



Mandan youth wins MD5 Peace Poster contest

Advances to international competition

Katelyn Schmidt, a 8th grade student at Mandan Middle School, Mandan, took a big step towards becoming an internationally recognized artist when she won a local competition sponsored by the Mandan Dacotah Lions Club, Mandan.

Katelyn's poster has advanced through the Mandan Dacotah Club, District 5 NW and Multiple District 5 levels of competition and is now advancing to the international level, which is the final level in the contest.

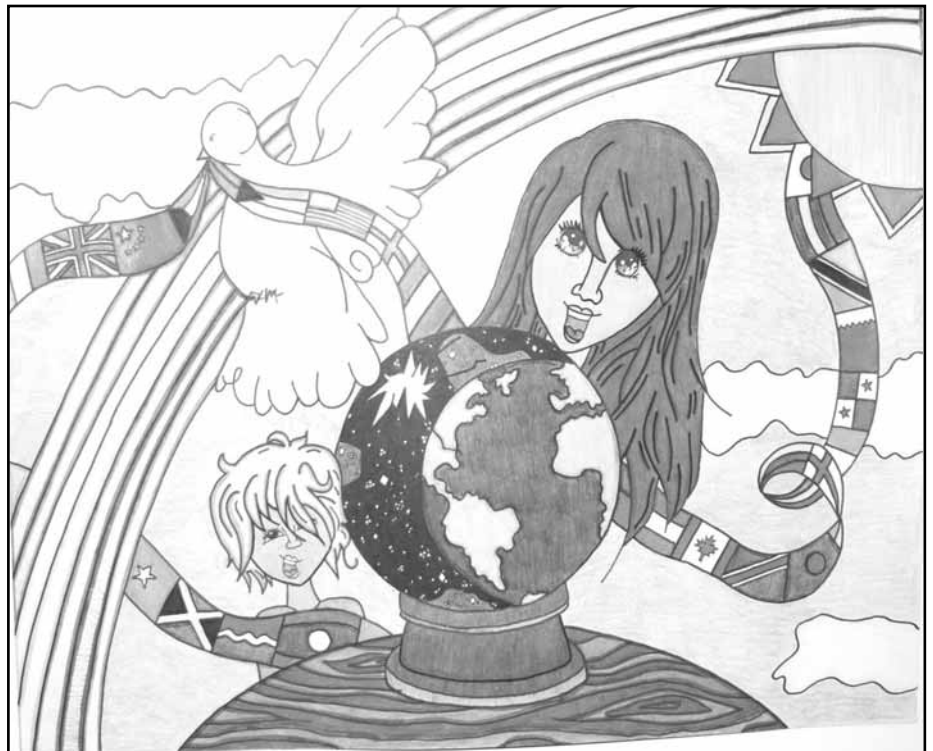
Katelyn's poster is one of more than 350,000 entries submitted worldwide in the annual Lions International Peace Poster Contest. Lions Clubs International is sponsoring the program to emphasize the importance of world peace to young people everywhere.

"Our future is bright. It is filled with Peace and Happiness," the thirteen-year-old from Mandan said. The poster was selected for its originality, the boldness of color, the defined lines, the attention to detail and the story the poster tells of the theme for this year "Our World, Our Future" by a panel of judges made up of local artists.

The artists gave outstanding praise to all of the District entries and were amazed by the imagination and creativity of each student and the artwork they submitted. Each poster received the appreciation of the judges for their excellent work.

Mandan Dacotah Lions Club member and District Governor-Elect Arlen Fetch of Lions District 5NW said he was impressed by the creativity and self-expression of the students at the school.

"This marks the third year in a row that a gifted student from Mandan Middle School has won this contest at the District

level. It is obvious that their teacher, Lisa Leingang, does an excellent job of promoting this wonderful opportunity to these young people," Fetch said. "Those students who participate in the program do so over and above scheduled class time. This takes discipline and motivation to complete their posters in a timely manner before the initial judging. These creative students demonstrate strong ideas about what peace means to them. I'm so proud that we were able to provide them with the opportunity to share their visions."

