In the past few issues, I have been describing a framework of leadership for all Lions. It describes several concepts such as Role and Identity, Personal and Position Power, Formal and Informal Leadership and Management and Leadership. Let's look at some of the skills that can be used within this framework and where to learn about them. There are many ways to learn and Lions International offers a variety of opportunities to learn how to master specific skills.

Portal Training

On the Lions Portal there are a variety of free courses available to Lions. To get there is easy. Just sign on to the Portal and click on the Learn Button. Then click on the "Go" tab and select Content Library from the menu on the right side of the page. You will find several courses listed which you can take. You can also check the Courses Box to see a list of some additional

courses. These are well designed and developed courses which can help develop skills useful not only in Lions but in your personal and professional life as well.

Club Officer Training

Lions also offers several in-person learning opportunities. We are presenting a series of Club Officer Training courses for Club Presidents, Club Secretaries, Club Treasurers and Membership. These are scheduled for Saturday, April 26, 2025, at the NH Police Standards Training Facility in Concord. You can find the application in the February issue of the Pride Newsletter on page 21. You do not have to hold any of these positions to attend. Come and learn more about how Lions Clubs work.

USA/Canada Forum

Another opportunity for you to consider is the USA/Canada Forum. It is a multiple day event consisting of many classes covering a large variety of topics relevant to your Lions Journey. It will be held on September 18-20, 2025, in Atlantic City, NJ. Information about the Forum can be found online by searching for USA/Canada Forum.

These are only some of the places you can receive valuable training through your Lions membership. I spent the bulk of my professional life managing Training & Development programs in a variety of industries and have attended all these Lions programs over the past few years. We had an interesting discussion at our Atkinson Lions business meeting recently. We brought in Tina Hurley from "Less Leg More Heart", an organization that helps individuals deal with the loss of a limb. It turns out that approximately 150,000-160,000 individuals lose a limb to Diabetes every year in America. That means about every 4 minutes, someone loses a limb due to Diabetes complications. Diabetes accounts for 80% of non-traumatic lower limb amputations. These numbers are certainly eye-opening.

As we know, Diabetes is an epidemic in America. It's a chronic disease that affects people over time if not managed well. Diabetes can be managed with a healthy diet, medications and exercise. Is it easy to manage? No. But, it can be done. There are excellent resources out there to get good information on how this can be done. Ask your doctor for starters. Or go to https://diabetes.org/ to get great information from the American Diabetes Association.

Please do your family a favor and manage your Diabetes. From what Tina Hurley told us, you do not want to lose a leg. She didn't lose her leg because of Diabetes, but complications from a loss of a limb do arise and they are not fun to deal with according to Tina. If you want to contact Tina to have her come in and talk to your Club, just go to https://www.lesslegmoreheart.com/ to get contact information. She is an excellent speaker on the topic.

In alignment with its mission to accelerate improvements in global health and well-being through food and nutrition, the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics implores world leaders and policymakers to rapidly unite efforts to allocate resources that ensure universal access to food and water, end the deliberate restriction of food and water during conflict, support and protect humanitarian aid workers, and implement effective strategies to prevent famine. It is incumbent upon the international community across all sectors to prioritize the alleviation of suffering inflicted by starvation and malnutrition as a paramount objective everywhere, every time, without reservation.

Famine knows no boundaries. Whether born of conflict or violence, population displacement, natural disaster, environmental degradation or economic crises, famine is the result of a combination of factors occurring simultaneously or sequentially and often is exacerbated by a lack of access to essential humanitarian aid. Among the most vulnerable are pregnant parents, infants and children, with devastating long-term impacts on physical and cognitive development, leading to stunted growth, cognitive impairments, and increased susceptibility to diseases.

Famine is most often triggered by conflict, particularly when access to food and water is deliberately restricted or destroyed and people are forcibly displaced from their communities. Environmental contributors include drought or flooding, extreme temperatures, insect infestations and diseases affecting crops and livestock. Economic crises exacerbate the situation

by increasing unemployment and poverty and reducing resources to address food needs for vulnerable populations. Famine devastates communities, disrupts economies and deepens global inequalities — and it must be prevented through concerted action, innovative policies and sustained commitment to our collective humanity.

ENVIRONMENT

If you are anything like me, you probably have an old broken or unused electronic device lingering in your desk drawer or garage. But if you are a responsible person, you put your items in your recycling bin, take them personally to a waste facility, or visit (at your personal cost) an organized electronic event- many Lions Clubs and other community organizations use this service project as a fund raiser. Once out of your hands, it is now considered electronic waste (E-Waste)-most electronic waste may be recycled with reuseable or valuable elements extracted.

Electronic devices have become an indispensable part of our modern life styles and are found in items as small as your smart watch and as large as your automotive vehicle. What they all have in common are rechargeable lithium-ion batteries. These batteries vary in strength but all contain lead, mercury, and cadmium which is detrimental to human health and to our precious environment. It was estimated that at the beginning of this decade, Global E-waste topped over 50 million tons with just 17.4 percent of that waste collected being recycled.; the rest ending up in our landfills and poisoning our communities!

