

# Marie Valliere, First Vice District Governor

There are 1.395 million people in the State of New Hampshire as of 2022. There are 1.37 million Lions around the world. Just imagine if our state had to provide service to the whole world. Now think about the 2247 Lions trying to serve all of the people in the state. This is why we need more members. We have all heard about Mission 1.5 but let's try to think about a more realistic goal. Each member on average serves 43 people. Four new members to your club serves 172 more people. Not all clubs have been able to meet their goals and others will exceed them. This is where we can help and support each other with membership. Share your successes and failures with the clubs in your zone. Assist a club with canvassing, a membership meeting and sharing on Facebook their events. We need to work together to make the district strong to be able to serve those in need.



# Vince Giambalvo, Second Vice District Governor & GLT

**Management and Leadership:** In the last issue I introduced the concepts of Role and Identity. Hopefully you have identified the strengths and weaknesses you have for your role. At this point let's look at how these relate to management and leadership. No matter what role you play in the organization, you are a leader. How do these two things relate to each other?

**Management** refers to planning how to accomplish your objectives by using the resources you have available. For instance, if you are going to collect used eyeglasses you need to determine what resources to collect and how to use them. You might consider the following:

- how many collection boxes you need and where should you place them?
- how often should someone check and empty them?
- how will you advertise the program to your community?
- what budget you will need?
- how many volunteers will you need?

One of the resources you will need is people. This is where leadership comes in. **Leadership** refers to getting the right people to work on the project and interacting with them to gain their commitment and accomplish the tasks you need for your project to be successful. A leader needs to:

- give clear directions and ensure people understand them
- offer assistance when necessary
- provide feedback to keep people motivated to
- recognize the achievements of the group

To relate back to Role and Identity, management of the project comes from your Role. It defines what needs to be done, by when and with what resources. Leadership comes from your Identity. It relates to the way you interact with people to gain and keep their commitment to a successful completion of the project.

In future issues we will look at how these ideas and others can be joined in a model of Leadership.

We are supporting the Dover, Rollinsford, South Berwick club in this endeavor. Please bring new, unwrapped toys and games for children from newborn to age 12.

Finally, as many clubs reconvene after the summer break, we ask that clubs report all of their activities in the portal. Right now only 48% of our clubs have reported activity. The goal is 100%. ### From International Director Steve Middlemiss

We as Lions are continuing with our efforts of Making our Mark by growing our membership and adding new clubs. I was able to attend along with the District and Multiple District leadership from many states one of the two Mission 1.5 Summits. There were some amazing and encouraging presentations on this topic which the Leaders were then able to utilize as they met in groups to review and adjust their goals regarding membership. Many Districts were able to consider an increase in the number of clubs they would work to develop and an increase in their overall membership goals. Each of us as a member of our clubs and Districts should take it upon ourselves to contribute to this effort in every way we can. To continue to serve our communities and the growing needs within those communities we need to continue to grow to maintain our Legacy of Service.

LeeAnn and I started our second year of traveling in September by going to the USA/Canada Forum in Louisville. What a great turnout with nearly 2,000 Lions in attendance. Of course, there were once again some great inspirational speakers (Hudson Lions one and only Lion Randy Pierce being one) and some fabulous seminars. Our trips continued with visits to District 24 C Virginia and District 5 SW South Dakota. What amazing Lions in these areas, creating new and interesting ways of serving their community.

In Virginia we were able to visit the Virginia Eyeglass Recycling Center with Director Lion Kay Patrick. This location is where the Lions of NH sends their used eyeglasses. What an amazing location run by such a dedicated Lion. There is nearly nothing that they throw away. If a pair of glasses do not meet their requirements, they send them on their way to a scrap company and receive funds to help run the Center. They recycled close to 250,000 glasses last year with just over 52,000 being delivered overseas. About 25% to 35% of the glasses received are considered reusable. Director Kay commented that the Lions of NH send them nearly 50% of the glasses they receive and that the Hampton Lions do a fantastic job of sorting and packaging what they send. She couldn't say enough great things about those Lions. LeeAnn and I were both so proud to be able to say we were NH Lions.

