Czywczynski named to Lions Hall

Lion Dave Czywczynski of Beulah has been named the recipient of the North Dakota Lions Hall of Fame Award for 2010, according to PDG Al Kahlbaugh, chairman of the Hall of Fame Committee. The award will be presented at the State Lions Convention in Grand Forks in October.

The award is based on dedication to and activities on behalf of the candidate's home club, his or her District's projects, North Dakota Lions programs, as well as those of MD5 and Lions International. The committee also takes note of other

community involvement outside of Lions.

Dave has been a Lion since 1983, and has the distinction of having been president of two different Lions clubs in 5NW. His first membership, in the Bowman Lions Club, gave him valuable leadership experience as he served in a number of positions in the club, including president, for which he received the President of the Year Award in 1989. Because of a job relocation, he transferred to the Beulah Lions Club in 1996 and eventually served once more as president.

Lion Dave became District Governor of District 5NW in

1991-1992, and many Lions may remember him as being one of the three "singing Governors," along with Bruce Schwartz and G. Paul Larson who were governors from 5NC and 5NE respectively during the same year. In spite of their busy District Governor schedules, the three managed to rehearse and perform several songs which delighted those in attendance at Lions conventions and meetings during that year.

After his Governorship, Dave has certainly not faded into obscurity. Matter of fact, he served on the Cabinet of 5NW for 19 years. Also in the intervening years, he has served as president of the Past District governors Association for two consecutive years, and in 2009 he finished a term as president of the Lions Foundation of North Dakota. Lion Dave is currently the LCIF District Coordinator for 5NW. He has received a Melvin Jones Fellowship, five International President's Certificates of Appreciation, and a Guiding Lion Award. He has sponsored 18 new members over the years.

In his community he has served on the Beulah Parks and Recreation Board for twelve years, and is currently the president. He worked for Knife River Coal Mining Company for 25 years, and has been employed with Dakota Westmoreland Corporation for the past nine years, where he is currently a supervisor of the draglines. He and his wife of 36 years, Lion Linda, have three children—Amy, Derek, and Dustin.

Convention to feature 'meals only' plan

The Convention Executive Committee has been very pleased with the early registration numbers and the progress being made on the 2010 Convention Program. Clubs and individual Lions are reminded to get their registrations sent in as early as possible in order to help us plan for meals, meeting set-up and many other arrangements that need to be made. The registration rate is \$75 per Lion through Sept. 30. Rookie Lions, that is anyone who becomes a Lion between November 1, 2009 and October 30, 2010, can register at the Early Bird rate of \$55 per person. Please consider registering before the busy summer season begins.

The Convention Committee has approved a "meals only" plan for the guests of registered Lions. The amount has not

been officially set as we are still working with the Alerus Center on menu details. We anticipate the total package will be approximately \$60 which would include the Friday night Ice Breaker, Saturday breakfast, luncheon and banquet. A price per meal will be published at a later date. The program will include a Leadership track and a New Member track in addition to sessions on ocular research.

There will be a demonstration of assistive technology for the blind and visually impaired including equipment that can enlarge the visual image of print and objects through video magnification; and, equipment that provides an auditory means of output through speech synthesis. Diabetes awareness and testing will be part of a Lions Service Project for Friday. A speech competition on Lionism featuring select high school students will be one of the breakout sessions and a highlight of the noon luncheon presentation on Saturday.




issues settled. The sound of the gavel met the table at 2:30 p.m. to officially adjourn the last meeting of a 29 year history of District 5NC.



Type 1 Diabetes

(Usually strikes children or young adults):

- Frequent urination
- Unusual thirst
- Extreme hunger
- Unusual weight loss
- Extreme fatigue and irritability

Type 2 Diabetes

(Usually strikes after mid-life, sometimes called "maturity onset" diabetes)

- Any of the Type 1 Symptoms above, but also
- Frequent infections
- Blurred vision
- Cuts/bruises that are slow to heal

- Tingling, numbness in hands or feet
- Recurring skin, gum, or bladder infections

Sometimes type 2 people have NO symptoms. If you have any of these symptoms, or even if you are just over 50, ask your doctor about checking your blood sugar.

Risk factors:

- Age over 56
- Low Activity Level
- Race or Ethnic Background
- High Blood Pressure
- Family History of Diabetes
- High Blood sugar during pregnancy
- Being Overweight
