Hey Clubs, please make sure you input your 2025-2026 officers into the Lion Portal as soon as you can. Our 2025-2026 MD Directory is being created, and we need your help to provide accurate information for your club.

To input new officers:

- go to the Lion Portal (https://lionsinternational.my.site.com/s/login/?language=en_US,
- input Username (your email) and Password; click Login button,
- click on the My Club tile,
- click on the blue Manage Officers button on the right,
- create new assignment, click the Next button,
- click upcoming year, click Next button,
- click Officer Type = Officer, Title Type = Official; click Next button,
- Officer title is where you select from the drop-down options; then click the radio button
 to the left of the name of the club member filling that office for next year; click Next
 button,
- Would you like to add an officer address? Answer No, Click Next button,
- Would you like to create another officer title assignment? Click Yes if you have more
 officers to report; click No if you are ready to finish,
- click Next button and you are done.

Please make sure you are providing information on at least the officers included in the MD Directory: President, Secretary, Treasurer, Membership Chair, LCIF Coordinator, and OKS Coordinator. OKS Coordinators are reported slightly differently and are not available on any reports the directory editor can pull. Please send an email to <u>LindaQuebec@Ymail.com</u> to provide your OKS Coordinator for next year. As a default, if you don't send an email, your current year OKS Coordinator will be used in the next MD Directory.

Membership Chairperson: Will develop and implement a membership growth plan and retention program to encourage and assist the club in recruiting and retaining high-quality members.

President: Will preside at all regular and special meetings of your club and board of directors, appoint standing and special committees and ensure their success. Will also serve on the district governor's advisory committee and attend the meetings of your zone.

These are the basic descriptions of the positions at the Officer's Training classes on Saturday April 26,2025. This is a great place to learn more about how your club works even if you are not an officer. Quite a few officers go every year to learn about the updates. This year ends in 5 so there are tax issues for the treasurers. ALL Lions are responsible for getting new members and this is the place to try other ways to "Ask One". Secretary duties can be shared in any club and will always be a big help. Ditto for the president. Our motto is "We Serve" and that begins at the club level as well as the district. Vince Giambalvo, Second Vice District Governor & GLT Lifelong Learning

In my past articles, I have discussed dimensions of leadership and learning to be a more effective leader. Now let's look at learning itself. Learning may be defined as a change in behavior based on experience. The goal of any learning experience is to acquire new skills and knowledge. Applying new skills and knowledge allows us to change our behavior leading to enhanced performance. To be maximally effective, learning should be a lifelong endeavor. In essence, we can all be lifelong learners. There is a difference between being a lifelong learner and not being one. Lifelong learners keep on learning and adjusting their performance. Someone explained it this way. Two individuals have been doing a task for ten years. A lifelong learner will have 10 years of experience while a non-lifelong learner will have 1 year of experience ten times over. Each of us can ask ourselves, am I a lifelong learner? Am I continuing to increase my knowledge and adjust my behavior to accomplish more?

With increased knowledge comes wisdom. Wisdom might be thought of as the accumulation and application of knowledge. For example, knowledge is knowing that a tomato is a fruit not a vegetable. Wisdom is not putting one in a fruit salad. As we acquire knowledge and build skills, we become wiser and are able to be more productive.

By continually working on our leadership skills, we increase our ability to be more effective leaders. Let us keep in mind that the skills we develop as leaders can be used not only in Lions but in all phases of our lives.

To quote a great sports leader, Vince Lombardi, "Leaders aren't born, they are made. And they are made just like anything else, through Hard Work." So ask yourself, "Am I a lifelong learner?"

We are beginning the 4th quarter of this Lion year and thus far it has been a very good year. As a District we have added a new club in Auburn-Candia, grown by 46 members (adding 124 new Lions) and donated over \$100,000 to LCIF. PCC Bob Gustafson, Diabetes Awareness Chair

As I've stated many times, Diabetes is an epidemic in America. It's getting worse. It's a chronic disease that affects People over time if not managed well. Diabetes can be managed with a healthy diet, medications and exercise. Is it easy to manage? No. But, it can be done. There are excellent resources out there to get good information on how this can be done. Ask your Doctor for starters. Or, go to https:\\www.diabetes .org to get great information from the American Diabetes Association.

