Comeau newest honoree

On June 11, 2016, Lion Leon Comeau of the South Forks Lions Club was presented with the Robert John LePage Service Award.

Lion Leon received the award during the banquet of the annual state convention of the North Dakota Association of the Blind at the Home Place Lodge and Suites in Williston.

In his nomination letter, Club President Ross Jorgensen stated that Lion Leon "has been the driving force behind the tremendously successful Christmas in the Park since 2002 ... no one has given as much time, physical effort and personal resources to make this annually anticipated event as much fun and successful than Leon Comeau."

According to Jorgensen, Lion Comeau has also played a vital part in the establishment and on-going success of the St. Joseph's Social Care and Thrift Store in Grand Forks. He has donated countless hours and resources to keep the buildings in good repair.

Jorgensen further states,

"I'm thinking most of his fellow Lions are unaware of the major role Lion Leon has played in making our town a better community."

The Robert John LePage Service Award is presented annually to a North Dakota Lion who exemplifies the type of quiet, unheralded service that Bob LePage gave to people with vision loss in the state.

LePage, a long-time member of the Gateway Lions in Fargo, was known in the Fargo area for providing help and service to all who needed it, in particular those with sight loss. In his honor this award was established in 2009.

Lion Leon was presented with a plague which reads: "With thanks and appreciation for your 'vision' and dedication to people with sight loss in North Dakota," followed by the motto of the ND Association of the Blind: "Not they who lacks sight, but they who lacks vision, are blind."

Congratulations to Lion Leon J. Comeau for this very well-deserved award!

Lions run annual mini triathlon

On Saturday, July 23 the Bowman Lions ran their 2nd Annual Mini Triathlon. This years event came together rather quicker than previous events due to the timely availability of the Bowman Sweetwater Golf Course for our running part of the race.

As has happened in so many places in Western North Dakota, the dramatic slow down in oil field activities led to the cancellation of the Annual Oil Field Golf Tournament, and the third weekend in July was open for an early morning event.

Lion Don Groll is the manager of the golf course and was instrumental in our making this change. Previously we had held walkathons on the first weekend in August allowing the High School athletes to compete without penalty, but that weekend got preempted by another group sponsoring a color walk to raise money for their church youth group two years ago.

The Bowman Lions have held several annual events like this going back to the first Journey for Sight events in the late 1980's. After discussing this with club members as well as previous event participants, we decided to try a completely new (for us!) event last year, and the first Mini Triathlon was born.

This year's event consisted of a 5km (3.1mile) run at the golf course, following the same path as the Bowman Cross Country meets, followed by a 3.6 mile bike ride along the shoulder of US Highway 85 north to the Rouzie Recreation Center pool where the contestants swam 10 lengths for a total of 250 yards. We followed the same pathway last year, so there was only some painting of the golf course and the shoulder of the road.

We were greatly assisted by Bowman Cross Country Coach Jon Jahner who designed and laid out the running course and provided the stop watches so necessary for timing. Those familiar with larger triathlons might cringe as we started running, then biked and finished with a swim- the order is NOT what the Ironman Olympic events do.

Obviously, we had no open water on which to swim any distance here in Bowman, and the proximity to town facilitates both locating the event as well as running it made all the difference.

Our biking distance was determined by the distance from the pool from the golf course ... not a percentage of the Ironman competitions. Finishing at the pool left a very public ending to the event, but much more importantly, an easily supervised (and rescued if needed) place for our athletes to finish in relative safety. Our local police department was most helpful in doing traffic control where our contestants joined U.S. 85 and then further along crossed U.S. 85 to go to the Rec Center.

The spirit of competition was alive and well. We had a total of 16 Individuals from three states and five teams of three participants each.

While there were certainly some VERY serious athletes participating, there were also some more laid back individuals who also enjoyed the morning.

This year, we also had one of the contestants stop and help another whose chain had come off! Talk about Good Samaritan service! This was the largest event we have had in over 15 years and the two large factors in it were the availability of the golf course which our athletes enjoy

running on, and the time of the summer.

No matter which weekend one picks, there will be schedule conflicts, so we will have to try to work even closer with Lion Don to get our 3rd annual event on the calendar for 2017. Another large change this year was the almost exclusive use of Facebook to promote it. We anticipate that the word will spread faster next year if we can co-ordinate it sooner.

