Fargo Lions past president Neil Jordheim, treasurer Jason Jaeger and Health Services Committee member Jane Pettinger were on hand for the presentation.

Drs. Kevin Melicher and Barbra Brookshire of Eyecare Associates said during the presentation, "Patients have given so much to our office and staff that it is important that we give back to our community."

The Fargo Lions Club is working through a number of different schools and social services to be sure those in need receive the eyeglasses. Drs. Gary Renier and Lori Scheel, members of the Fargo Lions Club, are active in helping the club identify eye issues and helping the club fulfill Lions mission to eliminate preventable blindness and help those with vision problems.

In addition, during 2009, Eyecare Associates continued its ongoing program, **Our Focus is You**. This program provides eye examinations and eyeglasses to individuals who have no other means of receiving vision care.

Large donations to LCIF despite global recession

In late September, Lion Philip Stern, an attorney and Lions District Governor in District 16-E, New Jersey, presented a US\$95,000 donation to LCIF. The case he won claimed that a debt collector unlawfully left messages for consumers without making proper disclosures. At Stern's suggestion, the court approved a US\$95,000 award to LCIF. More recently, during a welcome reception and LCIF seminar on October 26th in honor of LCIF Chairperson Al Brandel's visit, more than 225 Lions from across The Republic of Korea presented their combined 2009-2010 pledge of more than US\$1.25 million for LCIF. While it is the Lions of Korea's tradition to present a pledge of donation to LCIF each year when the LCIF Chairperson officially visits Korea, this pledge was more than three times the amount usually pledged.

Disaster update

LCIF and Lions have responded to a number of large-scale disasters recently. The Philippines, Samoa and Indonesia have all been affected by natural disasters ranging from earthquakes to typhoons. Updates and other details about LCIF and Lions relief efforts are posted on-line.

Lions Celebrate World Sight

Lions marked World Sight Day in Prague on Thursday, October 8. Typically held the second Thursday of October, the annual event is now in its 10th year and has become an international event of Vision2020. With SightFirst funding from Lions Clubs International Foundation, Lions partnered with Prima Visuz and local ophthalmologists to provide free vision screenings to 125 kindergarten children on Lions World Sight Day at two schools in Prague.

LCIF chairperson

A new partnership with The Clinton Global Initiative will work with LCIF and Lions on a cataract initiative in Peru. In total, 7,500 cataract surgeries are to be performed within the Lima metropolitan area. In addition to fostering new relationships with organizations, LCIF is working to strengthen and expand existing partnerships. The partnership with Special Olympics was extended for 12 months through a US\$1,000,000 grant to continue the Lions-Special Olympics Opening Eyes Program. LCIF's partnership with The Carter Center was also recently extended to continue work with sight restoration in Latin America and Africa.

New partnerships

Earthquake Reconstruction Update

Lions marked the year-and-a-half anniversary of the earthquake in Sichuan Province of China with the official dedication of the Peng Hua Lions Village. LCIF Chairperson Albert Brandel and his wife Dr. Maureen Murphy, Second Vice President Dr. Wing-Kun Tam and Lions from China, Hong Kong & Macau participated in the dedication, handing over the keys to 80 newly constructed homes. The Foundation has awarded more than US\$3 million for reconstruction projects in the area, and Chinese Lions contributed financially to the rebuilding. Lions provided housing, but also helped rebuild the entire village, which was leveled during the earthquake.

Emelly was born with a chromosome disorder that resulted in her being intellectually disabled, unable to move and afflicted regular with seizures, she was unable to sit upright and indicated little, or no, awareness of activity or people.

whose mission is to improve the quality of life for people with disabilities through therapeutic horseback riding and related activities.

"We're so grateful to the Houston East End Lions in Texas who helped make this program possible for our darling Emelly. I know that Lions do so much to help children," said Maria, Emelly's mother. "It really is difficult to describe the benefits of the therapy, but quality of life for Emelly and all our family members, has improved so much. We anticipate continued improvement with this invaluable therapy."

Ruti Korolski, a 8th grade student at Bredenbury School, Bredenbury, Saskatchewan, Canada took a big step towards becoming an internationally recognized artist when she won a local competition sponsored by the Bredenbury and District Lions Club.

Ruti's poster has advanced through the Bredenbury Club, District 5 CA and MD5 levels of competition and is now advancing to the international level, which is the final level in the contest.Ruti's poster



is one of more than 350,000 entries submitted worldwide in the annual Lions International Peace Poster Contest. Lions Clubs International is sponsoring the program to emphasize the importance of world peace to young people everywhere.

"The Power of Peace Keeps Us Together," the 13-yearold from Bredenbury said. The poster was selected for its originality, artistic merit and portrayal of the contest theme, "The Power of Peace" by a panel of judges made up of local artists. The artists were astounded at the imagination of the young participants and the artwork they submitted. Each poster received the appreciation of the judges for their excellent work. The judging was held on November 27, 2009 at Regina, Saskatchewan.

MD 5 Lions Opportunities for Youth Chairperson, Lion Maureen Meston-Pockett, said she was impressed by the expression and creativity of the students from eight of the nine Districts in MD5.

"All the Lions of MD 5 are cheering for Ruti as her poster advances to the international competition, and we hope that her vision will ultimately be shared with others around the world," Lion Meston-Pockett said.

One international grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners will be selected. The grand prize includes a cash award of US\$2,500, plus a trip for the winner, two family members and the sponsoring club president to New York City, New York, USA for the awards ceremony at Lions Day with the United Nations. The 23 merit award winners will each receive a certificate and a cash award of US\$500.







ND launches on-line donor registry

Editor's note: This letter was sent to Karen Thomas, director, Lions Eye Bank of North Dakota.

I am very proud to announce that as of Nov. 17, citizens of North Dakota now have the opportunity to register their donation intentions on-line. Historically, North Dakotans had to make this designation on their driver's license or state identification card. The launch of the new registry provides an additional opportunity for individuals 14 years of age or older to securely and privately document their decision to be a donor from any computer with Internet access.

The new registry is in memory of Alexa Kersting, a 14-year-old girl from West Fargo who died while waiting for a lung transplant in 2004. The goal of the registry is to make it easier for all North Dakotans to save lives through

organ and tissue donation so that other families don't have to endure the loss of a loved one due to a lack of available organs for transplant.

North Dakota has one of the highest donor registration rates in the country with 64 percent of licensed drivers choosing to give the gift of life through donation. The Department of Transportation will manage this registry and the donor registration information will be held in the driver's license database.

The registry will be promoted though a statewide advertising campaign, which will run through January. By providing an additional means for people to register, North Dakota is poised to have the highest rate of donation in the country.

We are very proud of this accomplishment in North Dakota and recognize it is a direct result of a strong community support, including elected officials, hospital leadership, community members and the Department of Transportation.
