Littlefield gets 'Hall' nod

Past International Director, Lions Clubs International Trustee, Lions Clubs International Foundation Board of Directors

Past International Director, Lions Clubs International Trustee, and Lions Clubs International Foundation Board of Directors' Robert Littlefield will be the newest member of the North Dakota Lions' Hall of Fame.

He will be honored at a ceremony at the State Lions Convention in November.

Robert S. Littlefield was born in Moorhead, MN in 1952. He graduated from Fargo North High School in 1970; received his teaching degree in English, Speech, and Theatre from Minnesota State University Moorhead in 1974.

That fall began his teaching career at Barnesville (MN) Public Schools. He joined the North Dakota State University faculty in 1979; and in 1983, completed his doctorate at the University of MN. Over his 38 years at NDSU, he served in several administrative and leadership roles, including department chair and interim dean of Humanities and Social Sciences.

He currently is a professor and director of the Nicholson School of Communication at the University of Central Florida.

In 1984, PDG Frederick G. Walsh introduced Littlefield to Lionism. He served two terms as president of the Fargo Lions (1990-91; 2005-06). Robert's feelings for his club and for those with whom he has served run deep. His enthusiasm and positive outlook have helped to motivate his fellow Lions to exceed their club goals, whether through fundraising or service projects.

He has held many offices within the association, including district campus club chairperson, district governor, region chairperson, council chairperson, LCIF district coordinator, multiple district convention chairperson, and is a certified guiding Lion.

In addition, he is a Past President of the North Dakota Past District Governors' Association. He was elected to serve a two-year term as a director of Lions Clubs International at the association's 97th International Convention held in Toronto, Canada, in July 2014.

Presently, he is serving a three-year term as a Trustee on the Lions Clubs International Foundation Board of Directors.

In recognition of his service to the association, he has received numerous awards, including the District Governor Excellence Award, International Leadership Award, the

Membership Advancement Key Award, and four International President's Awards, to name a few. He is a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

Lion Robert and his wife, Lion Kathy have been married for 43 years and have two grown children: a married daughter, Lindsay (Thomas Allen), who is an independent consultant currently working for the Stephen Group; and a son, Brady, who is a vice president with Rubenstein Communication, Inc. in New York City. Peace Poster Contest

Lions clubs throughout District 5NE invite young artists to share their ideas about peace through the Lions Clubs International Peace Poster Contest.

This year's theme is The Future of Peace.

The contest is open to young people ages 11 to 13 as of Nov. 15, 2017. Kits can be purchased from now until Oct. 1.

Lions clubs will provide kits for schools, scouts, youth groups and individuals who may be home schooled.

Club members working with the project need to be clear with teachers or other guides that this is an international contest. Lions and the Peace Poster Contest do not promote religion or politics. We do not want to see someone's work disqualified.

Young artists are encouraged to use bright faces, colors, animals and symbols in the posters. Please do not use letters or numbers. The size of each poster should be 20 inches by 24 inches.

Participants use a variety of mediums, including charcoal, crayon, pencil and paint. The work created could express the young artists' life experience and culture. Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme. Bright colors are strongly encouraged.

Posters are judged at the club level, district level and beyond. Club-winning posters will be judged at the district level during the state convention, Nov. 3 and 4 in Bismarck.

The international winner will receive \$5,000 and is invited to go to the United Nations on Lions Day at the U.N. There are also 23 international merit awards.

The clubs sponsoring need to purchase a Peace Poster kit for each group they sponsor. Complete information can be found in the January editions of both The Lion and The North Dakota Lion. Information can also be found on the Lions Clubs International website at www.lionsclubs. org.




IRS. It is possible that your club is on the list but has been reinstated since organizations stay on the list for a few years after reinstatement.

Tricia Nechodom of Minot will tell us more about how to get involved in this project. Another way for clubs to serve!

Club hosts annual

The Bowman Lions held their third annual Mini Tri-athalon "Splash and Dash" event on Saturday Aug. 5.

Under partly cloudy skies, it began with a 5Km run on the Bowman Sweetwater Golf Course, continuing with a 3.8mile bike ride to the finish at the Bowman Rouzie Rec Center Pool where contestants swam 250 meters.

To many of us, these are just numbers, but when you consider that MOST athletes do only ONE of these in a competitive fashion on any given day, the significance of their effort becomes clearer! Our champions this year included Jonathan Burkhalter of Reva, S.D. who lead everyone in, followed by Danielle Hiatt of Bowman and Washington who lead the women in and finished second overall with Dan Peterson finishing a close third and handily beating the football kids he challenged.

As in past years, we also made this available for those who wanted to compete as a team with each leg being completed by a team member. Our first place team was Alex Bartholomay, Blaine Jeffers, and Tanner Fischer, followed by Tristan Peterson and Andrew Miller in second with the team of Heather, Naressa and Ray Ann Hiatt finishing third.

