# **Littlefield new International Director**

Robert S. Littlefield, a professor of communication at North Dakota State University, was one of seven Americans among the 17 Lions from around the world elected to the position of International Director at the 97th Annual Convention of Lions Clubs International July 4-8, in Toronto, Canada. With 25,000 participants at the convention, 5,000 certified delegates voted, capping off the annual convention activities.

Littlefield joins the 34-member international

board as one of 14 directors representing the United States. He will serve a two-year term on the board of directors and travel primarily throughout North America representing the association.

A member of

Club since 1984, Littlefield has held numerous leadership positions including club president in 1991 and

2005, district governor in 2011 for eastern North Dakota, and council chairman in 2012 for Multiple District 5 including North Dakota, South Dakota and Saskatchewan. In addition. Littlefield is

serving as president of the North Dakota Past District Governors Association and is the faculty adviser to the North Dakota State University Fargo campus Lions Club.

Recognized with leadership and service awards at the local, district and international levels, Littlefield is a progressive Melvin Jones fellow – the highest recognition given by the Lions Clubs International Foundation.

He and his wife, Kathy, a social studies teacher at Shanley High School, are the parents of two grown children, Lindsay, Austin, Texas and Brady, New York, N.Y., and two grandsons.

# Leader Dog announces Kennel Campaign

Leader Dogs for the Blind has announced a capital fund raising drive as part of its 75th anniversary. The growth of the organization since 1939 along with the deteriorating conditions of the kennel portion of the complex have made it necessary to redesign and expand the operation in a major way.

The total amount of the expansion needs is \$14.5 million, some of which has already been raised. Leader Dog is asking the Lions of the United States and Canada to raise \$3 million of that total.

The campaign formally began July 1 and will end June 30, 2015. During this oneyear effort Lions clubs and individuals will be asked to make one-time donations or

pledges. Donations may be made in a lump sum or spread out over a three to five year period. There will be individual and club recognitions of various kinds for the various levels of giving which will be explained in future articles.

The fund raising drive is organized in much the same manner as the hugely successful 2005-2008 Campaign SightFirst II

initiative. Bruce Schwartz accepted the roll of Regional Coordinator for North and South Dakota. Jan Froemming Elgin is District Coordinator for District 5NW and Sandy Wurgler Rugby holds that position in District 5NE. District coordinators in South Dakota are Donna Wetz of

# Club celebrates 75th anniversary

The Mandan Lions Club celebrated its 75th Anniversary at the Mandan Moose Club on April 26, 2014. The festive occasion was attended by Lions from eight ND Lions Clubs. The Mandan Lions Club, with the Bismarck Lions Club as sponsor, held its organizational meeting on May 1, 1939.

The club was presented its charter, dated May 9, 1939, at a banquet and program at the Lewis and Clark Hotel on May 22, 1939. Entertainment was provided by the Hi-Hat Orchestra and the Mandan Male Chorus, Mandan Mayor C. G Byerly provided welcoming remarks and Lions International Director, W. Murray Allan, of Grand Forks, was the featured speaker.

Dignitaries at the 75th Anniversary included PID Bruce Schwartz of Bismarck and candidate for endorsement for ID, PCC Robert S.

Littlefield. The evening started with a welcome by Lion Dennis Friesz, the incoming Mandan Lions Club President.

Following dinner, the group was entertained by the Northern Lights Chorus, a local barbershop group. PID Bruce Schwartz introduced the keynote speaker, PCC Robert S. Littlefield. In his speech, PCC Robert S Littlefield spoke of his work as a college professor and how he has come to observe celebrations on a regular basis, as graduations occur every semester for those students who complete their courses and pass their tests. In this context, he spoke about how the Mandan Lions Club had passed a significant test of its own – the test of time.

In 1939, the world was on the brink of World War II, the people of the United States were recovering from the Great Depression, and the Mandan

community was encouraging the development of service organizations to meet the needs of its people. In response, the Bismarck Lions Club sponsored the Mandan Lions Club May 22, 1939.

PCC Littlefield spoke about Mandan Lions projects that have been the mainstay of their efforts over the years. The club created a park and arboretum, sold Christmas trees and holiday decorations, sponsored a major high school wrestling tournament, to name a few. Remarkably, as new needs arose, the Mandan Lions responded with resolve to add to their efforts to help those needing assistance.

On all accounts, the Mandan Lions earned high marks for dedicated service, their loyalty to Lions charities and other community needs, their support for youth programs, and their resiliency.

PCC Littlefield closed his speech by reading a letter that had been sent to the Mandan Lions Club 40 years late. It came from a man who had been given the opportunity to attend Boys State due to the generosity of the Mandan Lions Club. However, he had not written his thank you note when his parents had asked him to, so he wanted to set things right by letting the club know how much their support had meant to him.

It turns out that he ended up attending NDSU, learned about optometry scholarships, attended Pacific University College of Optometry in Oregon, and became a Doctor of Optometry, currently practicing in Wisconsin. Lions rarely know the impact they have on those they help. But the writer of the letter concluded: "You can't really say where

# Celebrating half a century in South Forks




