





The 2012 MD5 Convention, this year slated for June 1-2, at Bismarck, will feature business, industry and Lions educational seminar presenters, in addition to keynote speaker, second-year International Director Dr. Gary A. Anderson of Grand Rapids, MI. In addition to serving as our keynote speaker, ID Anderson will also host a question and answer session with and for Lions members and guests Saturday morning.

While the MD5 Convention committee continues finalizing educational seminar arrangements, convention participants may attend any of the following seminars already confirmed: peace posters, given by MD5 LOFY Chairperson Maureen Meston-Pockett; North Dakota Leadership Seminar (a costfree inspirational, motivational retreat for high school students), presented by Lions Scott and Sandy Ressler; an introduction to the mountain lions of the prairies, presented by a North Dakota Game and Fish biologist; the Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) concept, explained by Brian and Angie McGinness, owners/operators of Riverbound Farms, located south of Mandan; Lions Global Membership Team and Global Leadership Team (of special interest to Lions club presidents, vice presidents and membership chairs), co-lead by PDGs Rob Hill, Doug Scheller and PCC Gordon Ziegler; the success story of family-owned Cloverdale Meats of Mandan, as told by Cloverdale President/ CEO T. J. Russell; guidance and answers to Lions club leaderships' legal and/or insurance questions, offered by Lawyer (and Lion) Aaron Birst and Insurance Agent (and PDG) Brach Johnson; digital photo enhancements, lead by Professional Photographer (and Lion) Jerry Renner; the training and placement of service dogs by Service Dogs of America (Great Plains Assistance Dogs of Jud, ND) throughout the U.S. and Canada; the North Dakota oil boom, addressed by Director of the North Dakota Industrial Commission & Department of Mineral Resources (and Lion) Lynn Helms; and Lions in action around the world, stories of new and amazing Lions accomplishments that benefit the needy around the world, told by International Director Gary Anderson and Past International Director Bruce Schwartz.

Convention participants will have a choice of three educational seminars during each of two 45-minute time slots on both Friday and Saturday. At least one of the three options during each time slot will be of special interest to Lions, while at least one educational seminar each time will be of general interest to Lions and guests alike.

North Dakota Army National Guard Major General David Sprynczynatyk will keynote the Friday noon luncheon, while University of Mary President Father James Shea will be the Saturday breakfast keynote speaker.

In addition to a diverse selection of educational seminars and the keynote addresses, the two-day convention also offers a Friday evening mixer (which includes games and great food), four special meal functions, a vendor fair with both educational and home-based commercial vendor participants, a remembrance service, awards ceremonies and MD5 business meetings.

Lions members are urged to pre-register at their earliest convenience; the convention registration fee jumps from \$125.00 per person to \$140.00 on April 15. Look elsewhere in this issue for a registration form.

MD5 Convention Co-chair PDG Bev Charles also encourages Lions to make their room reservations at their earliest convenience - and before April 30. A block of rooms, guaranteed at \$84.00 per night (plus applicable taxes), has been reserved at Convention headquarters, Ramkota Inn, in south Bismarck, until April 30. At that time any extra rooms will return to the open market, becoming available for tourism, business and industry.

For those planning to bring a recreational vehicle to the Convention, RV accommodations can be arranged with Bismarck KOA or Prairie Breeze RV Park, at Menoken (10 miles east of Bismarck). All phone numbers for both hotel and RV accommodations are included on the pre-registration form.

MD5 Lions Club of the Year Contest

Due to space concerns, the form to be used for completing the Lions Club of the Year Contest can be downloaded from the MD5 website at www.md5lions.net.

Forms should be complete and submit to your district governor by MAY 15 to be judged on the district level.

The District Governor will submit the district's Lions Club of the Year to compete on the multiple district level with the other five districts in MD5 at the MD5 Convention.

MD5 Lions Club Scrapbook Contest

The following are general minimum guidelines:

Scrapbooks need to be in a 3-ring binder clearly labeled with the club name.

The Scrapbook MUST have a Table of Contents.

