

This is our logo. This is our brand. It is there for us to use in marketing hats, shirts, scarves, ties, and other apparel. This is the design to use on social media and anywhere you advertise your club events. It is easily downloaded from Lions International with all the details of how and when it can be used. There are a few exceptions. One being road signs. Those may continue in the old design.

Now, are they visible? Maybe you need to trim some bushes or branches out of the way. Does it need the pole straightened or replaced. Sometimes they have become faded due to too much sun. Make sure your meeting information is updated for time, date and place. We want people to find us. Is it in a good location meaning the right road(s). Sometimes moving it some place new sparks interest in new people. Little details can make a big difference in the larger picture.

Vince Giambalvo, Second Vice District Governor & GLT Influence and Control

In a previous issue I discussed Role and Identity. Remember that Role refers is the requirements of your position in the organization. Identity refers to the characteristics that define who you are. Now let's take a brief look at the ideas of Control and Influence.

Control comes from the authority given to you by your Role. People use this authority to get people to follow them. It is more like Telling. If you use only the authority the Role gives you, people will follow you because they have to.

Influence comes from the relationships you create using those qualities that make up your Identity. Using such qualities enables leaders to encourage people to do what needs to be done because they understand the need to do them. It is more like asking. In other words, they will follow you because they want to.

As a leader you will often be in situations where you can use either Influence or Control. Here are some brief guidelines that might assist in determining which one to use.

Control

- In case of an emergency, you may need to get immediate action. For instance, you need to aid after a natural disaster. You might decide to appoint a team to render assistance rather than ask for volunteers.
- When you need to meet a short but important deadline you might assign a task to someone directly.

Influence

- You want to build a team to start a marketing program that will allow the club to gain visibility in the community. You might ask people with relevant skills and interests to step up to the task.
- You need a senior member to act as mentor to a new member. You might use your relationship with the mentor to gain their commitment.

As a leader you will have to use both Influence and Control to get things done. One thing to remember is to use Influence whenever you can and only use Control when you need to. Influence is a more powerful tool to get people engaged in the activities and tasks required for a successful lions Club.



Some Good News on the Childhood Cancer research front!

Little Warrior Foundation's partnership with Beat Childhood Cancer Foundation & Penn State College of Medicine is expanding. This year, they have committed \$350,000 in support of not one, not two, but THREE new Clinical Trials to fight back against Ewing's Sarcoma (and other pediatric solid tumors, too). One of the trials will be a frontline treatment, and two trials will combat relapsed or refractory disease. The relapse trials will be opening soon, and the upfront trial is targeted to begin enrolling in early Q1 2025. This is amazing news since there has not been research in 30 years hopefully there will be more breakthroughs.

Lions International uses statistics from the International Diabetes Federation. What stood out to me from reading that stats below is that half the population is unaware they have diabetes. Consequently, we're going to have a Diabetes Awareness event on Tuesday, December 10th from 5-8pm at the Atkinson Community Center for District 44H Lions and their Communities. More information will be forthcoming but mark the date on your calendar if you're interested in attending.

Diabetes facts and figures show the growing global burden for individuals, families, and countries. The IDF Diabetes Atlas (2021) reports that 10.5% of the adult population (20-79 years) has diabetes, with almost half unaware that they are living with the condition.

By 2045, IDF projections show that 1 in 8 adults, approximately 783 million, will be living with diabetes, an increase of 46%.

Over 90% of people with diabetes have type 2 diabetes, which is driven by socio-economic, demographic, environmental, and genetic factors. The key contributors to the rise in type 2 diabetes include:

- Urbanization
- An ageing population
- Decreasing levels of physical activity
- Increasing overweight and obesity prevalence

However, it is possible to reduce the impact of diabetes by taking preventive measures for type 2 diabetes and providing early diagnosis and proper care for all types of diabetes. These measures can help people living with the condition avoid or delay complications.

And remember, November is National Diabetes month. Treat yourself well. Eat healthy. Exercise and lose some weight if you need to. Diabetes is preventable.

<u>Recycling and Waste Management</u> – Conserve resources and reduce waste to minimize adverse impacts on sustainability.

<u>Environmental Awareness, Education and Advocacy</u> – Raise awareness of the importance of protecting the environment, educate your community members and create positive change. <u>Clean Water & Sanitation</u> – Ensure safe water and adequate sanitation for all, promoting better health outcomes around the world.



