Lions from District 5NW gathered in Beulah, ND at the Beulah Middle School to learn and grow. 120 Lions were preregistered with 100 attending the day of learning and sharing, including DGE Kathy Clemens and 1st VDGE Grant Kahlbaugh from District 5NE, DGE Linda Vollmer and PDG Neil Vollmer from District 5SW and lastly DGE John Emmet from District 5SE.

The 18th Annual District 5NW Spring Rally brought together Lions with the motto, "Lions on Fire to Inspire!" and all the presenters reflected that ideal in their presentations. There were the typical presentations such as President, Secretary, and Treasurer training as well as topics such as Membership through Service, Women and Families in Lions, My Lion App, 5NW Lions Alert Plan, Youth in Lions and of course, Lions Orientation.

One of the unique presentations was titled "GLT-GMT- GST, What are All These Acronyms?" presented by DG Ginney Jones, PDG Mark Koller, and PCC Arlen Fetch. They had a humorous presentation that also described the purpose of the GLT- GMT- GST positions in the District.

The Keynote Speaker, PID Cindy Gregg, inspired us with a message from Lions International to move forward by bringing youth and women into our clubs. She commended us for being the top District in MD5 with 36% of our membership as women and urged us to continue growing new membership. She challenged us to gain new members through unique ways, such as Branch Clubs. She also was the presenter of "Women and Families in Lions".

Cindy's husband gave an interesting presentation about gaining "New Members Through Service". He said that the youth of today want to do service....they aren't interested in meetings. The highlight of the day was the Baked Goods Auction for LCIF Pediatric Cancer Research which earned \$1,240. Because over \$1000 was earned, District 5NW could name a Lion with a Melvin Jones Fellowship. Every lion attending the Spring Rally had their name placed in a bucket and Lion Carolyn Lean from the Bismarck Prairie Rose Lions Club was the recipient.

The District 5NW Membership Challenge, in which the club gaining the most members from November, 2018 to April 5th, 2019 would earn 3 registrations to the ND Lions State Convention in Dickinson, ND. First place went to Wilton Lions Club with 8 new members and 2nd place to Dickinson Noon Club with 4 new members. Second place will receive 2 registrations to the ND State Convention.

PID Cindy Gregg presented Presidential Certificates to Lion Brach Seibel and Lion Amy Prince from the Beulah Lions Club and the current 4A Zone Chair, Doug Rothe.

Finally DG Ginney Jones was presented a Melvin Jones Fellowship, earned through donations from various Lions Clubs of District 5NW, by PDG Mark Koller.

In Remembrance

Lions of North Dakota have lost a fellow Lion, Past District Governor, and one of the first recipients of the North Dakota Lions Hall of Fame. He was an inspiration to all Lions and truly upheld the Lions motto "We Serve" by his unending dedication and service to the Lions organization.

PDG Hadley Seeklander passed away December 13, 2018 in Bismarck. Hadley married Verda Ohlhauser on March 31, 1950. To this union they were blessed with four children: Barry, Jerry, Scott and Linda. They lived in Hazelton, ND where Hadley was a farmer, a salesman, a Lions Club International Staff Representative and an active member of the community. Hadley always had a smile on his face and when asked how he was, he would reply "Great and getting better."

Hadley became a Lions club member May 1, 1962 when he and the Hazelton superintendent of schools chartered a Lions club in Hazelton, North Dakota. He was the second president of the Hazelton Lions Club and held the offices of vice-president, secretary, and director. He later became zone chairman, deputy district governor and then District Governor. He later transferred his membership to the North Star Lions Club and was an active member until his passing.

When Hadley was zone chairman, he organized a new club in District 5 NW. As District Governor (1969-71), he organized four more clubs. In 1972, Hadley was hired by Lions Clubs International as an International Staff Representative for Multiple District 5. As a staff representative, he was to increase membership through the extension of new clubs. In 1972, MD 5 had 7500 members and 10 years later the MD 5 had grown to 15,000 members all due to Hadley's hard work. Later, Nebraska,

Montana, Alberta, the Northwest Territories and part of British Columbia were added to his service area. As an International Staff Representative for Lions Clubs International, Hadley helped organize more than 300 clubs.


He was recognized for his accomplishments by being awarded the prestigious Presidential Award from five International Presidents. In 1979-80, Hadley was presented the Outstanding Extension and Membership Achievement Award from International President Lloyd Morgan of New Zealand. He received numerous awards from Lions Club International including eight special Extension Awards and seven International medals

He sponsored more than 47 Lions members and was given the Senior Master Key Award. He was a Melvin Jones Fellow and a progressive Melvin Jones Fellow. He was the first Lion to be named to the North Dakota Lions Hall of Fame in 1982. In 2012, he was awarded his 50 year pin in Lionism. In 2018, the North Star Lions awarded Hadley a lifetime membership for his service to his own Lions Club, the Lions of North Dakota and the Lions of MD 5.

In 1976, Hadley was named to Who's Who in North Dakota for his outstanding achievements in business, government, and community affairs.

All of our Zone chairs have met their 2- year obligations and hopefully, we have some new faces that are stepping up to fill these roles. Zone Chair positions are so important in our district and help provide the connectivity



between our clubs and our district leadership. Thanks to Lion Karen Koller who stepped in to fill the void in Zone 3-A and finish out the year!

Remember, we have many Lions in our district who you can reach out to for questions or advice on various service projects. Consider trying a new service project this year. Trying new things is exciting and your community will benefit from it as well.

With well over 1,100 Lions in the western half of North Dakota, you'd expect a lot of noise from a pride of that size. But it's been awfully quiet.

At least is has from the standpoint of Lions qualifying for the Roarin' Lion Award.

