

By the time this article reaches you, we will be in Japan and I will be serving at my final board meeting as an International Director. While I am excited to be nearing the end of my term, I honestly am sorry to see this experience come to an end. Fortunately, we will be able to continue serving at the international level through my appointment to the LCIF Board of Trustees. However, we are feeling a wide range of emotions about the wonderful experiences we have had over the past two vears: and one of those emotions is regret.

The events of the past two years have been humbling, exhilarating, and to be honest, sometimes overwhelming. We have met so many wonderful people who have welcomed us to their districts and shared their stories of service as Lions. One of the amazing consequences of writing a weekly (mostly) blog has been the familiarity our hosts have had with our journey as a director couple. We often receive comments, such as: "We read about..."

or "We saw that you were..." And, by being familiar with us, Lions have opened conversations as our newest friends and those friendships have followed us throughout our travels.

When we began the campaign, the littlefield4lionsid.com blog was written to "pull back the curtain" to show what being an international director was all about and to share the experiences we were having with our friends and supporters. A Problem at Service Dogs of America in Jud

Cement floors of the kennels and training room areas are hurting the dogs' feet and claws. It makes their training uncomfortable for them.

The concrete floor was poorly prepared originally then it was painted. That paint is now wearing off, exposing the cement underneath.

Vicky McMahon, of Service Dogs of America, says they have a solution to the problem but it will take over \$2,300 to provide a safe, non-skid surface for the dogs.

To raise funds for this project, The Rugby Lions club asks every North Dakota Lions Club to donate an item for the State Convention silent auction.

The ND State Lions Convention will be held, October 28-29, in Rugby. All money raised by the auction will be stipulated for this project.

Thundershield is the name of the coating. It is a high quality product that

is used in veterinarian hospitals, kennels and at the Leader Dog facilities.

Preparation costs for the 5,500 square foot area is estimated between \$200 and \$300. McMahon says that the cost of the Thundershield itself is \$80 a gallon; about \$2,000 total.

Labor costs will be extra. The more work that can be done by volunteers the lower the total cost of the project. McMahon thinks the Thundershield will be easy to apply.

The manufacturer

promises the product will fill in cracks, breaks, and holes in the underlying concrete. The surface will be both non-slip and stain resistant and it will be durable.

MD5 Lions Appointed to LCIF Board of Trustees

As incoming chairperson of the Lions Clubs International Foundation, International President Jitsuhiro Yamada has announced the appointments to the 2016-2017 LCIF Board of Trustees. The board is composed of 22 members, including the five executive officers of LCI, eight trustees from the seven constitutional areas and Africa, two trustees representing the largest two membership countries, three trustees from the largest per member giving

countries, two presidential appointees, and the two immediate past LCIF Chairpersons.

Of particular interest to Lions in Constitutional Areas I and II, is the notice that LCI Past International President Clement F. Kusiak, will represent Constitutional Area I, and International Director Dr. Robert S. Littlefield will serve as the representative from the United States, the largest LCI membership country. addition, Past International Director Garnet E. Davis was appointed to represent Constitutional Area II, to begin serving a one-year term.

As LCI nears its Centennial year and LCIF is approaches its 50th Anniversary, these appointments to the board will keep the Lions of Multiple District 5 well informed and an integral part of the planning and implementation of new strategies to build the future of the world's largest service organization-Lions Clubs International.

Well we are nearing the end of our Lions year. I have a couple of visits left, I hope my team has helped you as a club and as individual lions. We have told all of you if you need help, please just ask. I know the future governor teams will do the same, the important thing is asking. Even if you think it is nothing important, if it bothers you then ASK, I assure you we are just here to aid you as your year goes on.

