#### Marie Valliere, First Vice District Governor

When I go to Chicago this month, I will be in training with 750 other District Governor Elects from around the world. I will be given a "Passport" to collect my conversations with members who speak another language. This is a way to meet people from another culture and way of doing things, finding a way to communicate and overcome the language barrier. WOW! One of the biggest problems we face is COMMUNICATION. How well do you know your fellow club members outside of meetings? Do you socialize with them on occasion? If you do, that's wonderful and if not, Why not? While I am making new friends from other parts of the World, I challenge you to make new friends in your club or another club in your Zone. At your next meeting sit with someone else. Go to another club's service project or fundraiser. Make a new friend and share your ideas. I will bring back stories of my new friends and their thoughts and I hope you will share your stories with me.



In the past few issues of the Pride, we have looked at leadership from the perspective of your Role, what is expected of you, and your Identity, who you are and how you deal with relationships .Now let's take a look at how these two fit in a leadership model.

#### Starting with the Role

Use your Role to ensure you have a clear understanding of your objectives. This will allow you to develop a plan and measure your success. The next step in this leadership model is defining actions clearly. By ensuring that you and each member of the team understand their specific responsibilities and objectives, you can create a focused and aligned environment. Clarity in roles helps eliminate ambiguity, allowing individuals to work efficiently toward common goals. It is crucial for leaders to communicate expectations explicitly and provide the necessary resources and support for their team members to achieve their objectives.

#### **Shifting to Identity**

Once the roles are well-defined, the focus shifts to identity. Using your identity and the personal power you can build from it; you can foster a strong sense of identity within the team. Encouraging involvement and ownership is paramount to build and maintain a strong sense of commitment. When individuals feel connected to their roles and the organization's mission, their engagement and motivation increase significantly. Use your personal power to build relationships that cultivate a sense of identity by recognizing and celebrating contributions, promoting collaboration, and aligning individual values with the broader vision of the organization.

In conclusion, by starting with clear role definitions and then shifting towards building a cohesive and involved team identity, leaders can create a dynamic and productive work environment. This model not only enhances performance but also nurtures a culture of commitment and excellence.

#### **PCC Robert Gustafson, Diabetes Chair**

As we know, Diabetes is a chronic, metabolic disease that occurs when the body has trouble regulating blood sugar levels. The disease can have detrimental effects on many of the systems in the body including the heart, kidneys, eyes and nerves. The Lions have identified Diabetes as a major issue for us to address. Unfortunately, we also know Diabetes is becoming an epidemic.

#### Is type 2 diabetes genetic?

Type 2 diabetes has a stronger link to family history and lineage than type 1, and studies of twins have shown that genetics play a very strong role in the development of type 2 diabetes. Race can also play a role.

Yet it also depends on environmental factors. Lifestyle also influences the development of type 2 diabetes. Obesity tends to run in families, and families often have similar eating and exercise habits.

If you have a family history of type 2 diabetes, it may be difficult to figure out whether your diabetes is due to lifestyle factors or genetics. Most likely it is due to both. However, don't lose heart! Studies show that it is possible to delay or prevent type 2 diabetes by exercising and losing weight.

What is an example of hunger motivation? Our mission is to facilitate individual and collective action to transform the systems of inequity that create hunger and cause it to persist.

What is an expression about hunger? Some common examples are: "I'm so hungry, I could eat a horse." "I'm so hungry, I could eat an elephant." Or "I'm so hungry, I could eat a whole pizza."

- Extrinsic. Doing an activity to attain or avoid a separate outcome. Chances are, many of the things you do each day are extrinsically motivated. ...
- Intrinsic. An internal drive for success or sense of purpose. ...
- Family. Motivated by the desire to provide for your loved ones.

#### **ENVIRONMENT**

We have all seen the term "Organic" labeling on the foods at the grocery store- mainly in the produce aisles. Just what do those signs really mean? Simply, "organic" means foods are USDA certified as grown and produced following federal guidelines regarding soil quality, animal raising practices, pest and weed control and regular crop rotations. Organic farming is touted to be healthier for your body as well as friendly to our environment. But do we really know which foods we need to buy organic and those that are okay to buy non-organic?

Every year, the Environmental Working Group (EWG) Organization tests over 47 produce items for pesticide residue and publishes their "Dirty Dozen" and the "Clean Fifteen" list. You would be surprised to learn that the top five on the 2024 "dirty dozen list" are strawberries, spinach, kale, blueberries and apples. The top five "clean" produce are asparagus, avocados, cabbage, carrots and honeydew melons. Granted, organic produce can be more expensive and worth spending the extra funds, but even the non-organic foods contain needed nutritional benefits. Luckily there some effective methods to help rid your produce of harmful substances:

- 1. <u>Cold, Clean water soak;</u> immerse your fruits and vegetables, swish gently and soak a moderate amount of time- change water if it becomes "murky"
- 2. <u>Vinegar</u>: good for produce that does not have a skin. Do not rub or scrub to ensure that microorganisms don't get into a broken outer layer. Use 1 part vinegar to 3 parts water
- 3. <u>Pre-mixed solutions</u>: find it in the natural foods section at your grocery- expensive but effective
- 4. <u>Soft bristle brush</u>: good for removing dirt and pesky pesticides on the tough skins of some produce
- 5. <u>Activated charcoal powder:</u> absorbs toxin but not nutrients. Find it online or health food store
- 6. <u>Grapefruit extract</u>: works well for removing bacteria, etc. Available at most health food stores
- 7. <u>Apple Cider Vinegar & Sea Salt</u>: more powerful than regular vinegar- a natural pH balancer. Eat right away because produce will spoil faster.

Even better, grow your own or visit your local organic farm stands...



I sit on the New England Advisory Board to Fidelco. At a recent meeting, I heard a few announcements I think are worth passing along which I will cover in this and a subsequent article.

Most notable to me are the changes being made to the Fidelco campus. During Covid, Fidelco transitioned many administrative jobs to remote work. This was so effective that most administrative offices at Fidelco are now being converted to "dog" areas. The dog trainers have more room for the daily activities with dogs in formal training. There is more room for the puppy raisers and dogs when they have their training sessions. The stated goal is to eliminate as much stress as possible for the dogs in the training environment, allowing the dogs to learn more easily with fewer distractions.
