

Michelle Ackroyd, Childhood Cancer Chair

The Salem Lions participated in Relay for Life raising Money For Childhood Cancer research. They raised just over \$9,000 for this very worthy cause. There is always Hope that they will find a cure!



PCC Robert Gustafson, Diabetes Chair

The ADA, American Diabetes Association, puts out a "Recent Advance" report summarizing recent advances in confronting Diabetes. The tidbit below I thought was very interesting. Moral of the tidbit Story? Keep your A1C levels under control if you have Diabetes. A1C is a longer term measure of blood glucose in your system. Most sources indicate you should keep this level under 7%. The A1C test measures the amount of glucose (sugar) attached to hemoglobin in red blood cells. Since red blood cells live for about 2-3 months, the A1C reflects average blood sugar levels over that period.

Tidbit: Several large clinical trials have demonstrated the importance of tight glucose control for reducing diabetes complications. However, few studies to date have tested this in the real-world, outside of a controlled clinical setting. In a study published this year, Dr. Laiteerapong found that indeed in a real-world setting, people with lower hemoglobin A1C levels after diagnosis had significantly lower vascular complications later on, a phenomenon known as the 'legacy effect' of glucose control. Her research noted the importance of early intervention for the best outcomes, as those with the low A1C levels just one-year after diagnosis had significantly lower vascular disease risk compared to people with higher A1C levels.

With these findings in hand, physicians and policymakers will have more material to debate and determine the best course of action for improving outcomes in people newly diagnosed with diabetes.

Jeri Maynard, Environment Chair

In the last couple of months, we have been focusing on plastics, specifically, (PFAs, PFOs, PDFs, etc.). Microplastics are tiny (sometime microscopic) and can be found everywhere. Evidence of their presence is present in our air, water sources, soil, food and even our bodies. and are becoming a concern for our health and environment. You may not see them but they are there!!

While you cannot completely avoid microplastics, here are 9 science -backed* recommendations for avoiding them:

- 1. <u>Choose tap water, not plastic bottled water:</u> Individuals drinking beverages with plastic packaging have been found to have more microplastics in their digestive system
- <u>Do Not Microwave Plastic</u>: Heating food in plastic wrap and/or containers release the microplastics into your food. <u>Transfer</u> your food into glass or ceramic containers before heating
- Plastic Kitchenware: Many kinds of plastic kitchenware transfer microplastics into your food. This would include plastic cutting boards, bowls, blenders, electric kettles and sponges. <u>Alternatives</u>: stainless steel, glass, ceramic, bamboo and stoneware items. For cleaning, use non-plastic sponges, steel wool scrubbers, and brushes with non-plastic bristles

- 4. <u>Chose Natural Fibers for Carpets, Furnishings, and Clothing.</u> Microfibers are constantly being shed due to abrasion during wear and cleaning procedures. <u>Alternatives</u> to clothing and home textiles are cotton, linen, bamboo, silk and wool. Be sure to read the article labels as synthetic fibers may be blended with natural fibers.
- 5. <u>Avoid Plastic Tea Bags</u>: Again, heat releases numbers of microplastics into your relaxing cup of tea. <u>Switch</u> to looseleaf tea in a metal tea strainer or a reusable cotton tea bag.
- Bring Your Own Non-plastic Reusable Cup: All types of disposable cups have been found to release microplastics into their contents. This includes paper cups that have a plastic lining like your morning take-out coffee cups. More microplastics are released when contents are hot or carbonated (soda is acidic).
- 7. <u>Plastic Baby Bottles</u>: Infants can be exposed to "millions" of microplastics daily from plastic baby bottles. Use shatter-resistant glass bottles instead.
- Nonstick Cookware: Cookware coated with PTFE (Teflon) were found to release "millions" of microplastics but are also concerning because they also contain PFAs ("forever chemicals"). Instead, use stainless steel, ceramic or cast-iron cookware.
- Personal Care Products: In the USA, microplastics have been banned for use in "rinse-off" products such as toothpaste and face wash. However, microplastics can still be added into "leave-on" items such as body lotions and make-up. <u>Read labels</u> and avoid ingredients such as polyethylene, polypropylene acrylates, polymers and microbeads.

Mario Izzo, Hunger

A statement made by UN Secretary-General General Antonio Guterres. This Global Report on Food Crises is another unflinching indictment of a world dangerously off course.

Hunger is not an emergency confined to certain pockets of the world or periods of time. It is fast becoming a scar etched into the lives of millions around the globe. Fueled by conflict, geopolitical tensions, climate chaos, environmental vulnerabilities, and economic upheaval, food and nutrition crises define the lives of millions— not for weeks or months, but for years and even lifetimes.

As detailed in this report, more than 295 million people faced acute hunger last year, the sixth consecutive annual increase. From Gaza and Sudan, to Yemen and Mali, catastrophic hunger driven by conflict and other factors is hitting record highs, pushing households to the edge of starvation. Displacement has also surged, as violence and disasters rip families from their homes and condemn people of all ages to malnutrition and even death. Meanwhile climate extremes are growing in intensity – wreaking havoc on global food security, crippling harvests, and breaking supply chains.

The message is stark. Hunger and malnutrition are spreading faster than our ability to respond, yet globally, a third of all food produced is lost or wasted. Long-standing crises are now being compounded by another, more recent one: the dramatic reduction in lifesaving humanitarian

funding to respond to these needs. This is more than a failure of systems – it is a failure of humanity. Hunger in the 21st century is indefensible. We cannot respond to empty stomachs with empty hands and turned backs.

Governments, businesses and decision-makers must heed the clear warnings issued in this report. We must summon the funding, innovations and global solidarity to build the food-secure and climate-resilient future that every person, everywhere, needs and deserves. Trade must become a driver of food security - not a barrier to it. We need fair, transparent, and resilient trade systems that ensure food can move efficiently, especially during crises. The UN Pact for the Future, adopted in September 2024, gives renewed momentum to the fight against hunger by helping to build more resilient, inclusive, and sustainable food systems for all.

We can meet the great promise of ending hunger if we commit to change, choose to act, and forge a different, more humane path.



Lion Portal Tip

It's important to keep your club information updated so other Lions can see when and where you meet, and it's accurate when reports are pulled. Here's how a Club President, Secretary, and Admin can update your club's meeting date, time, and location in the Lion Portal.

How to change a club's meeting information

- Login to the Lion Portal
 - o https://www.lionsclubs.org/en
 - Click on Lion Portal link in top right of screen
 - Enter username (your email address)
 - Enter Password. Password requires minimum of 8 characters, including at least one letter, and one number.
 - Click blue Login button
- Click My Club tile
- On right side of screen, click on Club Actions tab
- Click blue Edit Club Details button
- In pop-up Edit Club Details screen, update fields as necessary.
 - If you meet at the same time and place twice a month, you only need to fill in Meeting Location 1 information. Identify the meeting weeks of the month (for example first and third Monday at 18:30 (6:30pm), at the meeting place and meeting address.
 - Or, if your club meets at two different locations during the month, use Meeting Location 1 to identify where, when, time you meet. Then repeat these fields under meeting location 2 for the second meeting you have each month.
 - \circ $\,$ Scroll to the bottom of the pop-up screen, click Next, and you are finished.
- This information will display on a report when the directory is updated again next year.


