Cheetah found, brought home!

Enderlin Lion Christiansen hailed as financial genius!

The Enderlin countryside sleeps a bit easier knowing the local Lions Club has found its missing roaming Cheetah.

In the summer of 2011, Enderlin Lion Carol "Christy" Christiansen bought a stuffed Cheetah toy at a Twin Cities rummage sale for \$1. A Cheetah is not quite a Lion but still a member of the big cat family.

On Sept. 21 of the same year, Lions Christy, Harold Narum, Donn Larson and Jack Armstrong drove the Cheetah to Grand Forks and dropped her off at a local Lions club meeting: the deal was for every day your club had the Cheetah, \$5 was to be donated to the Great Plains Assistance Dogs Foundation of Jud.

Lion Christy's thought was to raise money for this Foundation and to encourage Lions Club visitations.

The only way to shuck this financial drain was to pass it on to another Lions Club, who then paid \$5/day to Jud until they passed it on to another Lions Club.

After the Cheetah was left at Grand Forks, the Enderlin Lions caught snippets of its visits until about a year ago when all rumors stopped.

In desperation, the Enderlin Lions placed a story in "North Dakota Lion" newspaper, pleading for its return and promising the hiring of Dr. Walt Palmer, famed hunter and killer of big cats. Dr. Palmer would go from Lions Club to Lions Club with his bow and blood lust in his eye until the Cheetah was returned.

The day the "North Dakota Lion" went on-line was the day Lion Christy got a call from Lion William Gackle, Kulm Lions Club, who said "We got your Cheetah."

Arrangements were quickly made and Lion William delivered the Cheetah to the LaMoure Chronicle office and Jenny Fernow, the Enderlin Independent editor, drove her the last 55 miles to Enderlin Jan. 19.

The financial director of the Great Plains Assistance Dogs Foundation, Shelly Nannenga, told the Independent: "We are tickled to get these donations. We are so thankful and it was a great idea."

Foundation Executive Director Jan Brodkorb added "Lions Clubs are one of our biggest supporters and we are grateful for all Lions support."

The travelog in the Cheetah's cage documented 28 host clubs but, alas!, the records for the first 6 months on the road are gone!

How Will Historians Write Our History?

It's February and the Ground Hog did not see his shadow; so, an early spring is on the horizon. That's good news for us as we long to lose the snow and cold that often gets the best of our spirits about this time of year.

An early spring holds great promise and potential. There is something that lies ahead of us and we don't always know what the future will bring. We always have the past, so there is something to write about; but looking forward often leaves us with a blank page, waiting for history to write itself.

In recent years, the news stories being written by journalists contain information that is quite negative in scope: stories of war, terrorism, extremist groups, shootings, and hate, to name a few. These stories are painting a picture of people who are violent and destructive. Will historians write about humanity in the 21st Century as warlike and

uncaring about their fellow human beings?

In contrast, Lions are rebuilding communities after natural disasters, empowering youth, feeding the hungry, and providing sight and vision services for those needing assistance. Lions are providing hope through the services they provide and the projects they support financially. But, are there enough stories of hope for historians in the future to conclude that not all of humanity was focused on war and violence? Some days, I'm not sure.

I believe Lions should be more proactive in making sure that their positive stories of service get published in local newspapers and broadcast over public airwaves so that people become more aware of all the wonderful things Lions do in their communities and around the world. You know my theme has always been: "Speak Up For Service!" In addition, through the efforts of friends there is a "Speak Up For Service Day" on October 30 each year. I want to remind everyone that publicity is a key part of building awareness and helping people to understand exactly what Lions do.

I want to suggest that Lions should actively counter the negative stories with positive ones, so that "the record" is more balanced in the history books. We need to make sure the correct information is written about Lionism and our role as Lions in the world today. We need to make sure that we provide the complete picture and provide the substance that future historians can use when they write about 2016.

Think about Lionism and the impact we have in the world. More than 1.4 million people annually come together in membership to stand up for love, peace, humanitarian needs, and hope for a brighter future. In over 46,000 clubs, Lions serve their communities and



stand together against hate, violence, and destruction. We have come together—not for political purposes to dominate the world; not for economic purposes to control the flow of goods and services; not for religious purposes to establish one faith—but for humanitarian purposes to make the world a better place.

When historians in 2516 look back at the world in 2016, let's hope we have provided them with the evidence they need to write about Lions Clubs International as the largest civilian dynasty the world has ever known. Who wouldn't want to be part of such an organization? Let's leave a legacy and make sure we tell our communities and the world about what we do; and with our stories, bring the promise of a bright future for those in need.

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LEBND to Partner with SDLETB

During the Lions State Convention in Minot October 2015. I announced that the LEBND and SDLETB were to become partners as a new organization dba Dakota Lions Sight and Health. That time is now upon us. We have been working on this for over twelve years to make a stronger, economical and unified eye and tissue bank. A decision was made to leave TBI who was the management company, to find a better, closer management organization. The discussions between LEBND and SDLETB BOD's. had been about organizing a joint entity since they have been managing our eye bank for the past one and a half to two years.

As in any new relationship we have had a few bumps to smooth out but it has been very minimal. One of the bumps was the makeup of the new BOD. We will have equal representation with three members each from 5NE

and 5NW. This will reduce the number of LEBND BOD by twelve.