You may not be aware that as of July 1, 2025, rechargeable lithium-ion batteries will be prohibited from being disposed in all New Hampshire landfills and incinerators (HB 1386). "Household and businesses must recycle through special battery programs and never mixed with recyclables" One of the reasons for this "ban", in addition to the environmental effects, is the rising number of fires and injuries occurring when the batteries explode. The National Waste/Recycling Association estimates that each year, nationwide, more than 5000 fires occur at waste facilities causing bodily and extensive building destruction.

So, where can we safely dispose of these electronic devices? Staples, Best Buy, and Batteries Plus stores have US Department of Energy funding programs and will accept cell phones, laptops, vacuums, cables, smartwatches, etc. For bigger items, NH Department of Environmental Services advises residents to contact your local transfer station or the NHDES/Household Hazardous Program by E:mail hhw@des.nh.gov or phone: 603 271-2047.



Baby, it's cold outside!

Not much has changed since last month at Lions Camp Pride but big changes are on the way.

The Board has voted to install a complete solar array on the roof of the new rec. hall. When the building was built, it was purposely orientated to provide perfect exposure for a future solar installation. The total cost of the installation is \$92,000. So far, we have \$20,000 committed from donors. The rest will come from money on hand, a possible Federal grant, and of course the generous clubs of 44H. The new system will provide 100% of the electricity needed to run the camp for the year and will pay for itself in something less than 6 years. This is the most exciting thing to happen for the camp in a long time and is really the first move in guaranteeing the sustainability of Lions Camp Pride. It's a great day when you can tell the electric utility to kiss off. I know I'm shooting for the moon but 66 panels divided into \$72,000 = \$1100/panel. You can help by sponsoring a panel or 2 and make the payback even happen faster. Thanks

THANKS, NEW HAMPSHIRE LIONS Eyeglass collection passes 500,000 milestone

Every day, people recycle more products to help the environment or people in need. One item that does not appear on published recycling lists is used eyeglasses. New Hampshire Lions have taken a very positive role in increasing the recycling of used eyeglasses. This allows them to bring sight to many who have never enjoyed the gift of sight, which so many of us take for granted.

This emphasis on recycling used eyeglasses started with the efforts of two New Hampshire Seacoast Lions. In 2006 Jack Helie, of Exeter, spearheaded the effort to increase collection of used eyeglasses. He even drove his own vehicle to deliver the glasses to the Eyeglass Recycle

Center, Roanoke, Virginia. He and Ted Davis of the Hampton Area Club then got together. Jack still spearheaded the collection of glasses, and Ted took on the role of sorting, inspecting, and shipping the packaged glasses to the Roanoke Center.

Both men have since passed, but the program continues to grow. This program growth is the result of the effort of each club, in New Hampshire, placing the collection boxes in prominent town/city locations, making regular collections, and getting the glasses to Hampton. The Hampton Area Lions hold weekend sorting and packing sessions. However, the volume of glasses collected by all the clubs is very large and more than can be processed in these weekend sessions. To help solve this problem, some members have taken glasses home to be sorted and packed. Lion Beth Gilloran is our champion in sorting and packing so many glasses at her home. When useable glasses are packed, they are sent via the UPS store in Noth Hampton, NH to the recycle center in Virginia/. The end result of this New Hampshire Lions effort is that, to date, over a half million pairs of glasses have been shipped to the Virginia recycle center.

The Hampton Area Lions want to thank all New Hampshire Lions Clubs for helping to make this such a successful program.

Got an old computer collecting dust in your closet, or a broken air conditioner sitting on the back porch? What do you do with such items when you replace them? Everything from laptops, phones and computers to TVs cost a fortune to haul away.



Turn all that junk over to the Laconia-Gilford Lions Club during their Electronic Waste Collection Day fundraising event on Saturday, April 12, Cinemas 8 parking lot in Gilford, 8:30am-12:30pm. For a small disposal fee, we take your old electronic items off your hands and recycle them. You do not have to be a resident of Laconia or Gilford to take advantage of this fundraiser - it is open to everyone. The disposal charge is almost always less than the prices at local transfer stations. Cash or checks will be accepted but not debit or credit cards.

Items accepted include: laptops, PC towers, PC LCD monitors, servers, CD/DVD players, camcorders, AV equipment, VCRs, speakers, copiers, faxes, scanners, printers, phones (land and cell), phone systems, humidifiers and computer accessories (all \$5 unless very large).

In addition, we will also take microwaves, air conditioners, dehumidifiers (all \$10), CRT monitors less than 50 lbs. and TVs less than 25" (\$20), TVs 26" and larger (\$30). For TVs needing more than one person to lift or CRT monitors over 50 lbs., the item will be weighed on site and the price determined. Anything with a cord not listed will also be accepted. We are also now accepting Teflon pots and pans for \$1.

You CANNOT drop off: smoke detectors, oils, paints, thinners, batteries (except car batteries), tires, items containing mercury such as fluorescent and CFL light bulbs or thermometers, capacitors, ballasts, or any other hazardous waste.

The Laconia-Gilford Lions Club appreciates your help with their Electronic Waste Collection Day fundraising event and wishes to thank in advance everyone who contributes to making a real difference in our community. This project has been officially sanctioned by the Green Sanctuary Committee of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Laconia.
