The US/Canada Forum held every September is a learning opportunity not to be missed! This year the Forum is being held in San Juan Puerto



I got a pop up on my PC that software updates were ready to install. I clicked to postpone the updates and I would start them later, when I had finished with the e-mail.

I sent the e-mail reminder out to all the Lions e-mail addresses in North Dakota, and thought I might as well make my donation before I could forget about it. I went to the Service Dogs For America website and clicked the donate button.

I debated on whether or not I should donate the suggested \$25. I decided I would donate \$15 instead, since any amount would be accepted and I don't make a lot of money as it is. I went to the checkout on the web site and put in all my information. Just as I was about to click the "Make Payment" button, my PC started shutting down to install the updates, canceling my transaction.

While my PC was updating, I thought this must be a sign that I should update my donation as well. When it was up and running again, I went back to the website and made my donation of \$25.

Some may think it was just coincidence. Some make think the higher power was Microsoft. I think the Higher Power was farther up telling me I needed to make a different decision.

Stitch is an experiment, number 626, who comes to earth, specifically Hawaii. There he finds Lilo, a little girl who lives in a non-traditional family.

Through caring and trials, Stitch and Lilo become friends - the destiny Stitch was created to have is changed.

His destiny is changed by love and caring, and finding a family. As the story moves along, Stitch says something that first made me have a big lump in my throat and has since made me think.

"Ohana means family. Family means nobody gets left behind, or forgotten.... This is my family. I found it all on my own. It's little, and broken, but still good. Yeah - still good."

The word ohana in the Hawaiian language means family in English. It is beyond the blood-related family and includes the community and

Please look around your community for people who have a heart for service, who want to make your community a better place. The frequent answer people give who recently joined a Lions club about why they did not join sooner is: "Nobody asked me."

Ask and nurture new members. Help them become great Lions. Our clubs are filled with great Lions, good family members.

We simply need to include as many people as possible to keep building our service opportunities.

A few clubs have had several members leave, some at one time. What happened?

Please, if people are not coming to meetings, call them. Keep communication channels open. Find out if something is wrong, if there is a way a club can help.

When my husband was laid off from his job money became tight. My club supports me in many ways and allows me to be a full member, paying all dues, but not purchasing meals. This simple gift means a great deal to me in my Lion family. I know there are other clubs who cover member dues and find ways to assure membership.

Please, if Lions say they are leaving the club, find out why. Do exit interviews. Ask people if being a Lion just wasn't a good fit, or if something happened they didn't understand or whatever is appropriate.

Lions are a family. Ohana. We are part of a greater community, a world-wide organization saving sight and creating


In our ohana, let us be sure we use aloha for hello more than goodbye.

AHHHHHHH, Spring is in the air, the days are getting longer and the sun is starting to heat things up. I'll be glad to get rid of the ice and snow and get into some gardening. You know for all of the talk of "Global warming/climate change" that we've all heard about for the past 15-20 years, some forgot to memo Mother Nature.

We start Daylight savings time on the 9<sup>th</sup> and it reminds me of an interview many years ago with a native American elder, when asked about it, his answer was, "White man very foolish he thinks by cutting off one foot from the bottom of the blanket and sewing it to the top he has more blanket." A little common sense can go a long way.

We are coming to the end of my third quarter as District Governor and I have to say my Cabinet and my 1st and 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG's have really done a fantastic job. My VDG's have been doing club visits, along with starting to build their personal teams for their coming year as District Governor's. The Zone Chairs. and Committee Chairs have all done a great job and it has made my job easier. I encourage all of you to take the time to become involved in the leadership of this great organization either at the level or district level.

It's like learning to swim, a baby dropped in a pool will learn very quickly because they aren't afraid, an adult will struggle and fight it because they are afraid. Fear is a learned response, not a natural one. The only difference between the person who has succeeded and the one who didn't is the belief in one's self.

When I've been making my Club visits, my goal has been to create an interest in the local clubs to start or expand on a community garden project to help feed those less fortunate. My motto is "Feeding the world one garden at a time." The North Star Lions Club had taken on that project several years ago and this past year gave away approximately 754 pounds of produce on their small plot. A high school Leo's class project in Montana produced almost 75% of the vegetables and potatoes for their school lunch program in 2013. The benefits are that they were getting fresh vegetables and learning stewardship, community involvement, leadership skills, and how to be self-sustaining. When I first started to research some of the things that would be needed to survive in hard economic times, the key was to be able to produce your own food. Small gardens, a few chickens

if the city allows them, fruits, vegetables and spices. Several countries and worldwide organizations talk about Food Security in different parts of the world. If a major drought, war or a natural disaster strikes can the country(s) sustain themselves. In areas where there are shortages, hoarding becomes common as does the black market for essential products, ie medicine, water, food or shelter. The U.S. imports \$70 billion worth of agricultural products every year. Only 1.1 % of these imports are inspected. Any manmade disaster against our food supply chain by chemicals,



contaminants or pathogens can and will have a very devastating effect. We as Lions need to make every effort to assist and teach people not only locally but throughout the world how to be self-sufficient to some degree.

So as we get ready for Spring and gardening, please plan it for sharing a portion of your bounty with others.

