



Oakes Lions Club visits Qual Dairy

On April 16, 2019, the Oakes Lions Club made a road trip to Qual Dairy in Lisbon, ND. The Club had 17 members make the trip, first to Qual Dairy and then to Gwinner, ND for dinner.

The Dairy is a family run milking operation that is milking 1200 cows three times a day. Each milking takes about five hours. The milking is all automated with a sixty stall carousel for the cows. Each cow knows how to go into their stall and how to back out when they are done milking. Each cow has a collar which is read automatically when the cow enters the stall. This will identify the cow and record

the amount of milk they will produce at each milking. They have thirteen employees but only one is needed to monitor the carousel.

The automated milking system was shipped over to the United States from Germany. There are only two milking systems of this type in the United States. Everything in the operation is computerized from the feeding to the milking.

The outing was very interesting and all seventeen Lions were very impressed with the technology used in this farming operation.

You've heard the phrase, "Where there's a need, there's a Lion."

I'd like to add another phrase that goes hand-in-hand with that: "There's magic when many Lions clubs team up on a project."

I'd say you can quote me on that, but it's nothing new. We Lions have been living by those statements for years.

An opportunity arose for Lions to team up to use both kinds of magic.

Various clubs, not just from District 5NE but from all of North Dakota, get a chance to show what we are all about when we work together for a need in Mayville. It's scheduled to take place Saturday, May 18, and we're calling it Mayville Magic.

It started when a small group of potential Lions, who want to become part of a new club in Mayville and Traill County as a whole, noticed Luther Memorial Home in Mayville has a guide dog who is getting up there in years. These potential Lions saw a need to have Scooby, the older dog, retired and replaced with a younger dog from Service Dogs for America in Jud.

So this group planned a fundraiser by selling burgers and other goodies to at least make a start in the funding to provide a replacement for Scooby.

But this Mayville group needed a Lions club to sponsor the event, since it isn't a Lions club yet. And these potential Lions want to show how much good Lions would do for Mayville and the other Traill County communities. Enter the Jamestown Lions Club, taking over as sponsor of this fundraiser, led by District Governor Elect

Kathy Clemens. DGE Kathy grew up in Hatton, which is near Mayville, and her mom is considering becoming a member of the club.

Another need was someone to cook the burgers and other foods. Enter the Davenport Lions, who believe our motto, "We serve," also applies to burgers, steaks, chicken, fries, you name it. The Davenport Lions are well known for cooking at Lions events and will do the cooking in Mayville.

Of course, there was a need for other volunteer help at the event for serving, cleaning and other things. Enter Lions from clubs in Fargo, Grand Forks and elsewhere in District 5NE.

All this coordinating was done by Fargo Gateway Lions Club member Crystal Dueker, who has been directing this as if she were a master conductor of a symphony orchestra. Lion Crystal was the one who originally saw the need for a new Lions club in Mayville and has been helping the potential Lions try to form a club.

Lion Crystal also knew other things were needed for this fundraiser, so she sought donations.

She was successful, getting donations from various businesses. Old Dutch is chipping in with 200 bags of potato chips. Dollar General is shelling out some bucks – a \$200 gift certificate for supplies. Gate City Bank is opening its supply gate with 200 cups, napkins and paper plates. Goose River Bank is dipping into its coffers for \$20 worth of cups. And Miller's Bread Company may be rolling out some dough by donating hamburger buns.

Some Lions clubs also got into the act. The Horace Lions and Fargo Lions donated money for the fundraiser. Donations also came in directly to Luther Memorial Home from the West Fargo Lions and Gateway Lions.

That's just for starters. Talk about Lions coming together!

All of this caught the attention of folks at the Traill County Tribune, Mayville's weekly newspaper. The Traill County Tribune published a story about plans for the Mayville Miracle, drawing attention from folks in that county and other nearby counties.

It also drew the attention of Past District Governor Chuck Whitney of the Bowman Lions. PDG Chuck planned on sending a "starter" check as a challenge to his fellow Lions, trying to get the Lions or their clubs to donate.

Wow! This is fantastic!

