

- **Public Speaking**: Engage in public speaking to share your insights and practice articulation.


#### 10. Stay Adaptable

#### Marie Valliere, First Vice District Governor

Now that we have started the new year, we will be promoting our events more on social media. Before, during, and after. Remember to use the rules of journalism. Who, what, when, where, why, and how. How much, if necessary. Use complete details such as the date should include the day of the week not just the date. Location needs a full address with an actual number. Details make a difference, even the smallest ones. Most projects have a benefit behind it. That's the Why. Lions Charities is too broad and vague. That's where details help. Does it help the hungry? Is it for scholarships? Get the idea? Identify people in the photos. This is a form of recognition, and a lot of newspapers insist on it. All too soon some of those people are gone and others don't remember them or their names. Every photo should have a caption to identify it. It can be brief and to the point. Don't forget a contact number or form of address for the public to reach the club for questions or more information.



#### Vince Giambalvo, Second Vice District Governor & GLT

To begin our discussion of leadership let's go back to some basic concepts and then build on them. A starting place is to distinguish between our Role as leaders and our Identity. Role refers to the position we have taken on and what are the expectations of that Role. For instance, the position of Club President carries some responsibilities. Among these are running meetings, appointing committees, gaining support for club activities, resolving conflict, budgeting, etc.

Identity refers to those individual characteristics that define who you are. Characteristics such as attention to detail, vision, punctuality, empathy, friendliness, etc. are examples of what makes up your Identity.

There is an interesting interplay between these two. In some cases, your Identity can act as a power source in achieving the requirements of your Role. For example, attention to detail helps in making plans, empathy assists with coaching and counselling, punctuality assists in keeping meetings on time.

Sometimes your Identity makes it difficult to perform your Role. For example, someone who is very empathetic might find it difficult to handle discipline, someone who is very detail oriented might find it hard to deal with people who are "Big Picture" oriented, or someone who is very punctual might find it difficult to deal with people who tend to run-on when they speak.

In trying to understand the things that makeup your Identity you might try this exercise. Make a list of the characteristics you think make up your Identity. You may ask people who know you well to see the list. Then give away as many characteristics as you think may not belong on the list. The remaining characteristics help define your Identity. They are those characteristics you couldn't give away if you wanted to.

In future issues we will explore how these relate to being an effective leader both in Lions and life.

#### Bob Bedrosian, Cabinet Secretary

**Cabinet Meeting**: We have just recently returned from our Cabinet Meeting at Camp Pride. It was an exciting and informative meeting. District Governor Peter LaPointe welcomed a great turnout with 24 clubs represented and 133 registered Lions. We shared fellowship and enjoyed a hearty breakfast prepared by the Camp Pride kitchen staff. We heard great reports from Zone Chairs and district organizations and committees; a low-cost window insulation presentation from Jessica Williams of Window Dressers, GAT, International Relations, LCIF, and multi-district reports; a great 50/50 and fabulous raffle baskets – thank you donors. Our next Cabinet Meeting will be on November 10<sup>th</sup> at the Castleton Event Center in Windham. Please gear up and get ready to go!

**Dues**: The first set of District dues bills went out at the beginning of July. There are still some clubs that are outstanding. A second bill will be e-mailed to those clubs at the beginning of September. Please remit promptly.

**Visitations**: We have heard from several clubs looking to set up a visit from the District Governor to either a meeting or event/project. Please send an e-mail to <a href="mailto:bbedrosian@comcast.net">bbedrosian@comcast.net</a> to schedule a visit. DG Peter would love to meet you and learn what your club is up to.

**Reporting**: Every club should be reporting all their service activities online at the Lions Portal. This includes donations, fundraising, meetings, projects, etc. – all in service to our communities. To effectively tell our story, measure our impact, and grow membership, it's critical that all clubs report service. Every activity that we participate in is important in our journey of service. Please contact anyone on the cabinet if you need help using the Portal to report service.

**District Goals**: Lions, it's all about service. District Governor Peter has outlined goals for the district; yet as clubs and as individuals we all play a part in the reaching these goals. • Increase membership by a minimum of 167 new members with net growth of at least 82. Last year with 1246 members in District 44H, we provided 275,772 hours of service. Simple math, with 167 new, excited Lions we could service at least 37,000 more people in our communities. People need our help. • We need to do a better job of training new leaders by increasing individual club officers training by 10%; a goal to increase the number of clubs participating in training by 10%; all Lions can use Learn (LCI online learning modules), and can attend district/multi-district trainings. • Report service so that 100% of clubs are reporting their service activities in the Portal. • Support LCIF, our charitable arm, with at least \$38,000 in donations and have all of our clubs make a donation of at least \$10 per member. Bottom line, run your service projects, report them and offer the Lion opportunity and the goals should be met. Service to humanity is the best work of life.

#### Gail Dacey, Global Membership Leader (GMT)

We are going to be working very hard on increasing and retaining members this year. The GMA approach really works. If you need any help with that please let me know.

