

## PCC Robert Gustafson, Diabetes Chair

The latest diabetes cure news focuses on major breakthroughs in cell therapies for Type 1, like stem cell-derived beta cells that make patients insulin-independent (Vertex/Semma trials), and new methods to shield these cells from immune attack, potentially ending immunosuppressants.

For Type 2, exciting advances include procedures like Duodenal Mucosal Resurfacing (DMR) or ReCET (electroporation), which "reset" the gut lining to reduce insulin dependence. While no universal "cure" exists yet, these regenerative and immune-modulating therapies show massive promise for restoring normal glucose control.

In summary, advances are being made to control and potentially cure Diabetes. It's just a matter of time. It's time to end this menace called Diabetes.

## **Lion Portal Tip**



So far in newsletters this year, we have covered several topics on using the Lion Portal:

- maintaining club information
- taking online courses in Learn
- viewing service reported for your club
- reporting Mental Health and Well-being service projects
- integrating Learn into the Lion Portal
- how to report service activities, meetings, donations, and fundraisers

Club Presidents, Secretaries, and Treasurers, do you know how to view statements from LCI online? It's easy to do this in the portal...

- Login to the Lion Portal, then click on the My Club tile
- Click on the Statements tab
- The Monthly Activity section of the screen displays balances, including the current balance as of the date you are looking at the screen. Click on the paper icon next to the Current Balance to see recent transactions that result in the Current Balance.
- Notice there are buttons at the top of this section to pay your club's current balance online. You can only see these buttons if your office has access to this function.
- The Statements and Invoices section of the screen summarizes several recent months' statements. These statements are generated at the end of each month. Click on the paper icon in the View Statements column to see a statement for the month you have chosen to view.
- Keep in mind that billing from the district is not reflected in the LCI statements. Contact
  the District's Cabinet Treasurer if you have questions about balances owed to the


