Our Region III Chair is John Aulls and our Region III Zone Chairs are Betsy Estilow, Richard Pickett and Harry Swope. Our Region IV Chair is Richard Crunkilton and our Region IV Zone Chairs are Mike Garner, Floyd Freyman and Myron Horn.

There are some changes to the Awards section of the roster book including service, donations and two new awards for LVRF and LCIF. There are also changes to the Club Excellence Award including the number of members required to attend certain meetings and events and the public collection of funds for LVRF and KeraLink Mid-Atlantic (formerly the Medical Eye Bank of Maryland). My service goal for the year are that each club completes one project in each of the five service areas: Environment, Hunger, Vision, Pediatric Cancer and Diabetes. LCI is no longer emphasizing youth as a separate service area; youth are, and should be, involved in all five project areas as partners with Lions. Our new Global Service Team Coordinator is PCS Susan Cox. We are all waiting anxiously for more direction from Lions Clubs International regarding the duties and responsibilities of the Global Service Team

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My membership goals are to increase membership by a net of 19 members based upon membership growth in our district for the last five years. We are working to increase the number of women members and to stop the loss of members who join and then leave in the first two years of membership. The GMT and the entire membership team is working to start two new clubs. The GMT is led by Martin Bonura with Membership Specialists FVDG Gerry Beachy, PCS Susan Cox, PDG Bob Mitchell, PDG Andy DeMario, PDG John Hopkins, Region Chair Sandy Moore and Family and Women's Specialist Nadja Muchow.

My leadership goals include the provision of many training opportunities for Lions throughout the year. This year we are offering a make-up training in August for any club president, secretary, treasurer or membership chairman who did not have the opportunity to attend training in June. Look for training articles in all issues of our district newsletter. Our GLT is led by PDG Steve Finger with Leadership Specialists SVDG Lenny Gares, Allan Chrest, Region Chair Lois Conrad and PDG Kent Eitemiller.

My financial goals for our foundations and main charities are \$10,000.00 for the Lions Youth Foundation (LYF); \$35,000.00 for the Lions Vision Research Foundation (LVRF); \$40,000.00 for the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF); \$8,000 for the District 22W Foundation; \$15,000.00 for KeraLink Mid-Atlantic (formerly the Medical Eye Bank of Maryland) and \$30,000.00 for Leader Dogs for the Blind.

International President Aggarwal's theme is *We Serve*. According to Dr. Aggarwal, "Service to others defines who we are. It is our very reason to exist as a global organization. Our motto puts it in terms others can easily understand. Our single-minded purpose is and has been to provide service to those in need. Our motto is timeless and it is as relevant today as it was in 1917. It will inspire us into our next century of service."

Thank you all very much for allowing me to serve as your District Governor. I am looking forward to working with you to continue our strong legacy of service.

ROBERT CRUM "BOB" FRY

Robert Crum "Bob" Fry, died June 5 at HeartFields Assisted Living in Frederick of complications of diabetes and dementia. Born July 5,

1932 near Adamstown, he was the son of Howard Clifton Fry and Charlotte Ellen (Crum) Fry. He was married for 50 years to Ann Myra (Rothenhoefer) Fry, who predeceased him in 2007.

Mr. Fry operated a dairy farm on Hollow Road near Middletown from 1958 to 1995 and continued to live on the farm until moving to HeartFields in 2015.He is survived by two sons, Robert Crum Fry, Jr. of Hockessin DE and W. Brian Fry of Frederick, two grand-daughters, Rebecca Catherine Smith (Quint) of Colorado Springs CO and Rachel Christine Fry of Arlington VA, and several nieces and nephews.

Mr. Fry was a 1951 graduate of Frederick High School. In his early adulthood, he played trumpet in the Yellow Springs Band. He was an active member of the Middletown Lions Club and the Frederick County Promenaders Square Dance Club until his health declined.

LION PAUL J. STEIN, JR.

