NDSU-Fargo campus Lions club honored in Bison service challenge

The NDSU-Fargo Campus Lions Club was one of campus groups honored at the 3rd Annual Bison Service Challenge Award Ceremony held Thursday, May 3, in the North Dakota State University Memorial Union.

Other honored groups included Blue Key National Honor Society, Men's Track and Field Team, Women's Basketball Team, Kappa Alpha Theta sorority, Alpha Gamma Delta sorority, Churchill Residence Hall, and Weibel Residence Hall.

The Dakota Medication Foundation, FirstLink, and Impact Foundation join with the NDSU Volunteer Network headed by Matthew Skoy, Director of Service Learning and Civic Engagement to annually sponsor the Bison Service Challenge encouraging NDSU students to volunteer their time and energy to serve the needs of the community.

This year, Skoy reported that NDSU students recorded over 51,000 hours of service in the Fargo-Moorhead community, translating into a \$1+ million economic impact.

In each category (athletics, student organizations, Greek life, and residence life), two campus groups are recognized. The Dakota Medical Foundation provides first place winners \$700 and second place winners \$300 to donate to a non-profit organization of their choice that is currently being sponsored by the

The NDSU Lions placed second in the student organization category, logging 853 hours of service during the 2011-2012 academic year. They donated their \$300 prize donation to the American Diabetes Association. The first place winner among student organizations was Blue Key.

Lion President-Elect Jade Monroe accepted the award on behalf of the club. Other club members at the ceremony were incoming officers Derek Vogel (community service committee), Shane Hofer, (fundraising committee), Rachel Geiser, (secretary), and Robert Littlefield (chapter advisor).



2012 MD5 Convention agenda finalized

Mixer to offer Lions talents, games of skill, vendor booths and great food

Concluding the first day of the 2012 MD5 Convention, scheduled for June 1 - 2 at Bismarck, will be a fun evening guaranteed to challenge Lions' talents and skills.

According to PCC Brach Johnson, welcome mixer chair, the evening mixer will offer the MD5 Lions' version of America's Got Talent, scheduled to begin at 7:00 p.m., the Lions' rendition of "Minute to Win It," as well as numerous stations providing a variety of games of skill, such as ring toss, darts, hockey, and basketball games, the Lions interpretation of the annual Kentucky Derby, with equestrian (stick) entrants decorated by District Governors prior to the race, and more. Prizes will be awarded to winners of "Lions Got Talent," "Minute to Win It," as well as the other games.

In addition, the educational and home-based commercial vendors will be set up around the periphery of the room, welcoming browsers.

The welcome mixer will start at 5:30 p.m. and continue until 9:00 p.m. Appetizers will be served throughout the evening, beginning at 5:30 p.m.

PCC Johnson echoes the America's Got Talent judges' invitations, "Let's see what you've got!" He invites potential "Lions Got Talent" contestants (both individuals and groups) to contact Convention Registrar Lion Jim Bumann at their earliest convenience with their intentions and contact information. Lion Bumann may be reached via e-mail at @g.mail.com.

PCC Johnson expects to have six two-member teams, one team from each Lions district, competing in the MD5 Lions' "Minute to Win It." Toward that end, he urges each district to solicit two volunteers to come to the mixer prepared to defend their district's honor. He asks the volunteers to register at the general Convention registration area upon arrival.

The 2012 MD5 Convention will feature second-year International Director Dr. Gary A. Anderson of Grand Rapids, MI. In addition, ID Anderson will also host a question and answer session with and for Lions members and guests Saturday morning.

North Dakota Army National Guard Major General David Sprynczynatyk will keynote the Friday noon Senior Counselor Awards Luncheon, while University of Mary President Father James Shea will be the Saturday breakfast keynote speaker.

Convention participants will have a choice of three educational seminars during each of two 45-minute time slots on both Friday and Saturday. At least one of the three options during each time slot will be of special interest to Lions, while at least one educational seminar each time will be of general interest to Lions and guests alike.

In addition to the keynote addresses, a diverse selection of educational seminars, the Friday evening mixer and vendor fair, the two-day convention also offers four special meal functions, a remembrance service, awards ceremonies and MD5 business meetings.