But this is nothing new. That's what Lions do. We create magic, especially when there's a need, and especially when various clubs get together.

The event is scheduled to last from 5 to 7:30 p.m. at the Mayville Armory. Scooby, the service dog who is being

retired, will be there.

See you May 18 in Mayville. Come and watch Lions perform more magic.

Fargo Lions Club "Sight 4 Kidz" Vision Screening

Approaching 10,000 children screened this year

The Fargo Lions Club continues their commitment to assure that no child in the area needs to suffer with an undetected vision disability. So far this year the Fargo Lions have screened 9,600+ children in area child care facilities, the public and private schools in the city of Fargo and the other schools throughout Cass County.

Lions work with school nurses

The Fargo Lions work closely with the Fargo Public Cass Health Nurses, (who are contracted to provide nursing services for the Fargo Schools, as well as, other schools throughout Cass County) to schedule vision screening and to follow-up to assure that children who are referred are provided with the opportunity to visit an eye care professional.

Follow-up

Of the more than 9,600 children screened 1,160+ or approximately 12 % have been determined to have a vision issue and need to see an eye care professional. The school nurses follow up to assure that children from the schools they represent actually seek the services of an eye care professional. The follow up process for children in the child care facilities is provided by Vision Services of North Dakota.

Lions Assist Those in Need

As previously indicated, the goal of the program is to assure that no child needs to suffer with an undetected vision disability. To determine that the child has a vision issue is important; however, just as important is a system

to assure the child sees an eye care professional to address the issue. In order to be able to reach that goal, the Fargo Lions have set up a fund to assist those families who qualify for financial assistance. The Lions club assists the families in need by arranging for, and paying for a professional eye exam and assisting with the purchase of needed glasses.

Lions demonstrate "We Serve" by Devoting Countless Hours to SIGHT 4 KIDZ Effort

Thirty different Fargo Lions spent more than 350 hours providing the vision screening to children in child care facilities and schools in

the Fargo area this year. In addition, approximately 20 Horace Lions and 8-10 Gateway Lions provided screening to children in their areas.

Area Lions clubs work together to provide vision screening

The Horace Lions have provided vision screening for students at the Horace Elementary School for many years and have, during the last few years, included the use of the vision screening devices. They have partnered with a Fargo Lion for assistance and screening devices during that process. The Valley City Lions Club has been involved in the SIGHT 4 KIDZ program and used

the screening devices stationed in the area to screen children in their elementary schools in their city.

Fargo Gate City Lions are currently screening children in the West Fargo area and the West Fargo Lions will begin a screening program shortly.

Representatives of the Lions Clubs in the Fargo-West Fargo-Horace and the West Fargo schools have scheduled a meeting later this month to discuss vision screening. The goal is to put in place a systematic plan for serving the children in the area.

Scooby to mentor a new service dog for Luther Memorial Home

Not much goes on inside Luther Memorial Home that doesn't attract the attention of Scooby, the facility dog.

Scooby came from Service Dogs of America in Jud, N.D., an organization supported in part by Lions Clubs of North Dakota.

Scooby may soon have a partner.

Recently, Joan Amundson and her husband, Ron, moved from Williston to Clifford. Joan's mother lives in Luther Memorial Home. During a recent visit, Joan, a former member of the Williston Korner Lions, noticed that Scooby is moving slower because of age.

"She's 11 years old, so it's a good time to start a project where Scooby can show a new dog the ropes," Amundson told the Tribune.

Amundson contacted Kathy Clemens, Lions incoming district governor, about organizing a benefit to raise funds toward the purchase of a new facility dog for LMH. The Jamestown Lions, Clemens' club, will sponsor the fundraiser.

The Lions are still trying to start a new club in the Mayville-Portland area, so North Dakota Lions Clubs are coming to Mayville for the benefit. From 5 to 7:30 p.m. Saturday, May 18 inside the Mayville Armory, the Davenport Lions will grill burgers and hot dogs. Lions Clubs from Fargo, Grand Forks, Horace and Jamestown will serve food to the public, the food coming via Miller's Fresh Foods.