It was with sadness that we learned at Lion Paul Stein, Jr., age 90 years, a club member for more than 45 years, passed away on May 28, 2017. He was sponsored by Lion Ken May. We know that Lion Paul had been dealing with several medi-



cal issues, and he approached those with the attitude of adapting as best as he could. He always had a smile to give. Among Lion Paul's notable achievements were being named LaVale Lion of the Year in 1977. He went through the leadership chairs to become Club President in 1978-1979. The club bestowed the Melvin Jones Fellow recognition on Lion Paul on January 13, 2005.

Although Lion Paul volunteered and chaired many club committees, including property maintenance, visitation, finance and budget, membership and retention, public affairs, and chicken barbecue it is without a doubt that his greatest Lions Club achievement was leading the way in getting LaVale District park and Memorial Lions Field from a vision of what Lions could do to that of becoming reality. Arguably most impactful to our community was Paul's efforts serving as LaVale coordinator for Project Open Space. Because of his efforts, the land for LaVale Library and the LaVale Swim Club pavilion was secured and two community parks established: LaVale Park, consisting of four lighted tennis courts, basketball courts and walking trails; and Lions Park, with two more tennis courts, playgrounds, ball diamonds, and soccer and football fields. Paul Stein oversaw construction and maintenance of the parks getting Program Open Space funds from government agencies to build and continue their maintenance today. Paul retired from Walter N. Yoder and Son where he was a mechanical supervisor and estimator, and helped the company establish a subsidiary company, RiteWay, specializing in an asbestos abatement

A funeral service was conducted at the funeral home on Saturday, June 3, 2017 at 12:00 pm. A private interment was held in Restlawn Memorial Gardens. He was a 1953 graduate of Williamsport High School, Williamsport, Md. Tom worked as a farmer, route truck driver for Hershey Ice Cream for 15 years, and then started his appraisal career with First Federal Savings & Loan until 1986, when he became an independent fee appraiser with William G. Bowen Inc. He obtained the SRA designation from the Appraisal Institute in 1990 and was with William G. Bowen Inc. until 2013. He was a member of St. James Brethren Church since 1951 and served in numerous capacities. He was a member of District 12 Ruritan Club in the 80's and lived in St. James for 33 years.

Later he and Harriette moved to the Paramount area, and Tom joined the Longmeadow Lions Club where he was president from 2007-2008, received the Melvin Jones Fellowship, was voted Lion of the Year in 2010-2011, and chaired many successful fundraisers for the club. At present, he served in the Office of Director and despite illness attended meetings regularly adding his friendship and wonderful wit.

Tom loved God, country, children, grandchildren, farms, cows and Hershey's ice cream. Tom is survived by his wife, Harriette Irene Myers Bowers, whom he married Feb. 12, 1956; son, Randal J. Bowers and his wife, Kristal, of Boonsboro, Md., daughter, Robin M. Deadrick and her husband, Douglas, of Salem, N.H., son, Charles T. Bowers Jr. of Washington, D.C..

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ONE HELPING OF COMMUNITY SERVICE AND A SIDE OF LEADERSHIP: THE LAVALE LIONS CLUB SCHOLARSHIP AT FROST-BURG STATE UNIVERSITY Submitted by: PDG Steven Finger

The LaVale Lions Club's chicken barbeque fundraisers are popular events in Allegany County, with people from all over flocking to Lions Field in LaVale for chicken prepared in the Lions' secret marinade. Each year, the Lions serve about 40,000 chicken meals. Funds raised through those barbeques directly support the Lions Club's charitable mission in Allegany County. A new Lions initiative will also help two county residents study at Frostburg State University each year.

The new LaVale Lions Club Scholarship, established through the FSU Foundation, Inc., will provide two awards per year of \$1,500 each. Allegany County residents enrolled at FSU with junior status and a 3.0-plus GPA are eligible to apply for the award. The first two scholarships will be awarded to students for the fall semester of 2017.

LaVale Lions Club First Vice President Michael Wallinger, professor emeritus of Communication Studies at FSU, said the Frostburg scholarship was a good fit for the Lions, following on the club's existing scholarships to Allegany College of Maryland. "It makes eminent sense to me, given our traditions of service, of service to youth and our roots in the community, to give a significant scholarship to an institution that is increasingly rooted in the community," said Wallinger.

