Each year the Lions of Multiple District 5 host a camp for youth from all over the world. This Lions Youth Camp changes location within the Multiple District. In 2011, it was hosted in North Dakota, 2012, in South Dakota and in Saskatchewan in 2013.

In 2014, the camp will be at the Badlands in Medora. Cost for running the camp runs approximately around \$28,000 and our District is responsible for raising the necessary funds to host the camp.

The camp fee portion paid by the youth is \$400. This is only about 55 percent of the total funds that are required. Presently, for the Districts located within North Dakota – you are responsible for hosting once every three years. In any attempt to obtain sufficient funding we are asking directly, the North Dakota districts.

Lions can get involved and assist by contributing a voluntary amount. The other Districts will also be contacted asking them to get involved as this is a MD5 North Dakota Lions project. Another method is to hold a one-time special function with the proceeds going to the Lions Youth Exchange Program in lieu of the contributions.

The success of the Lions Youth Camp relies on the involvement and assistance of the Lions. Without your assistance the Lions Youth

Camp will not succeed. The youth are going to be our leaders in the not so far future and what better way to introduce them to the world of volunteerism and Lions. The fellowship we enjoy in our club meetings creates leadership that creates fellowship – a circle of influence. See page 50 of the January Lion magazine for more.


PU101



We want everyone to SEE a better tomorrow!

Good vision is key to a child's physical development, success in school and overall well-being. Poor vision can result in poor grades and behavior problems. As vision systems develop and grow, equal input from both eyes is necessary for the brain's vision center to develop normally. Uncorrected vision in childhood can lead to vision problems that cannot be corrected in later life.

Detecting vision problems at the earliest age possible is widely advocated. Research clearly indicates that detecting these conditions in early childhood increases the chance of successful treatment, especially if detected before the age of five. The earlier these vision problems are detected, and the underlying cause corrected with glasses or surgery, the more successful the treatment.

Helping the children of North Dakota SEE!



The Lions Foundation of North Dakota has approved a plan to purchase Six Vision Screening devices to be placed in six strategic sites throughout the State of North Dakota. Lions Clubs in the surrounding areas to where the screeners are located will have access to the screening device and their trained individuals will be able to screen preschool children in their local communities. All interested representatives from the clubs will be appropriately trained to use the devices.

Club representatives will work with school districts, social service agencies, healthcare organizations and others in the various communities to identify the early childhood population. Local Lions clubs will also arrange for screening facilities, schedule screening activities and inform the public.

Screening results will be provided to the county health nurse office in the area served and that office will be responsible for follow-up activities such as contacting parents and encouraging them to meet with eye care professionals.

How will the Project be Sustained? After the initial purchase of the equipment and training is completed, Lions Clubs throughout the state will be responsible to provide the personnel for screening and administrative responsibilities. The Lions Foundation of North Dakota, the Lions Eye Bank of North Dakota and County Nurses of North Dakota will also be partners in the project.

The initial cost of the project is expected to be approximately \$60,000.

application by March 15, 2014, and include the following information: the individual's name, club name. contact information for both yourself and the nominee, a letter outlining the types of service provided to individuals with sight loss within the community, the number of years as a Lions member, any offices held, committees chaired, and a brief letter


