm. The catastrophic wind damaged homes, buildings, vehicles and trees throughout the community.

Following the aftermath, the District 5NC Lions hosted an event in Coleharbor to replant trees that had been lost. They put the motto "We Serve" into action. They contacted Bailleys Nurseries and secured a donation of 365 trees. They also were successful in seeking other commercial sponsors, including Great River Energy and West River Cooperative Telephone, to help defray the cost of equipment rental.

Nearly 100 Lions from 13 clubs planted 365 trees in the park, in yards and around town. Members served hamburgers and a picnic lunch for all the volunteers as well as Coleharbor residents.

ND STATE LIONS/ND DISTRICTS CONVENTION RULES 2009

1. The official convention program shall be the order of business.
2. Roberts Rules of Order shall govern on parliamentary procedures. Host District Governor shall appoint a convention parliamentarian and a convention secretary.
3. Presiding Officer – The host District Governor (5NW, DG Kevin Vannett) shall be the designated officer to preside at the state meeting.
4. Quorum – A majority of the registered certified delegates in attendance at a convention session shall constitute a quorum.
5. Lions in good standing must be registered and certified in order to vote on all convention matters. Clubs with indebtedness of \$50 over 90 days old to Lions International or their District will be considered not in good standing.
6. The use of profane language at any business session, social function, or banquet is prohibited.
7. Credential to vote at the District/ND State Convention shall be mailed to the Credentials Committee Chair, Lion Sherry Fetch, 406 4th Avenue NW, Mandan, ND 58554, or delivered upon arrival at the convention in care of the Lions Registration Desk, Mandan Seven Seas, Mandan, ND, no later than 7:00 p.m., Friday, October 30, 2009.
8. CLUB DELEGATE FORMULA. Each chartered club in good standing in Lions Clubs International and its district (single or sub- and multiple) shall be entitled in each annual convention of its district to one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate for each ten (10) members, who have been enrolled for at least one year and a day in the club or major fraction thereof, of said club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month last preceding that month during which the convention is held. The major fraction referred to in this section shall be five (5) or more members. Each certified delegate present in person shall be entitled to cast one (1) vote only for each office to be filled by, and one (1) vote only on each question submitted to, the respective convention.
9. Solicitation or sale of club project items, with the exception of the host district is prohibited.
10. Business sessions shall be smoke free. Smoking areas shall be established outside the business area and for all convention meals.

Leader Dogs for Blind now offers GPS capability

Donations sought for program

When traveling in Memphis, TN last week, we had the good fortune of using a GPS to get around traveling in the city. Imagine trying to follow driving directions to a new location but all the street signs along your route have been removed. Your trip would be difficult and stressful. This is what it is like to travel when you are blind and cannot use street signs for guidance. The GPS technology being used at Leader Dog gives the user 'audible street signs' so they can navigate in a new environment without having to stop and ask for directions.

In April 2009, Leader Dog for the Blind graduated its first class to receive free Trekker Breeze GPS units and training along with their dog guide. The Trekker Breeze, and audible GPS device, gives



step-by-step directions for a programmed route and notifies the user of upcoming streets and landmarks.

Gary Thompson of Springfield, Missouri says, "I love my Breeze. (A hand held GPS unit). It has made my life a lot easier, especially when traveling in new areas. The Breeze and a Leader Dog go together like peanut butter and jelly. For instance, the Breeze announces when I'm nearing a cross street; so when my dog slows down then stops at the curb, I'm completely aware of my situation."

Greg Grabowski, Leader Dog president and CEO, added, "We strongly believe that this technology is an effective tool for independent travelers.

"Preliminary research suggest that people using the device expand their travel environments and experience," he said.

The first letters to all clubs in 5NC have been mailed to the club secretaries. As Leader Dog chair, I would like to encourage all clubs to continue to give as much as they can donate to LEADER DOG.
