Keynote speaker inspires Lions

Make a difference. Look for opportunities to make a difference in someone's life. That's the message brought by International Director Douglas X. Alexander to Lions members at their state convention in Bismarck Oct. 28-29.

Alexander closed out the convention, putting smiles on the faces of those at the banquet, sharing a number of light-hearted stories. Those stories revealed how he became a Lion, and how he learned what it meant to be a Lion and to serve. "It's made me proud to be a Lion," he said. Alexander also presented a number of awards at the conclusion of his speech, including a number of Melvin Jones Fellowships.

Convention organizers deemed the event a success. The Bismarck location was a last-minute decision as this year's event was scheduled for Minot. But with the flooding and recovery only beginning, plans were made to move the convention to Bismarck.

Flood relief receives boost at convention

Funds continue to pour in for the Lions Zone 2A Flood Relief Fund. More than 30 clubs and individuals have contributed to the effort. More than \$6,600 was received at the Lions State Convention in Bismarck. To date, in excess of \$28,000 has been raised for the effort.

Lion Josh Ressler, member of the Magic City Lions, 5NW cabinet member and Zone Relief Fund coordinator, Ressler said plans are to continue fundraising until the end of the year.

LCIF will match up to \$75,000 on a qualifying grant. Ressler said depending on where the fund balance is, local businesses may be tapped to come up with enough to match that amount.





It's a good time to think about spring tree planting

A good way to avoid the "blues" that the oncoming winter season can often cause is to begin planning for ways to improve our landscapes next spring. This is especially true if your yards or farmsteads were damaged by high waters any time last summer. If any of your trees were heavily damaged, you may want to replace them next spring or simply add trees to your existing landscape. Either way, the winter months provide an excellent time to decide on the types of trees you wish to plant and where you will locate them.

With the summer rush over for nursery and landscape personnel, it is a good time to visit with them about your

planting intentions for next spring. For rural landowners who may be thinking of planting windbreaks or shelter belts, now is the time to be visiting with your local soil conservation service staff to seek their assistance in selecting trees and shrubs that are suited for your particular areas.

If there are any improvement projects being planned for any public areas in your communities such as parks or school grounds, it would be a good time for members of your club to visit with those decision makers to offer assistance in planting of any trees on those properties. This could be a great community service project that would also help your club reach its goal in planting at least one tree for each member. Let's all do our part to help our clubs reach this goal.


LCI honored by Council for Blind

This is a National Historical Landmark 60 miles southeast of Enderlin and is the restored farm headquarters of a circa 1880's 9,000 acre Bonanza farm.

The group was joined by Lions Mike Martin and Susan Dopp and volunteer Bagg Farm tour guides divided the assembly in 3's and a one-hour tour followed.

Countless hours and staggering sums of donated money have resulted in a wonderful collection of barns, houses, original farm equipment and house furnishings that bear testimony to a unique era known to few.

Following the tour, all met in the lower area of the huge mule barn which has been remodeled to include a kitchen and dining area. A "harvest supper" of pork and dress, Bagg Farm garden raised carrots, tomatoes, potatoes and cucumbers (with gravy and cream respectively), and homemade pie (with optional ice cream) and appropriate coffee and lemonade.

In fact, one of the Club's more exacting food critics was heard to say, "many people in our country would never enjoy a meal that good or that fresh."

At 7:40 p.m. Lions 1st Vice President Nancy Rangeloff called a Lions membership meeting to order and thanked Bagg Bonanza Farm volunteer Pat Ward for arranging our visit and tour. The cooks and tour guides were also singled out for their part in a wonderful experience.

Lion Treasurer Terry Taylor gave an updated treasurer's report on our two club accounts and Lion Carol "Christy" Christiansen then took the floor to update the club on the recent Grand Forks visitation. The group returned to the dining area and played cards, visited or watched, in the farm's cold storage building, DVD movies about the Bonanza farming era.

Garrison Lions donate to flood relief

Residents from Garrison and the surrounding area pitched in in a big way to help those affected by the flood in Minot and surrounding area. At a meeting Oct. 10, Lions Clubs from Zone 2A gathered in Garrison. The clubs include Glenburn, Sawyer, Minot, Minot Plum Valley and Magic City. During the meeting, Garrison Lions Club members presented a \$1,400 check to the zone. The funds were given to Zone 2A's Minot Flood Relief Fund.

The proceeds were from the sale of two loads of aluminum cans. Collecting and recycling aluminum cans is one of the club's many service projects. The check was presented to Lions Club Zone 2A Chair Darlene Miller of Glenburn by Garrison Lions Club President Mike Maki.

Maki told the group it was an honor to present the check for flood relief, saying it showed the Garrison area supports those in the Minot area who have suffered so much through the disaster.

"I'm thrilled that our community responded to our plea for cans and filled the trailer, not just once, but twice," he said. "Without the people of this community we would not have been able to raise the amount we did, I tip my hat to them ... for supporting not only the Garrison Lions, but our neighbors to the north."

A silent auction was also held. The \$92 raised was also donated to the flood relief fund.

Doreen Clock, member of the Minot Magic City Lions, said that through an initial emergency grant from LCIF, the charitable arm of Lions Clubs International, more than 180 cleaning kits for FEMA trailers were assembled and distributed.

"They made a difference in the lives of those affected by the flood," she said.

The money was also used to purchase water meters to help in the dry down process of homes. Medication was also purchased

through First District Health for those who lost their prescriptions in the flood.

With the Garrison Lions donation, more than \$25,000 has been received for the Zone 2A Flood Recovery Fund. The amount included remaining funds of the now defunct Garlic & Grape Festival. The event was also a Zone 2A project.

Josh Ressler, Magic City Lion member and one of the coordinators of the flood relief project, hopes more funds will come in. He said that LCIF will match up to \$75,000 in a grant.

SNW District Governor Pat Vannett, along with husband Past District Governor Kevin Vannett, attended the meeting. She credited the Garrison Lions for doing their part to help the flood relief effort.

"Change starts with each member, including the recycling of cans that will allow those affected by the Minot flood to receive help," she said.