Lions members are urged to pre-register at their earliest

convenience; the convention registration is \$140.00 until May 15. The fee increases to \$150.00 for walk-ins.

MD5 Convention Co-chair PDG Bev Charles also encourages Lions to make their room reservations at their earliest convenience. A block of rooms, guaranteed at \$84.00 per night (plus applicable taxes) had been reserved at Convention headquarters, the Ramkota Inn, in south Bismarck until April 30. At that time the extra rooms returned to the open market, becoming available for tourism, business and industry.

For those planning to bring a recreational vehicle to the Convention, RV accommodations can be arranged with Bismarck KOA or Prairie Breeze RV Park, at Menoken (10 miles east of Bismarck). All phone numbers for both hotel and RV accommodations are included on the pre-registration form.

Look for the pre-registration form found elsewhere in this issue, complete and submit it, and make your hotel or RV reservations NOW, if you haven't already done so. The Convention Planning Committee wants to see you in Bismarck, show you a fun time, and share a worthwhile MD5 Convention with you!

A great year for vision projects in N.D.

At this time of year, we Lions wrap up our Lion Year and often look back on what we have done and what we can do better. It is a time to give thanks to our leaders, the District Governors and their leadership teams.

It is a time to pat each other on the back for all that we have done and the fruits of our labors- the pancakes we have served, the burgers we have flipped and the raffles we have run. Without YOU, our everyday Lion, we would not be able to do what WE do outside the boundaries of our own clubs and towns.

You have each heard it many times ... was that a hundred, a thousand or more? Helen Keller challenged the Lions to become KNIGHTS for the BLIND at the International Lions Convention in 1925, and we, YOU especially, have stepped up to the plate time and again to help fund Leader Dog Schools, buy eyeglasses for the needy, help with eyeglass recycling, as well as organizing and help funding for the Lions Eye Bank. The Ocular Research Center in Grand Forks was in its infancy when the Lions of Grand Forks stepped up to help with its funding. Great Job, well done!

The goal here is to update you on the progress of two programs you support which impact the people of North Dakota directly: The Lions Eye Bank of North Dakota and Vision USA. The Lions Eye Bank is in Bismarck which may be a million miles from the Red River Valley, but still through the dedication and hard work of our Executive Director Karen Thomas, is in the enviable position of having contracts for Eye Donation and retrieval from virtually every hospital in North Dakota EXCEPT Sanford in Fargo. (COME ON Fargo!!! get with the program – Those Eyes need to stay with LEBND and NOT go to Minneapolis!).

We have had a great year, coming off two very not wonderful years. YOU, our Lions made the difference and helped lessen the deficit and the loss. To date we have had 123 donors giving a total of 185 transplantable corneas. That number has left us in the black for a change, but even so we are slightly below our anticipated budget for the year. For the first time in two years we got some money back from TBI- our vendor.

While the \$29k check is very much appreciated and welcome, it needs to be remembered that we were \$47k in the red four years ago, received some \$16k back from TBI three years ago and almost broke even last year ... to say that last year's loss was covered by this year's surplus. How can you say: this is an up and down business? Through it all, our staff has stuck by us, we have reduced our overhead in smaller leased space and paid out less for mileage.

Perhaps the best "through it all" has been YOU, the Lions of North Dakota. You have continued to send us your donations and for that we are extremely grateful. As of 4/25/12, 26 of 53 Clubs in 5NW donated a total of \$6467.57 and 16 of 60 Clubs in 5NE donated a total of \$5851.

A BIG Thank YOU to all of you who donated. LEBND President Rick Swenson set a goal for us to have 100 Percent Club participation and we have a ways to go to reach that goal. Won't you please set money aside EVERY year to contribute? Send those

donations to LEBND 410 E Thayer Suite 201, Bismarck 58501. The Lion Year will end on June 30, and we will recognize your club during the Parade of Green for the Past year's donation.

The OTHER program we help fund is the VISION USA which is administered by the North Dakota Optometric Association. Our donations help pay for the costs of the eye glass lenses- which the optical labs provide at reduced cost to our participating Doctors.

