

HENRIETTA "HON" ELIZABETH MOORE

Henrietta "Hon" Elizabeth Moore, 100, of Funkstown, Md., passed away on Monday, July 10, 2017, at her home. Born June 20, 1917, in Danville, Pa., she was the daughter of the late John Gearhart and Jennie (Brent) Gearhart.



Lioness Hon received a **Melvin Jones Fellowship** from the club.

Hon's husband, John Harrison Moore to whom she was married for 64 years, now deceased, was a Melvin Jones Fellow and long-time member of the Hagerstown Lions Club for whom the club's annual Pancake Day is named. He traditionally sold over 1,000 pancake tickets each year.

Lioness Hon received a Proclamation of Recognition from the City of Hagerstown for 100 years of longevity and her service to the community.

Born Aug. 20, 1927, in Brentwood, Md., he was the son of Jack Bradford and Minnie Pearl (Campbell) Welch, who preceded him in death. Jack was a veteran, serving in the Merchant Marine during World War II and in the U.S. Army. He was a self-

Jack was a member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Funkstown, Md., serving as longtime treasurer and council member. He was a charter member and past president of the Funkstown Lions Club with **60 years of perfect attendance**, served as District 22-W cabinet treasurer and was a recipient of the **Melvin Jones Fellowship**.

So let's examine every stage of one's Lionistic career and how I can help. **The first stage is becoming a new member**. When I became a new member 43 years ago, I suddenly felt as if I had left my hometown and become a man of the world. This year, I want every member to download our new mobile app. This will connect all our members on one global platform.

The next stage is beginning to serve. As a member of the Batala Smile Lions Club in Punjab, India, I was proud of how the community began to respect me. This respect depended on the number of people I served and how many people were aware of this service. We now have a new Global Service Team. Your District GST leader will identify projects that serve the maximum number of people per dollar and per hour. They will also train Lions on how to convert a normal project into a Legacy Project via Lions branding and public relations.

The **third stage is aspiring for leadership.** While I enjoyed rising up the Lions' ladder, I sometimes wished that our leaders focused more on work than on long speeches. A new awards system will incentivize the efforts of Lion leaders in the right direction. We plan to reward retention of members, hence keeping the focus on you—our existing members. New awards will also be given for involving over half the club in service and for creating the most Legacy projects.

As a global leader of Lionism, I want to keep every Lion connected to Lionism. Our new Welcome Home program is an international online club for members unable to attend club meetings. Meetings and fee payments are conducted entirely online.

The last stage is now. I want to give every Lion the same goal for the next 12 months. My dream is that every Lion will serve 10 people each month. If this happens, we will serve 170 million people this year— a big increase from our current level of 100 million and a big step toward our goal of serving 200 million annually by 2020. This is the focus of all my meetings around the world.

The District clubs performed 4000 service activities with 110,000 hours of service to over 43,000 people.


IPID Richard Liebno received a crystal lion statue for his service as International Director for the past two years.

DISTRICT NEWS LEGACY TREES OF MARYLAND Submitted by: Environmental Chairperson Francis "Champ" Zumbrun

"There is hope for a tree, if it be cut down, that it will sprout again, and that the tender branch thereof will not cease." Job 14:7

Imagine this ... special forestry board and Lions' Club events are conducted on City, County, State, and Federal public lands where the Wye Oak, the Washington Elm, and the Liberty tree grow side by side. Nearby are two tall flagpoles with one containing the U.S. Flag and Maryland State Flag gently waving in a soft breeze. Music is playing! It is a sunny, happy day, families and children are having fun nearby – picnicking and fishing.

Preserving these historic trees, which are part of our state's heritage, can be accomplished by regenerating the trees of historic significance. This can be done by promoting the value and benefits of trees to present and future generations through educating and inspiring youth with stories of their connection to heritage legacy trees.

<u>Liberty Tree:</u> Tree seedlings originate from a scion (graft) of the original Maryland historic Liberty Tree, a tulip popular that stood at a site at present day St. John's College in Annapolis. Officials nurture the seedlings at John S. Ayton State Tree Nursery.

Under this tree, American revolutionaries advocated independence from Great Britain during the Stamp Act of 1765. Liberty trees were gathering places for Sons of Liberty groups throughout the American colonies. Two members that gathered under the Liberty Tree from the Annapolis chapter of the Sons of Liberty became signers of the Declaration of Independence. When they could, British troops chopped down these symbols of independence.

The tree stood silent witness from several blocks away when George Washington resigned his military commission as commander in chief the Continental Army on December 23, 1783 at the Annapolis State House. In 1999, at an estimated 400 years of age, the last of the surviving liberty trees in the original 13 colonies died from damage caused by Hurricane Floyd. This tulip tree was at one time the largest known of its species in the United States.

