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Mission to Brazil: Deliver glasses

Eye glasses donated in North Dakota will help people in southern Brazil.

Optometrist Dan Long, his daughter Kelly and about 10 other people from two Bismarck churches will travel to Brazil in July to provide eye exams and free eye glasses to people who live in some of the poorer areas.

"It is exciting," Long said. "You look at the boxes in the bank or store and it doesn't look like much, but it means that someone can go to school and work."

A group from Dickinson recently returned from the same area of Brazil, where they distributed about 1,500 pairs of eye glasses. Long's group will bring another thousand pairs.

The glasses are collected by the Lions clubs in North Dakota. At one point, the donated glasses would go in Long's garage in Mandan, where he would clean them and use a lensometer to read the prescription.

Then, Terry Narum, a member of a Lions Club in Minot, decided he wanted to collect 650,000 pairs of glasses to donate, the equivalent of the state population, Long said. Narum met his goal last year, and now he will be going on the mission trip to Brazil, he said.

Long started taking trips to give eye exams and eye glasses when he was in optometry school in Chicago. This is his eighth trip. He has been to Honduras, Mexico and Armenia on

previous trips. His daughter Kim and son David have gone on previous trips. This will be Kelly's first trip.

"I'm looking forward to touching people in Brazil, the spiritual aspect," Kelly Long said.

She will be the president of the Mandan High School Leo Club next year. The Leo Club is a student organization affiliated with Lions Club.

The people in the group are from Century Baptist Church and Bismarck Baptist. The organization hosting them is Chains of Love, a group home for foster children. While they are there, the group also will work with the children and help with any renovation projects the organization needs, Dan Long said. The eye exams will be given in surrounding neighborhoods at community centers. They will use hand scopes to determine prescriptions and find glasses that most closely match those prescriptions.

"It's not like here where we ask one or two," Long said about the equipment used in most eye exams in the United States.

The people going on the trip will spend two weeks there. Each person pays their own expenses. Donations that are received will be used for other aspects of the trip, such as the group home renovation.



According to Lion Christopher F. Kemp, Secretary of the Williston Lions Club, "Ruthie," as she is known, has been an active member of the club since she joined the organization in December of 1992, at the club, zone, and district levels."

"We have one of the largest clubs in the state of North Dakota, with 70 members, and Ruthie is a major reason for our success," writes Kemp. "She is the backbone of our club, and her energy and enthusiasm for helping those in need, especially those who are vision impaired, is inspirational."

["]Although she is committed to all of the great service projects the Lions are involved in," Kemp continues, " Ruthie holds near and dear to her heart the projects that focus on work for the blind and visually impaired."

As I write this column, I am sitting on the airplane flying over the Pacific Ocean returning from the 93rd International Lions Convention in Sydney, Australia. I find myself filled suddenly with emotion; patriotism in returning to the USA in time to celebrate the 4th of July — a time when Americans feel a particular pride in the events surrounding our nation's founding and the freedoms we hold dear. In addition, I feel humbled by the responsibility entrusted to me and honored to have the opportunity to serve the Lions of District 5-NE as governor. But, beyond the patriotism and gratitude, I am excited to begin this very important year in the history of Lions in North Dakota.

We are at a point in time when two new districts are coming together, strengthened by the rich traditions of three; with new leaders committed to creating exciting opportunities for service to those in need. Please accept our sincere appreciation for the financial support and encouragement given to me and my wife, Kathy. We will do our very best to serve the district and Lions Clubs International.

INTERNATIONAL NEWS Presidential theme

This year, International President Sid Scruggs, III, established the theme A Beacon of Hope and called upon all 1.35 million Lions worldwide to recommit themselves to service. This means more than doing what has always been done before. Instead, all Lions are called upon to go beyond and extend the hands of service to even more people in need. Imagine the changes we would see in the world if 1.35 million people made service their priority! We would feel a ripple effect around the world as more people benefited from LIONS — Loving Individuals Offering Needed Service and our local clubs would likely find more people interested in joining with such a caring and dedicated group of individuals.

As we begin this year, club executive officers are asked to review their club's service activities and identify one as a signature project. You already may have

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such a project or you may decide that there is a new project needed in your community. Club presidents are asked to report on their signature project at the first zone meeting in September.

The international focus of being *a beacon of hope* for individuals in need of assistance emphasizes several areas: service, public relations, membership, youth, leadership, and giving. Clubs should establish goals including as many of these areas as possible. My district goal—"Speak Up for Service through Lionism!"—is one way to address several aspects of the international theme. Service is the primary focus and increasing awareness through public relations is one way to make sure your community knows what your Lions Club is doing.

