Is Type II Diabetes preventable?

Type 2 diabetes is a preventable disease. Here are some evidence-based strategies to reduce your risk:

Lifestyle Modifications:

 Maintain a healthy weight: Losing even a small amount of weight can significantly lower your risk.

- Engage in regular physical activity: Aim for at least 150 minutes of moderate-intensity exercise or 75 minutes of vigorous-intensity exercise per week.
- **Follow a healthy diet:** Focus on consuming fruits, vegetables, whole grains, lean protein, and low-fat dairy. Limit sugary drinks, processed foods, and unhealthy fats.
- **Get enough sleep:** Aim for 7-9 hours of quality sleep per night.
- Manage stress: Find healthy ways to cope with stress, such as exercise, yoga, or meditation.

Start with one modification above and work your way down the list. It's like cleaning your House. Start with one room and continue until all rooms are done. Doesn't need to be done in one day but over time voila!

- We could sure use some volunteers to give us a hand!!



Kennel Cough is not a single disease; it's a catch all term much like the flu in humans. There are two viruses and one bacterium responsible for most cases. They frequently occur together and are accompanied by a "barking" cough! It's not a serious disease in general but it is uncomfortable for the dog and contagious. It is easily treatable and avoidable with vaccinations.

All Grant Applications meeting the following guidelines will be reviewed at the next Lions Youth Services Meeting. Our meetings are held at 6:30 pm on the 2nd Thursday of every month at the Airport Diner in Manchester. If possible, we encourage all clubs to join us to present their request.

- 1) All requests submitted by the President of a Lions Club in the State of New Hampshire Districts 44N and/or 44H
- 2) The Maximum Grant is \$500. LYS will consider up to 2 requests per NH Lions Club per Lions year (July-June)
- 3) Each application must be for a unique project. Applications for the same project within the same Lions Year will not be considered.
- Each application should benefit more than one individual. Applications benefitting one person will not be considered.
- 5) Grant Applications MUST be received by the last day of the month prior to the start of the project, otherwise the request may not be considered.

It is the intent of Lions Youth Services Grant Program to partner with the Lions Clubs of New Hampshire to serve the Youth of our state; not to replace your club's support.

2026 NEW HAMPSHIRE MD44 MID-WINTER CONVENTION GUEST - INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR DAVID WINEMAN



David Wineman from Sebewaing, Michigan, United States was elected to serve a two-year term as an international director of Lions International at the association's 106th International Convention in Melbourne, Australia, June 21 through June 25, 2024.

Director Wineman is the CEO of both Abadata Computer Corporation and Abadata Connect, Inc. with more than 45 years of experience in information technology. Among his many notable projects are the sponsoring of numerous school clubs and Boy Scouts of America troops, expansion of tourism and business through a partnership between the Schewaing Chamber of Commerce and local village government, as well as Michigan state highway expansion.

Director Wineman joined the Sebewaing Lions Club, now known as the USA Lions Club, in 1994 and is still an active member.

He has held a number of offices within the association, including district governor, Guiding Lion, youth chairperson, region chairperson, vice council chairperson, area leader, zone chairperson and Lions of Michigan Foundation trustee, among many others.

In recognition of his service to the association, Director Wineman has received numerous awards including multiple International President's Certificates and International President's Medals as well as a Club Youth Chairperson Certificate of Appreciation. He has received many awards from the Lions of Michigan Foundation, including the Hellen Keller Fellowship, Outstanding Service Award and Ken Lautzenheiser Fellowship. Director Wineman is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

In addition to his Lion activities, Director Wineman has served as a board member for the Lions of Michigan foundation, as well as the president and board member of Lions Bear Lake Camp. Additionally, he has served as mayor and trustee of Sebewaing, Michigan, and is a member of the Association of Computing Machinery, BICSI and CompTIA.

Director Wineman and his wife Lindy, who is also a Lion as well as a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, have five children and 12 grandchildren.



Nashua