All pictures should have a short description and people clearly labeled.

Scrapbooks MUST reach your District Governor in your district by May 15 to be judged on the district level.

The district winner will then compete on the multiple district level with the other five districts in MD5 at the MD5 Convention.

MD5 Lions Club Website Contest

The following are general minimum guidelines:

Website is to be a Club Website and not a Zone/District/State/ Provincial/International website.

Websites will be judged for quality of content and design.

The URL of each district's winning website shall be submitted to the Chairperson of the MD5 Service Activities/Public Relations Committee on or before MAY 15.

MD5 Newsletter/Bulletin Contest

The following are general minimum guidelines:

Newsletters are to be placed in sheet protectors which are to be placed in a 3-ring binder.

The 3-ring binder needs to be clearly labeled with the club name.

Newsletters should be concise and informative.

Newsletters will also be judged for the quality of content, page layout, and publication design.

The 3-ring binder MUST reach your district governor by MAY 15 to be judged on the district level.

The district winner will then compete on the multiple district level with the other five districts in MD5 at the MD5 Convention.

Re: Voting at the Multiple District Convention

Voting is by Lions Clubs International rules. Each Lions club in this multiple district shall be entitled to one (1) vote for each ten (10 members who have been enrolled for at least one year and a day in the club or major fraction thereof, of said club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month last preceding that month during which the convention is held (April 30, 2012). The Lion Most Miles Traveled Contest forms should be given to your delegation to be presented to the Convention Committee Chairperson, PDG Bev Charles, c/o The Lions Registration Desk at the" The Ramkota Hotel." The basis for Most Miles contest is for clubs "25 and under in members" and clubs "26 and over" in members. For the Most Lions Miles contest points are awarded on the basis of 3 for a Lion, 2 for a Lion's spouse/partner, and 1 for each child in attendance. The points are totaled and multiplied by your round-trip mileage to Bismarck, North Dakota. In completing these forms only count those that have pre-registered. All other contest entries (scrapbook, website, newsletter) are submitted to the District Governor according to their specified deadlines. District Governors will submit their district winners to the contest committee by 9 a.m. Saturday, June 2, 2012.

MD5 to vote on constitution and by-laws changes at upcoming convention in Bismarck

Notice of Proposed Amendment to MD5 Constitution

Relating to past actions taken exempting Campus Clubs from payment of annual MD5 per capita assessments, the MD5 Council of Governors wishes to codify the process and procedure for such exemptions by amending the appropriate section of the Constitution. This amendment was proposed at the November 12, 2011 council meeting, approved by the Council of Governors at its March 17, 2012 meeting, and is proposed for consideration by the membership at the 2012 MD convention. This amendment would become effective on July 1, 2012.

Constitution: Section 6 Powers

Paragraph c. text is added (in shaded italics) to read:

c. Levy upon each District an annual per capita assessment in respect of each member of each club within the District, said assessment to be sufficient to cover the expenses for the fiscal year of the Multiple District administration and such other matters relating to the business of Multiple District as the occasion may require and the Council may decide, subject always to the By-Laws of this Multiple District. Council may exempt from the per capita assessment classes or categories of clubs where it believes the best interests of the Multiple District will be served. Exemptions must be approved annually by the Council as part of the budgeting process.

Paragraph f. text is added (in shaded italics) to read:

f. The Council shall prepare and approve a budget showing anticipated receipts and expenditures for the ensuing fiscal year. Reference to waivers of per capita assessment granted under paragraph c. above shall be included as part of any budget. No expenditure may be approved or made which shall require use of any reserves, or reflect an unbalanced budget in any fiscal year,

or reflect an expenditure against the income or reserves of any subsequent fiscal year except upon the affirmative roll call vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the entire number of members of the Council.

Notice of Proposed Amendment to By-laws

Relating to the multiple district's financing and ability to accomplish its program and consistent with the "90% reserves" language (last paragraph) of this section, Council seeks to increase the semi-annual per capita assessment. This amendment was proposed at the November 12, 2011 council meeting, approved by the Council of Governors at its March 17, 2012 meeting, and is proposed for consideration by the membership at the 2012 MD convention. This amendment would become effective on July 1, 2012.