Locally, Katelyn Schmidt, 1st place, Katie Weiland, 2nd place, and Zander, 3rd place, will be celebrated for their participation in the Lions International

Peace Poster through the Mandan Dacotah Lions Club by displaying their creations at The Dakota Community Bank in Mandan November and December.

MD 5 Lions Opportunities for Youth Chairperson Lion Maureen Meston-Pockett said, "It is obvious that these young people have strong ideas about what peace means to them. I am grateful and very proud that we, as Lions, are able to provide these students with the opportunity to share their visions of peace."

What does LCIF do?

It's the first anniversary of Superstorm Sandy. The hurricane struck the East Coast of the United States and the Caribbean with deadly and destructive force as you all remember.

You may not know, however, that LCIF awarded an immediate \$100,000 Major Catastrophe Grant with money from the LCIF disaster relief fund which allowed Lions in affected areas to immediately begin providing assistance.

In addition, LCIF assembled \$640,000 in Emergency Grants and donations from Lions and other agencies to provide food, water, blankets, medicine, hygiene kits and more to people who lost their homes.

Sandy happened a year ago but here are some Lions activities still going on today.

The **Flatland Lions Club** of New York is using a \$40,000 LCIF grant to help elderly and infirm residents with great need to rebuild their homes.

The **Long Beach Lions Club** (New York) is using a \$47,000 LCIF grant to replace and rebuild the Long Beach Food & Friendship Inn, a Soup

Kitchen for people in need which has operated since 1983.

The Lions of New Jersey making home repairs for low income people who had no insurance and had not yet received Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) funds.

The **Brooklyn Transition Lions Club** (New York) is using an \$88,000 LCIF grant to provide New Church International with a transport van, equipment for the pantry, commercial appliances, shelving and flooring.

Weather related major disasters seem to never end. On Nov. 8, Typhoon Haiyan slammed into the Philippines with huge destructive force putting up to three million people out in the street. LCIF made \$130,000 available immediately to the 12,000 Philippine Lions to provide immediate relief. That amount increased to \$500,000 within a week through donations from Lions club members in neighboring countries and around the world.

As the typhoon struck, LCIF Chairperson Wayne Madden happened to be in

Singapore attending a regional Lions Leadership conference, which included Lions from the Philippines and other Asian countries. Within one hour, Lions attending the conference raised US\$370,000 for disaster relief in the Philippines. One hour! Chairperson Madden from Indiana was humbled by the immediate and generous support and said, "We are now focused on mobilizing our relief efforts and working with local agencies to assess the greatest need in the short-term. Our motto is 'WE SERVE' and

that's exactly what we intend to do for the people in the Philippines."

One of the questions I hear over and over as I attend conferences and meetings is, "What does LCIF do?" One quick answer is to reread the foregoing report on LCIF activities.

Perhaps your club, or members of your club, or both, could give a Christmas gift to LCIF to assist in funding disasters such as those mentioned above.

Vision Screener Project Task Force progressing

A nine member task force appointed by Lions Foundation of North Dakota has met three times via electronic meetings, with a goal of purchasing six Vision Screeners for placement throughout the state.

Sub committees are working to research and select the model that will be purchased, complete and submit a grant application to Lions Clubs

International, and raise the required matching funds needed for the grant.

Vision Screeners are operator friendly units that detect six different conditions in infants six months and older. Anisometropia, Astigmatism, Myopia, Hyperopia, Anisocoria, and Corneal Reflexes, when detected early, can be corrected. This can

make a profound difference, not only in the child's ability to see, but also enhance the learning ability of the child.

The projected cost of the project, including training for screener operators, is \$60,000. Half of that will be requested in the grant, with the other \$30,000 needed to be raised by the North Dakota Lions.

If those funds can be

received or committed before Dec. 27, the grant application can be submitted for consideration in the next review. Donations from Lions Clubs and individual Lions may be sent to Chris Voegelé, treasurer, Lions Foundation of North Dakota, PO Box 273, Bowman, ND 58653.

