It is August already and Back-to-School is just around the corner. Where has the summer gone? With Back to School approaching fast it also means that most Lions Clubs are getting geared up for the year ahead. Is your club ready?

Have you up-dated your membership and listed your officers in MyLCI? How about your summer activities?

As I begin to write this month's article I notice that there are several clubs that have not listed officers for the year. It is the club secretaries' responsibility to be certain this task gets completed, either by going into MyLCI or by sending the information to Jan Coca of the Rugby Lions.

Jan is our District Administrator and can enter the information for your club but it is so much easier if you are able to do it at the club level. If you do not know how to enter it online, ask another member of your club that is familiar with the task.

If there is no one able to teach you, please contact Jan or me and we can help you get started. If you still need to mail it to Jan be sure to use their new address. Luis and Jan have moved and their new address is PO Box 251 Butte, ND 58723.

There will also be training at the Spring Rally next April 7th in Valley City. Please plan to send your new officers for 2018-19 to this training.

At our district cabinet meeting on Aug. 12 in Jamestown, we will be discussing an increase in dues for members. Our Multiple District 5 voted last year to increase dues by \$2 for MD5 to bring it up to \$10 and District 5NE is looking at an increase of \$1 per member, plus the fee for the newsletter went up \$1 two years ago but it has never been passed along to the individual clubs and members. This would mean an increase of \$4 in dues for the district this year. LCI dues have not changed.


PDG Herman touched the lives of all those around him, especially his fellow Lions.

This program covers the period from 1 Jul 2017 through 30 Jun 2018. The program will be renewed each year, with possible modifications.

Any ND Lions Club in good standing with Lions Clubs International may submit a grant application during this period using forms provided by LFND. Grant applications will be considered at each quarterly meeting of the LFND until the \$20,000 identified by the LFND for this program year are committed on a first-come, first served basis.

Grants will be a 50% reimbursement match, up to \$250 (\$500 actual expense of applicant), on monies spent on visionrelated activities/equipment/procedures during FY 2017-2018. Applicant must provide proof of expenditure with the application. This proof may be copy of cancelled check, paid invoice, or receipt.

In order to be considered, a Grant application must be received by the Executive Director of the Lions Foundation of North Dakota not less than 30 days prior to a Foundation Board of Directors meeting. The meetings are held quarterly beginning in July; at the State Lions Convention; in January; and, in April. Applicants should contact the LFND Executive Director or any Board member for exact meeting dates in order to comply with the 30 day requirement. The proposed schedule for 2017-2018 is: November 3; January 13; April 28; and, July 14.

Examples of vision-related activities/equipment/procedures include, but are not limited to:

Local vision screenings, eye exams, medications, eyeglasses, and treatments of eye disease Diabetes screenings

Exams, medications, equipment, and treatment of diabetic eye diseases, i.e. diabetic retinopathy, diabetic macular edema (DME), cataract, and glaucoma Eyeglass collection, recycling supplies, and shipping costs spent in ND

# LFND changes to SOP – ByLaws 2017

The Board of Directors of the Lions Foundation of North Dakota is proposing the following changes to the Standard Operating Procedure and the By Laws of the Foundation. This official notice is required in order for these changes to come before the electorate at the annual meeting to be held during 2017 State Convention.

#### STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURES Page 1, Fiduciary Responsibility

Financial accounts shall be established as determined necessary by the Board or Executive Committee. The Treasurer may sign checks or other documents withdrawing funds from an account, as specified in the Bylaws. In the absence or incapacity of the Treasurer, the President, Vice-President or Secretary may be given this responsibility. Checks made out to one of the officers, must be signed by two officers (President, Vice President, Treasurer or Secretary) not to include the officer as the payee for the check. The Board may specify that two officers must sign checks or other financial documents in specific circumstances.

#### **Explanation:**

The Treasurer may (replaces "Two of the officers (President, Vice President, Treasurer or Secretary must).

In the absence or incapacity of the Treasurer, the President, Vice-President or Secretary may be given this responsibility. (This is added).

The word "Generally" is removed.

Two officers (replaces "two other officers") - (eliminate "other"), not to include the officer as the payee for the check. (These words are added).

The Board may specify that two officers must sign checks or other financial documents in specific circumstances. (This is added).

#### BYLAWS Page 3, Article VI Section 2. Checks, Drafts, or Orders.

All checks, drafts, or orders for payment of money, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the corporation, shall be signed by the treasurer of that account/project or a designee approved by the Board. The Board may specify that signatures of two officers of the Board or officers of a specific project/program, (which may include the President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, or Program Chairperson), be required in specific circumstances. This replaces "…co-signed by any two of the following: the treasurer, the president, the vice president, or the secretary of the board of directors of the corporation."

#### **Explanation:**

These provisions allow the Foundation Board to have signature requirements for the accounts/projects under their umbrella to include but not limited to the Video Magnifier, Sight 4 Kidz, and Eyeglasses Recycling accounts/projects.

# The Future of Peace

## 2017-18 Peace Poster Contest

"The Future of Peace" is the theme of the 2017-18 Peace Poster Contest. This is the 30th anniversary of the Peace Poster Contest. Lions clubs can sponsor the program in their community for children in local schools or organized, sponsored youth groups. Students, ages 11, 12 or 13 on November 15, are eligible to participate. Through the contest, students are encouraged to visually depict their interpretation of the contest's theme.

Lions clubs (except 5NW; District Clubs have been ordered) may purchase a contest kit through the Club Supplies Sales Department. A kit must be purchased for each contest sponsored. The contest must be sponsored by a Lions club.

Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches (33 centimeters by 50 centimeters) and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches (50 centimeters by 60 centimeters). Do not mat or frame artwork. Only one entry per student, and each entry must be the work of only one student. All artwork must be the individual student's original creation. Duplications are not accepted.

All media are accepted. Note: Chalk, charcoal and pastel entries should be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries.

Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled or attached to the artwork in any way. The use of lettering or numbering on the front of the poster, in any language, is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster. Artwork should be done on a flexible material, so it can be rolled for shipping in a mailing tube. Do not fold poster.

Participants accept all responsibility for late, lost, misdirected or illegible entries. Lions Clubs International is not responsible for entries damaged, destroyed or lost during the judging process. Entries cannot be acknowledged or returned; they become property of Lions Clubs International upon receipt. Peace Poster Contest images cannot be used without written permission from Lions Clubs International.

In consideration for the opportunity to enter the Peace Poster Contest, participants agree to allow Lions Clubs International to use their names and photographs for promotional and publicity purposes. In addition, the international grand prize winner, two family members (one being a parent or legal guardian) and the sponsoring club president or a club member (as designated by the sponsoring club president) are required to attend the special award ceremony. An international grand-prize winner is not eligible to receive subsequent prizes in future Peace Poster contests sponsored by Lions Clubs International. By entering, participants agree to be bound by these rules and the decisions of the judges and Lions Clubs International.

# **Judging**

Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme. Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners.

## **Awards**

One international grand prize winner will receive a trip to a special award ceremony. There the winning artist will be presented with an engraved plaque and a cash prize of US \$5,000.

Each of the 23 merit award winners will receive a cash award of US \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

## **Deadlines**

Please note that the following dates are from those in the Peace Poster information from Lions Clubs International. MD 5 Council may set a different date other than Dec 1-depending on when Council of Governors meeting is scheduled. Entries not meeting deadlines will be disqualified.