# Changes coming to Vision USA

# Name change a possibility

Geetings Lions of North Dakota: I bring you Glad News of Great Joy!
Firstly, and foremost, YOU are to be congratulated for your ongoing support of Vision USA. Because of YOU and the generosity of our partners in this project, the participating doctors of the North Dakota Optometric Association and the (name of lab), this project has provided eye care for many thousands of needy North Dakotans over the past twenty years.

The Lions have provided needed funding, the doctors provide a free eye exam for those who qualify, and the lab does the production work on

the lenses. The frames are a joint effort of the doctors and the lab. In addition, through the years, several other partners have helped- the NDOA Foundation, as well as the North Dakota Medical Association. The need has not vanished, and the participation of all of us is still very much needed.

With the advent of the "Affordable" Care Act, otherwise known as Obamacare, former insurance models have been outlawed or otherwise become obsolete. One such model is the Eye Insurance Program established by the NDOA for reasonable eye care coverage.

As a result of this, the funds that were held back from premiums to cover costs of the care will no longer be needed, and those funds are most likely to be funneled into the NDOA foundation. Simultaneously, the National Vision USA has mandated some changes which will affect the ability of the North Dakota partners to cover care for those in need.

The result of these changes is that the NDOA is studying how to best accomplish what we have done in the past while best using the resources at hand. It is no news that North Dakota has been blessed with a robust economy while the rest of the country has not, so the National Program has of necessity become more restrictive.

As I write this, the NDOA is getting ready for its annual convention where the member

doctors will discuss at length what THEY want to do about this situation. Have faith, the member doctors are not only good and caring people, but they genuinely want to do the right thing with this program. What we can expect is that the Vision USA, North Dakota Project, its full name as it stood before, will continue, but most likely with a new name. At this point, that name is "under study," and we as Lions may very well be asked for our input.

So put on your thinking caps, and let us know what YOU think should be the name for it. Thanks again for your years of support. Stay tuned for further updates!

### District 5NE on target to reach development fund goals

According to the report issued this month by Lions Clubs International Foundation, District 5NE clubs are on target to reach the district goal of \$25,000 by June 30, 2014. As of February, the district has raised \$18,226 and is currently standing at 72.9% of its intended goal. This level of contribution is \$5,986 ahead of last year's pace.

The District 5NE cabinet approved its LCIF goals for 2014 at the first cabinet meeting, which were to increase the level of donations


to LCIF by \$5,000 over the previous year and to have 100 percent of the clubs provide some level of support for the LCIF Development Fund.

As of this month, 21 clubs have contributed, including: Carrington, Edgeley, Emerado Arvilla, Fargo, Fargo Gateway, Gackle, Grand Forks, Grand Forks Red River, Grand Forks South Forks, Jamestown, Larimore Turtle River, Lehr, Medina, Napoleon, New Rockford, Northwood, Oakes, Rugby, Streeter, Valley City, and Wishek.

The goal for the remainder of the year will be to encourage those 36 clubs that have not

contributed to the LCIF Development Fund this year to make a donation of some amount so that District 5NE

can get closer to its dream of 100% support for LCIF in 2014.





During the event, several speakers shared their Leader Dog experiences, including Retired Master Sargent Eric Martz from Heroes of the Heartland who spoke of how his life was enriched because of the Leader Dog he received.

In addition, Rev. Ben and Pia Carlsen of Thief River Falls, Minnesota, accompanied by Xylon, the Leader Dog puppy they are training, talked about their experiences as Leader Dog puppy raisers and the role they play in helping to prepare dogs for their assignment as Leader Dogs.

At the conclusion of the event, NDSU Lions took the remaining chili to three facilities: Churches United for the Homeless, New Life Center, and the Gladys Ray Shelter. The chili and donut recipes used at Leader Dogs for the Blind are provided below for those who would like to sponsor a similar event.

### Leader Dog Buttermilk Donuts

3 cups buttermilk 2 tsp. salt 4 Tbsp. yeast 1/8 cup vanilla

1 tsp. baking soda

1 cups oil 5 Tbsp. sugar 1/2 cup warm water 9 cup flour

Glaze: In another bowl mix confectioner's sugar and vanilla. Add small amounts of warm water until mixture is workable (thickness of syrup).

Directions: In saucepan, heat buttermilk, oil, salt, and sugar until lukewarm and sugar is dissolved. Set aside. In small bowl dissolve yeast in 1/2 cup warm water, add vanilla. Pour buttermilk mixture and yeast mixture into large mixing bowl. Blend using a dough hook or pad attachment. Add 1 cup flour and baking soda; continue to add remaining flour in 1 cup intervals until dough is smooth and pulls away from the side of bowl. Knead 10 minutes. Remove from mixer. Let rise till double in size. Roll on lightly floured surface to 1/2 inch thickness. Using a large & small round cutter, cut into donuts. Place cut donuts & holes on lightly floured baking sheet and let rise until double in size. Deep fry at 350\*, when first side is golden brown in color; use a slotted metal spoon to carefully flip to other side. After donut is golden brown on both sides place in a paper towel lined pan to drain. Dip donuts & holes in glaze; place on wire rack until glaze dries. Yields 20 to 25 donuts and donut holes.




