Featured Speaker At State Convention PIP William L. Biggs

We are honored to have Past International President William Biggs of Omaha as our featured speaker at the North Dakota state Lions convention which will be held on November 3-4 at the Ramkota Hotel in Bismarck. He will be hosting a question and answer session after lunch on Saturday, and he will also be addressing us at the evening banquet.

William L. "Bill" Biggs of Omaha, Nebraska, USA, was elected president of Lions Clubs International at the association's 73rd International Convention, held in St. Louis, Missouri, USA, July 11 through 14, 1990.

Past President Biggs is an attorney in private practice with the firm of Gross & Welch in Omaha, Nebraska.

A member of the Omaha Westside and North Fresno Lions Clubs, and a Lion since 1962, Past President Biggs was a member of the South Forks Lions Club in Grand Forks in the mid 60's, served as an international director in 1983 to 1985, and as an appointee to the International Board from 1985 to 1989. He has also been a district governor, council chairperson, vice chairperson and chairperson of the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum. He served twice as chairperson of the District Governors-elect Seminar. He has served as

multiple district membership chairperson and regional coordinator for membership. He is currently serving as chairman of the board of directors of World Services for the Blind for a two-year term.

Past President Biggs has received numerous awards in recognition of his service to the association, including an Extension Award, 20 International President's Awards and the Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor the association bestows upon its members. He is a 10 diamond **Progressive Melvin Jones** Fellow, a Life Member and a Kev Member.

Past President Biggs is active in professional organizations including numerous community groups. He currently serves as general counsel for the Nebraska Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America; Past President of Hope Medical Outreach Coalition, which provides free medical services to over 15,000 people annually, serving the underinsured and uninsured in the Omaha metropolitan area; and a former member of the board of directors of Together, Inc., which provides food and clothing to those in need in the Omaha community. Past President Biggs was also chair of the board of directors of Wright &

Wilhelmy, a hardware wholesale distributor, headquartered in Omaha, Nebraska. He has served his community as a member of the board of directors of the Omaha Symphony and the Omaha Community Playhouse.

Past President Biggs and his wife, Past International Director Dana Biggs, a Melvin Jones Fellow, have five children, eight grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

THIS IS YOUR OFFICIAL NOTICE OF THE 2017 DISTRICT CONVENTIONS TO BE HELD IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE ND STATE LIONS CONVENTION November 3rd & 4th, 2017 IN BISMARCK, NORTH DAKOTA. THIS PAGE CONTAINS IMPORTANT INFORMATION THAT REQUIRES THE IMMEDIATE ATTENTION OF CLUB OFFICERS.

ND STATE LIONS/ND DISTRICTS CONVENTION RULES 2017

- 1. The official convention program shall be the order of business.
- 2. Roberts Rules of Order shall govern all parliamentary procedures. Host District Governor shall appoint a convention parliamentarian and a convention secretary.
- 3. **PRESIDING OFFICER** The host District Governor (5NW, DG Gary Morel) shall be the designated officer to preside at the state meeting.
- 4. QUORUM A majority of the registered certified delegates in attendance at the convention session shall constitute a quorum.
- 5. Lions in good standing must be registered and certified in order to vote on all convention matters. Clubs with a past due balances over 90 days exceeding \$20/member or \$1,000, whichever is less to Lions International or their District will be considered not in good standing.
- 6. The use of profane language at any business session, social function, or banquet is prohibited.
- 7. Credentials to vote at the District/ND State Convention shall be mailed to the respective District Cabinet Secretary for 5NE (Lion Kristi L Swenson 414 1st Ave N New Rockford, ND 58356) and 5NW (Lion Lois Reierson 1321 25th St W Williston, ND 58801) or delivered upon arrival at the convention by 9:00 am CST on Saturday, November 4th, 2017 at the convention registration desk at the Ramkota Hotel 800 S 3rd St Bismarck, ND 58504.
- 8. CLUB DELEGATE FORMULA Article IX.3. Each chartered club in good standing in Lions Clubs International and its district (single or sub and multiple) shall be entitled in each annual convention of its district to one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate for each ten (10) members, who have been enrolled for at least one year and a day in the club or major fraction thereof, of said club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month last preceding that month during which the convention is held. The major fraction referred to in this section shall be five (5) ormore members. Each certified delegate present in person shall be entitle to cast one (1) vote only for each office to be filled by, and one (1) vote only on each question submitted to the respective convention.
- 9. Solicitation or sale of club project items, with the exception of the host district is prohibited.
- 10. Ramkota Hotel is a smoke free facility.