While the costs have certainly increased since 1989 when I first talked to you about it, the current cost being \$60 for Trifocals, \$50 for Bifocals, and \$35 for single (usually children) is definitely a wonderful buy in terms of value for dollar spent. The participating Doctors DONATE the exam, as well as the frames, so there is PLENTY of donation involved in this program for the working poor. This program, like the LEBND, has had years of being busy and not so busy with obviously varying cost levels seen.

In 2009, for example, 38 Lions Clubs donated \$4269 while 185 people were served at a total cost of \$7095; in 2010 we did better when 65 Lions Clubs donated \$6266 with a total of 148 people of a possible 189 eligible candidates received \$6,005 worth of care.

For the year past, 58 Lions Clubs donated a total of \$5322 but the 133 candidates only had 76 eligible candidates and 73 received care for a total of \$4433. The eligibility criteria this year included a residency requirement. So far in 2012 (REMEMBER that NDOA runs a fiscal Jan to Dec year) 41 clubs have donated \$3433. The number of applicants has been 80 people so far with an expected surge after the next round of advertising in the ND newspapers this spring.

We have had State Convention Resolutions for the past many years to support this program with a VOLUNTARY \$3 per member contribution to the NDOA which is located at 921 S 9th St. in Bismarck 58504. It is far and away the best deal for our needy who qualify.

You can get a form from myself (Box 176, Bowman 58623 or carguy1949@hotmail.com, your local Social Services people, or in the letter you received from NDOA thanking you for your support and urging you to continue.

MD5 to vote on constitution and by-laws changes at upcoming convention in Bismarck

Notice of Proposed Amendment to MD5 Constitution

Relating to past actions taken exempting Campus Clubs from payment of annual MD5 per capita assessments, the MD5 Council of Governors wishes to codify the process and procedure for such exemptions by amending the appropriate section of the Constitution. This amendment was proposed at the November 12, 2011 council meeting, approved by the Council of Governors at its March 17, 2012 meeting, and is proposed for consideration by the membership at the 2012 MD convention. This amendment would become effective on July 1, 2012.

Constitution: Section 6 Powers

Paragraph c. text is added (in shaded italics) to read:

c. Levy upon each District an annual per capita assessment in respect of each member of each club within the District, said assessment to be sufficient to cover the expenses for the fiscal year of the Multiple District administration and such other matters relating to the business of Multiple District as the occasion may require and the Council may decide, subject always to the By-Laws of this Multiple District. *Council may exempt from the per capita assessment classes or categories of clubs where it believes the best interests of the Multiple District will be served. Exemptions must be approved annually by the Council as part of the budgeting process.*

Paragraph f. text is added (in shaded italics) to read:

f. The Council shall prepare and approve a budget showing anticipated receipts and expenditures for the ensuing fiscal year. *Reference to waivers of per capita assessment granted under paragraph c. above shall be included as part of any budget.* No expenditure may be approved or made which shall require use of

any reserves, or reflect an unbalanced budget in any fiscal year, or reflect an expenditure against the income or reserves of any subsequent fiscal year except upon the affirmative roll call vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the entire number of members of the Council.

Notice of Proposed Amendment to By-laws

Relating to the multiple district's financing and ability to accomplish its program and consistent with the "90% reserves" language (last paragraph) of this section, Council seeks to increase the semi-annual per capita assessment. This amendment was proposed at the November 12, 2011 council meeting, approved by the Council of Governors at its March 17, 2012 meeting, and is proposed for consideration by the membership at the 2012 MD convention. This amendment would become effective on July 1, 2012.

By-Laws: Section 1 Regular Per Capita Assessments

Text is amended (in shaded italics) to read:

Each District Cabinet Secretary/Treasurer shall remit to the Council Secretary-Treasurer, in US funds, a regular annual per capita assessment in two installments as follows:

August 1 **\$3.00** per member **

February 1 **\$3.00** per member **

**Current installments of \$2.00 per member assessments on August 1 and February 1 were approved by vote at MD5 Convention, May 2003. The basis for these two remittances will be membership as reported by Lions International as of June 30 and December 31 respectively prior to above dates.

When the reserves of undersigned funds reach a level of 90% of the approved budget, the Council of Governors shall make a recommendation of a dues increase to the membership of the Multi-District, which shall be voted on at the next Multi-District Convention.
