There are numerous programs that Lions International supports, and there are many opportunities for the local Lions clubs to roll up their sleeves and dig in to help others that are less fortunate. But, did you ever wonder how Lions International supports all these programs financially? When we join a local Lions club, the club explains the dues structure and all the benefits that go along with membership. Our organization is deeply committed to sight related projects, disaster relief, humanitarian service, and the youth. I feel that many believe that their dues are used to support all these worthwhile projects, when in fact, your dues support the administration of the **International Association** of Lions Clubs.

How does Lions
International pay for all
of our programs? They
are supported financially
by contributions given by
Lions clubs, corporations,
and individuals like
you and me. These
contributions are collected
and deposited into different
funds all controlled by a

foundation, or Lions Clubs International Foundation. Foundations have a 501(c)3 tax status as a charitable organization which enables them to accept your donation as a non-profit, tax exempt organization, while giving the donor a tax advantage depending on how you file with the Internal Revenue Service. All contributions received by LCIF are designated or undesignated funds depending on the wishes of the donor.

Lions Clubs International Foundation is like other foundations you have dealt with. Whether you are dealing with a hospital, elder care facility, universities, or writing grants to a corporation, they all have a treasury that accepts contributions and holds them in restricted or unrestricted fund accounts until they are disbursed in capital expenditures or in grants. LCIF is the treasury arm of Lions International, and disburses financial support through various grants. All this information is available on the LCIF website. For several years, LCIF distributed approximately 30 million dollars in grant support. Today, with all of the requests for grant monies, LCIF will need to have approximately fifty million dollars available to disburse

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for grant support. Currently, grant support is exceeding donations coming in to LCIF by a four to five million dollar deficit.

Instrumental programs have been put in place to counter the deficit problem. An LCIF Development Plan was initiated and its objective was to increase annual donations to US \$30 million by 2011-12 (from current average of US \$20 million per year). The idea was to increase contributions to LCIF by 50%, so we had some work to do. We had to strengthen the Foundation by adding resources and experience to our existing success. Through vigorous communication to the Lions clubs, LCIF challenged the clubs to increase their contributions. Lions clubs and individual members were encouraged to become a donor of \$1,000 towards a Melvin Jones Fellowship. This is an excellent tool for bringing in donations to LCIF. Currently, 5NW has 531 Melvin Jones Fellows and 59 Progressive Melvin Jones Fellows, 5NE has 417 Melvin Jones Fellows and 28 Progressive Melvin Jones Fellows.

Lions clubs have been asked to consider increasing contributions to LCIF. Some clubs have donations to LCIF built into their club budget, which makes it easier to commit funds and track their spending through a budget. Some Lions clubs like to write a check for \$1,000 as a onetime donation to LCIF for

the Lions fiscal year. Other clubs will write several checks throughout the fiscal year by supporting a Melvin Jones Fellowship, give a money gift to LCIF in the name of a visiting dignitary at your club, support the Measles Initiative, or help with disaster relief. These are all excellent ways to contribute to LCIF. Individuals have always had the opportunity to donate to LCIF, but did you know that only 6% of the individual Lions in our organization gave any financial support? Now, through new resources and communications. we have increased contributions by individuals through the Contributing Member (CM) Pin Program where members can contribute \$100 for a Gold Pin, \$50 for a Silver Pin, and \$20 for a Bronze Pin. to be worn proudly as a lapel pin. District governors and other dignitaries have handed out CM sheets at local Lions meetings for members to sign up for the level they choose. If all the members in a Lions club would give \$20 (Bronze level), they would earn the distinction of a 100% Contributing Member Club. Committing to support LCIF financially is the first step, writing a check to Lions Clubs **International Foundation** is the next step. Please consider strengthening your Foundation by writing that

Sister Thomas is an active participant on boards and in community organizations including service as a director of CHI St. Alexius Health and a past board member of MDU Resources Group, Inc. She also serves on the board of trustees of Missouri Slope Areawide United Way.

Active in professional organizations and religious affiliations, Sister Thomas received the Greater North Dakotan Award from the Greater North Dakota Association in October 2002, was honored with the Theodore Roosevelt Rough Rider Award by Governor Hoeven in May, 2004. She was inducted into the Scandinavian-American Hall of Fame in 2007, and received the Missouri Slope Areawide United Way's 2007 Bismarck-Mandan Lifetime of Caring Award.

District Governor Keith Zeutschel of 5NE was elected to be the new Multiple District Council Chair for 2018-19 at the Council of Governors meeting on March 24. Council Chair Elect Keith is from Horace, North Dakota.



At our recent Council of Governors meeting in Minot, a proposal was introduced by PID Robert Littlefield to update the Multiple District 5 Constitution and by-laws. The majority of the changes are just wording changes that have been approved by LCI but have never been changed in the MD5 documents. Other changes are the removal of items that pertain to the District level of Lions instead of the Multiple District level. A complete listing of the changes proposed can be found on the MD5 website at e-district.org/sites/md5 or e-district.org/sites/5ne. I have also emailed the changes to every Lions Member in District 5NE that has a current active email address. Please check with other members of your club who might have the email so that you can read it before the Multiple District 5 Convention in Bismarck. The proposed changes will be voted on by the registered members attending. If you cannot find a member that has access to the internet or to the referenced email, please contact me and I can send you a copy.

