Posthumous award for Lions Hall Jack Stewart to be honored


The North Dakota Hall of Fame for 2013 will be posthumously awarded to John T. "Jack" Stewart. A representative from his family will accept the award at the upcoming North Dakota State Lions Convention.

John T. "Jack" married Dorothy (Molenaar) on June 24, 1947 at Gilby, North Dakota. Jack and Dorothy were parents to three sons: Jeff, Reid, and Gregg; and had 8 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren.

Raised and educated in Gilby, Jack entered the Army Air Corp in 1943 and served for 29 months. Returning to Fargo, he attended and graduated from NDSU (then NDAC) in 1950. Jack and Dorothy moved to Park River and he taught agriculture education for 4 years. He purchased a farm in 1951 and actively farmed until 1963.

Jack worked for NDSU Extension Service from December 1961 until June 1990. During those years he worked in Hillsboro, Mohall and finished his career in Mandan. He and his family moved to Mandan in January of 1969 where they lived for over 40 years.

In 1986-87 Jack served as President of the North Dakota County Agents Association. The North Dakota group hosted the National County Agents

Association annual meeting in 1987 for the first and only time. While working as a County Agent in Mandan, the 4-H judging program for livestock, dairy, crops and land won many state contests and participated in many national events. Jack later was made a member of the 4-H Hall of Fame.

Jack and Dorothy were always active church members. Jack served 6 years as Active Elder (3 years as Clerk of Session) in the 1970's. Jack was asked to fill in an unexpired term in 2003 and thus was an Active Elder again for 2 more years.

Jack joined the Mandan Lions Club in 1969, and held every office except Secretary/ Treasurer. He was President of the club in 1977-78 and was again serving as club president at the time of his death. When asked, "Why are you a Lion?" Jack answered, "When I came to Mandan in 1969, former Morton County Agent Jim Noonan said, "All County Agents are Lions!" "So, I became a Lion and I remain a Lion by choice."

Jack attended one USDA/Canada Forum, one train-the-trainer session, five International Conventions, and many Multiple District and State Conventions. He was Zone Chair in 1984-85 and Region Chair in 1991-92. Jack served as the 5NW District Governor in 1992-93. He served as a Guiding Lion for 3 new Lions Clubs. When Jack was District Governor in 1992-93. all three North Dakota District Governors were awarded the 100% District Governor Award

John T. "Jack" Stewart died January 17, 2013 at the age of 87. He was preceded in death by his wife, Lion Dorothy, in August 2010.

While talking with DG Nada from Croatia, her goal was to help people build small garden plots in their yards so they would have fresh vegetables. We talked about seed exchanges, raised bed gardens to maximize the usable space within the urban settings, window box gardening, clay pots and a whole mess of other ways to grow fresh vegetables.

If we each do a little, plant an extra row of corn, beans, cucumbers, peas, tomatoes and then share the produce with the local food pantry or soup kitchen, it would be amazing at the difference it would make in other lives. I would like to see every Lion in 5NW in this next year start and share a small garden with a neighbor or friends.

Since we live in a more rural area, I would like to encourage a stronger relationship with the area farmers and ask them to share the bounty of one acre of crop or the value of a calf to the local food pantry.

I know that this is not an overnight project but one that will require time, patience and commitment. This is my dream, to be followed and committed to. What I am asking of you as Lions in our little corner of the world is to commit to a project and put your heart and soul into it. If it betters the life of just one person including you then it was a success.

We all have dreams. But in order to make dreams come into reality, it takes an awful lot of determination, dedication, self-discipline and effort.

-Jesse Owens, 1913-1980, Olympic Gold Medalist

Years ago, I was part of a host group for Jesse Owens. He walked into a packed room at a local college. His talk was about fulfilling his dreams. Owens spoke with love and care about what was happening in professional sports, young athletes and worldwide unrest.

Free eye exams offered 'year round' for low income workers, families

Free eye exams and eyeglasses if necessary, will be offered to uninsured workers and their families that are residents of North Dakota, through the Vision USA-ND Project.

As part of the national program called Vision USA, participating optometrists are donating their services to provide comprehensive eye exams to children and adults. In addition, local Lions Clubs and Vision Services Inc. and optical laboratories are providing funds and/or discounts to cover the cost of lenses.

To qualify, applicants must meet all of the following guidelines: Must be a North Dakota resident and have lived in the state of ND for at least 2 years.

The applicant, their legally wed spouse or the parent of a minor child that is applying, must be working at least part-time.

The applicant cannot have any type of eye health coverage that will assist them in any way with either an eye exam or eyeglasses. This includes Medicaid, Medicare and IHS.

The applicant's last eye exam has been 3 or more years ago

The applicant must meet Household Income Guidelines for the Vision USA Program.

"Many low income working people without insurance do not qualify for government assistance and simply cannot afford eye exams," according to Steve Kourajian, OD, Vision USA-ND Project Coordinator. "Without preventative eyecare, small vision problems could escalate to more costly and potentially serious conditions later in life." said Dr. Kourajian

Since the program's inception, over 2,500 North Dakotans have received assistance and approximately nine out of ten applicants have had one or more eye health or vision problems addressed through the program.

All applications will be reviewed. Eligible persons will be notified and referred to a participating optometrist.

Applications may be obtained from county social services, school administrators, local Lions Club members, or by contacting the Vision USA – ND Project at 701-258-6766. Applications may also be downloaded from www.ndeyecare.com.