This event is somewhat of a hybrid, as the famed Ironman events in Olympic Competition consist of an open water swim of 24 miles, a Marathon of 26.2 miles, and a final bike race of 112 miles. Given the constraints of a municipal pool and the need to get running early if we wanted to use the golf course, we began with a run, then a bike to the Rec Center and finished with a swim.

For those who are not strong swimmers, this event becomes a real challenge, but we are also gifted with life guards from the Rec as well as plenty of Lion help to make the final pool swim both practical and relatively safe.

We ARE looking at beginning next year's event in heats for the individual competitors to more closely mirror the Olympic events, but will most likely then have to abandon the run on the golf course due to a later running of that leg of the event. Obviously some compromise will be necessary, as the run then will most likely be done at least partially on hard surface.

This year we timed our individual competitors through

the end of the bike leg, and then added the swim leg which was done separately, time wise. This was not a perfect world solution, but did allow all contestants to take a dip in the pool prior to their swim, with the idea of minimizing the "shock" to their bodies!

The Mini Tri-athalon is an outgrowth of a Lions International program to raise awareness of Diabetes, which is the leading cause of blindness in the Western Hemisphere. It began as a 5 Km walk which we quickly expanded into a "fun run" in addition to a walk.

In 2015 we further expanded it to add the other two events. In the early years of the program, we also had the Bowman County Health Nurses out at the Golf Course to monitor the blood sugar of the participants before and after.

Most participants were intrigued to find that their blood sugar levels dropped after the event. Given the time constraints as well as the finale being in a separate location, this has not been attempted for the past three years; however, we are certainly open to attempt it again should we change the format of the



event.

A great big Lion Thank you needs to be extended to the Dakota Community Bank, Dakota West Credit Union, Dakota Western Bank, Southwest Healthcare, and Wells Fargo Bank, whose donations greatly helped offset the expenses of this event.

We certainly could not have done without the help of Josh and Melissa Lindstrom who made the Sweetwater Golf Course available to us for our run and Chanelle Walby who helped us with the Rouzie Rec pool and her life guard staff.

Bronson's Market Place supplied a good portion of our after event light breakfast, and finally, a big Thanks to the Bowman Sheriff's and Police Department who facilitated our use of the public way for our bike leg. A good time was had by all, and we look forward to seeing you next year!

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The Future of Peace 2017-18 Peace Poster Contest

"The Future of Peace" is the theme of the 2017-18 Peace Poster Contest. This is the 30th anniversary of the Peace Poster Contest. Lions clubs can sponsor the program in their community for children in local schools or organized, sponsored youth groups. Students, ages 11, 12 or 13 on November 15, are eligible to participate. Through the contest, students are encouraged to visually depict their interpretation of the contest's theme.

Lions clubs (except 5NW; District Clubs have been ordered) may purchase a contest kit through the Club Supplies Sales Department. A kit must be purchased for each contest sponsored. The contest must be sponsored by a Lions club.

Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches (33 centimeters by 50 centimeters) and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches (50 centimeters by 60 centimeters). Do not mat or frame artwork. Only one entry per student, and each entry must be the work of only one student. All artwork must be the individual student's original creation. Duplications are not accepted.

All media are accepted. Note: Chalk, charcoal and pastel entries should be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries.

Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled or attached to the artwork in any way. The use of lettering or numbering on the front of the poster, in any language, is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster. Artwork should be done on a flexible material, so it can be rolled for shipping in a mailing tube. Do not fold poster.

Participants accept all responsibility for late, lost, misdirected or illegible entries. Lions Clubs International is not responsible for entries damaged, destroyed or lost during the judging process. Entries cannot be acknowledged or returned; they become property of Lions Clubs International upon receipt. Peace Poster Contest images cannot be used without written permission from Lions Clubs International.

In consideration for the opportunity to enter the Peace Poster Contest, participants agree to allow Lions Clubs International to use their names and photographs for promotional and publicity purposes. In addition, the international grand prize winner, two family members (one being a parent or legal guardian) and the sponsoring club president or a club member (as designated by the sponsoring club president) are required to attend the special award ceremony. An international grand-prize winner is not eligible to receive subsequent prizes in future Peace Poster contests sponsored by Lions Clubs International. By entering, participants agree to be bound by these rules and the decisions of the judges and Lions Clubs International.

Judging

Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme. Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners.

Awards

One international grand prize winner will receive a trip to a special award ceremony. There the winning artist will be presented with an engraved plaque and a cash prize of US \$5,000.

Each of the 23 merit award winners will receive a cash award of US \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

Deadlines

Please note that the following dates are from those in the Peace Poster information from Lions Clubs International. MD5 Council may set a different date other than Dec. 1depending on when Council of Governors meeting is scheduled. Entries not meeting deadlines will be disqualified.



October 1, 2017 Deadline to purchase kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.

November 15, 2017

Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the district governor.

December 1, 2017

Deadline for a governor to bring one winning district poster to the multiple district council of governors meeting and give to the MD5 LOFY Chairperson.

December 15, 2017


