Although the registration was low with 149 registered, those that attended enjoyed all aspects of the convention. The theme of Rockin Steady with Teddy was chosen since **Teddy Roosevelt was present** to greet convention attendees at the ice breaker. Fun Pianos provided entertainment and engaged Lions to kick off a fun and educational convention. A silent auction was held with items donated by the Zone 1 Lions Clubs which netted \$1845 to benefit Service Dogs for America. A 50/50 raffle was held at the registration table with \$1079 raised and \$539 donated to Lions Clubs International Campaign 100. The Parade of Green collected \$37.065 for Lions and related charities.

We were fortunate to have International Director Justin Faber as the convention guest. He shared his insight and knowledge with Lions in a question-and-answer session and served as the banquet speaker. He also participated in a vision screening service project at Wolf Pup Day Care held prior to the convention on Thursday.

N.D. Sen. Cramer Visits Service Dogs for America in Jud

If you've ever loved a dog, if you've ever been loved by a dog, you know what it can mean to have a dog help someone 24-hours-a-day have a better quality of life. That is what a service dog does. Whether a person is a veteran who needs help, someone recovering from a medical issue or someone who has had to deal with any sort of trauma or stress, a service dog may be the ticket to a better life.

At Service Dogs for America in Jud, supported by Lions and others who care about people and dogs, wonderful things happen every day. One wonderful thing happened Oct. 13 when U.S. Sen. Kevin Cramer came to visit. He is a co-sponsor of a bi-partisan bill in the Senate, signed into law by President Joe Biden Aug. 25, called Puppies Assisting Wounded Service Members (PAWS) for Veterans Therapy Act. Cramer is a member of the Senate Veteran's Affairs Committee.

Cramer said SDA is the kind of program that can be a partner in the pilot effort to connect service dogs with veterans experiencing mental illness and SDA Executive Directive Jenny BrodKorb, a veteran herself, said the school is ready to handle the task. The school has already matched veterans and dogs.

"Service dogs have

changed, and even saved, the lives of many veterans with mobility impairments and now they can do the same for those who grapple with mental health challenges," said Sen. Cramer. "My visit was proof of our legislation in action, and it was eye-opening to see how these service dogs are trained up to serve our veterans. Thank you to Service Dogs for America for the great work you do and for hosting us. I also appreciate the Lions for their dedication to this program. Their efforts are truly Kindness in Action."

Sen. Cramer said the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs is in the early process of developing the program. Cramer noted the sense of security, comfort and increased ease in social interaction for veterans who might have mental or emotional issues in social situations. SDA, said BrodKorb, trains service dogs for people with disabilities every day.

BrodKorb adds, "As Thanksgiving approaches, we at Service Dogs for America, which some know as Great Plains Assistance Dogs Foundation, would like to express our sincere gratitude for the Lions and friends support and generosity. We could not complete our mission without you. Whether you give to us in time, talent or treasure — we are equally grateful for you,

every day.

"With 2021 winding down, we would like to encourage you to remember Service Dogs for America in your end-of-year giving. Each dollar received by Service Dogs for America goes to ensure we can complete our mission. If end-of-year giving is not part of your financial planning, please remember Service Dogs for America on Giving Hearts Day, Feb. 10, 2022. This is our largest-fund raising event of the year and (in advance) greatly appreciate your financial support on that monumental fund-raising day."

Current numbers on what is happening at the school show 26 dogs in training at the

school in Jud, in three North Dakota prison programs and in foster homes. They are being trained in mobility assistance, seizure response and PTSD support.

The school receives approximately 17 to 19 preliminary applications each week. Because of Covid, placements have been a challenge. Staff and volunteers keep the onsite apartments ready for the three-week stay applicants have on campus for direct training with the dogs who choose them. SDA is one of the few schools where the dog chooses the person.

Work at Service Dogs for America continues and the need never ends.

I'm sure the familiar saying; "A Picture is Worth a Thousand Words" resonates as you look at this photo of a baby named, Ella, sporting her new pink glasses. In fact, some of the words you might come up with are, "precious", "cute", and "sweet". Aside from those most adoring words, after knowing Ella's story, you might want to use words such as "Lions", "Vision Screening", and "Plusoptix". Obviously, not as appealing, but Ella and her pink glasses represent the fact that she was in need of glasses and her need was founded on a vision screening conducted by the local Lions Club.

Ella's First Screening

Kristi Voeller, of North Dakota, took her 6 month old daughter, Ella, for a vision screening conducted by the local Prairie Rose Lions Club at her MOPS Group in Bismarck. Kristi admits, she almost did not take baby Ella to get screened because she was only 6 months old and she had been seen regularly by the family pediatrician and there had not been any concerns. Since there was no one in line to get screened,

Kristi decided she would go ahead and take Ella. To Kristi's surprise, Ella was referred for further evaluation by an eye care professional. Even with the referral, Kristi thought it was some kind of fluke. However, she scheduled an appointment through the Infant SEE program for several months later. Not thinking there was any rush, she thought it was fine to wait until then. However, her husband, having to see the optometrist himself at about the same time, took Ella's referral information with him to his appointment and showed the optometrist the results of Ella's screening. Upon looking at the screening results, the optometrist suggested taking Ella to see her for a follow-up as soon as possible.

Ella Needs Glasses

After Ella was seen by the optometrist and given a series of tests, it was determined that Ella needed glasses. Kristi remarked at the difference in Ella's behavior after receiving her new pink glasses one week later. Ella became much more engaging, fascinated with her mommy's nose along with her toys, playing with the family dog and her big sister, 4 year old Emma. In addition, she had become more vocal, interested in her surroundings and environment by crawling more, and paying more attention to what is around her.

Ella's Glasses are Pink

How can you miss those pink glasses? Everywhere Ella goes; Kristi is stopped and asked about Ella's pink glasses. Ella loves her glasses and doesn't want to take them off. Ella's pink glasses have changed the way Ella sees everything around her. Not only does Ella look adorable, but even at 6 months old, Ella's sight has been improved all because of a vision screening conducted by the Prairie Rose Lions Club.

The Plusoptix vision screener ensures that children are screened for the most prevalent risk factors that may lead to the development of Amblyopia or "lazy eye". An early diagnosis means early correction and treatment. Thanks to the Prairie Rose Lions Club and early intervention, Ella's vision has been improved.