When people find out the difference local club leaders and club members are making in the lives of people at home and around the world, they will want to join and club membership will grow. With more members, clubs can do more service, and the word gets out to young people and others who may not have known much about Lionism. Let's *not* make Lionism our "best kept secret." Rather, we all need to become aware of public relations and *speak up*!

Focus on Service

The four key service areas emphasizing this year's Presidential Theme "A Beacon of Home" are: Engaging our Youth; Sharing the Vision; Relieving the Hunger; and Protecting our Planet. At a minimum, clubs are asked to choose one of these areas and develop a new project. August (*Let youth lead!*), October (*Impact someone's vision!*), December-January (*Feed the hungry in your community!*), and April (*Protect the environment!*) are target months for these special projects.

Club leaders will receive e-mails and other resources to help them plan as each target month nears. But planning begins now. Remember: 1) Don't start from scratch. Build on an existing project or partner with another local organization. 2) Make it hands-on. Participation energizes members and generates interest from observers. 3) Be visible so people know what you are doing. 4) Don't forget recognition and thank those Lions and non-Lions who made the project a success. 5) Create excitement and consider ways to promote participation.

Club secretaries should report their club's service projects on monthly activity reports. Clubs that submit projects related to the service action campaigns through the online Service Activities Report will automatically be considered for district and international awards and recognition.

LCIF Development Fund

The Lions Clubs International Foundation is the source of funds for emergency grants and programs to support those in need around the world. North Dakota has received several emergency grants in recent years to help with recovery from floods and tornadoes.

The LCIF Development Fund is a way to provide support to this very important source of assistance. We are asking clubs not already making an annual donation to LCIF to start this year. Those clubs already supporting LCIF are asked to give an additional amount because the need is great. Contributions to the LCIF Development Fund may be used for Melvin Jones Fellow Awards to recognize club members who achieved distinction in their club. You will receive more information about this and I will be speaking about this topic at the region rallies and club visitations.

DISTRICT NEWS Region rallies scheduled in August

Region rallies will be held in August as a way for the Kathy and me to meet with club leaders, zone chairs, and region chairs. The events are being scheduled by the region chairs and will be more social than business. I hope to have an opportunity to introduce the major themes and projects being developed on the district level in 2010-2011. Club presidents, secretaries, treasurers, and membership chairs are strongly encouraged to attend with partners or spouses. More details will come in the August newsletter.

5-NE constitution & by-laws passed

This is a recap of the activities that took place during the 2009-2010 year of planning for redistricting. Club delegates at the 2009 district meeting held in Mandan last October unanimously passed the proposed district constitution for 5-NE. After that meeting, a committee was formed to discuss how the by-laws should be drawn up and presented. DG Wayne Westlund, DG James Ruff, PDG Craig Wollenburg, CC Duane Zwinger, and DGE Robert Littlefield met in January to discuss how the by-laws should be drawn up and presented to the membership of the new district. Other interested Lions were consulted for their input.

The committee decided that the by-laws should follow the standard by-laws of Lions Clubs International, with the only information particular to the district being the assessment of dues. Once the committee agreed on the proposed dues structure, the proposed by-laws were printed and distributed, along with a ballot, to all club presidents. Ballots were received with 403 Lions voting to approve and 2 Lions voting not to approve. With this vote, the proposed by-laws were approved and will be adopted by the District Cabinet at its July 24 meeting.

Proposed amendments to the constitution and by-laws must be submitted to the district governor at least 30 days prior to the annual district meeting at the state convention, this year scheduled on October 30, 2010 in Grand Forks.

State convention in Grand Forks

The state convention is scheduled on October 29-30, 2010 in Grand Forks. The theme "Roarin' on the River" will guide the activities as Lions from across the state travel to District 5-NE for the annual gathering.

The details and registration form for the convention are included in this newsletter. If you have questions or need information, please contact the convention chair, Del Hager, at del714@hotmail.com.

The district goal for 2010 is to increase club participation at the convention by 50% over last year. There were 14 clubs from 5-NE represented at the 2009 convention, so that means we need to increase attendance by 7 over last year and have representation from 21 of 58 clubs to meet the goal. I know we can exceed this so plan to take a drive over to Grand Forks on October 30th and participate in the convention!

Club presidents are asked to have at least one person from their clubs attend the district meeting on Saturday morning. In addition to the district meeting, there are information sessions, programs, three meals, a state meeting, and the *Parade of Green* for clubs to present their donations to the Lions Eye Bank of ND, the Lions Foundation of ND, and Service Dogs of America.

The convention committee is working hard to make this event a big success. Make sure you are "roarin' on the river in 2010!

