As we prepared and celebrated the tremendous success of our first century of service, Lions Clubs International recognized the opportunities to do much more. One hundred years ago, it began with Melvin Jones. He had a vision, and Lions are still working together toward that vision today. Lions Clubs International Foundation is 50 years old, and just finished celebrating our 50th birthday at the International Lions Convention in Las Vegas just a few weeks ago.

Our focus will be on vision, youth, disaster relief and humanitarian causes. Our other focus will be on fighting Diabetes. We will play a major role in responding to the diabetes global epidemic. We will also work toward a world where no one goes hungry, strengthen our medical services to combat Childhood Cancer, and will work to protect the environmental health of our communities.

will learn more about what the foundation does and the work it supports and be invited to translate that awareness into a gift. Every Lion's contribution will make service possible in each of our cause areas.

One of the resources we will be using to work on Campaign 100, is the LCIF Club Coordinator. As your LCIF District Coordinator, you will be trained and become familiar with your role as Club Coordinator and what this new campaign entails and the positive impact it will have locally and globally.

What we have accomplished in the last 50 years is more than

amazing. We have prevented avoidable blindness through the Campaign Sightfirst programs. These programs provided over 9 million cataract surgeries, and 270 million river blindness treatments.

The Measles Initiative has reached the goal of raising 30 million dollars, and that amount was matched by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. This combined partnership will help to save the lives of 60 million children. We are a part of that because of LCIF.

In Disaster Relief, LCIF has provided more than 118 million dollars in grants for the United States alone. The state of North Dakota

has received more dollars in grants from LCIF than what we have donated to LCIF. Campaign Sightfirst II had a goal of raising \$150 million. We exceeded that goal and raised \$200 million.

During the next 3 years, you will become familiar on LCIF's Campaign 100 and what it means to you and your Lions Club. Because of LCIF, Lions have the resources we need to take on the issues we care about. Because we understand that service is both giving and doing, our impact will last for the next 100 years and beyond. Together we will make our community and our world a better place to live.

Peace Poster Contest under way "Kindness Matters"

"Kindness Matters" is the theme for this year's Lions Peace Poster Contest, for youths ages 11 through 13 (by Nov. 15).

Bright colors, faces, symbols, flags and animals are great things to put on the Peace Posters. More ideas can be found under the Peace Poster Contest on lionsclubs.org.

Poster sizes are to be 20 x 24 inches. There should be no numbers or letters on the front of the posters. Designs regarding religion or politics are not allowed.

A variety of mediums are used to design the posters. You can find these in the school guidelines of the kit that you will order by Oct. 1. Encourage kids to be as creative as possible and, by all means, have fun!

Judging of the posters is based on originality, artistic measure and expression of the "Kindness Matters" theme.

Each club will judge the posters and pick out one winner per school. The winning poster per school will move on to the District 5NE judging, which

will take place at the state convention Oct. 19-20 in Grand Forks. (Since there are two districts in North Dakota, there will be two district winners – one from 5NE and one from 5NW.) The district winner moves on to MD5 judging, and the winning MD5 poster goes to international judging.

The person who creates the winning international poster will receive \$5,000 and a trip for four to the United Nations. There are also 23 \$500 winners at the international level.

Posters from within District 5NE can be taken to the state convention. If they can't be brought to the state convention, they can be mailed to Carla Lein, District 5NE Peace Poster Contest Chair, 5050 40th Avenue South, Apt. 237, Fargo, ND 58104. Please mail by Oct. 16.

Lions clubs will be responsible for ordering kits. There is one kit per school or youth group. You can sponsor more than one school if need be.

To order a kit, call Club Supplies Sales at the Lions

Clubs International office, at (630) 571-5466 or 1-800-710-7822. To order online, go to Club Supplies (Item Search: Peace Poster Kit) under lionsclubs.org. The cost of the kit is \$11.95 plus shipping, handling and applicable taxes. Please use a credit card.

The kit includes rules and regulations for the club, rules and regulations for the school, fliers about Lions and the Peace Poster Contest for students to take home, an Achievement Award certificate to be given to the club-level winner, and a winning sticker that needs to be filled out and put on the lower-right corner of the winning poster.

There is an essay contest for those who are blind. If there is a youth in your area who is blind and wants to take part in this, please encourage that youth to write an essay on "Kindness Matters" with 500 words or less. The essay should be mailed to Carla Lein or brought to the state convention.