I know I have been harping on you all year, but I want all of you to get the credit you deserve. With one month to go where we can still report, we have 18 diamond clubs, we have 8 with 3 challenges done I am going to name them and tell you which challenge you have left to become a diamond. The first 5 have (Environmental) to go Chaffee, Grand Forks, Horace, Larimore-Turtle River, and Napoleon. The next 2 need (Hunger) Enderlin, and Linton, and Jud needs (Vision). We have 6 with 2 challenges reported and 9 with 1 challenge reported. All of the clubs can still report what they have done throughout the year, or you can still get ahold of Kristi and she can aid you or put them in for you. Like I said way back in October at the state convention I think all of our clubs are Diamonds we just have to learn to report it. I am glad reporting is way up but we want you to keep reporting both membership (both all the people you add and the ones you lose). Remember if you get members in the next 2 years they are centennial

Lions plus their sponsors get a special pin, if you keep your new member the sponsor will get up to 4 pins each different. Your service activities and your donations, please enter each donation separately, vou can use either activities or donations towards the centennial challenges. The newest centennial addition is the Legacy Projects. There are 3 levels you can participate in Level 1 is recognition like a sign, a park bench of something that draws attention to your Lions club. Level 2 is a community gift, refurbish a park, or playground, or fund resources for the visually impaired. Level 3 is a big operation, build a clinic, expand a library, or equip a hospital.

I was asked by the Lions of Alberta, Canada for financial aid. The province has had over 800,000 acres burnt. The city of Ft. McMurray lost 2400 structures. Residents got to go back and see the damages early in June. Since the whole town had to be evacuated, all of their food, water, and cleaning supplies have to be thrown away. Any donations would be appreciated. Lions International is asking us to pass the money through LCIF. In the memo line put (Disaster relief/ Alberta fire), from this it will be put in your account towards a Melvin Jones Fellow or Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, Thank you Lion John Wiskus and the Lehr Lions, clubs and individuals in that area called me with an outstanding offer. I relayed the information to

the people of Alberta, if they need a few homes to use for a year or so while everything is being rebuilt, they would find places for them. The schools in the area were called to make sure their children could go to school there, they also found people who could council them if that was needed too. We will not know what is needed until later this summer. The Past International Directors thought that was a fantastic gift.

On May 25th the Governor teams and GMT/ GLT's met in Regina for a Summit, learning new methods to increase membership, finding and training new leaders. It appears this will happen again in Deadwood before the next MD 5 convention. Many people from North and South

Dakota as well as Saskatchewan were at the convention. We had several speakers from Canada, such as Dog Guides this is similar to Leader Dog but they train 6 types of dogs at their facility.

On Friday night there was a simulcast horse race to benefit DR. Patty Hill of Alberta in her attempt to get into the **International Presidents** line. International Director Karla Harris of Wisconsin was the keynote speaker. She included some things about ID Robert Littlefield since they have served on the board together. She also talked about all the good things we Lions of the world have been doing, one of them was kids sight (we call it sight 4 kidz), another was reading to the ones who



need it especially our youth. Along with planting trees, and aiding the hungry. At the end of the banquet came the awards. PCC Mike Brand received a Presidential certificate of appreciation for his 24 years of service to MD 5 given to him by CC Arlen Fetch. Lion Mike resigned his position of secretary/treasurer of the council of governors for the past 24 years. There were 5 Leadership Medals given, and 7 Presidents Medals awarded to our Multiple. I am only going to tell you about S-NE's. The Leadership medal was awarded to a person who aided the Cabinet by keeping me straight and correct with my paperwork, they also were responsible for a lot of 5-NE clubs getting their centennial challenges reported, but mostly because of her ability to teach others and perform as a screener for Sight 4 Kidz, screening over 1000 children this year alone. LION Kristi Swenson. The Presidents Medal went to an individual who all by themselves transformed how our district looks at the District Governors team and how it is now truly teamwork top to bottom. IPDG Dwaine Heinrich. At the end of the night we were also treated with MD 5 presenting Lion Mike Brand a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.


Saturday we look forward to the inspiring words of our then International President, Chancellor Bob Corlew.

What stories I have been able to share with my students regarding the places that we visited; and the cultural experiences that I have gained broadened my horizons and were integrated into my lessons in all of my subject areas.

When I consider what I have gained from being a "partner in service" for Robert during his two years as International Director, I know that I have brought both Shanley and the Lions of MD 5 with me wherever I went. I know that this responsibility made me want to be a better Lion, a better woman, a better person; because our association is a tremendous organization with a record of humanitarian service that is unparalleled in the world. The pride and excitement that I felt representing Lionism cannot be articulated except to say that I felt energized and proud of

what we all do.