Focus on youth recognition This year, District 5-NE has an Awards Team to help promote district and international recognition programs. Lion Mary Ann Zwinger (Carrington) is the team leader, along with team members Cliff Vining (Leonard), Ken Hansen (Carrington), Karna Nelson (Fargo), and Betty Triplett (Rugby). Their task is to help clubs identify ways to recognize their members and club in conjunction with district and international deadlines. Listed below are three service activities involving youth — the first theme area identified for increased service. Specific rules and guidelines to help clubs offer these programs are available through the Awards Team. Contact the team leader at dzwinger@daktel.com or call 701-650-8476 for help in getting access to these materials.

Peace Poster Contest: Clubs can get Peace Poster kits from LCI and distribute to art teachers in local schools. The contest theme is "Vision of Peace." Club contests should be completed by mid-October so zone and region levels of competition can occur in a timely manner. Region winners will be brought to the district competition to be held at the state convention on October 30. The region winners will be displayed in Grand Forks at the Alerus Center and those attending the state convention will vote to select the District 5-NE winner advancing to the multiple district level in November.

Essay Contest: Clubs can get information from the LCI website. This is a new event being introduced this year for those who are considered visually impaired according to established guidelines. Participants must be 11, 12, or 13 years of age on November 15 to participate. The contest theme is "Power of Peace." Club level judging should be completed by mid-October so zone and region levels of competition can occur prior to the state convention where the winner will be announced and advance to multiple district level in November.

Speaking Contest: Club leaders may request guidelines from the district

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awards team. This is a new event being introduced this year in conjunction with the "Speak Up for Service through Lionism" theme. Students in grades 9-12 give a 5 minute speech on a topic related to youth and service. Attendees at the state convention in Grand Forks will be able to observe how the speech contest is run and the top speakers from the district will deliver their speeches as part of the program at the Saturday luncheon at the convention.

Keep reports & payments current

Club secretaries should check their rosters to be sure that all member addresses are up to date with LCI. This information is used to make sure the North Dakota Lion gets to everyone who should be receiving it. Also, secretaries need to make sure their membership rosters are current. If names have not been removed someone from the LCI records and the billing date passes, the club will be held responsible for paying the dues. Save your club money and keep your lists current! MMRs are due to LCI monthly. While some clubs continue to use the paper format, the LCI online reporting system has been found to be efficient and easy to master for club secretaries converting to this form of reporting. Whichever method is used, the information is essential to the zone chairs, region chairs, and district officers. Make every effort to complete the forms on a monthly basis.

Club treasurers should pay their district and international dues in a timely manner. The first half billing for payment of district dues was sent in June. The LCI billing for international dues should also have been received. Help keep your club and the district in good standing.



Garrison Lions recycling aluminum

The Garrison Lions Club is in the recycling business once again – albeit on a limited basis. The club is accepting aluminum cans only.

The club and Lion Gail (Spanky) Larson introduced the public to the resumption of the recycling program at the All-School Reunion Parade this past Saturday. Larson pulled the recycling trailer in the parade. The trailer is now in place just east of City Hall and alongside the rear of the SunDollar Store.

The limited program is self-service. Those who would like to contribute can bring their aluminum to the trailer at anytime. Doors are on the upper sides of the trailer. The doors can be opened and cans dropped into the trailer.

The Lions recycling program has been dormant for the past two years since the bottom fell out of the recycling market. But Larson, who spearheaded the recycling effort in the first place a number of years ago, saw the aluminum market rebound. And with a club-owned trailer sitting near the city's Water Treatment Plant sitting idle, the idea to resurrect a limited recycling program began to grow.

Club members threw out a number of ideas at their meetings the past few months on how best to revive the idle program. One option of rebuilding the trailer from the frame up proved too costly, and the idea was put on the back burner – that is, until Larson and his wife Gloria came up with an idea to retrofit the trailer.

Taking the bull by the horns, Larson proposed a plan to club members who readily accepted his idea. And over the past few weeks a frame was built






and covered with poultry netting. The Larsons received help with painting the framework, signs were affixed and the trailer was rolled out for the publicduring the Fourth of July weekend.

Dovetailing with the trailer are four blue plastic barrels upon which Larson affixed Lions logos and placed at the City Park and on Main Street during the all-school reunion. "Contributions" were adequate for the first-time outing, club members said. Plans are to leave the receptacles in the community for people to recycle their aluminum cans. People are reminded to not crush cans as the holes in the containers are cut to only accept un-crushed cans.

'During the afternoon, all ages were invited to use the pedal cars provided free of charge by the National Guard. Assistance was available by Guard members and volunteers.