VOTING AT THE DISTRICT CONVENTIONS HELD DURING THE ND STATELIONS CONVENTION

11. All voting at official meetings of the district and state shall be done by certified delegates present. A delegate must be present at the time of voting to have his/her vote counted in official results. If he/she cannot be present, his/her alternate shall take his/her place. For a club to be in good standing, all debts over 90 days past due exceeding \$20/member or over \$1000, whichever is less, to Lions Clubs International or their District, must be paid. The Credentials Committee must certify voting delegates. Clubs should identify their voting delegates and alternates and list them below. The ice breaker at the Heritage Center will be a good time. The quest speaker for the banquet will be PIP Bill Biggs. There is still plenty of time left to register for the convention.

Here are some reminders. Make sure the Peace Posters get to Lion Karen Koller by October 24th. Please bring your voting delegation forms to the convention. We have 2 Lions that made their intentions known to the nominating committee and did the proper steps to run for 2nd VDG.

I visited the Bismarck Prairie Rose Lions. This group of Lions represent what Lions Clubs International means and wants when they refer to women in Lions. They are 36 members strong and all are active.

I know that I asked for your help before with donations to Lions Clubs International Foundation. Just this year natural disasters struck around the world. In South Asia, parts of India, Nepal and Bangladesh are experiencing devastating monsoon rains. In the past 3 months LCIF has approved 20 emergency grants to South Asia, totaling \$125,000. In July, flooding in Japan took lives and destroyed homes. LCIF awarded a \$100,000 Major Catastrophe Grant to help the community recover. In August, the USA had hurricanes Harvey and Irma. Then Mexico was hit by its strongest earthquake in 100 years and followed by another earthquake. LLCIF awarded two more grants of \$100,000 to help with Irma and the earthquakes. More recently, LCIF granted \$100,000 to support Puerto **Rico following Hurricane** Maria. Lions do help people around the world. We might not see the results but we are doing what our motto says, "WE SERVE". I would like to personally thank all the Lions and Lions Clubs that have donated to LCIF. October 12th is

World Sight Day which focuses global attention on blindness and vision impairment. Lions have been leaders in supporting this cause since 1925. Lions launched World Sight Day in 1988 and Sight First in 1990. Currently 253 million individuals are blind or visually impaired.

The Sight 4 Kidz program in North Dakota is going strong. In the SW part of the state we screened 2694 children between September 18th and October 3rd which includes 14 schools and 2 daycares and we have 5 more schools to screen. I know the rest of the screeners in North Dakota are this busy also. This great program is possible due to the Lions Foundation of North Dakota.

Lions clubs, please submit your service activities with a written story to the North Dakota Lion so we can see what each club is doing to serve their community. The September ND Lion was filled with activities: annual triathlon, blood drives, donating school supplies,

celebrating Lions centennial birthday, hosting feeds, breakfast, scavenger hunts, donating money to help build a home for families, patients and health care providers, and members receiving a Lifetime membership to LFND. Let's fill the ND Lion with all the good we Lions do. I know for myself, the last thing I think of is to grab a camera or cellphone to take pictures of the activities we are doing. We need to brag about ourselves as Lions and show what we do.

What Should I Bring to the Convention?