A \$2.00 MD5 dues increase scheduled for July 1. 2018 was rescinded at this time. Dues will remain at the 2017-2018 level. Your MD5 council continues to look at other ways to save expenses in order that a dues increase will not be needed.

Another thing happening at the MD5 convention

will be the Treasure Chest raffle to raise funds for various activities within your district. This year the funds raised will be split between the districts and the District Governor Team will decide where the money can be donated. It could be donated to Vision Screening, LCIF, Service Dogs or Leader Dogs or any of the other worthwhile projects sponsored by Lions in your district. If you would like to donate items for the raffle bring them to the convention or contact someone who is going to attend. Tickets can be purchased through your club or right at the convention. Tickets are \$1.00 each or 6 for \$5.00. What a great way to support the many projects of Lions International or the local projects right here in our district.

The deadline for the District Speak-off contest is May. If you have an entry, please submit it to your DG team for judging. Also, Peace Poster kits are available from Lion Carla Lein. It is never too early to start your contest. Deadline for entries is early October before the State Convention in Grand

The Spring Rally and Officer Training was held recently in Valley City. If you were not able to attend or you still have questions about your duties as an officer in your club, you can find training lessons on the Lions International website at lionsclubs.org. You do not need a password to access these training items. LCI is committed to saving time and money by offering online lessons.

All clubs should have held their elections already for officers in 2018-2019 and need to get them reported to LCI. This is also a great time to go through your club roster and be certain that all club member's information is correct and that there is contact information for each member. During my recent email blast about the proposed constitution changes, I received many notices that email addresses were incorrect. In researching these, I found that some emails are entered wrong in MyLCI, such as Yahoo spelled as Hahoo, mail instead of Gmail, and others.

A reminder of a few opportunities for service that are scheduled this year include: The Spring Cleanup day at Service Dogs for America in Jud on May 5th.

The MD5 convention will be on May 17 - 19in Bismarck. There is

still time to get your registration submitted or you can register right at the convention.

The International Lions convention in Las Vegas is June 29th – July 3rd.

Camp Kinship Youth Exchange Camp will be held in Sioux Falls, SD July 15th -21st. Look for additional info in your copy of the North Dakota Lion newspaper.

If your club has an event scheduled, be sure to contact your District Governor team so that they can help spread the word.

Another opportunity for service is to become a member of your District Leaders Team. 1st Vice District Governor Rob will become your District Governor at the **International Convention in** Las Vegas. The Chaffee Lions

He talked about delivering a check to a local man who was experiencing hardships because of frequent travel to Fargo for treatment. The Lions Club was able to help out.

"I went over and delivered the money and there were tears," Levos recalled. "He and his wife were so grateful. It wasn't a lot of money, really, when compared to their expenses, but it was nice to know that someone cared."

The Chaffee Lions

Club has also financially supported the Anne Carlson School, Service Dogs of America and assisted local students in funding educational trips.

"We do so much more than just collect eyeglasses," club member Chuck Albright said. "And now this year, we want to hold this event in a beautiful spot."

St. Peter's Lutheran Church, nestled in a picturesque setting along the shores of the Maple River, donated the use of their fellowship hall to honor its pastor and fellow club member, the late John Flaa who passed away in early December.

Albright, who was recently named a Melvin Jones Fellow after the founder of Lions Club International, said gift cards for goods and services would be part of the auction and raffle.

"We have everything from oil changes, pizzas to restaurant meals. We also have some power tools going up for auction."

The 32 member club has given out over \$7,000 in financial gifts in 2017 and Levos hopes to increase this in 2018. "That's what we're here for. We're Lions. We help."

MD 5 Lions Speak Off Contest Rules 2018



- 1. Students in grades 9-12 may participate in the speak-off contest including home school students.
- 2. Speeches shall be 4-6 minutes in length.
- 3. Topics will be limited to the following areas: Hunger, Environment, Vision, Youth or Public Service. Speeches must be original, not copied from some other source.
- 4. Notes may be used for the speech contest, but speakers will not be allowed to read from a manuscript.
- 5. Speakers should prepare speeches prior to the contest. The speeches may be memorized if the speaker wishes to do so.
- 6. Appropriate clothing should be worn for the contest.
- 7. District winners will provide a live recording speech for the Multiple District contest.
- 8. Each District Governor will be responsible for coordinating their District speak-off contest within their district. The Governor will also be responsible for obtaining a recording of the winning speech to be forwarded to Lion Gale Hyde for the MD 5 Speak-off Contest.

