District 5NW meets electronically

The District 5NW Cabinet held its third quarterly meeting Saturday morning, January 25. Doing so is just good Lions district management and essentially unremarkable.

But *how* the Cabinet members met on yet another "near blizzard" winter day in North Dakota *is* remarkable!

Nineteen District 5NW Cabinet members met via the "Adobe Connect" meeting experience, under the "host tutelage" of District 5NW Information Technology (IT) Chair Butch Frank.

District SNW IT Director Butch served as primary meeting host, managing the technical aspects of the meeting, while District 5NW Governor Mike Blazek conducted the 90-minute meeting and shared co-hosting duties with IT Chair Butch.

All participating Cabinet members had access to microphones on their computers, along with text communication capabilities; all sites except one had webcam service.

District 5NW Governor Mike felt this first 5NW District Cabinet meeting went very smoothly. "The cameras and microphones made it easier for everyone to be actively involved in the meeting."

"For a first time electronic District meeting, the connection was really strong. Everyone respected one another's wishes to speak and took turns talking."

District 5NWIT Chair Butch Frank agrees with DG Mike's assessment of the electronic meeting experience. "The meeting went smoothly, considering the number of people participating. We had the fewest technical glitches

Multiple District 5 receives LCI grant

Council Chair Rick Pockett recently received notification that Multiple District 5 has been awarded a public relations grant for 2014 in the amount of \$20,000 to be distributed between the six districts and the multiple district to promote Lionism. Each district will receive approximately \$2,200 to support its project, with the remainder awarded to the Multiple District to complete a social media campaign.

This is the fifth public relations grant the Multiple District has received in the past six years. LCI specifies that the grant must be used to purchase public relations materials or develop public relations programming and each district must match 10 percent of the grant within the district budget.

MD 5 applied for the grant

this year in order to confront a growing problem: declining membership across the region. The Council of Governors attributed this problem in part, to the lack of effective public relations activity to increase awareness and interest in Lions Clubs International. The grant includes six specific projects – one from each district – along with an overarching project at the Multiple District level to promote Lionism. Listed below are the specific projects identified for each district and the Multiple District:

District 5SKN - The information technology committee will purchase equipment and programs to create websites and develop PowerPoint displays, specifically targeting young adults.

District 5SKS – The public relations committee will purchase banners used for public events or events

sponsored by local Lions Clubs to replace existing banners that have become worn and out-ofdate

District 5NE – The public relations committee will purchase advertising and public relations materials to be used by the media to promote community awareness of Lions service.

District 5NW – The district will use the funds to create advertising and public relations about the refurbishing of the 4-H camp facility used by the general public and Lions throughout the district.

District 5SE – The funds will be used to pay local radio stations and media outlets to develop information for use in paid and public broadcasts to promote Lions activities throughout the district.

District 5SW – Using the information gained from a pilot test of ad campaign materials with local newspapers, the

district will develop a public relations campaign to use in local newspapers throughout the district

MD5 – The Long Range Planning Committee and the Public Relations Committee will consult with social media experts to develop the capacity to use Internet and video streaming to disseminate publicity to the general public using social media.

The grant application was written by PCC Robert Littlefield, Chair of the MD5 Public Relations Committee, with input from the six district governors and their district leadership teams, and submitted by CC Rick Pockett. The grant seeks to reach over one million people in Saskatchewan, North Dakota, and South Dakota through the public relations projects. 

MD5 Lions Badlands Youth Camp needs your help

Lion Judy Beaudry is using her influence as District 5NW 1st Vice District Governor in an effort to involve all Lions members and officers in providing volunteer and financial assistance to help make the 2014 MD5 Lions Badlands Youth Camp a huge success!

Specifically, she's asking Lions clubs for money, both to support meals for the campers during the week and full or partial financial sponsorships of North Dakota high school youth (ages 15 to 18) to attend the camp, Lions families across North Dakota to serve as host families before and/or after the Youth Camp for the international campers, a Lion volunteer to make arrangements for the international youth, clubs to spend a day at the camp preparing and serving either noon lunches or evening meals or both. Ideally, she would like to see one club (actually, only about four members are needed) assisting with camp

activities throughout each day of the six-day camp. She also welcomes donations of orange juice, bottled water, peanut butter and jelly. In addition, she encourages Lions members to solicit high school youth to register to participate in the camp.

The Youth Camp is slated for Sunday, July 20, through Saturday, July 26, at Medora. Participation is limited to the first 56 campers. The cost for each registrant is \$400, with half of the fee due upon registration.

According to 2014 MD5 Lions Badlands Youth Camp Director Mac Beaudry, camp highlights include the Medora Musical one evening, horseback riding, a westernthemed outdoor barbecue, a picnic, an ice cream social, a pizza party, a story-telling activity, miniature golf, swimming at the local pool, and possibly one or two community service projects. Although the schedule isn't finalized, Beaudry promises "We're in the Badlands of North Dakota; we're going to have a 'western' good time!"



A little history on St Valentine's Day

History says the name comes from Valentine, a priest, who served during the third century in Rome. Emperor Claudius II decided that unmarried young men fought better than married men since wives and families were a distraction to them when in battle. Saint Valentine continued secretly married the young men in violation of the Emperor's decree, because he felt it was an injustice to deny the young men a wife and family. When the Emperor found out, he had Valentine put to death. While in prison awaiting his execution, it is said that he fell in love with the jailor's daughter and before he died he sent her a note

signed "from your valentine" hence the saying yet today. The middle of February was chosen to celebrate the anniversary his death or burial in approximately AD 270. It took until the 5th century, when Pope Gelasius declared February 14th as St Valentine's Day. Valentines greetings were popular as far back as the Middle Ages, with the earliest written cards in the1400's. The earliest known poem was written in 1415 by Charles, Duke of Orleans, to his wife while he was being held prisoner in the Tower of London. It is now in the British Library in London.

By the 1900's cards began to replace written letters as it

was quicker and cheaper due in part because of improved printing equipment. In America we started exchanging handmade valentines in the 1700's. In the 1840's, Esther A. Howland began to sell mass produced valentines in America. Howland was named "Mother of the Valentine." She created valentines from scraps of ribbon, lace and colorful pictures.

Today there are approximately 1 billion valentines cards sent each year throughout the world. Women purchase approximately 85 percent of them.

Now that you have a very small history of Valentine's Day, share it with others. Also please



share your love of Lions as well, for it is with a Lions heart that we all serve others.

Invitations went out to the Hazen Lions Club and the members of the Beulah Lions Club. The banquet was held at the Grandview





communities. He is well versed on the current issues facing Lions Clubs International and is prepared to be a strong advocate for preserving the best of Lionism while building our Lions organization for the