The news was shared with Lisa Nelson, LMH activities director.

"It's very nice that the Lions offered to do this," Nelson told the Tribune. "We've been very happy with Scooby, who was two years old and well trained when we got her nine years ago. She's still energetic when she wants to be."

Crystal Dueker, Fargo Gateway Lions says, "This event will help educate the public on how the Lions serve in our communities and reach out to help other Lions Clubs."

Dueker also discovered that "the dog will not be an apprentice, but a fully trained dog ready to serve Luther Memorial Home residents from day one."

2019-20 LCI Peace Poster Contest

"Journey of Peace" is the theme of the 2019-20 LCI Peace Poster Contest. This is the 32nd anniversary of the Peace Poster Contest. Lions clubs can sponsor the program in their community for children in local schools or organized, sponsored youth groups. Students, ages 11, 12 or 13 as of November 15, are eligible to participate. Through the contest, students are encouraged to visually depict their interpretation of the contest's theme.

Lions clubs may purchase a contest kit through the Club Supplies Sales Department. A kit must be purchased for each contest sponsored. The contest must be sponsored by a Lions club.

Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches (33 centimeters by 50 centimeters) and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches (50 centimeters by 60 centimeters). Do not mat or frame artwork. Only one entry per student and each entry must be the work of only one student. All artwork must be the individual student's original creation. Duplications are not accepted.

All media are accepted. Note: Chalk, charcoal and pastel entries should be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries.

Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled or attached to the artwork in any way. The use of lettering or numbering on the front of the poster, in any language, is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster. Artwork should be done on a flexible material, so it can be rolled for shipping in a mailing tube. Do not fold poster.

Participants accept all responsibility for late, lost, misdirected or illegible entries. Lions Clubs International is not responsible for entries damaged, destroyed or lost during the judging process. Entries cannot be acknowledged or returned; they become property of Lions Clubs International upon receipt. Peace Poster Contest images cannot be used without written permission from Lions Clubs International.

In consideration for the opportunity to enter the Peace Poster Contest, participants agree to allow Lions Clubs International to use their names and photographs for promotional and publicity purposes. In addition, the international grand prize winner, two family members (one being a parent or legal guardian) and the sponsoring club president or a club member (as designated by the sponsoring club president) are required to attend the special award ceremony at Lions' Day with the United Nations. An international grand-prize winner is not eligible to receive subsequent prizes in future Peace Poster contests sponsored by Lions Clubs International. By entering, participants agree to be bound by these rules and the decisions of the judges and Lions Clubs International. Lions Clubs International may cancel the contest without notice at any time. The contest is void where prohibited, taxed, or restricted by law.

Judging

Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme.

Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners.

Awards

One international grand prize winner will receive a trip to a special award ceremony. There the winning artist will be presented with an engraved plaque and a cash prize of US \$5,000.

Each of the 23 merit award winners will receive a cash award of US \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

Deadlines

Please note that the following dates are from those in the Peace Poster information from Lions Clubs International. MD 5 Council of Governors may set a different date other than Dec 1- depending on when their meeting is scheduled. Entries not meeting deadlines will be disqualified.

October 1, 2019	Deadline to purchase kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.
November 15, 2019	Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the district governor.
December 1, 2019	Deadline for district governor to bring one winning district poster to the multiple district council of governors meeting and give to the MD 5 LOFY Chairperson.
December 15, 2019	Postmark deadline for the MD 5 LOFY Chairperson to send one winning entry to the Public Relations Department at International Headquarters.
February 1, 2020	International winners will be notified on or before this date.

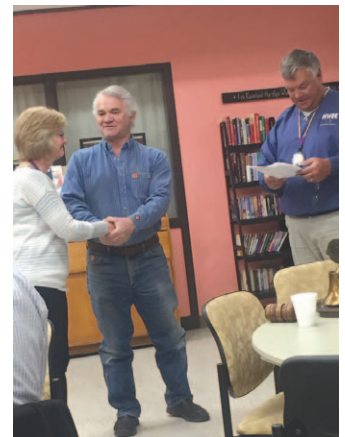