We continue to look forward to serving the Lions of the World as we all work toward "Making Our Mark".

# PCC Robert Gustafson, Diabetes Chair

To reiterate from previous reports, Diabetes is a chronic, metabolic disease that occurs when the body has trouble regulating blood sugar levels. The disease can have detrimental effects on many of the systems in the body including the heart, kidneys, eyes and nerves. The Lions have identified Diabetes as a major issue for us to address. We know Diabetes is becoming or has become an epidemic.

### What are the stats you ask? From the Lancet in June, 2023:

New estimates published this week indicate that more than 1.3 billion people could be living with diabetes by 2050 worldwide. That's 1.31 billion people living with a disease that causes life-altering morbidity, high rates of mortality, and interacts with and exacerbates many other diseases. The increase in prevalence (up from 529 million in 2021) is expected to be driven by increases in type 2 diabetes, which in turn will be caused by a rise in the prevalence of obesity and by demographic shifts. In 2021, type 2 diabetes accounted for 90% of all diabetes prevalence. Most of this burden is attributable to social risk factors—such as high BMI, dietary risks, environmental and occupational risks, tobacco use, alcohol use, and low physical activity—that thrive on the obesogenic way our environments are designed and the inequitable way we organize our resources and societies.

How can each of us approach this insidious disease? We can start by improving our diet and exercising. Easy, right? Not so easy but we can start by focusing each day with good habits and then make it routine. Make the new routine a way of life.

# Mario Izzo, Hunger Chair

What is food insecurity?

Definitions of food security and insecurity may vary, but the Department of Agriculture defines it as access to enough food for an active, healthy life for all members of a household. According to the department, a household is considered food secure if it can eat an adequately nutritious diet without resorting to using emergency food supplies, scavenging, stealing, or other measures.

How have food insecurity levels changed during the pandemic?

The rate of adults living in homes where they sometimes or often don't have enough to eat started to rise in the first year of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 before falling in 2021. But from August 2021 to October 2023, that percentage grew consistently from 7.8% to 12.5%.



Fall is upon us and that means it's time to help get our Camp ready to go to bed for the winter.


- Turn the mattresses

When all of our service is reported, we will see our service statistics grow. When we conduct more service activities, we will see our service stats grow. When we have more Lions providing service, we will see our service stats grow. Mission 1.5 is a goal to beef up the number of Lions with the end goal of serving 1 billion people in a year. ### New Rules for Second Vice District Governor Qualifications

A candidate for the office of second vice district governor shall:

- (1) Be an Active Member in good standing of a chartered Lions club in good standing in his/her single or sub-district.
- (2) Secure the endorsement of his/her club or a majority of the clubs in his/ her single or subdistrict.
- (3) Have served or will have served at the time he/she takes office as second vice district governor:
  - As president of a Lions club for a full term or major portion thereof, and a member of the board of directors of a Lions club for no less than two (2) additional years; and
  - As zone chairperson, region chairperson, district global extension team coordinator, district global



leadership team coordinator, district global membership team coordinator, district global service team coordinator, district LCIF coordinator, or cabinet secretary.




### **Lion Portal Information**

### Here's how to add a new member in the Lion Portal:

- Club Presidents, Secretaries, and Admins can do this function.
- Go to the My Club screen in the Lion Portal
- Click blue Manage Club Members button (blue button to the right of the screen)
- Click Add New Member radio button, click Next
- Input data requested, click next as needed to move through the screens, Submit.
- Note: We have received an email from Lions Support that only LCI Member Service can add an *Associate* member to a club. The request must come from the Club President or Secretary where the member will be an Associate member. The request needs to include the full name, member ID number, and start date as an Associate member.

# **GUIDELINES FOR RUNNING A SAFE & EFFICIENT LIONS CLUB**

(Note: This in no way criticizes or blames anyone, past or present)

### NEW CLUBS, OR CLUBS THAT ARE NOT REGISTERED WITH THE STATE OF NH:

1 Be sure to set up your Club Constitution and By-Laws in accordance with Lions Clubs International. You can obtain this information on the Lions Clubs International Website for Clubs.