Other information:

Local lions club or Zones can sponsor a contest. Several clubs can get together and sponsor a contest. Let your schools know about the contest. For further information for judging ballot, please contact PDG Tim Thueson at thueson@bis.midco.net.

The winner of the local contest will then advance to the District competition. In the event that no local club or Zone contest is held; the District Governor can hold a district wide contest. Please check with your District Governor for dates of the District competition.

Winners from the District contest will send a video presentation of the winning speech to: Lion Gale Hyde at hydesoffargo@gmail.com before May 1, 2018. She will inform PDG Tim Thueson who the winners are from the MD 5 competition before May 14.

Lions Breakfast Supports Sight Related Causes

Supporting a good cause at the Area Lions Pancake Breakfast was at the First Lutheran Church in Williston

Williston Lions Club, the Korner Lions Club, and surrounding Lions clubs from Wildrose, Watford City, Sidney, Plentywood, Arnegard and Alexander put on the feed or lend their financial support for the event.

Money raised will support major projects associated with diabetes and sight issues which are two of the Lions Club International's missions.

A function supported from the breakfast is the diabetes blood sugar screening, now held in conjunction with the Williston Sport and Recreation Show, held in March. The Lions screen up to 300 people at the show, and normally find an average of six to 10 people who need to be referred to a doctor for further testing. Diabetes contributes to more than 5 million deaths a year, making it the eighth leading cause of death in the world and the numbers

are rising. Lions and Leos are confronting this global health emergency by raising awareness of diabetes through Strides events, expanding access to care through screening and treatment programs, and improving quality of life through diabetes camps and community recreational programs. Lions Clubs International believes they can help prevent and control this global epidemic by uniting Lions and Leos around this cause.

The group also purchases low vision readers which are machines for people with vision challenges. They enlarge the text and allow the person to read their newspaper or mail.

The committee purchases these at often \$2.500 and loans them to senior citizens and other clients experiencing the effect of macular degeneration or other sight defects. The committee will purchase the equipment, and loan it to a person until it is no longer used. Up to 28 of these models have been provided to those experiencing some sight loss in the past years.

The Future of Peace

2017-18 Peace Poster Contest

"Kindness Matters" is the theme of the 2018-19 LCI Peace Poster Contest. This is the 31st anniversary of the Peace Poster Contest. Lions clubs can sponsor the program in their community for children in local schools or organized, sponsored youth groups. Students, ages 11, 12 or 13 as of November 15, are eligible to participate. Through the contest, students are encouraged to visually depict their interpretation of the contest's theme.

Lions clubs may purchase a contest kit through the Club Supplies Sales Department. A kit must be purchased for each contest sponsored. The contest must be sponsored by a Lions

Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches (33 centimeters by 50 centimeters) and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches (50 centimeters by 60 centimeters). Do not mat or frame artwork. Only one entry per student and each entry must be the work of only one student. All artwork must be the individual student's original creation. Duplications are not

All media are accepted. Note: Chalk, charcoal and pastel entries should be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries.

Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled or attached to the artwork in any way. The use of lettering or numbering on the front of the poster, in any language, is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster. Artwork should be done on a flexible material, so it can be rolled for shipping in a mailing tube. Do not fold poster.

Participants accept all responsibility for late, lost, misdirected or illegible entries. Lions Clubs International is not responsible for entries damaged, destroyed or lost during the judging process. Entries cannot be acknowledged or returned; they become property of Lions Clubs International upon receipt. Peace Poster Contest images cannot be used without written permission from Lions Clubs International.

In consideration for the opportunity to enter the Peace Poster Contest, participants agree to allow Lions Clubs International to use their names and photographs for promotional and publicity purposes. In addition, the international grand prize winner, two family members (one being a parent or legal guardian) and the sponsoring club president or a club member (as designated by the sponsoring club president) are required to attend the special award ceremony at Lions' Day with the United Nations. An international grand-prize winner is not eligible to receive subsequent prizes in future Peace Poster contests sponsored by Lions Clubs International. By entering, participants agree to be bound by these rules and the decisions of the judges and Lions Clubs International. Lions Clubs International may cancel the contest without notice at any time. The contest is void where prohibited, taxed, or restricted by law.

Judging
Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme.

Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners.

Awards

One international grand prize winner will receive a trip to a special award ceremony. There the winning artist will be presented with an engraved plaque and a cash prize of US \$5,000.

Each of the 23 merit award winners will receive a cash award of US \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

Deadlines

Please note that the following dates are from those in the Peace Poster information from Lions Clubs International. MD 5 Council of Governors may set a different date other than Dec 1- depending on when their meeting is scheduled. Entries not meeting deadlines will be disqualified.

October 1, 2018	Deadline to purchase kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.
November 15, 2018	Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the district governor.
December 1, 2018	Deadline for district governor to bring one winning district poster to the multiple district council of governors meeting and give to the MD 5 LOFY Chairperson.
December 15, 2018	Postmark deadline for the MD 5 LOFY Chairperson to send one winning entry to the Public Relations Department at International Headquarters.