By-Laws: Section 1 Regular Per Capita Assessments Text is amended (in shaded italics) to read:

Each District Cabinet Secretary/Treasurer shall remit to the Council Secretary-Treasurer, in US funds, a regular annual per capita assessment in two installments as follows:

August 1 \$3.00 per member ** February 1 \$3.00 per member **

**Current installments of \$2.00 per member assessments on August 1 and February 1 were approved by vote at MD5 Convention, May 2003. The basis for these two remittances will be membership as reported by Lions International as of June 30 and December 31 respectively prior to above dates.

When the reserves of undersigned funds reach a level of 90% of the approved budget, the Council of Governors shall make a recommendation of a dues increase to the membership of the Multi-District, which shall be voted on at the next Multi-District Convention.

Most-Lions-Miles-Traveled Contest Entry Form

The basis for the Most Lions Miles Contest is for clubs "25 and under in members" and clubs that have "26 and over in members." Multiple District leaders 'Walking the Walk' of service in Minot

The MD5 Council of Governors added service and fundraising to their regular agenda at a recent meeting held March 16-17 in Minot to help the local Minot community efforts to rebuild after last year's flood; and to support the purchase of dog guide and service dogs for two Canadian youth. Teams of Lions assisted Minot home owners with the reconstruction of their places of residence, to help local thrift stores with specific projects, and to prepare meals for volunteers working as part of the Lutheran Social Services Rebuild Project.

In addition, the Council raised \$160 through tail twisting and donations received during the two-day meetings. Donations were distributed to the Saskatoon Millennium Lions Club and the Maryfield District Lions Club to purchase a guide dog for Shane Fleming and a service dog for Trystan Lawless.

The Saskatoon Millennium Lions Club has \$14,000 in place with the Lions Foundation of Canada for a Dog Guide and Shane's Family may be applying. Shane's condition is worsening and his father and mother must provide assistance around the clock. VDG Tom Armstrong presented the family with the \$80 donation raised at the Council meeting.

The Maryfield District Lions initiated the funding for a service dog for Trystan Lawless. Trystan is a high functioning autistic individual; he and his family have been approved for a service dog from Service Dogs for America from Jud North Dakota. 5SKS IPDG Rob Hill presented the \$80 cash, raised at the Council meeting, to Trystan and his family along with a check from Maryfield Lions for \$1,500. Trystan and his Mother will be in Jud the end of July for training with the Service Dog.

In addition to generating donations, the council members served Minot in many ways. Some worked in homes helping to rebuild. SNE DG Steve Johnson and his wife, Brenda Johnson worked in a home that had the basement and main floor previously "gutted" and the electrical and plumbing replaced before they arrived. Brenda helped put up insulation and plastic vapor barrier

in every nook and cranny of the kitchen. This work included her wielding a staple gun for the first time in her life. Steve carried, measured, and installed drywall in the dining room of the home. He also cleaned up construction debris and made it easier for drywall installers to get around to do their work the next day.

5NE 2VDG Fran Romsdal, Lion Monica Peldo, 5SKN DGE Nick Laley, and 5NE DGE Mel Olson helped put up Sheetrock in a home. They generally worked on the ceilings of a couple of rooms that had been totally stripped down to the studs. Another group had also installed the insulation and plastic coating prior to the arrival of the MD5 Lions crew.

PID Bruce Schwartz, wife Lion Julie Schwartz, and CC Robert Littlefield installed insulation and plastic sheeting on the main floor of a local home, tore out damaged wall material, and performed general clean up to prepare for the installation of Sheetrock by the next crew.

A group of Saskatchewan Lions volunteered to work at a variety of locations. Some toiled at the Thrift Store on Broadway for Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch. They cleaned, dusted, and moved display shelves and shelf units; repaired and used the vacuum cleaner; sorted, packaged and put on display various items of jewelry; cleaned the overhead fan; loaded and unloaded boxes (and boxes and boxes) of donated items - mostly clothing - from

one cube van to another and into the downstairs storage area.