Dear Lions and Ladies:

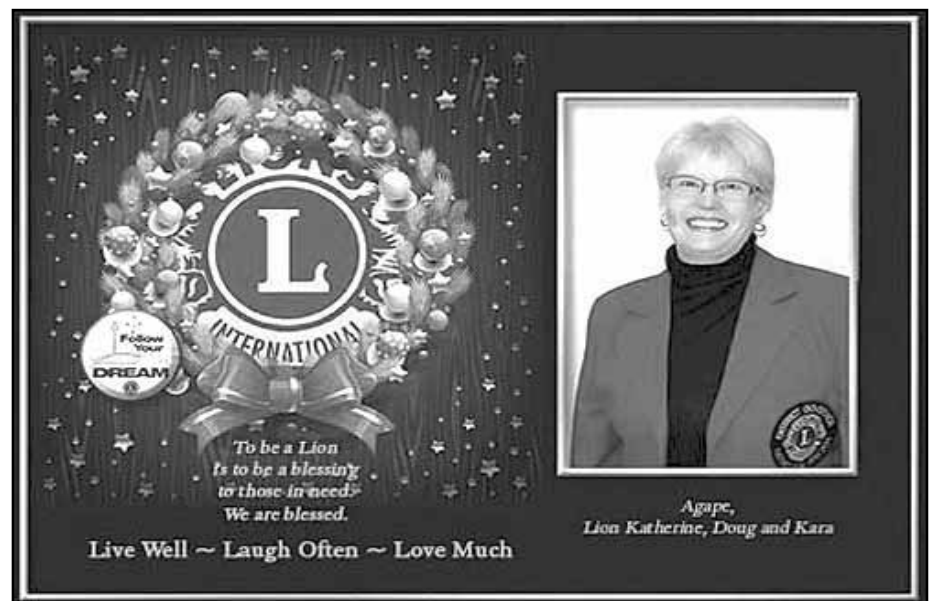
I suppose you have heard the legend

5NW DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S REPORT

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Now that you all have survived the Black Friday/ Grey Thursday shopping frenzy and are now well into the Christmas shopping season, along with all of the year-end requests from every charity and scam you can think of and several you haven't, one of the worst that I've seen in my line of work is the one where a family who is trying to find housing here and sent a down payment and first month's rent to lease a home they saw on an online ad, only to find out they were scammed.

The person running the scam states that they are going out-of-country, usually Kenya or some other African nation, for six months to a year and they will send you the keys as soon as they get your deposit.

Because they steal the information from a legitimate site they can post a very beautiful set of pictures

and information about the property. In the past two years I've had at least six properties that were hit this way and know of several other properties.

One was a family who pulled up to a property that was for sale with a U Haul truck and told the owner that they had leased the property and "Why were they, in their home?"

This was a very hard one because of the young children, and the couple had spent the majority of their funds getting here to work in the oil patch.

With that in mind, let's look at that all of the letters, phone calls and other means that the charities attempt to get us to donate to them. The actual amount of money donated that is used for charitable programs is from 0 percent to 100 percent.

The majority of the income is used for administrative expenses. The CEO's salary can

be as little as a few thousand, to several millions with expenses and a Rolls Royce.

Lions Foundation stand alone in this arena. It has no administrative expenses taken from the donations it receives. Since its inception it has granted/donated more than \$860 million back to victims of disasters such as hurricanes, tsunamis, fires, tornadoes and such.

They also support community projects like walking trails, playgrounds, park shelters, needed medical equipment for individuals, glasses, community gardens to promote good nutrition, youth projects, etc.

These are all projects that benefit communities and individuals worldwide. Lions Clubs International expanded its measles immunization program so that that disease can be eradicated.

Lions International has also extended its support of a reading program started a couple of years ago, for the next 10 years.

There are really too many programs to really get into in this space, but if you are really interested in sending a donation to a great service organization that puts all of the proceeds back in to charitable projects, take a look at www.lionsclubs.org. You will get the most bang for your buck.

