The month finished with Camp Pride's work day. Lions everywhere were full of energy, and happy in the work they were doing. During convention we were able to recognize some outstanding Lions; award recipients are listed in the newsletter. Congratulations to all recipients, and everyone who supported them in their success.



This is my last message as your District Governor. Thank you for all you have done this year to contribute to our success. Our district is in good shape with many

clubs providing great service in their communities, raising money, and donating to so many great causes. We have had a great year. Thank you. I would also like to thank my cabinet team which has worked with me and done an outstanding job in achieving our goals for the 2023-2024 Lion Year.

We have accomplished so much this year in the district. The year has flown by. We all joined Lions International for one and only one purpose, to serve selflessly. It was gratifying to see first-hand during my visits to Clubs that we are serving with great spirit. Some of the service projects completed included over 1250 vision screenings, over 800 Hugs & Cuddle bears distributed, road clean ups, diabetes and cancer related walks, and tree plantings, fund raisers, donations to LCIF and CHaD and many many local organizations. Several of our Leos were also active by writing thank you cards to service men, preparing Easter baskets for children homes, and helping with serving Thanksgiving dinners.

Here are some numbers to sum up our successes. Our goal was to have 95% of clubs report some faction of service. We achieved 100% of clubs reporting! Some highlights included an amazing amount of over \$1.1 million dollars in funds raised in the district! We served over 215,000 people; donated over \$60k to LCIF; completed over 1,800 service activities; provided over 36,000 volunteer hours; and donated over \$500,000 to provide help to others. We have such strong numbers to share. Over the course of this year, we have added 116 new members that gives us more hands providing service. Continue to focus on retaining members so our growth will be even stronger as we move forward into our second century of service in New Hampshire.

My new journey as Council Chair for District 44 will begin on July 1st, and the incoming District Governor, Peter LaPointe, will take on the governance of 44H. I wish DG Peter, and all of you, great success as we continue to strengthen the work we do in New Hampshire.



ENVIRONMENT

Let's face it- we all have clothes or textiles such as curtains, duvet covers, and blankets that we do not want any more or are past their prime. Do we really know what can be done with these no longer wanted items? Last month I attended the district <u>"Green Team"</u> Gift Making Event sponsored by the 44N Team Members. They had all sorts of ideas about how to make useable items from un-useable products i.e. left- over paint samples, toilet/paper towel rolls, wood pieces. I was drawn to the old unwanted tee-shirt table where I attempted to make a tote bag (which I am now using to carry cleaning items around the house). Just a note- the young girl beside me did a much better job with her tote! Anyways, it got me to thinking about what happens to those clothes/textiles once we no longer need them.

Clothing and textiles are nearly 100 percent recyclable. Clothes and textiles that are in good condition can be donated and sold for re-use. Items that are not suitable can be recycled and made into new items, such as padding for chairs and car seats, cleaning cloths and industrial blankets. Most of us recycle our old attire by donating to a local thrift shop or charitable organization.

When a piece of clothing or accessory is donated, the thrift store that receives it will always seek out the maximum value for that item. That might mean it is put of up for sale first, and if not sold within the store's preferred time-frame, it moves on to the next stage – a donation to a charity, who can then sell the items (as a fundraiser) to a clothing recycler for conversion for another reuse, or for sale overseas. If still not useable, items are typically sent to "textile recyclers" to be broken down and reused. Clothing can become anything from cleaning rags and carpet padding to rubberized playgrounds and insulation.

You may have noticed increasingly numbers of recycling containers around town, many belonging directly to a textile recycling company. The textile making process is energy and resource intensive. The recycling of old clothes is now being called the "next frontier "for cities looking to reduce solid waste.

Textile & clothing recycling is a beneficial activity from both environmental and economic points of view. Through the recycling of used clothes and textiles, we can avoid pollution and energy intensive production of new clothing.

Interesting data about textile and clothing recycling:

- 1. More than 15 million tons of used textile waste is generated each year in the United States
- 2. The average lifetime of cloth is about 3 years.
- **3.** The annual environmental impact of a household's clothing is equivalent to the water needed to fill 1,000 bathtubs and the carbon emissions from driving an average modern car for 6,000 miles.

- 4. More than 70 percent of the world's population use secondhand clothing- 50% is used as second-hand products. 20% for polishing and cleaning cloths (industrial uses), and 26% used as fiber for insulation, upholstery, fiberboard or even re-woven into new clothing.
- 5. <u>There are now more than 500 garment recycling companies employing 17,000 textile</u> <u>industry workers.</u>



Community Food Drive: Back in April the Wolfeboro Lions Club and the Rotary Club of Wolfeboro were



Congratulations to DG Kamal Masand and his committee for a wonderful 50th 44H Spring Convention weekend! Our guest speaker was International Director (ID) Jay Moughon from Virginia. He was very inspirational during his talk. He asked us to think about why we joined Lions, and think about the moment that impacted each of us to give to the community. This is often referred to "when you became a Lion." When you talk to people about being a Lion make sure you tell them about the service projects you've been involved with that touched your heart. The new pickleball courts in the pavilion provided \$9k in income this year, and those funds help to offset the rate for special needs groups coming to camp in the summer.









Over 600 Granite State Fellowships, and over 50 progressive GSFs have been given out. The funds donated to NH Sight and Hearing Foundation are used to provide sight and hearing assistance in NH. Lions Youth Services has \$500 grants available to clubs, twice a year, to assist with the cost of projects for youth in NH. Ask your club, how can we use these grants?


Saturday evening was a very nice District Governor's reception and banquet. After dinner we heard from the elected district officers.