In keeping with the Lions Club's mission of service, applicants must provide a written statement that demonstrates a significant role in community service and a record of leadership activity, as well as the intent to continue service and leadership as an FSU student. Through those award criteria, the scholarship supports students seeking to be engaged leaders who actively serve their communities.

"That was one of the essential requirements," Wallinger said. "It fits perfectly with the Lions Club purpose. Our

motto is, 'We serve.' We are a service organization – period. Every dollar we earn in fundraising goes right back into the community."

Many Frostburg students choose to serve their community, and FSU helps them find opportunities for service and with student organizations often choose local charitable groups or projects to support. Students can also join FSU's Lions Campus Club.

Through programs like the Sloop Institute for Excellence in Leadership, the leadership studies minor and others, FSU students have numerous opportunities to develop as leaders.

The LaVale Lions Club has served the youth, elderly and less fortunate in the LaVale area of Allegany County since it was chartered in 1955. The Lions have built parks and athletic facilities, loaned convalescent equipment, sponsored youth activities, provided vision screenings and collected eyeglasses and hearing aids to be recycled for those in need, all at no cost to the community. They partner with local elementary schools to provide clothing shopping sprees and sponsor an American Heritage Essay Contest at local schools.

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SAFETY FIRST

With the change of the calendar from June to July, the change of the season of spring to summer, the change of the Lions year from 2016-2017 to 2017-2018, and the Change of LCI to a new Century, our thoughts turn to our many fund-raising projects and service projects we have planned for the outdoors. It does not matter if they are carnival activities, sporting events, summer camps, fishing derbies, or car washes, they all have one thing in common. We want them to proceed without incident so that nobody gets hurt. That is why every event should be planned with one thing in mind, SAFETY FIRST.

Here's how easily something can happen. Several years ago, at our French Fry Stand at the carnival. I was working with a fellow lion to cut the potatoes. We were very busy, so he was loading potatoes and I was pulling down on the handle that cuts them. Our timing was just a little bit off, and I went a little early. I just nipped his finger as he pulled out. Fortunately, he was not injured. But at our next meeting, I conducted a classic "ALERT minute" as I demonstrated the proper way to bandage a blooded and broken finger. He hammed it up with loud moans of pain and cries that I tried to kill him.

LCI has a couple of downloadable forms that are ideal checklists for your pre-event planning. Go to the LCI site and conduct a search for "Lions Club Self-Inspection Checklist" and "Lions CREW at Work Safety First". I recommend that these be printed, completed, and filed with your club's paperwork.

Here are just a few things you should be thinking about and looking for as you complete your pre-event inspection:

- Have you completed the proper permits and obtained insurance?
- Do you have the proper equipment? Sharp knives, Sturdy Workstation, No missing parts
- Is your electrical equipment safe? No frayed cords, No potential water hazards
- Do you have well-stocked first aid kit nearby?
- Are your workers wearing the appropriate safety gear? Hard hats, goggles, gloves, shoes.
- Is the area well-lit with safety barriers where needed?
- Do you have the appropriate signage?
- Look for these hazards: Tripping, Electrical, Chemicals, and Sharps.

Inevitably, sometimes S@#* happens. For instance, I heard about the Lion that fell off a ramp getting food

out of a refrigerated truck. He ended up requiring knee surgery. When these things do happen, remember these three priorities:

- Provide the necessary first aid, transport for further medical care, if necessary.
- Report the incident to LCI and the insurance company.
- Report the incident to DG and myself so others can learn from your mistakes.

Every club should have a safety officer whose job is to make sure these safety inspections are completed. The District has combined ALERT and Safety into one position. Your club can also. Remember, SAFE-TY FIRST. The incident you prevent may have involved you!

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BROOKE'S HOUSE Submitted by Lion Jack Byers

Our guest speaker for the Hagerstown Lions Club on Tuesday, June 13th, was Kevin Simmers who brought us up-to date on the construction progress of Brooke's House, an addiction recovery house for women.