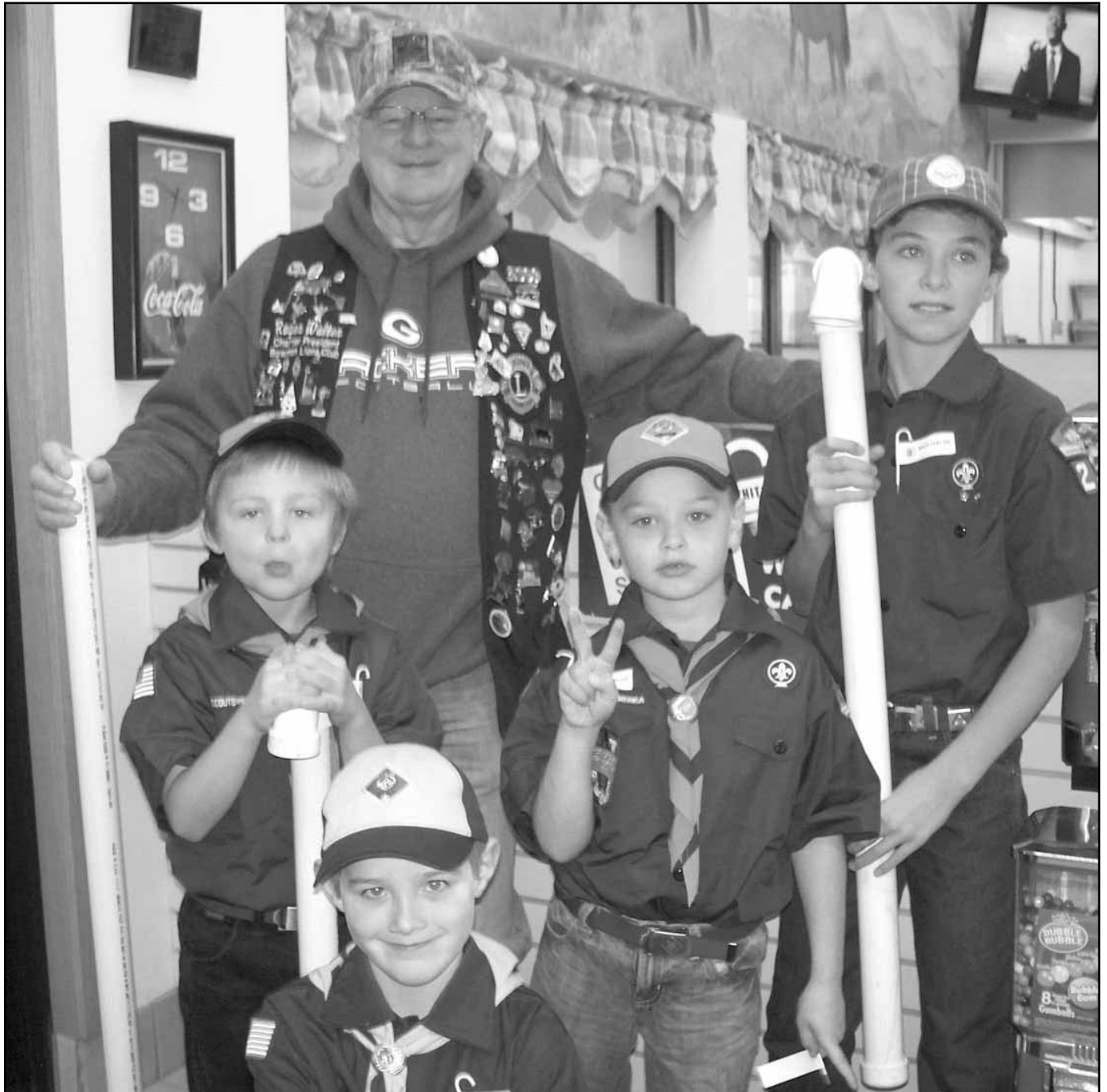
Throughout the evening door prizes were given away and major prizes were won by those who attended. The Bowman Lions would like to thank all the door prize sponsors and major prize contributors.