The Bowman Lions also do the White Cane Day and a Night at the Races to fund our Diabetes and Sight programs. We sponsor the Glucose Kits for the Community Health Screening on the first Thursday of December and these events help us pay for those kits.

Each year we screen between 80 and 100 people for Cholesterol, Glucose levels as well as Prostate health and a take home colon screening kit.

Just one more of many ways, we as local Lions make a difference for those around us by doing what we can to uphold the challenge made to us in Cleveland in 1925 by Helen Keller to become "Knights for the Blind". See you next summer for the 3rd Annual Bowman Lions Mini Triathlon.

2016-17 5NW Peace Poster Contest

Lions, as we celebrate 100 years of Lions Service, it is most appropriate for the theme for this year. Peace Poster contest to be Celebration of Peace.

The Peace Poster kits were distributed at the Spring Rally in New Salem. If someone from your club was not able to attend, they were mailed to your Lions club secretary. We have so many talented children in our communities.

It is so exciting and inspirational to see the vision children have of peace and how they put their visions into their drawings. Students ages 11, 12, and 13 (with birthdays that fall on/before Nov. 15) are eligible to participate in the Peace Poster Contest. Be sure to review all poster rules that are included in the packet each Lions Club received, especially the size

requirements.

I would like to encourage the clubs to buy the poster board and cut it to the proper size because if a poster submitted is even 1/8-inch too small or too large, it will not qualify.

The Enderlin Lions' slogan, "We Serve", underwent a severe stress test the last week of June. Enderlin's 125th Anniversary of the City's founding was slated for June 24th-26th and many high school class reunions were also scheduled for this same weekend. Hundreds of people were coming to town and the 34 member Lions Club (plus two Associate members) was a solid resource for some of the events.

Wednesday, June 23rd saw a dozen Lions set up the Club's 40'x100' pole circus tent. Despite a stiff opposing 25mph wind, despite a very tough and thick asphalt street where many of the stakes were to go, experience triumphed under the direction of Lion tentmasters Maynard and Dean Torbenson.

Never was the stake drivin' electric jackhammer more appreciated and never were so many skilled hands so welcomed in addressing the wind.

Thursday, June 24th witnessed a more sober group of 9 Lions who attended the funeral of Enderlin Lion Leo Schall. Lion Leo had been a continuous member since the Club's 1976 charter and was one of three remaining. Several benches of vested Lions were at the front of the church and Lion Leo's years of Lionism and service are well appreciated and remembered.

By 6am Saturday, June 25th, Enderlin Lions were coming to the community's Senior Citizen Center to host a pancake benefit breakfast.

According to Club Treasurer Harold Narum, "We served between three and four hundred people and grossed some \$1,500. This was part of a good week for the Club." The monies will go to the family of a young Enderlin man who had been killed in a workplace accident during the prior week.

This same morning also proved once again how important it is to have friends, as the neighboring Sheldon Lions Club came to town to clean-up Enderlin's streets and alleys following a night of parties and street dances. At least 15 Sheldon Lions picked up cans, bottles and other trash and this necessary work was scantily rewarded with a free Enderlin Lion pancake breakfast, and now a BIG THANK YOU!!!

Hardly had the tables been cleared at the pancake breakfast when the Club was organizing the 125th Celebration's Parade. Once again Senior Lion Maynard Torbenson used his experience from dozens of prior parades to successfully launch one of Enderlin's finest. Estimates say over 200 units wound down the Airport/Bus Barn hill staging area and hundreds of spectators filled their bags and buckets with free goodies.

One of the floats was the Enderlin Lions' and had been painted up, jazzed up and all around improved by Float Czar Lion Grant Patterson. "Skittles" candy was handed out by his helpers Lions Jerry Hanson and Mark Bartle as well as reminders for the club's next event.

What followed was

a first for the Club, an experiment in running a Community Hospitality room highlighting the Club's 40 Years of Service and community involvement.

At 1 p.m. this event started in the side room of downtown's TraXside Cafe and the idea was to expose the public to past Club service work through pictures and discussion. Also free ice cream cones were given to all and blue/ gold Lions helium balloons were given to kids as well.

