"Waiting for spring? Remember, gardens ... and clubs need attention"

Not long ago, a friend of mine directed me to a joke about spring. It went something like this: A man had spent the late winter months waiting impatiently for signs of spring. When the first warm, sunny Saturday arrived, he eagerly unlocked the storm door and stepped onto the patio deck. Pleased by the sight of green sprouts and the sounds of singing birds, he was delighted by the sweet aroma of the spring air. Knocking on the kitchen window, he beckoned to his wife to join him in enjoying the pleasures of the season. She quietly brought him back to earth when she reminded him that he was standing over the dryer vent, inhaling the scent of fabric softener.

Seriously, while I understand it's almost spring; at least that is what they are telling me, I also know that in some corners of the Multiple District, it may be awhile before all of the snow melts. Despite this reality, we officially have passed the first day of spring on the calendar and some are thinking about planting flowers, vegetables, and crops to enjoy during the summer and fall.

In my area, lawns are dry and some of my neighbors have already been raking up leaves and dead grass to make

room for the new shoots that are waiting to poke their stems up. It won't be long before flowerbeds and gardens are tilled and watered to prepare for planting. At some point, fertilizers will be added to enrich the soil and help the plants to grow to their fullest potential.

In the countryside, there are fields that need to be plowed, fertilized, and prepared before the seeds can be planted. Then, once in the ground, the forces of nature—sun and water—are needed for the seeds to sprout and grow. Farmers don't just plant the seeds; they must nurture their crops through a difficult growing season in hopes of securing a bountiful harvest.

At this point, you may be wondering, "What is this guy talking about; and more importantly, why is this taking up space in the Lions newspaper?" The answer to these questions is pretty simple. Just as lawns, flowerbeds, garden plots, and fields need to be prepared and cared for in order for plants to grow, Lions need to take steps to prepare and care for their clubs in order for growth to occur.

As Lions prepare for the 2015-2016 Lions year, there are a few things that should be done

to help guarantee a good crop of leaders and bountiful harvest of activities and service.

First, Lions need to make sure that new leaders are elected and encouraged. Take a look at who has been leading the club for many years and make an effort to open up some of the leadership positions to new members. The result will be a growth of confidence and new ideas to help the club move forward.

Next, open up the club to some new ideas. Just as the soil is tilled to make it more receptive to the seeds, flowers, or vegetation being planted, clubs should make sure that the hardened way of doing things is loosened up to make the club more receptive to new options.

Following the introduction of some new ideas, make sure that club leaders are fertilized with updated training provided by the District rallies and training sessions, Multiple District Convention training sessions, Great Plains Lions Leadership Institute, USA/Canada Forum, or International Convention. Certainly, Lions can figure things out by themselves—just as plants find ways to grow despite growers without green thumbs—but just as fertilizer makes for a stronger plant,

taking advantage of Lion training will make for a stronger leader.

Once these steps have been taken, Lions should nurture their new leaders and new ideas to help them survive the inevitable obstacles that arise during their year of service. Being a leader in a voluntary organization has its challenges and even though we might give some sunshine in the form of a smile or recognition, or shower our leaders with attention from time to time, unless we take care of our leaders, they will surely not produce what they might have if we would have been more supportive in the first place.

As we near the end of the 2014-2015 year of Lionism, let us make sure that we pay as much attention to our leaders and clubs as we do to our lawns, gardens, and fields. If we do, we will surely have a harvest that exceeds our expectations. And, if you happen to step outside and smell something wonderful, make sure it's the flowers and not your fabric softener!

For those who enjoy the game of Golf, the Osgood Golf Course in Southwest Fargo is the site. A round of nine holes, lunch, and round-trip transportation to and from the venue are included in the \$40 fee. Hole prizes and good

fun is planned for those who participate.

The Maple River Winery will be the destination for those who want to sample wines made from North Dakota finest fruits. Nestled in downtown Casselton—just a short 20 miles from the hotel—the tour will feature samples and round-trip transportation. The winery will have products on sale for those interested. much time as needed prior to the start of the convention. The shopping alternative is open to anyone at no cost. However, transportation to and from West Acres is up to those wanting to shop.