Some worked at the Restore. They sorted and priced gently used items for resale in the store. Some prepared meals at a local church for volunteers. Some emptied a storage locker used by the Minot Salvation Army and moving the material to their facility on Western Avenue.

They needed to clear the storage facility by March 31 as the building is scheduled to be demolished. They loaded the contents (canned food and bottled water) first onto flat deck carts (3) and then into a pickup truck to be transported. Two truckloads were loaded, transported, unloaded and stacked at the Western Avenue facility.

SSKS DG Dennis Becker, Lion Barb Becker, Freda Hill, Lion Lorne Olver and Lion Rob Hill helped with sheet rocking at a house in Burlington. Lion Barb and Freda cut sheet rock and workers installed it. Lion Lorne, DG Dennis, and Lion Rob worked installing sheet rock in the porch of the house. Lion Barb and Freda's team completed the master bedroom and a hallway. DG Dennis and his team completed two walls and most of the celling.

The MD5 council volunteers were gratified by the genuine expressions of appreciation they received from the local homeowners and citizens of Minot.

It's hard to get a bunch of Lions to all smile at the same time, but on Saturday afternoon, Feb. 18, this group of Lions members were really, really smiling on the inside that is, that good kind of 'lump in the throat' feeling a person gets when they know they are a part of a service organization that helps people with sight problems. Helen Keller had challenged the Lions organization in 1925 at their convention to be 'Knights of the Blind.' Well Saturday was that day in Wishek.

You see, one of their fellow business owners, LeRoy Wanner, was receiving a Video Magnifier from the Lions Foundation of ND. This machine is the Cadillac model that shows its magnified images in color. Mr. and Mrs. Wanner have a catering business in their community of Wishek. They were forced to slow down due to health issues. With Mr. Wanner's failing eyesight, he will now be able to read his magnified recipes with ease.

Executive Director of the Lions Foundation of North Dakota, Inc. (LFND), Kevin Vannett and his wife, NW District Governor Pat Vannett delivered two Magnifiers in our area on Saturday. One to Kulm to June Land and the second one to Wishek. The LFND started this Video Magnifier Lease Program approximately two years ago and at the last meeting on January 21, 2012, Lion K Vannett reported that 35 machines have been purchased or donated.

The foundation has received 55 applications requesting a video magnifier. Twenty-nine have been placed with three more to be placed shortly. Ten applications are on a waiting list. These numbers are continually changing and have increased. As of March 6, Lion Kevin stated that 59 applications have been received and 32 machines have been placed.

Lions clubs in ND are encouraged to make donations to the Foundation's VM Program. Special fundraisers could be held to

support this project. There is a local need. The cost of one machine is almost \$1,900. This machine will make LeRoy's and June's life easier. Another help the machine will provide is magnifying the labels on prescription bottles.

Simple things like that, that we with good eye sight take for granted. June Land from Kulm has also been enjoying her new machine as she loves to read books and now can do that with ease. These are life changing machines.

Wishek Lions members coming to help set up the machine and to congratulate Mr. Wanner, included President Warny Becker, Secretary Stanley Schmidt, and Lion Delmar Zimmerman.

Fargo Lions team with Puerto Vallarta Lions to give clear vision

When Luis Angel Campos was led up to the mark on the floor of the Puerto Vallarta Lions Club's large community room, he couldn't tell Fargo Lion Blake Strehlow what the large object was at the top of the eye chart 10 feet away. It wasn't because the 12 year old didn't know the word for sailboat – he simply could not see it well enough to identify the shape.

Luis had lost his glasses and his eyesight was so bad he couldn't go to school. So his mother, Olga Patricia Bocenegra, brought Luis, his big sister, Carolina, and little sister, Bianca, to the vision testing conducted by the Fargo Lions Club working with the Puerto Vallarta Lions. They all left with proper eyeglasses.

