Noonan photographer wins Lions' photo contest

Jerry Walter of Noonan recently learned a photo he entered won Grand Prize Best of Show in the Lions International Environmental Photo Contest, at their convention in Busan, Korea.

"This is a big deal to me," said Walter, whose photo was one of 46 submitted from 18 countries.

The photograph titled "Sundogs at Sunrise" is of the Brandt Barn, one mile east of Noonan.

The purpose of the contest is to "showcase the beauty of the environment," according to the contest award letter.

Nearly 400 Lions, who attended the convention voted for their favorite photo in each category as well as the overall winner, the Best of Show. "With so many beautiful photos, the decision to select just one in each category was no doubt difficult for the voters," the award letter states.

As the Best of Show, Walters' photo will also appear in the 2013 Lions Environmental Photo Contest wall calendar, which may be purchased by sending an email to programs@lionsclubs. org.

Next year's special theme, "beauty of

the rural environment" is likely to be one in which Walter will also excel.

It's not the first time a Walters' photo featuring sundogs has won acclaim. A photo featuring sundogs framing a lone tree on the prairie won national attention a few years ago, appearing on a number of national weather websites.

That photo was also used as the cover on a book on folklore and folk art published by the North Dakota Council on the Arts. Walter is also a past finalist in the Smithsonian photo stamp contest, among others.

Kia Kalliomaa (18) hosted by Lions John and Bonnie Wiskus, Wishek. Heli Kieski (17) hosted by Lions James and Donna Ruff, Lehr.

The U.S. journey was split up with the first seven days and the last week spent in North Dakota with their host families. July 8-14 was spent in South Dakota at the 2012 Lions Dakota Adventure Youth camp at the campus of Augustana College in Sioux Falls. This camp offered an opportunity of a lifetime or a lifetime experience. Twenty six youth from 14 different countries were in attendance. Finland held the record of sending the largest number of youth. These girls were strangers on July 1 when they met at the airport in Helsinki but history proves that they will remain friends for life. This MD5 sponsored camp consisting of Sask, N.D., and S.D. had only nine American youth attending. But they were fine hosts to their guests from afar.

The three host families were very generous with their time taking turns entertaining the youth. Some places they visited were: the 4th of July parade and rodeo in Mandan, Eureka 125th celebration, N.D. State Heritage Center in Bismarck, Tri-County Fair at Wishek, Beaver Lake State Park, and the Medora Musical.

Long Lake, South Dakota's Holly Hoffman, 21st season's Survivor contestant, gave each gal her new autographed book. She also had lunch with them and the host families at the Big Screen in Wishek. Finland will be airing the 21st Survivor season this year.

Some interesting facts we learned about their country were: Satu was able to vote this year as in Finland they can vote and drink at age 18. Her future plans are to go to a trade school and be a travel guide. Kia has one more year of high school left and has no future plans. Heli has two more years of high school and would like to go to medical school, but it is hard to get accepted. There is a lot of unemployment in Finland. The Lions clubs in Finland helped with some of the girls expenses. Satu received 200 Eros which equaled \$245.73 in US dollars. Kia received 400

MD5 moving to technology format to enhance training

The Multiple District 5 leaders are moving to use available technology to enhance training opportunities while reducing time and travel for the members of the clubs in North Dakota, South Dakota and Saskatchewan. MD5 leaders applied for and received a technology grant from Lions International to assist in the cost of implementing the change.

Council Chair, Dennis Becker has implemented the use of technology for some committee meetings in preparation for the August 17-18 MD5 Council of Governors meeting. Plans call for using technology to provide training for Zone Chairs later this fall.

Lions International Grant

The matching funds from the Lions International Grant were used to purchase licenses to use Live Meeting for each of the six districts in North Dakota, South Dakota and Saskatchewan. Most club officers in the Multiple District 5 already have computers and access to the web; therefore, the cost of implementation will be minimal. Provisions will be made for those who may live in areas where service is poor by pairing them up with Lions who have the access or having them go to a public facility that has access. These licenses will be used by each District to implement the use Live Meeting for training in their district as they see fit.

Training to be implemented at Council of Governors meeting

A portion of the Council of Governors meeting in August will used for a demonstration and training provided by DG Mel Olson and PCC Robert Littlefield. The plan is to provide the District

Governors and committee members with the necessary knowledge and skills so they can go back to their districts and encourage implementation.

Significant savings in time and travel

Because of the rural nature of the area in MD5, the impact of implementing the use of technology in training and meetings is projected to be huge. Providing training for club officers and other Lions has always been limited by the amount of time and travel involved. The appropriate use of technology will make training and meetings more accessible and save significant money that can be applied to serving the needs of others.

Lions recognize the social value of meeting face-to-face and this value can be retained by continuing to meet face-to-face but on a less regular basis.

INSIDE INTERNATIONAL

Three years ago, Lions Clubs International Foundation made the decision to activate and energize the Foundation in an effort to realize its full potential by starting the LCIF Development Plan. The LCIF office increased its fulltime personnel from one to eight allowing it to become much better organized and aggressive in its operation. The original goal for the new LCIF was to increase contributions from an average of \$20 million per year to \$30 million in the following three years. That goal was achieved by the end of the first year of operation (June, 2010) and has been improved upon ever since bringing us to a point where over \$40 million has been

But that's not good enough. Lions and Lions clubs around the world can do better. We now have the infrastructure in place to increase LCIF contributions to a much higher level so that initiatives such as the "One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative" inoculation program can meet its \$5 million matching grant goal as

proposed by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. We're half way there. Let's

What "infrastructure" are you talking about, you may ask.

The LCIF Development Plan is set up along much the same lines as Campaign SightFirst II. The bureaucratic arrangement utilizes our current district boundaries, with some variations, with each multiple district and sub-district having a coordinator. One variation is that MD5 includes just North and South Dakota. Because of the International boundary, Saskatchewan is in the Canadian scheme.

Let me introduce the MD5 LCIF Development Plan team of coordinators.

I am the Multiple District Coordinator for North and South Dakota. PID Garnet Davis is my counterpart in Saskatchewan. Our North and South Dakota District Coordinators are:

• DISTRICT 5NW, DAVE CZYWCZYNSKI. Dave hails from Beulah, ND, and is beginning his second three year term as a district coordinator.

• DISTRICT 5NE, ROBERT LITTLEFIELD. Robert is also beginning his second three year term as coordinator and lives in Moorhead, MN, but is a member of the Fargo Lions Club.

 DISTRICT 5SW, LARRY BURKHEAD. Larry is just starting his first three year term as coordinator for 5SW and is from Rapid City, SD.

• DISTRICT 5NE, CINDY IVERSEN. Cindy is from Madison, SD, and is beginning her second term as coordinator.

Beginning this Fall Lions clubs in North and South Dakota can expect to receive mailings and other information from district coordinators asking for increased participation in the LCIF Development Plan. Many clubs do not contribute to LCIF at all and other clubs do very little. We can do better. Plan now to make LCIF one of your primary charity items.






May and will continue thru October. The student and their families come to Jud and begin an intense three week training period with their dog.

Repair park benches