I know some of you out there have Type II diabetes. This can lead to damage to the kidneys over time. It's called CKD or Chronic Kidney Disease. Basically, it reduces the viability of the kidneys to clean the blood of toxins. If you can't clean you blood of toxins, you may have to go on Dialysis treatment to have it manually treated. You don't want that to happen. The good news is that the FDA has recently approved Ozempic to treat Kidney disease. Ozempic is made by Novo Nordisk, a Danish Pharma Company and distributed in the U.S. So, not only can

Ozempic reduce weight in patients but it can also mitigate Kidney disease. Please talk to your Doctor and see if Ozempic is right for you.

Mario Izzo, Hunger Chair


Over 122 million more people are facing hunger in the world since 2019 due to the pandemic and repeated weather shocks and conflicts, including the war in Ukraine. This is according to the latest State of Food Security and Nutrition in the World (SOFI) report published today jointly by five United Nations specialized agencies. If trends remain as they are, the Sustainable Development Goal of ending hunger by 2030 will not be reached, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the World Health Organization (WHO) and the World Food Programme (WFP) warn.

A wake-up call for the fight against hunger: The 2023 edition of the report reveals that between 691 and 783 million people faced hunger in 2022, with a mid-range of 735 million. This represents an increase of 122 million people compared to 2019, before the COVID-19 pandemic.

While global hunger numbers have stalled between 2021 and 2022, there are many places in the world facing deepening food crises. Progress in hunger reduction was observed in Asia and Latin America, but hunger was still on the rise in Western Asia, the Caribbean and throughout all subregions of Africa in 2022. Africa remains the worst-affected region with one in five people facing hunger on the continent, more than twice the global average.

"There are rays of hope, some regions are on track to achieve some 2030 nutrition targets. But overall, we need an intense and immediate global effort to rescue the Sustainable Development Goals. We must build resilience against the crises and shocks that drive food insecurity-from conflict to climate, said UN Secretary-General António Guterres through a video message during the launch of the report at the UN Headquarters in New York.

<u>"OUR POWER, OUR PLANET"</u> is the theme for the 55th Anniversary of the annual celebration of <u>International Earth Day</u>, held on April 22 each year! You may have noticed that the theme changes from year to year. According to the President (K. Rogers) of **EARTH DAY. ORG**, the decision is based upon "the collective power of billions of people speaking out on an issue, is hard for governments, institutions, or industry to ignore."

Since global power consumption is not decreasing and populations and electric needs are increasing, our energy usage is constantly growing. Our dependance on fossil fuels will eventually run out and the need for alternate sources of power is imminent. *Did you*

now that it is estimated that by the 2030's the largest source of electricity power on the planet will be solar? Other future sources are wind, hydroelectric and the renewable sources-geothermal and tidal energies.

It has come to my attention that Lions Clubs have been challenged to hold an environmentally oriented project sometime between or around April 18-27. I know that many clubs have and will be conducting environmental projects through out the year and have already met this challenge. BUT the challenge now is to make sure your environmental activities are recorded as such, not just as a service project. Remember, Environment is one of the main focuses of Lions Clubs International and deserves the credit due just as diabetes, hunger, etc. have.

No more preaching, maybe your club can clean-up a local park, plant a tree or do a collection drive for recyclable items (fabrics, clothing for example) that can be donated to an organization that could use them

<u>Another idea-</u> Think about our own <u>Camp Pride</u> and sign up <u>for Lions Clean-up Day (May 31st)</u> or your club may want to contribute to the cost of the <u>Solar Project</u> currently underway- the camp will be completely under solar power eventually, but could use the funding to make it happen - our camp is certainly doing our part with the International Lions Environment Focuses.

HANS NEIDHARDT INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR

Hans Neidhardt from Potwin, Kansas, USA, was elected to serve a two-year term as an international director of Lions Clubs International at the association's 105th International Convention in Boston, Massachusetts, USA, July 7 through July 11, 2023. Director Neidhardt is a retired Colonel with 39 years of service in the United States Air Force. After retiring from his career in the military he served another eight years as a Special Education Paraprofessional/substitute teacher. Since 2020, he has been fully retired. 
