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Giving the gift of sight

Death can prove a difficult period no matter what the circumstances. But lost loved ones can live on through the gift of sight.

The Lions Eye Bank of North Dakota has coordinated cornea transplants for nearly 15 years. Since 1995, some 3,000 donors have given vision to others here and abroad.

The cornea is the eye's outermost layer. It is a thin, dome-shaped piece that covers the front of the eye and acts as the eye's primary lens, controlling and focusing the light that enters the eye.

Trained technicians remove the tissue at the hospital in sterile conditions. The procedure takes about an hour.

"We have some packaged kits all ready for them. They have all of the instruments already in there," Thomas said.

The eye bank relies upon a series of Lions volunteers who drive the packaged cornea tissue across the state. "We have relay systems that work really well," said Karen Thomas, the program's executive director.

Recently, a link of drivers was organized from Devils Lake to Jamestown to move tissue to Bismarck

Others make the four-hour trek from Williston, passing on to another

Lions respond to Haiti earthquake victims

Haiti, and the thousands of victims of the earthquake there, are the headlines in the news around the world. And around the world, Lions have sprung into action. driver waiting in Stanley and then another to Minot. Law enforcement agencies like the North Dakota Highway Patrol will help, or eye bank personnel may pick up the last part of a leg if there is no one else to move the tissue.

"We have Lions volunteers in every town," Thomas said. "Tissue comes from every city in North Dakota."

Chuck Esser, a retired environmentalist from Mandan, will go out and meet other drivers and return with the cornea tissue. "We've gone as far as Carrington or halfway to Minot," he said. "Somehow the calls always seem to come in at two in the morning."

Esser has been transporting tissue for the eye bank for four years.

"There is nothing like the feeling of delivering it. When you walk in, you know somebody's waiting for it and it's going to help someone. It's awesome," Esser said.

Retired teacher Jerry O'Connor of Grand Forks has been transporting eye tissue for 10 years between Grand Forks and Fargo. Several of the transports have been from 3 a.m. to 6 a.m. "It's something I can do, so I do it," he said. "You know you're doing something worthwhile.

The tissue may arrive at the eye bank in Bismarck any time of the night or day. "We can get donors at two in the morning, four in the morning or five in the morning," Thomas said. "We're on the clock 24-7."

Time is critical to ensure healthy tissue arrives for safe storage, examination and to be given to a patient with sight issues.

Early consent from family is important. "Usually, we like to have the tissue removed within six hours. After that, we have to have it transplanted within 14 days," Thomas said.

"If someone dies in the hospital, the hospital calls (us), that number gets triaged onto us. We call the families and get consent for the donation," she said.

"They get packed and transported and take them back here to the eye bank," Thomas said. "Once it gets here, we evaluate it"

All cornea tissue is brought to the eye bank headquarters in Bismarck. The donor's medical history and blood samples are sent to the lab in Bismarck.

"We evaluate all the tissue here, do all the screening before we send them out," she said. "Within 12 hours, we would like it here." Arrival time depends on weather conditions. From there, it is stored in a temperature-controlled refrigerator.

Thomas said about 150 North Dakotans donors give cornea tissue per year. Of those, about 100 benefit someone in this state. About 90 percent are used for transplants. About 30,000 corneal transplants are performed a year around the United States

Those interested can be registered on their driver's license.

Donors also may register online at the DOT Web site at www. donate.nd.gov. These steps alert law enforcement and hospital officials of donor status.

The next step requires donors be frank to those closest to them. Family members must give consent when donors cannot

"Let your family know your wishes so that it's not so difficult to make that decision," Thomas said. "... When people die, it can be overwhelming for families ... They're trying to get a lot of things done. "

The cornea tissue helps a whole spectrum of recipients. These

include those who have lost eyesight due to corneal disease, had an accident, eye surgery that went poorly, had cancer in their eye and other deformities.

"We do try to transplant as many as we can here," Thomas said. "If all else fails, and we can't transplant them here, then we send it out."

Pegged maps in her office show where tissue has helped people across the country and the world. The cornea tissue has benefited people as far away as Africa and Europe.

Tissue found unsuitable for a transplant can be used for research. Standard policy allows the eye bank to accept tissue for transplants from donors up to age 74.

"We had a donor that was 79. It was very good tissue. Instead of bringing it for research, we used it for a transplant," Thomas said.

"Eye surgery does not preclude you from being a donor. Cataract surgery does not preclude you from being a donor. A lot of

people think if you have eye surgery yourself you cannot be a donor. Diabetics can be donors, people who have had cancer can be donors," she said.

The tissue is given to recipients for free, but there are other medical costs associated with transplanting the corneas. "We cannot sell them; we donate them," Thomas said. She said doctors pay for their time.

Lions clubs around the state raise money to pay the technicians who remove the cornea tissue at the hospitals. Other funds come from donations from families.

She said doctors provide her with a list of people who need tissue. "We try to match a cornea for them. It's kind of fast and furious. ... If we don't have one, we have to find one on our network."

Although saying goodbye to a loved one is difficult when there is a death, Thomas said many find comfort because of the help the eye bank can provide. "Sometimes the families will call us and will be very thankful they did this," she said.

Lions 'In Sight' at game


