A quick reminder of future events includes the MD5 Convention May 17-19 in Bismarck, Lions International convention in Las Vegas June 29 – July 3, USA-CANADA Forum in Columbus Ohio Sept. 20 – 22, and the ND State Lions convention in Grand Forks Oct 19-20. Be sure to attend as many as you can.

I am looking forward to the second half of my year as District Governor. I have met so many dedicated Lion members and clubs that do so much for the community and world. Keep up the great work you have been doing and let's look forward to an even better second century of service.

Hazen Lions Club do vision screening as part of the Sight 4 Kidz Lions International Program. Hazen Lions work

with local public health nurses in Beulah, Center-Stanton, Halliday, Hazen and Twin Buttes schools. Screenings were also done at West River Head Start Hazen, New Salem Head Start, Capital Energy Childcare Cooperative, Hazen Preschool, Hazen Special Ed Preschool and Beulah Special Ed Preschool.

A total of 355 children were screened using the Plus Optix Screener. This is a mobile screening device (much like a camera) that can measure many eyehealth issues. The camera takes a "picture" of the child's eyes and prints out a report. If problems are detected, referral to an eye doctor is suggested to parents.

Hazen Lions is committed to vision and to children in our community. We invite parents to bring any children between the ages of six months to 12 years of age who have not been screened to English Lutheran Church on Thursday, Nov. 30, between 3 to 6 p.m. The screenings that day coincide with the Hazen Walk Around. This free screening is made possible through a grant from the Lions Club International Foundation and local Lions clubs. Members of Delta Kappa Gamma, a local women's educators organization, also assist with this project. For more information contact Maxine Beckwith at 701-880-1169 or Esther Eustice at 748-6330.

PARTICIPANT QUALIFICATIONS

1. Candidates for this institute must be from Constitutional Area I & II - United States of America, Its Affiliates, Bermuda & The Bahamas & Canada. This institute will be conducted in English. Candidates must be capable of understanding and participating in the language of instruction at this institute.
2. **Candidates must be Lions in good standing who have successfully served on a club committee and who have not yet attained the level of club president.** Current charter club presidents are also eligible for this institute.
3. Candidates must be willing to commit to all days of the institute, including group mealtimes, understand personal time is extremely limited. **Attendance at all classroom sessions and scheduled meals is mandatory.**

COST OF THE INSTITUTE

Lions Clubs International will provide meals and lodging according to the schedule of the institute. Please note that according to board policy, a non-refundable participation fee of **US\$125.00** will be required to offset a portion of these costs for all institutes. This fee will be due no less than six weeks prior to the institute start date. **Please do not send fees until you receive a letter of acceptance to the institute.** Participants are also responsible for their own transportation and related travel expenses to and from the institute site.

SELECTION PROCESS

Because of the high number of applications received by the association, acceptance into the institute is not guaranteed. In the selection process the Leadership Development Division strives to achieve maximum geographical representation of districts throughout the constitutional area. **All candidates will be notified of selection status no more than two weeks after the application deadline via the email address provided on the application form.**

The Leadership Development Division of Lions Clubs International reserves the right to cancel any institute or language-specific classroom due to insufficient applications submitted by the stated application submission deadline date.

The division maintains the quality of all aspects of the institute, including program, faculty and the selection process of participants. The division works in concert with the International President and the Leadership Development Committee of the International Board of Directors.

3. Share their institute experiences with members of their club and encourage other qualified Lions to apply to the institutes.

I. International Newsletter (Bulletin) Contest Awards: First place certificate Four honorable mention certificates

1. The contest is open to all Lions clubs and districts. (Not multiple districts.) The above listed awards will be presented in each category.

2. Lions clubs must submit two copies of the same issue of its best club bulletin.

3. Districts must submit two copies of the same issue of its single best bulletin. Districts producing newsletters for more than one purpose or project must select only one for submission. (Only the first eligible district bulletin contest entry received by the Public Relations and Communications Division at International Headquarters will be considered by the judges.)

4. Newsletters must be mailed to the Public Relations and Communications Division at International Headquarters to arrive by May 1 of the year in which they'll be judged at the Lions International Convention. Official entry form must accompany entry. For clubs and districts wishing to submit a digital newsletter or bulletin for consideration, submission shall be made via email to PR@lionsclubs.org. All other deadlines and criteria apply. Effective June 29, 2017