In the past year, only nine Lions have qualified for additional bars for their Roarin' Lion pin. Three second year bars, one third year bar, one fourth year bar, one fifth year bar, and three seventh year bars were awarded.

Not a single Lion qualified for the first year pin. No, let me re-state that: Not a single Lion forwarded the completed application card showing they have earned that award. And it's even easier to continue getting those bars each year.

2019-20 LCI Peace Poster Contest

"Journey of Peace" is the theme of the 2019-20 LCI Peace Poster Contest. This is the 32nd anniversary of the Peace Poster Contest. Lions clubs can sponsor the program in their community for children in local schools or organized, sponsored youth groups. Students, ages 11, 12 or 13 as of November 15, are eligible to participate. Through the contest, students are encouraged to visually depict their interpretation of the contest's theme.

Lions clubs may purchase a contest kit through the Club Supplies Sales Department. A kit must be purchased for each contest sponsored. The contest must be sponsored by a Lions club.

Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches (33 centimeters by 50 centimeters) and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches (50 centimeters by 60 centimeters). Do not mat or frame artwork. Only one entry per student and each entry must be the work of only one student. All artwork must be the individual student's original creation. Duplications are not accepted.

All media are accepted. Note: Chalk, charcoal and pastel entries should be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries.

Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled or attached to the artwork in any way. The use of lettering or numbering on the front of the poster, in any language, is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster. Artwork should be done on a flexible material, so it can be rolled for shipping in a mailing tube. Do not fold poster.

Participants accept all responsibility for late, lost, misdirected or illegible entries. Lions Clubs International is not responsible for entries damaged, destroyed or lost during the judging process. Entries cannot be acknowledged or returned; they become property of Lions Clubs International upon receipt. Peace Poster Contest images cannot be used without written permission from Lions Clubs International.

In consideration for the opportunity to enter the Peace Poster Contest, participants agree to allow Lions Clubs International to use their names and photographs for promotional and publicity purposes. In addition, the international grand prize winner, two family members (one being a parent or legal guardian) and the sponsoring club president or a club member (as designated by the sponsoring club president) are required to attend the special award ceremony at Lions' Day with the United Nations. An international grand-prize winner is not eligible to receive subsequent prizes in future Peace Poster contests sponsored by Lions Clubs International. By entering, participants agree to be bound by these rules and the decisions of the judges and Lions Clubs International. Lions Clubs International may cancel the contest without notice at any time. The contest is void where prohibited, taxed, or restricted by law.

Judging

Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme.

Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners.

Awards

One international grand prize winner will receive a trip to a special award ceremony. There the winning artist will be presented with an engraved plaque and a cash prize of US \$5,000.


Each of the 23 merit award winners will receive a cash award of US \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

Deadlines

Please note that the following dates are from those in the Peace Poster information from Lions Clubs International. MD 5 Council of Governors may set a different date other than Dec 1- depending on when their meeting is scheduled. Entries not meeting deadlines will be disqualified.

October 1, 2019	Deadline to purchase kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.
November 15, 2019	Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the district governor.
December 1, 2019	Deadline for district governor to bring one winning district poster to the multiple district council of governors meeting and give to the MD 5 LOFY Chairperson.
December 15, 2019	Postmark deadline for the MD 5 LOFY Chairperson to send one winning entry to the Public Relations Department at International Headquarters.
February 1, 2020	International winners will be notified on or before this date.



- 4. Newsletters should be concise and informative.
- 5. Newsletters will be judged for quality of content, page layout, and publication design.

6. Photos may or may not be included within the newsletter.

MD5 LIONS CLUB SCRAPBOOK CONTEST

1. Scrapbooks must be clearly labeled on the outside of the book with the club name.

2. Photos contained within the scrapbook must have a brief description and people in the photos should be clearly identified

3. Scrapbooks will be judged on content, design and use of scrapbooking materials.

MD5 LIONS CLUB WEBSITE CONTEST

1. Websites shall be a Club Website and not a State/ Provincial/ Zone/International website.

2.Websites will be judged for quality of content and design.

What are the Youth Exchange Chairpersons responsibilities?

The main role of the District and Multiple District YCE Chairperson is to plan coordinate and promote local Lions YCE activities

And to serve as the liaison between Lions Clubs International the district governor/council chairperson and clubs regarding program activities. **Chairperson Responsibilities:** Understand the intricacies of the program by thoroughly reviewing the YCE policy.

Ensure Lions or officially designated non-Lions conduct the program according to the YCE policy.

Develop a district or multiple-district plan to establish publicize evaluate and report camps and/or exchanges.

Establish and oversee a committee to coordinate the various aspects of the local YCE programs.

Work with your district governor council chairperson or coordinating Lion to enter your local program information on the

YCE Information Submission Form to be certified by LCI and included in the YCE Directory.

Utilize the YCE Directory to network and coordinate with YCE Chairpersons in other countries.

Establish a thorough screening and selection process for participants and host families.

Organize program orientation for sponsored participants and host families.

Ensure youth protection is maintained and procedures are followed according to local laws and customs.

Confirm that all youth traveling abroad have the necessary travel documents and are adequately insured.

Complete the Youth Camp & Exchange Activity report after program activities have concluded or by December 15th whichever comes first.

Report YCE activities to the district and multiple district local mediaMyLCI Service Activity Report and Lions Clubs International social media outlets.

Best Practices: Establish separate committees to oversee incoming versus outgoing youth.

Develop and facilitate training for YCE volunteers at the district or multiple district level.

Encourage clubs to invite past youth participants to be involved in planning or implementing future YCE activities.

Encourage families of past youth participants to serve as host families for future incoming youth.