More than 500 residents of Puerto Vallarta, Jalisco, Mexico, showed up at their appointed times on February 13, 14, and 15, 2012, to have their vision checked by members of the Fargo Lions Club. Many arrived early, excited to get eyeglasses that would enable them to read newspapers, street signs, bus destinations, and other things most of us take for granted.

For two weeks prior to the Fargo Club's arrival, the Puerto Vallarta Lions Club had advertised the screenings and invited people to come to their club house in downtown Puerto Vallarta to make appointments. It was the first of many indications that the Puerto Vallarta Lions knew their business.

Due to international shipping regulations, the Fargo Lions were forced to pack into large suitcases about 3,000 pairs of glasses, which the Club had collected, cleaned, read the prescriptions, and tagged. These suitcases accompanied Fargo Lions as checked baggage, and, thanks to arrangements made by the Puerto Vallarta Lions, were brought into Mexico duty-free.

The Puerto Vallarta Lions also arranged transportation for the Fargo team, served them lunch, and provided translators during the screenings.

They welcomed patients and registered

them. The guests then had their far vision tested by Fargo Lions Blake Strehlow, Dick Schaefer, and Patrick Brown, with the invaluable assistance of several Puerto Vallarta Lions and some Lions from nearby towns.

After the initial screening, each person was sent to see Lions Dr. Mark Tufte and Neil Jordheim, who worked together for all three days to determine each person's prescription using the portable auto refractor the Fargo club purchased with the help of a \$10,000 grant from the Lions Club International Foundation.

With prescriptions and, in many cases, eye drops in hand, the people walked to the fulfillment area where Lion Deb Tufte and Lion spouses Nancy Jordheim, Kathie Strehlow, and Mary Schaefer searched through the inventory to find the exact prescription, or one acceptably close to it, or non-prescription readers.

If their new glasses needed fitting and adjustment, they then paid a visit to Fargo Lion Samantha Petersen, a professional optician. As they left they were given a gift of candy, a pen, or soap.

In all, the two clubs fitted with eyeglasses 549 people, young and old, during the three days. Dr. Tufte also recommended 70 people for free cataract surgery provided by the Puerto Vallarta Lions. Dr. Tufte & Neil Jordheim also made one house call to a house-bound elderly woman, whose sight, unfortunately, was beyond care.

Hard work by Lions in Puerto Vallarta and by other members of the Fargo Lions Club paid big dividends. Fargo Lion Jane Pettinger chaired the Vision Mission Committee and guided the Fargo Mission Team through the entire process. Lion Dave Butler worked with the Puerto Vallarta Lions to pave the way for the team. Many other Fargo Lions also participated in collecting, reading and boxing the glasses the Club took to Mexico.

This first vision mission by the Fargo Lions was a resounding success. Just ask Luis Angel Campos and his family.

Dakota NFL Lions holds 1st speech festival

On Tuesday, March 13, the Dakota National Forensic League Lions Club held its first major fundraiser with the support of the Department of Communication in the form of the first annual speech festival at North Dakota State University.

As co-sponsors, the NDSU-Fargo Campus Lions Club members collected from the participants \$115 in donations for the ND Association for the Blind, collected about 30 pairs of glasses for the Lions Recycle program, and approximately 70 cans of food for the Fargo Food Pantry.

Nearly \$1,800 was raised from participation and donated judging fees for the Dakota NFL Lions Club Project Fund to support ND student participation at the national NFL tournament to be held in Indianapolis in June. Approximately 95 students and 30 adults attended and participated in the festival's 14 individual speaking and performance events.

The Dakota NFL Lions Club is the first of its kind in the world, bringing

together members with a special interest in supporting public speaking activities for youth that encourage good citizenship and civic engagement.

The club is a cyber-club, so there are no regular meetings, but members have an opportunity to discuss projects at the annual NFL district qualifiers and at other tournaments where they may be present. Otherwise, the club has a website and meets through social media.

The club is open to any student over

the age of 18 who is in high school or college and any non-student 18 and older. Coaches, judges, parents, former competitors, school administrators, retired forensic educators may all be interested in joining this service organization with a specific focus on high school forensics.