Lion Terry Taylor did a worthy job of staging the room and several hundred visitors were planned for.

By the 5pm closing, 520 cones had been served and the 125 helium balloons had gone in the first hour.

The Club also added a new affiliate member - Dan Lund of Alice, N.D. and a new active member, Elizabeth Sorensen of St. Paul, MN. Ms Sorensen had also served as hostess for the Hospitality Room and her youth and enthusiasm was apparent.

By Monday, June 27th, the Club had taken down the 40'x100' tent and staged all of the next rentals of the season.

At 3pm Tuesday, June 25th, Lions and friends boarded the local school's coach bus for a road trip and headed east down Highway 46. 35 miles later the group pulled into Dakota Fiber Mill, near the I-29 Interchange. This unique business processes and weaves animal hair and wool into useful fabric. An added plus is many of the animals who provide the resource are raised on the farm. The group met Abe, a bactrian

camel and saw yaks, Jacob sheep and Alpacas.

From there it was a twenty minute drive to Fort Abercrombie, a State Historical Society site on the Red River. The Club was split into two groups and was walked around by two Fort Rangers. The tour ended at the site's interpretative center where original Fort artifacts are on display.

On the way back west the bus stopped at McLeod, North Dakota's Silver Prairie Saloon where supper was ordered. Following the meal all arrived home before the sun was down.

On the following day, several Enderlin Lions helped a Community elder clean out their apartment. Furniture was lugged the old-fashion way ... lift and carry. Lion Mark Bartle, one of the Club's youngest members at age 59, was a key player in this chore and it was just another one of his monthly acts of kindness.

Throughout the week of the Celebration, the Club sold raffle tickets as a fundraiser for future projects. 1,000 tickets at \$20 each have been printed and three Enderlin 125th Commemorative Henry Rifles are the prizes. The drawing will take place at the end of this year. Lions Jim Ekeren and Christy Christiansen were amongst the dedicated who sold tickets during this busy time.

All in all, it had been a busy week, a good week and it proved the Enderlin Lion Club takes its slogan "We Serve" at full value!

Major decisions, such as bylaw changes or amendments, generally recommended by the Board of Directors, are decided by the state-wide membership during a session at the State Convention.

There are two directors elected each year by each District. Directors may serve no more than two consecutive three-year terms. Candidates seeking election are encouraged to convey their interest to their District Governor or the District Nominating Committee.

Lions Foundation of North Dakota announces proposed bylaws changes

The Lions Foundation of North Dakota Board of Directors does hereby propose and recommend the following changes to the corporate Bylaws:

Eliminate current district governors and second vice district governors from the Board of Directors.

Change to read..." any two of the following Treasurer, President, Vice President or Secretary of the Board of Directors of the Corporation".

The above proposed changes were approved and recommended by the board of directors at the quarterly meeting in July, to be decided by the North Dakota Lions at the Annual Meeting during the state convention in Rugby in October, 2016.

The Bylaws state that amendments will take effect at the close of the annual meeting at which they were ratified unless otherwise specified in the amendment.

Lions Foundation of N.D. awards grants

At the quarterly board of directors meeting in Mandan July 9, the Lions Foundation of North Dakota approved and awarded grants to assist two North Dakota Lions clubs with projects they are conducting in their communities.

The Linton Lions Club's grant was to assist with repairs the club is making to their Linton Lions Club Demolition Derby Arena.

The Williston Korner and Williston Lions clubs were awarded a grant to build, together with the Williston Rotary Club, a pavilion in a park.

Each of the two grants were awarded in the amount of \$1,000.

Grants are limited to not more than 50 percent of the total cost of the project. The amounts awarded in this round, were further limited by the current amount of funds available.

The original intent of the Lions Foundation of North Dakota anticipated donations from Lions clubs, individuals and others, along with investment earnings, to provide grant funds. Investment earnings for the past several years have been very modest,

limiting the amount of funds available.

Recent donations, although also modest, have been the primary source of revenue to continue providing grants. Those donations are much appreciated, not only by the Foundation, but even more so, the clubs

conducting projects that qualify for grants. Since the Foundation's first grant provided in 2010, thirty-two projects conducted by North Dakota Lions clubs, have been assisted with more than \$52,000 in grants.