This year's theme is 'Kindness Matters'. What a great theme!, We are teaching children not to bully in school and to be kind to everyone.

School is starting soon, so this is a good time for clubs to be contacting your schools. The children need time to create the posters and get them to your club to be judged.

I would like to receive your clubs winning poster the week of October 8th. The Peace Posters will be judged at the North Dakota State Lions Convention in Grand Forks on October 19th and 20th. You may also bring your winning Peace Poster to me on Friday at the State Lions Convention.

I would encourage the Lions Clubs to buy the poster board and cut it to the proper size. The poster's smallest size: 13 inches X 20 inches, and the largest size 20 inches X 24 inches. If the poster is even 1/16 of an inch too small or too large, it will be disqualified. Posters can be any size in between these two sizes.

It is amazing how the children translate their vision of peace on to the posters without using letters or numbers. We have some very creative students in our communities.



DISTRICT GOVERNOR & VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR ELECTIONS

If you are a candidate for the position of Second Vice District Governor, First Vice District Governor, or District Governor, these are things you must do prior to the State Convention:

You must be an active member in good standing of a chartered Lions club in good standing in the district.

You must have served as Club President, and as a member of the board of directors of a Lions club for no less than two additional years.

You must have served as Zone Chair, or as Cabinet Secretary or Treasurer.

Submit a Letter of Intent, and a Letter of Endorsement from

your Lions Club, to the District Nominating Committee at least 30 days before the convention.

At your District Meeting during the State Convention, following the report by the District Nominating Committee:

You are allowed a Nomination Speech by a fellow Lion, no more than five minutes in length.

You are allowed a Seconding Speech by a fellow Lion, no more than three minutes in length.

Nominations from the floor are not accepted, unless there is no other candidate who has fulfilled those requirements.

CANDIDATES FOR BOARD OF DIRECTORS LIONS FOUNDATION OF NORTH DAKOTA DAKOTA LIONS SIGHT AND HEALTH

Although there are no requirements listed in the District Standard Operating Procedures, you must be a Lion in Good Standing to hold one of those positions.

It is recommended that Lions considering one of those positions contact the District Nominating Committee prior to the State Convention, stating their intent, so the Nominating

Committee can verify qualifications and recommend the candidate for election.

In order for these Lions organizations to operate effectively and efficiently, it is important that candidates be dedicated and committed to fulfill the requirements of their respective positions. It's not about the title, it's about the job. Please consider carefully what you are agreeing to.

Lions Foundation of North Dakota (LFND) Vision-related Grant Program for FY 2018-2019

Funds for this grant program are made possible by transfer of assets from previously existing ND Lions Eye Bank in accordance with the Fund Agreement signed by the two organizations.

This program covers the period from 1 Jul 2018 through 30 Jun 2019. The program will be renewed each year, with possible modifications.

Any ND Lions Club in good standing with Lions Clubs International may submit a grant application during this period using form provided by LFND. Grant applications will be considered on a first-come, first

served basis at each quarterly meeting of the LFND until the \$20,000 earmarked for this program year are committed.

Grants will be a 50% reimbursement match, up to \$500 (\$1,000 actual expense of applicant), on monies spent on vision-related activities/equipment/procedures during FY 2018-2019. Applicant must provide proof of expenditure with the application. This proof may be copy of cancelled check, paid invoice, or receipt.

In order to be considered, a Grant application must be received by the Executive Director of the North Dakota Lions

Foundation not less than 30 days prior to a Foundation Board of Directors meeting. The meetings are held quarterly beginning in July; at the State Lions Convention; in January; and, in April. Applicants should contact the LFND Executive Director or any Board member for exact meeting dates in order to comply with the 30 day requirement. The proposed LFND meeting schedule for 2018-2019 is: October 19; January 12; April 27; and, July 13.

Examples of vision-related activities/equipment/procedures include, but are not limited to:

Local vision screenings, eye exams, medications, eyeglasses, and treatments of eye disease

Diabetes screenings
Exams, medications, equipment, and treatment of diabetic eye diseases-- diabetic retinopathy, diabetic macular edema (DME), cataract, and glaucoma
Eyeglass collection, recycling supplies, and shipping costs spent in ND