Our push is 1.5 million members by June 2027. We are going to have some incentives for your club and individual members. Our theme along with 44N's is Staying Alive 1.5. See the flyer in the "District Org Happenings" section of this newsletter with the incentives explained for individuals. It will be a friendly competition between the two districts. Also PCC Christine Greenwood Smart will be holding a zoom meeting the first Wednesday of the month at 7:00 for an hour on membership, service or leadership that your club members are welcome to attend. Please share this with your members.

The district is working on club incentives rewarding clubs for new members. Stay tuned for updates.



Hold a membership drive. Wear your Lions gear any time you hold a service project because every project is a membership opportunity. Please orient new members and mentor them. Get them involved as soon as possible. Find out what their interests are and listen to any new ideas they might have.

Retention is just as important as adding new members. Check up on members you haven't seen in a while. Give them a simple job to do to make them feel needed.

Please let me know if there is anything I can do for you.


As we begin our year, I'm sure there are many service projects underway. Share your projects in the district newsletter and when you receive it, be sure to read what other clubs are doing. There

#### PCC Robert Gustafson, Diabetes Chair

As I said in my last report, Diabetes is a chronic, metabolic disease that occurs when the body has trouble regulating blood sugar levels. The disease can have detrimental effects on many of the systems in the body including the heart, kidneys, eyes and nerves. The Lions have identified Diabetes as a major issue for us to address. We know Diabetes is becoming an epidemic.

So, let's start with drinks. What are the worst three drinks to drink for Diabetics? I remember drinking Mountain Dew when I was a kid. Great drink for a Diabetic? Not so much. It turns out the worst three drinks to drink are Soda with sugar, Energy drinks that contain sugar and fruit juices. Yikes. How about Sugar Free Canada Dry? It has Aspartame, a sugar substitute. Is it safe?

Well, aspartame has NOT been found to pose a risk to people with diabetes if used in moderation. Why? Aspartame has zero grams of sugar and won't spike insulin levels after it's consumed. However, studies in mice have shown that Aspartame affects gut bacteria in ways that could lead to insulin resistance, especially with frequent and repeated use. Thus, always drink in moderation. Or, just drink Water! There's nothing like a cold glass of Water after a long walk.







- Service of any sort should be reported at least monthly. Many clubs report activities
  right after they happen. Service comes in 4 categories: service activities, meetings,
  fundraisers, and donations -- report it all so you accurately reflect what your club is

- Enter the activity title, select activity type, click Next
- Fill in the required fields, click Save (bottom of screen). Note that required fields change depending on the activity type, and are indicated with a red dot at the required fields.
- Edit the activity, click Report Complete, click Save. Verify that status is Reported (top of screen). Note that only the Club President, Secretary, or Club Admin can perform this final step which completes the report and makes it available to Lions International.



#### **Club Excellence Award Changes**



**Officers be informed**... the criteria for the Club Excellence Award has changed for 2024-2025. Take a look at the new application and plan for your club's success. Click here for link to the application.

#### Two significant changes include:

- A net growth of 2 members or 10% or more members (whichever is greater), or charter a new club. For example, a club with 40 members on 7/1/24 needs to grow by 10%; a net growth of 4 or more, or charter a new club.
- LCIF contribution of an amount greater than or equal to the club's membership total multiplied by \$10. For example, a club with 44 members on 6/30/25 needs to make an LCIF donation of \$440 (44 members x \$10) or more in order to qualify for the Club Excellence Award.

#### EYEGLASS RECYCLING GUIDELINES

This is divided into two sections: What the sending clubs should attempt to check and what the Hampton Area Lions will check

#### Sending clubs:

Discard cases, wrappings from glasses, and/or any safety straps attached to glasses, except those attached to baby glasses (usually rubber and easy to spot). Discard glasses with solid neck support and eyeglass lenses connected by Magnets.

Glasses must be complete - No missing lenses, ear pieces, or nose pads.

(Note - Forward new/demo frames with no lenses, but pack and mark them)

Discard unusable glasses that have all plastic frames. Mark and pack separately those glasses with any metal frames or components and send to Hampton.

#### Hampton Area Lions:

Sort and pack glasses:

Check that glasses are complete

Lenses may not be cracked, scratched, or deteriorating. If glasses are dirty, clean to check if lenses are satisfactory.

Ear pieces or frames must not be discolored or show signs of having been chewed.

Lens area of plastic glasses must not show a forward bend or flat lens area - discard.

Safety glasses with side protectors should be set aside and checked to see if side protectors can be removed without damaging glasses.

Pack complete and satisfactory glasses and send to the Virginia Eyeglass Recycling Center. (Pack separately new/demo frames with no lenses)

Discard unusable glasses with plastic frames. Save unusable glasses with metal components. Remove lenses and pack and ship metal components send to the Virginia Eyeglass Recycling Center

When in doubt as to whether or not glasses are satisfactory, ask yourself - would you want to use these glasses?

In addition, please donate used eyeglass cases to Savers in Nashua and Manchester. Also, it costs an average of \$.08 (8 cents) per eyeglass pair to ship – consider a donation to the Hampton Area Lions Club to help defray shipping expenses.