Kevin's account of his daughter's typical teen-age revolt against parental authority and subsequent dependence on substance abuse was most difficult to listen to. During his presentation, I found it most difficult to keep a dry eye and had trouble trying to keep focused and record the necessary notes for this article. It is almost impossible to comprehend the road blocks and red tape that exist from both law enforcement, the insurance industry and medical health sources which form an almost impenetrable barrier to seeking and receiving adequate treatment for persons suffering from drug addiction

Kevin chronicled the various instances when Brooke was close to recovery, only to relapse time and time again. Often admittance to a medical facility would be on a voluntary basis only and Kevin and his wife would not be able to have her forcibly admitted. When leaving a rehab facility prematurely, she would then be denied reentry to the program.

It is difficult to understand how the family was able to weather the continuous highs and lows in Brooke's physical and mental condition and retain any semblance of sanity. It was Brooke's wish that someday a facility be made available where other women such as herself could go and recover from their addiction. To fulfill this wish, Kevin and his wife envisioned such a home in Hagerstown. Consisting of 8 bedrooms, with a capacity of 16 occupants, the house has proceeded from the conceptual stage to an actual facility in the design stage. When built, Brooke's House will offer a transitional sober living home for adult women in the early stages of substance abuse recovery in Washington County, Maryland. While a considerable amount of money has been raised through donations, much more is needed, and additional contributions are sorely needed.

Our guest speaker on Tuesday, June 6th, was Erin Anderson, Communications Manager for the City of Hagerstown and former WHAG-TV Assignment Editor and Reporter.

Erin first brought us up to-date on the sharp increase in the use of the spice which is presently receiving much coverage in the local news media. Spice is not a single drug, but a range of laboratory made chemicals that mimic the effects of tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), the main psychoactive component of cannabis. Much cheaper than heroin, it is readily available to lower income earners and as such its use is more prevalent in poverty prone areas of the community.

She next addressed the Hagerstown Cultural Trail which connects the downtown Arts and Entertainment District with the City Park. Points of interest along the trail include: (1) a photo gallery representative of life in Hagerstown, (2) a metal sculpture at the Herald-Mail Plaza (3) a controversial Mural of Unusual Size, (4) a Whimsical Garden, which will include a Butterfly Garden, (5) decorative screens that evoke memories of railyard switches, (6) another photo gallery, (7) a Community Art Exhibit, and (8) a massive hand carved granite sculpture produced by Richard Deutsch. Lions Clubs in District 22W (Carroll, Frederick, Washington, Allegany and Garret Counties) recently made financial donations to KeraLink International's MidAtlantic division at banquets held in Garrett County, Frederick County and Carroll County. The mission of KeraLink is to reverse corneal blindness globally through transplantation. The cornea is the transparent outside surface of the eye which covers the iris and the pupil and lets in light enabling a person to see.

Originally founded in 1962 as the Medical Eye Bank of Maryland, KeraLink was previously known as TBI/Tissue Banks International. TBI established the International Federation of Eye Banks (IFEB) in 1985. In 2015 TBI/Tissue Banks International divested its musculoskeletal operations to focus exclusively on corneal blindness. In 2016 TBI/Tissue Banks International became KeraLink International.

The name KeraLink is short for "Kera" which suggests the cornea and "Link" which identifies the collaboration and partnerships with donor families, surgeons, researchers, academic centers, organ procurement organizations, other eye banks, patients and financial benefactors such as Lions Clubs.

Pauline Rosier, President of the South Carroll Lioness Lions Club, presented a \$150.00 donation to KeraLink at the annual White Cane Banquet held on Saturday, May 20 at the Terra Rubra Lions Club building in Keymar, Maryland. A total of \$17,765.14 was donated by the clubs in District 22W. The keynote speaker was Laura Kline, Director of Ocular Programs KeraLink Mid-Atlantic. Past donations have been used for equipment purchases and current donations will be used for professional development programs to enhance the skills of those managing the program.