However, with Robert's new position at the University of Central Florida, I resigned my position at Shanley after 32 years. It was surprising, emotionally challenging, and physically exhausting to say goodbye. I loved my job, I loved my students, and I loved my colleagues. Simply put, it was a great run, but a great new adventure awaits us in Florida.

As Helen Keller's Knights of the Blind, Lions worldwide recognize the importance of supporting those among us who are blind or vision-impaired. Another important role Lions play is educating the rest of the public about the lives of people who are blind or vision impaired. I am writing to ask for your help in supporting a project that does both at the same time.

In July of this year, at the museum at the Hjemkomst, the Historical and Cultural Society of Clay County will host a nationally touring exhibit of some renown. Child in a Strange Country: Helen Keller and the History of Educating People who Are Blind or Visually Impaired. The exhibit explores four primary subjects: Reading, Science, Math, and Geography. Using Helen Keller's educational journey as a lens, the exhibit uses tactile reproductions and authentic artifacts to uncover the roots of modern education for children with vision loss. We expect the exhibit to draw in students of all ages

from throughout the region, including ND School for the Blind students, during its four-month exhibition period July 1 through Nov. 1, 2016. Although we are committed to bringing this highly interactive educational experience to our community, we can use your help: the exhibit rental fee is \$7000. Several Lions members have encouraged us to reach out to Lions Clubs in our region to ask for club support to help cover these expenses.

We want you to know that we already discount the admission of the school children of Clay County when they come to the museum as a class to just \$2 per person. We also offer a special rate of \$4 per person to organized school groups from outside of Clay County as well. Even with paid admission, HCS does not expect to profit from this exhibit. It is not our purpose to profit; our purpose is to educate. Please consider a donation of any amount to help us defray the hard costs.

VOTING RESULTS AT THE MD -5 REGINA CONVENTION

The following Proposals were voted on at the Second Business Session at the MD5 Convention held in Regina, SK May 26 to 28, 2016. All were passed by majority vote of the Certified voting Delegates. A dues increase of \$ 2.00 US per member was passed and takes effect July 1, 2016. This increase is primarily the result of the declining membership in MD5 (on average 280 members per year). The per capita Dues become \$ 4.00 US billed semi-annually to the Districts, on July 1, 2016 and January 1, 2017 and based on membership numbers as of June 30th and December 31st respectively. Membership Dues are the only source of income for the Multiple District Council to support the Administrative functioning of the Council by Lions Clubs International.

CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS PROPOSALS

The following are the proposals put forward by the MD 5 Long Range Planning Committee for the consideration of the Council of Governors:

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS — **Multiple District Council Chairperson** — update the Duties of Officers to be current with the Lions Clubs International Constitution and Bylaws:

BYLAWS - page 19 Article 2 Section 1

DELETE all wording following Section 1 Multiple District Council Chairperson INSERT

The multiple district council chairpersons shall be the administrative facilitator of the multiple district. All actions are subject to the authority, direction and supervision of the multiple district council of governors.

In co-operation with the council of governors, the council chairperson shall: Further the Purposes of the association; Assist in communicating information regarding international and multiple district policies, programs and events; Document and make available the goals and long range plans for the multiple district as established by the council of governors; Convene meetings and facilitate discussion during council meetings; Facilitate the operations of the multiple district convention; Support efforts initiated by the International Board of Directors or the council of governors that are intended to create and foster harmony and unity among district governors; Submit reports and perform such duties as may be required by the multiple district constitution and bylaws; Perform such other administrative duties as may be assigned by the multiple district council of governors; and Facilitate, at the end of his/her term of office, the timely presentation of all multiple district accounts, funds, and records to his/her successor in office.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS – Multiple District Council Chairperson – add new Council chairperson removal policy to be current with Lions Clubs International Constitution and Bylaws:

BYLAWS – page 19

Section 2 REMOVAL At the request of the majority of the council of governors, a special meeting of the council may be called for the purpose of removal of the council chairperson. Regardless of the manner in which the council chairperson is selected or elected, the council chairperson may be removed from the council for cause by an affirmative vote of 2/3 of the entire number of the council of governors.
