Hey Clubs, please make sure you input your 2025-2026 officers into the Lion Portal as soon as you can. Our 2025-2026 MD Directory is being created, and we need your help to provide accurate information for your club.

To input new officers:

- go to the Lion Portal (https://lionsinternational.my.site.com/s/login/?language=en_US,
- input Username (your email) and Password; click Login button,
- click on the My Club tile,
- click on the blue Manage Officers button on the right,
- create new assignment, click the Next button,
- click upcoming year, click Next button,
- click Officer Type = Officer, Title Type = Official; click Next button,
- Officer title is where you select from the drop-down options; then click the radio button to the left of the name of the club member filling that office for next year; click Next button.
- Would you like to add an officer address? Answer No, Click Next button,
- Would you like to create another officer title assignment? Click Yes if you have more
 officers to report; click No if you are ready to finish,
- click Next button and you are done.

Please make sure you are providing information on at least the officers included in the MD Directory: President, Secretary, Treasurer, Membership Chair, LCIF Coordinator, and OKS Coordinator. OKS Coordinators are reported slightly differently and are not available on any reports the directory editor can pull. Please send an email to <u>LindaQuebec@Ymail.com</u> to provide your OKS Coordinator for next year. As a default, if you don't send an email, your current year OKS Coordinator will be used in the next MD Directory.

PCC Bob Gustafson, Diabetes Awareness Chair

Many People have questioned whether Diabetes can be cured completely rather than just managed via medication, diet and exercise. Believe it or not, there is progress being made on this front.

What is the new breakthrough in diabetes treatment? Sana Biotechnology is pioneering a revolutionary approach to islet cell transplantation for type 1 diabetes that circumvents the need for immunosuppression. Their innovative hypoimmune technology enables the transplantation of engineered islet cells without triggering an immune response.

In other words, we are getting to the point where we can bio-engineer pancreatic cells that make insulin. Insulin is the hormone that assists glucose from the food we eat to get into our cells to produce energy. Many times, lack of Insulin production can cause excessive levels of glucose in our blood which can negatively impact many organs in our body from our Kidneys to our Heart to our Eyes. The Science isn't quite there yet but progress is being made. Have hope.

Mario Izzo, Hunger Chair

According to the United Nations website, the UN reports that global hunger numbers continue to be alarmingly high, with approximately 9.2% of the world's population facing chronic hunger in 2022, totaling around 735 million people. This represents a significant increase compared to 2019, and global food insecurity remains a major challenge, with 2.4 billion people facing moderate to severe food insecurity.

- Global hunger has risen steadily, with a 122 million increase in the number of people facing hunger between 2019 and 2022.
- While some regions have shown progress in certain areas, others, particularly in Africa, continue to face significant challenges in combating hunger.

- A large portion of the world's population (2.4 billion) experiences moderate to severe food insecurity, meaning they lack regular access to safe, nutritious, and sufficient
- Conflict, climate change, economic instability, and the COVID-19 pandemic have all
 contributed to the rise in global hunger and food insecurity, according to UN News.
- Millions of children are affected by hunger and malnutrition, including stunted growth and wasting, which can have long-term health consequences.

Let's all recognize the new Lions Club being formed in the Tilton-Northfield area for their recent food drive for their local food pantry. They collected an estimated 1,100 lbs of food. Great job!!

<u>Do you really know what PFAs are??</u> I recently asked several of my friends if they knew the answer and, surprisingly, they were not familiar with PFAs. Most did concede that they knew they were not good for them.

<u>What are PFAs?</u> They are Polyfluoroalkyl substances and referred to as PFAs (also PFOs). PFAs are chemicals that were created back in the 1930s. By the 1950s their use In manufacturing and consumer goods was continuing to become more wide spread. It was not until the 1970s that people became concerned. PFAs were being found in the blood of workers who had been exposed because of their occupations,(ex: fire fighters). By the 1990s, blood samples of the general population were indicating they had been exposed; the United States started pulling PFAs out of various markets. Manufacturers started looking for alternatives that might be an environmentally friendly substitute as well as accomplishing the same goals.

Where do we find them now? The answer is essentially everywhere!! The problem is that PFAs are long lasting and do not break down easily. They are used in carpeting and clothing, in microwave bags (popcorn) and fast-food wrappers. Most water-proof clothing and stain resistant clothing is coated with them. PFAs are being found in the soil, air and water supplies. Blood samples now show that our food supply; both in wild and animal products (especially in fish) and vegetables grown in contaminated soil (from water supply) are affecting our health.

How can you safe-guard yourself and family?

- (1) Listen to the warnings, read the labels and do your own research- there are massive research articles that you can visit on line
- (2) Limit your visits to the fast-food drive-throughs (greasy wrappers and take-home containers)
- (3) Avoid PTFE-based non-stick pans and kitchen utensils (stainless steel or cast iron is best).
- (4) When buying new carpets and/or furniture, look for items that have not been pre-treated, and skip the optional stain-resistant procedures.
- (5) Finally, when buying outdoor gear, avoid fabrics labeled stain or water resistant (do research before buying).

<u>Bottom line</u> PFAs have made our lives much easier, tastier and a lot more convenient- a hard route to give up.

Donate bears to spread kindness



Terri Lynn Giant Cashews

Ingredients

- · 3 tbsp Soy Sauce
- 3 tbsp Honey
- · 2 tbsp Oil
- 1 ½ lb Boneless Chicken Breasts (cut into ¼-inch pieces)
- ¼ cup Brown sugar
- Black Pepper (just a pinch)
- 2 tbsp Chopped Garlic
- 1 tbsp Grated Ginger
- 1 cup Sliced Scallions
- 8 oz Sliced Water Chestnuts
- ¼ cup Terri Lynn Giant Cashews
- A small head of Boston or Bibb lettuce (leaves separated).

Directions

- Combine the soy sauce and honey in a small bowl. Set aside.
- Heat the oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat.
- Season the chicken with ½ teaspoon pepper, stirring occasionally, until it begins to brown, about 3 minutes.
- Lower heat to medium and stir in the garlic and ginger. Add the scallions and cook for 1 minute.
- Stir in the water chestnuts and half the soy sauce mixture. Continue cooking until the chicken is cooked through, about 4 minutes. Remove from heat and sprinkle with the cashews.
- Divide the lettuce leaves among plates and spoon the chicken over the top. Serve with the remaining soy sauce mixture for drizzling.