GUIDELINES FOR RUNNING A SAFE & EFFICIENT LIONS CLUB

(Note: This in no way criticizes or blames anyone, past or present)

NEW CLUBS, OR CLUBS THAT ARE NOT REGISTERED WITH THE STATE OF NH:

1 Be sure to set up your Club Constitution and By-Laws in accordance with Lions Clubs International. You can obtain this information on the Lions Clubs International Website for Clubs.

Existing Clubs not registered with NH as a Business or Charity should do so as soon as possible. But you cannot use your original date of becoming a club, so use a date prior to completing the Constitution and By-Laws and having the current officers sign the necessary documents.

To Register with the State of New Hampshire, you will need to go on-line into the Corporate Division and electronically fill in the required information. Before doing this, you need to discuss this with your board of directors, as all officers & directors need to be aware that they will be listed in the Articles of Agreement and the preparer will be electronically signing on their behalf. (Sample Attached) Once Approved by the State of NH they will issue a "Certificate of Existence" to enable new clubs to open the club's bank accounts.

NEW CLUBS OBTAIN TAXPAYER IDENTIFICATION NUMBER THROUGH THE IRS

2 If you have not already obtained a Taxpayer Identification Number (EIN), you should do this as soon as possible. (You Can Go On-line and apply or fill out the form and fax) Note: do not use periods or commas etc. Be sure the faxed copy is signed (Sample Attached)

ESTABLISHING LIONS BANK ACCOUNTS

3 **New Clubs** - It is important to keep your charitable funds and administrative funds separate. **RECOMMENDATION TO HAVE TWO SEPARATE ACCOUNTS:**

One for Administrative Receipts & Expenses (Dues, etc.) and one for all Charitable Receipts and Disbursements relating to charitable fundraising, etc.

Clubs that currently have only one account should do one of the following: (A) Set up two accounts, one for Administrative Receipts & Expenses (Dues, etc.) and one for all Charitable Funds received & expenses relating to charitable fundraising.

BANK WILL REQUIRE TAXPER ID #(EIN) & NH CERTIFICATE OF EXISTENCE

Bank Accounts should be established for at least two authorized signers, preferably non related.

(B) Set up specific spreadsheets detailing all Administrative Receipts and Expenses, and Balance; and all Charitable Receipts, Expenses and Balance. *It is imperative to keep concise records and prepare monthly and report all activities by written reports to your Board of Directors MONTHLY, either by direct contact, e-mails, etc. giving a breakdown of all administrative and all charitable receipts and disbursements. The Treasurer should be able to provide information to its Club at any and all times.*

NOTEBOOKS should be kept up-to-date with separation between Charitable & Administrative; Include all Receipts, Deposit slips & details of what deposit represents; events, Disbursements with all billing slips and details; if possible copy all checks written, or keep a copy of letter to charity or individual detailing date, event/cost, amount and check number.

THIS INFORMATION WILL BE NECESSARY WHEN REPORTING YOUR ANNUAL REPORT TO THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE; as well as providing your club with clear/concise records.

4 NH ANNUAL REPORT

Every year an Annual Report (NHCT-12) must be filed with the State of NH on or before November 15 (Fiscal Year July 1 through June 30) These are now done on-line. If you wish a paper form you need to notify the State of NH either via e-mail or telephone call at annualreports@sos.nh.gov or 603-271-8200 You will need to provide the business name, ID number and name and address for them to mail or email to.

5 NH 2025 & EVERY 5 YEARS AFTER NON PROFIT REPORT

Every five years a Non-Profit Report is due to the NH Corporate Division, providing the Business Name; Type, Business ID and State of Incorporation; Current Principal Office Address, Current Mailing Address if different; and New Principal Address and mailing address; Principal Purpose and Officer and Director Information (names, address and titles); There are filing fees for the Annual Reports and Non Profit Report. Existing registered Clubs should have last completed this form in 2020.

6 ANNUAL FILING OF INTERNAL REVENUE TAX FORM 990-N 990EZ OR 990

Many clubs have income of \$50,000.00, or less annually, must electronically file 990-N; other clubs, bringing in \$50,000 or more, must file either form 990EZ or 990. The filing is due no later than November 15, each year (based on the Lions fiscal year of July 1 through June 30).

WHEN NEW OFFICERS TAKE OVER, PROVIDE THEM WITH COPIES OF ALL OF THE ABOVE RECORDS & DOCUMENTS.