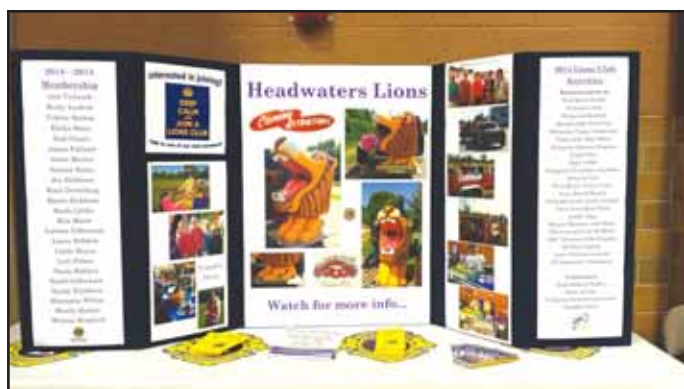

Carrington Lions Club-Sight 4 Kidz Project

The Vision Screening project sponsored recently by the Carrington Lions and conducted by trained Lions, detected vision abnormalities in 18% of the 44 preschool and kindergarten children screened.

The screenings was held Feb. 11, 2015, at CARRINGTON Preschool and Carrington Elementary School.

Those children found to have one or more of the six vision conditions the vision screener program equipment can detect, were referred to eye care professionals.

Lion Pat Vannett, chair of the North Dakota Lions Vision Screener Program said, "That is not an unusual result. We're finding a surprising number of children who can be helped

with early detection, to treat or cure vision conditions. That's why we are doing this. We encourage parents who may have missed this screening opportunity, to contact a local Lion to learn where another screening is scheduled nearby."

Screenings are free of charge to the public, sponsored by local Lions clubs, and conducted by North Dakota Lions who have been trained to provided this service. This project is made possible through the cooperation of Lions Clubs International Foundation.

Internationally, Lions were challenged to be "Knights for the Blind" by Helen Keller at an international convention in 1925. The Vision Screener project fills a gap in the Lions'

Varied programs are scheduled for the 2015 MD5 Convention to be held in Fargo on May 29-30, 2015. A keynote address by a local community activist and three programs will address this year's theme of Lions "Building Community: Teamwork, Technology, and Transformation."

To kick off the convention, Greg Tehven will present the keynote address on the topic: "Ideas Worth Spreading to Change the World." A motivational speaker and community leader, Greg has spent much of his life believing he can "create the community you want to live in." He is the co-founder of innovative enterprises, including: Emerging Prairie, Dinnerties.com, 1 Million Cups Fargo, and Students Today Leaders Forever. He is an adjunct professor at Concordia College in Moorhead, MN. Greg's current

In addition, programs in each of the three topic areas—Teamwork, Technology, and Transformation—will be presented on Saturday. 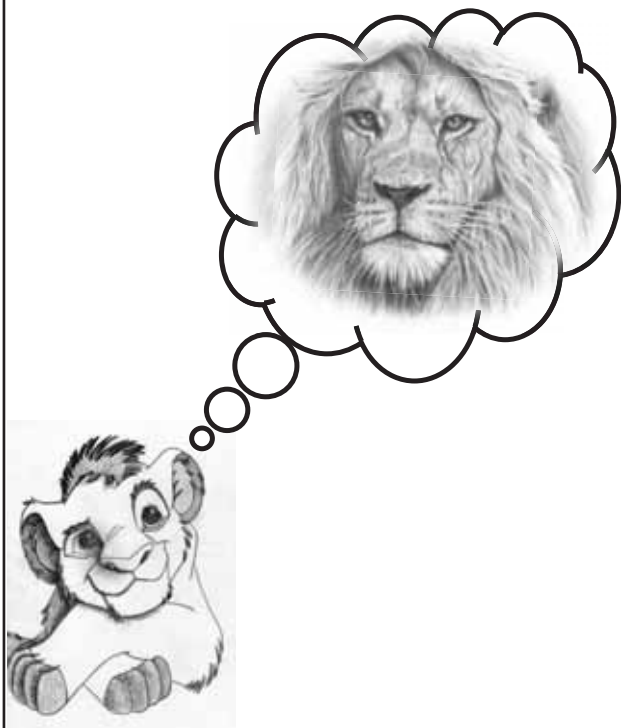