Existing Clubs not registered with NH as a Business or Charity should do so as soon as possible. But you cannot use your original date of becoming a club, so use a date prior to completing the Constitution and By-Laws and having the current officers sign the necessary documents.

To Register with the State of New Hampshire, you will need to go on-line into the Corporate Division and electronically fill in the required information. Before doing this, you need to discuss this with your board of directors, as all officers & directors need to be aware that they will be listed in the Articles of Agreement and the preparer will be electronically signing on their behalf. (Sample Attached) Once Approved by the State of NH they will issue a "Certificate of Existence" to enable new clubs to open the club's bank accounts.

### NEW CLUBS OBTAIN TAXPAYER IDENTIFICATION NUMBER THROUGH THE IRS

2 If you have not already obtained a Taxpayer Identification Number (EIN), you should do this as soon as possible. (You Can Go On-line and apply or fill out the form and fax) Note: do not use periods or commas etc. Be sure the faxed copy is signed (Sample Attached)

### **ESTABLISHING LIONS BANK ACCOUNTS**

3 **New Clubs** - It is important to keep your charitable funds and administrative funds separate. **RECOMMENDATION TO HAVE TWO SEPARATE ACCOUNTS:** 

One for Administrative Receipts & Expenses (Dues, etc.) and one for all Charitable Receipts and Disbursements relating to charitable fundraising, etc.

Clubs that currently have only one account should do one of the following: (A) Set up two accounts, one for Administrative Receipts & Expenses (Dues, etc.) and one for all Charitable Funds received & expenses relating to charitable fundraising.

### BANK WILL REQUIRE TAXPER ID #(EIN) & NH CERTIFICATE OF EXISTENCE

Bank Accounts should be established for at least two authorized signers, preferably non related.

(B) Set up specific spreadsheets detailing all Administrative Receipts and Expenses, and Balance; and all Charitable Receipts, Expenses and Balance. *It is imperative to keep concise records and prepare monthly and report all activities by written reports to your Board of Directors MONTHLY, either by direct contact, e-mails, etc. giving a breakdown of all administrative and all charitable receipts and disbursements. The Treasurer should be able to provide information to its Club at any and all times.* 

NOTEBOOKS should be kept up-to-date with separation between Charitable & Administrative; Include all Receipts, Deposit slips & details of what deposit represents; events, Disbursements with all billing slips and details; if possible copy all checks written, or keep a copy of letter to charity or individual detailing date, event/cost, amount and check number.

THIS INFORMATION WILL BE NECESSARY WHEN REPORTING YOUR ANNUAL REPORT TO THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE; as well as providing your club with clear/concise records.

### **4 NH ANNUAL REPORT**

Every year an Annual Report (NHCT-12) must be filed with the State of NH on or before November 15 (Fiscal Year July 1 through June 30) These are now done on-line. If you wish a paper form you need to notify the State of NH either via e-mail or telephone call at annualreports@sos.nh.gov or 603-271-8200 You will need to provide the business name, ID number and name and address for them to mail or email to.

#### 5 NH 2025 & EVERY 5 YEARS AFTER NON PROFIT REPORT

Every five years a Non-Profit Report is due to the NH Corporate Division, providing the Business Name; Type, Business ID and State of Incorporation; Current Principal Office Address, Current Mailing Address if different; and New Principal Address and mailing address; Principal Purpose and Officer and Director Information (names, address and titles); There are filing fees for the Annual Reports and Non Profit Report. Existing registered Clubs should have last completed this form in 2020.

#### 6 ANNUAL FILING OF INTERNAL REVENUE TAX FORM 990-N 990EZ OR 990

Many clubs have income of \$50,000.00, or less annually, must electronically file 990-N; other clubs, bringing in \$50,000 or more, must file either form 990EZ or 990. The filing is due no later than November 15, each year (based on the Lions fiscal year of July 1 through June 30).