By the end of October, all of you will be packing your bags to attend the state Lions convention in Bismarck at the Ramkota, November 3 and 4. But what do you need to bring? Let's make a list!

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Lions Foundation of North Dakota Board of Directors meetings

The Board of Directors of the Lions Foundation of North Dakota meets quarterly in January, April, July and in conjunction with the annual State Convention. Any Lions club member in good standing is welcome to attend any of the Board meetings as a guest. Board members will be seated at the business table while guests will be seated around the perimeter of the room. Guests who wish to address the Board are to be recognized by the Chair.

Routine business of the Lions Foundation of North Dakota is conducted at the quarterly meetings by the Board of Directors, who are elected by the District they represent. Only the elected Board members and the two 1st Vice District Governors on the Board are allowed to vote at the meetings. Membership in the Lions Foundation of North Dakota includes all Lion members in good standing in the Lions clubs of North Dakota. Major decisions such as constitutional or by-laws changes are voted upon by the state-wide membership during a session at the State Convention.

There are two directors elected each year by each District at the annual Convention. Directors may serve no more than two consecutive three-year terms. Although elected in the fall, the term of office does not begin until the following July 1st and ends June 30th three years later. Candidates seeking election are encouraged to convey their interest to their District Governor or the District Nominating Committee.

The proposals will be read aloud at the Convention meeting; motions will be made; discussions may follow; and, a final vote will determine the outcome. We ask for your support.



The Future of Peace 2017-18 Peace Poster Contest

"The Future of Peace" is the theme of the 2017-18 Peace Poster Contest. This is the 30th anniversary of the Peace Poster Contest. Lions clubs can sponsor the program in their community for children in local schools or organized, sponsored youth groups. Students, ages 11, 12 or 13 on November 15, are eligible to participate. Through the contest, students are encouraged to visually depict their interpretation of the contest's theme.

Lions clubs (except 5NW; District Clubs have been ordered) may purchase a contest kit through the Club Supplies Sales Department. A kit must be purchased for each contest sponsored. The contest must be sponsored by a Lions club.

Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches (33 centimeters by 50 centimeters) and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches (50 centimeters by 60 centimeters). Do not mat or frame artwork. Only one entry per student, and each entry must be the work of only one student. All artwork must be the individual student's original creation. Duplications are not accepted.

All media are accepted. Note: Chalk, charcoal and pastel entries should be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries.

Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled or attached to the artwork in any way. The use of lettering or numbering on the front of the poster, in any language, is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster. Artwork should be done on a flexible material, so it can be rolled for shipping in a mailing tube. Do not fold poster.

Participants accept all responsibility for late, lost, misdirected or illegible entries. Lions Clubs International is not responsible for entries damaged, destroyed or lost during the judging process. Entries cannot be acknowledged or returned; they become property of Lions Clubs International upon receipt. Peace Poster Contest images cannot be used without written permission from Lions Clubs International.

In consideration for the opportunity to enter the Peace Poster Contest, participants agree to allow Lions Clubs International to use their names and photographs for promotional and publicity purposes. In addition, the international grand prize winner, two family members (one being a parent or legal guardian) and the sponsoring club president or a club member (as designated by the sponsoring club president) are required to attend the special award ceremony. An international grand-prize winner is not eligible to receive subsequent prizes in future Peace Poster contests sponsored by Lions Clubs International. By entering, participants agree to be bound by these rules and the decisions of the judges and Lions Clubs International.

Judging

Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme. Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners.

Awards

One international grand prize winner will receive a trip to a special award ceremony. There the winning artist will be presented with an engraved plaque and a cash prize of US \$5,000.

Each of the 23 merit award winners will receive a cash award of US \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

Deadlines

Please note that the following dates are from those in the Peace Poster information from Lions Clubs International. MD5 Council may set a different date other than Dec. 1depending on when Council of Governors meeting is scheduled. Entries not meeting deadlines will be disqualified.