<u>Wye Oak:</u> Tree Nursery personnel at the John S. Ayton State Tree Nursery collect and propagate fruit from offspring of the original Wye Oak, Maryland's official state tree. The Wye Oak, once the largest know white oak of its kind, grew at Wye Mills, Maryland. On June 6, 2002, a severe thunderstorm brought down this iconic tree at the estimated age of more than 450 years. Since 1909, the Wye Oak captured the imagination of Maryland's First state Forester, Fred W. Besley, who inspired by the tree's immense size, started a champion big tree contest in Maryland. This program was the first of its kind and later adopted across the country.

George Washington Elm Tree: At Garrett Memorial Hospital in Oakland, Maryland, foresters collect root shoots generated from a descendant of the Washington Elm Tree that once grew at Cambridge, Massachusetts. Legend states that on July 3, 1775, during the American Revolutionary War, General George Washington, under the shade of this elm tree, reviewed his troops after taking command of America's first army. In 1923, the Cambridge Washington Elm succumbed to decay, old age, and bitter storms. Happily, before this iconic elm died, individuals grew new trees from scions, root shoots, and seed collected from the original tree. In 1932, officials planted descendants of the original Washington Elm tree all across the country to celebrate the 200th birthday of George Washington.

NOTES FROM THE LIONS VISION RESEARCH FOUNDATION (LVRF)

Lion Bob Johnson – District 22-W LVRF Chair

First, I would like to congratulate all of for your outstanding support of the LVRF during the past Lion's year. As of this writing the Lions of District 22-W donated \$77,558.50 to LVRF in 2016-2017. As far as I know, this is an all-time high for our district.

It is important to remember that the LVRF is a Multiple District 22 program and it depends on our donations to fund its operations. With that though in mind, 2017-2018 District 22-W Governor Susan Bonura is continuing to stress the importance of our supporting LVRF. As a part of this emphasis she has added a Vision Days collection (see below) event to the criteria for the Club Excellence award (\$100 minimum collection / donation). She has also created the Lions Vision Research Foundation (LVRF) Award as a means of recognizing clubs that excel in their support of the LVRF. The criteria for this award are as follows:

- The club donates \$26.00 per member, or more, to LVRF. This can include club donations, Vision Days collections, memorials, 120 pins, Aim for Sight support or individual donations.
- The club assigns a designated LOVRNET representative to assist the Sustainability Committee.
- 3. At least one club member participates in LOVRNET as a Patient Interviewer.
- At least one club member participates in LOVRNET as a Direct Services Volunteer.
- At least one club member attends the Vision Conservation Event (Combined WhiteCane/LVRF Vision Days Program) on March 31, 2018.
- 6. The club contributes to the Low Vision Fellow Endowment Fund.
- 7. The club holds a Vision Days collection event.

INTERNET SAFETY TIPS

- 1) Do not talk to anyone who calls or e-mails you claiming they are from Microsoft, Banks, Credit Card Companies, the Government, etc. If you get one of these calls, hang up and call your bank, credit card company, etc. using the phone number on your bill, credit card or statement and ask if your account is OK. Do not look up the phone numbers on the internet. Most of the results are frauds and it is very difficult to determine which ones are legit.
- 2) Do not respond or comply with any pop up on your computer that tells you to call a phone number to fix your computer. These are scams. These pop up messages will try and scare you with warnings, alarm sounds, etc.
- 3) Do not click a link in any email or open an attachment you are not sure of its intention or origination. Even if it seems to be from a friend does not guarantee it is not a scam that may have been sent out by an infection on their computer.

Almost all non-corporate email is totally unencrypted in transit and the message content and headers (addressees) can be intercepted in their travel over the Net. These intercepted messages are a wealth of information for nefarious types, as they connect your source email address with recipients who would normally receive email from you, making them likely phishing victims. The email may also expose information about the Lions position, such as a treasurer or secretary.

The safest way to send email to more than one address is to use bcc: or blind copy. All recipients will receive your message but your message header will only contain your source address and a single destination address. Don't worry, a message will be sent even if it doesn't contain a to: or cc: email address. If it's being sent to a group of Lions, make the message subject clear that a group will be receiving the message so it doesn't get sent along multiple times. There will be some who complain that they didn't know who else was receiving the message but it's a small price to pay for the prevention it facilitates. This policy would, of course, have to be publicized.



Please **DO NOT** respond to any email, Lions related or not, that requests that you send funds to anyone. You can identify these bogus emails by **looking at the email address** of the sender. It usually contains a name that you will recognize, but the email **address does not match** that person. Another **clue is the wording** that is used which typically contains misspelled words or incorrect grammar. **Please be cautious and do not respond to any suspicious emails.** You can easily verify the request by calling the person directly by phone.

DATA BACKUP

The most important thing you can do to protect your data is to have a current system backup. If you get infected, this can be the only protection that you will not lose valuable data. This can include documents, spreadsheets, photo's, music, emails, contact/address lists, banking info, etc...