All of the current assets of LEBND will stay in ND and be managed by a Financial Committee, not yet determined. We will be dissolving the current LEBND in order to move forward with the new partnership as required by LCI rules and state law. A new set of By Laws and Articles of Incorporation have been drawn up for the new organization and will be available upon request.

Any donations to the eye bank going forth should be made to Dakota Lions Sight and Health or DLSH. Donations can still be sent to our local office and they will be forwarded to the main office in SD. The clubs will still be recognized by DLSH the same as before at the State Lions Convention.

When I discussed this change with several of the older Lions members that had been involved in the startup of the LEBND, they felt it was time to move forward. Two of the most frequently asked questions

were, "What is going to happen to the assets we have?" and "Are we still going to provide the service we currently do with regards to sight programs?" My answer has been the same as above, all assets stay in ND. As to the second question, I believe we can improve on the service and have a stronger presence in our

communities.

I am asking for the Lions Clubs of North Dakota to promote the donor programs, especially the gift of sight.

Remember we are Lions. We are "Knights for the Blind" as Helen Keller asked us to be.

ID Littlefield Takes Position at University of Central Florida

ID Robert Littlefield has accepted a position as Director of the Nicholson School of Communication at the University of Central Florida and will begin his duties on August 8, 2016. Littlefield will leave North Dakota State University after 38 years on the faculty.

Littlefield was offered the position after a national search by UCF to fill the Director position. Littlefield will oversee the launching a doctoral program in strategic communication, the move of the NSC to a downtown campus location, and the creation of a College of Communication Arts and

Sciences. The University of Central Florida is in Orlando as is one of the largest universities in the United States, with 63,000 students.

ID Robert and his wife Kathy will move to Orlando, but keep their home in Moorhead, MN. Likewise, they will retain their membership in the Fargo Lions Club and plan to regularly participate in Multiple District 5 events and meetings. Littlefield also will continue traveling and speaking at conventions, forums, and events as a Past International Director for LCI.

Based on the data from Ellis, it gave us a referral. I was truly hoping the machine had failed. Our 3-year-old daughter, Ashtyn, was up next. She passed with flying colors. Before long the light bulb went off. Maybe he wasn't just 'a boy who hated everything learning' he was a boy that couldn't see.

The following Monday I was able to get Ellis into our family eye doctor in

Jamestown. I was still hoping and praying the Lions Club test was wrong. It wasn't 10 minutes into our appointment and the doctor advised that Ellis does not have bad vision, one for the win in a family of horrible eve vision. However, he does have severe astigmatisms. He can't see up close, he can't see far away. Two weeks later we received his glasses. His first statements were, "Wow! The floor is huge," "My feet are so huge, mom" and "Mom, I can see your eyes!" The whole day was filled with firsts for an almost 5-year-old little boy. We went out to eat at the Pizza Ranch and for the first time ever he wanted to color. and colored inside the lines!

At no time, had we ever suspected his eyesight to be the root of our problems. He has only known the way

When you meet a blind person

Editor's note: This paper was handed to Lions Club 5NW District Governor Judy Beaudry, Washburn, when she was trained to walk with the tools of a blind person.

"I was blindfolded and guided to walk as a blind person," she said. "It was a lesson in humility.

"These tips for us who are sighted, will help when we are in the company of those who are blind. As Lions, Knights of the Blind, these are easy aids to use." It is being run as per her request. There are many ways you can help blind people live normal lives Here are a few hints.

If you walk with him

Let him take your arm. Don't push him! The motion of your body will him what to expect.

If you eat with him

Read the menu and prices to him. If he wants help, cut his meat, fix his coffee, etc. Tell him the positions of the various foods on his plate.

If he has a dog

Remember the dog is a working dog, not a pet. Don't divert his attention or touch him – his master's life depends on his alertness.

If he is alone

Always identify yourself when entering a room where a blind person is. Don't play any "guess who" games.

If you live or work with him

Never leave a door ajar. Keep corridors clear of clutter. Tell him if furniture is moved.

If you talk with him

_A blind person can hear as well as you, sometimes better. Always talk directly to him, not through his companion.

If you seat him

When showing a blind person to a chair, put his hand on the back. He will be able to seat himself easily.

If you direct him

I could have stopped coming altogether to Bethany, but I chose to stay, and here is why, Dr. Littlefield. Connecting with the residents via a beat-up ukulele and a four-song repertoire was something I never expected. I thought they'd poo-poo me once they heard me "sing" or be woefully unfamiliar with my choice of music, but that's how I prevailed.

Music is truly the universal

language, Dr. Littlefield. This I have learned. I really doubted that an 86-year-old woman would be tapping along to a Shania Twain ditty played on a ukulele and sung by a tone-deaf 20-year-old. Well, the joke was on me! Right there I directly applied the concepts of intercultural communication, and your course came to life for me.

Since passing COMM 216 last December, I have continued to volunteer at Bethany on University. Every Friday afternoon from 2:30 to 4 p.m., I am there, with my ukulele, guitar or mandolin. That's another thing, too — after gleaning more experience on the ukulele, I branched out to guitar and then to mandolin, all because of the volunteer exposure from COMM 216. I also learned more songs and threw myself into tablature, picking and plucking Irish jigs and old hymns.

So I thank you for throwing me into volunteerism, Dr. Littlefield. I thank you for requiring your COMM 216 students to help their fellow man. Who knows how many others have had the same experience I did, one that really opened my eyes of how important and delightful volunteerism is for those on both ends of it.
