Arlo R. Anderson is the newest member of the North Dakota Lions Hall of Fame. He will be inducted during ceremonies at this year's State Lions Convention Oct. 17-18 in Jamestown.

Arlo R. Anderson was born at Leonard, on the family farm Jan. 11, 1936. He attended Maple River #36 school during elementary years and graduated from Leonard High School. He lettered in baseball, football (captain) and was basketball student manager and was a cheerleader.

After graduation, he joined the U.S. Navy and served four years on a minesweeper based in Charleston, S.C. with duty tours to the Mediterranean, Haiti and Cuba.

He married
Doris Holbrook
in North Carolina
after getting out of
the Navy. They lived
in North Carolina
for five years before
moving back to
North Dakota. In
North Carolina, he
worked for Duncan

Electric Company. His first two children, Marianne and Rodney, were born in North Carolina.

The family moved to North Dakota in 1966 to help on the family farm. A third child, Marsha, was born in 1972. Arlo received his electrical licenses in 1965. He retired from farming

after 40 years and from electrical work after 50 years.

Arlo is a charter member of Chaffee Lions, being a member since the club organized in 1974. He has

considered a holiday nor are they to be conducted for the purpose of a formal education, employment or career advancement. All youth are expected to serve as representatives of their communities and countries.

Youth Exchange was officially adopted in 1962. It is founded on the first of Lionism, to create and foster a spirit of understanding among peoples of the world.

What better way for Lions Clubs to do this than have the youth of our communities take part in a program that offers opportunities of a lifetime.

Strengthen the Pride through

Membership and Service

Last month, after the LCI New Board Orientation in Chicago, Kathy and I traveled to Minot to participate in the Council of Governors meeting for Multiple District 5. New Council Chair Ken Wetz from 5SW did a fine job of facilitating the meeting and the new District Governors and their leadership teams began their work in pursuit of their goals for the upcoming year. Kathy and I had a chance to thank everyone for their support and friendship and shared some of our experiences from Toronto. The international convention was a "top of the mountain" experience we will never forget.

It is always great to get together with fellow Lions in MD5 to learn out what is happening in each district and to discuss strategies to manage the tasks that come with being in a leadership position. Each Governor shared a similar challenge in the year ahead: Membership growth and retention. As International President Ioe Preston explained, "Our focus is on service, but our strength is directly tied to our members. While we have been fortunate to sustain membership growth over the past six years, that growth must continue if we are to maintain our role as the global leader in humanitarian service."

President Preston is promoting specific strategies for membership growth, particularly the Ask One campaign. You might not think you can do it, or you might question whether it works; but it sure has been the right strategy for me over the past month, producing two new members and the potential of a third. The impact of a positive and welcoming approach is all it takes to encourage people to join. If we each just ask one friend, colleague, or family member, we will see a dramatic shift in membership growth in our clubs and districts this year. I hope everyone will give "Ask One" a try.

In addition to the emphasis on membership, two other topics discussed at the Council meeting deserve special mention here.

First, Past International Director Garnet Davis, MD5 Centennial Committee Chair provided details about the upcoming Celebration in 2017. He outlined the theme. "Where there's a need, there's a Lion," and suggested ways the Centennial could be integrated into future projects and club activities. This year--2014-we are promoting the focus of inspiration through our heritage. To celebrate 100 years of service, we need to remember our identity and what we stand for as Lions. We make a difference in this world and we need to make sure our members realize the implications of our international heritage. Every year until 2017, a different focus will capture our attention and help clubs to prepare.

Second, to demonstrate the commitment of Lions worldwide to serving those in need, every Lions Club is being asked to participate

in the Centennial Service Challenge—100 million acts of kindness for 100 years of service. For each of the next four years, clubs are asked to do at least one project in each of four areas (empowering youth, improving vision and preventing blindness, combatting hunger, and preserving the environment) in order to reach the goal of 100 million acts of kindness. Club or personal donations to LCIF, in any or all of these four areas, is a great way for clubs to participate and help our foundation. The LCI Foundation has been very generous to our Multiple District through the awarding of numerous grants. This vear, North Dakota children will benefit from an LCIF grant, as vision screeners are now available through the Sight5Kidz program. Finally, we need to publicize our pride in Lionism and the difference we make in the lives of people. In response, a short video was produced through



the work of Bison Information Network at North Dakota State University. In this video, MD5 Lions share the benefits of membership in our great association. Video Magnifier Program helps local citizen

The Lions Club Foundation of North Dakota came to Hazen last week and made local resident Ron Muth a very happy man.

Muth, who suffers from some impaired vision, received a Video Magnifier system through the Video Magnifier Program of the foundation.

The machine, which magnifies objects laid on a plate onto a computer screen, will greatly enhance Muth's ability to read without the fuss of a hand-held magnifying glass. For example, reading medicine bottles, newspapers or looking

at photos.

The retail cost of the machine is about \$3,000 dollars and Muth, as well as many others, found the foundation's leasing program at \$20 per month much more feasible than a large payment.

"I had been looking at it for a while," said Muth. "But, I couldn't afford it on my own. I have been fighting with a magnifying glass and this is going to work good for me."

The program, now four years old, has become a self-sustaining program due to the leasing option which gives elderly citizens the ability to keep the machine as

long as they desire while the foundation reinvests in other video systems.

Muth became the 140th applicant for the service and was approved within two days to receive the magnifier. Currently, the foundation has 86 machines in use throughout North Dakota.

"This is a great tool for

people who are visually impaired," explained Kevin Vannett, executive director of the foundation. "The program has been very successful in North Dakota."



(Proposed:) A review or audit will be performed annually, either internally or by an accounting firm as determined and selected by the board of directors, and such finding be published in the North Dakota Lion newspaper. Said review or audit will be performed by an accounting firm no less than every five years, to include each year since the previous such review or audit that was performed by an accounting firm

- 1. The official convention program shall be the order of business.
- 2. Roberts Rules of Order shall govern all parliamentary procedures. Host District Governor shall appoint a convention parliamentarian and a convention secretary.
- 3. Presiding Officer The host District Governor (5NE, DG Dwaine Heinrich) shall be the designated officer to preside at the state meeting.
- 4. Quorum A majority of the registered certified delegates in attendance at a convention session shall constitute a quorum.
- 5. Lions in good standing must be registered and certified in order to vote on all convention matters. Clubs with indebtedness of \$50 over 90 days old to Lions International or their District will be considered not in good standing.
- 6. The use of profane language at any business session, social function, or banquet is prohibited.
- 7. Credentials to vote at the District/ND State Convention shall be mailed to the respective District Cabinet Secretary for 5NE (Lion Kristi Anderson, 1513 5 ½ Ave NE, Jamestown, ND 58401) and 5NW (Lion PDG Herman Schafer, 445 London Ave #1, Bismarck, ND 58504) or delivered upon arrival at the convention by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, October 18, 2014 at the convention registration desk at the Gladstone Inn & Suites, 111 2nd St NE, Jamestown, ND.
- 8. CLUB DELEGATE FORMULA. Article IX.3. Each chartered club in good standing in Lions Clubs International and its district (single or sub- and multiple) shall be entitled in each annual convention of its district to one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate for each ten (10) members, who have been enrolled for at least one year and a day in the club or major fraction thereof, of said club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month last preceding that month during which the convention is held. The major fraction referred to in this section shall be five (5) or more members. Each certified delegate present in person shall be entitle to cast one (1) vote only for each office to be filled by, and one (1) vote only on each question submitted to the respective convention.
