As we complete the first six months of this Lions year, I would like to remind clubs to strive to achieve the Club Excellence Award. Complete details can be found on pages 114 and 115 of the roster book. Some of the requirements include increasing membership: *The club will conduct a Friendship Night or new member event to introduce prospective new members to Lionism. The club must achieve a net gain of TWO new members for the year based on the members on record starting July 1, 2017 and ending June 30, 2018.*

Other requirements include events designed to introduce the public to Lionism and to raise needed funds: The club holds a Vision Days event and contributes \$100 or more to the Lions Vision Research Foundation (LVRF). The club holds a White Cane event and contributes \$100 or more to the KeraLink Mid-Atlantic. If your club has not yet completed these projects, there is still time to plan these events in the spring.

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Another requirement is attendance at the Vision Conservation Event in March: At least one club member attends the Vision Conservation Event (Combined White Cane/LVRF Vision Days Program) on March 31, 2018. Look for the details on this event in the near future in your Weekly Correspondence and in the District Newsletter.

As of November 27, we have added 66 new members and dropped 94 for a net loss of 28. While we continue to make great strides in adding new members, we are taking giant steps backwards by dropping more than we have gained. Does your club have a membership chairman? Does your club have a membership plan? If you do, work hard to achieve the goals set by the plan. This is the time of year when we are thankful for all our many blessings. It is also a time where gift giving is important. As Lions, **WE SERVE** all year by giving gifts of sight to those needing new eyeglasses, food for the hungry, vision screenings to detect eye problems in pre-school kids, scholarships for high school graduates, and donations to many other organizations including LCIF.

One of the best gifts we can give is sending a diabetic kid to Lions Camp Merrick. Ask around, and you will soon discover just how many diabetic kids we now have in our communities. The Lions Clubs in District 22W have scholarships for kids to go to diabetic camp, costing the child nothing, but giving the child a chance to spend a week with other kids just like themselves. My daughter, Jenny is a nurse during the summer at Camp Merrick and my grandson, Matthew has been a camper for many years and is now a camp counselor. He can tell you what the camp meant to him. You see, Matthew was diagnosed as a type I diabetic when he was 3 years old. Even having a nurse for a mother didn't help him in school when the other "normal" children avoided him for fear of "catching" Matthew's diabetes. Jenny reluctantly sent him to camp and discovered it was good for her to take a break from his diabetes, and it was good for Matthew to learn to take care of himself. Being with other diabetics his own age showed him he was not alone with this disease. Why do we send diabetics to Camp Merrick? Did you know that diabetes is a major cause of blindness? Keeping the disease under control helps to prevent blindness, fulfilling our task given to us by Helen Keller asking Lions to be Knights of the Blind. So, ask around, and you will be amazed at how many diabetic kids you have in your community. Ask one to go to Camp Merrick, then contact Lion Donna Jackman for possible funding to allow the kid to go to camp. You will feel better for helping a diabetic cope with such an insidious disease.

I have been talking a great deal about Lions membership. Keeping it brief, I encourage you to find a new member for your club. **Just Ask One** is a message from LCI. Sometimes, there is a good Lion out there that just needs to be asked to join your club. Just maybe, the new Lion could be set on fire with our motto **WE SERVE** and step into new leadership positions in your club. It may take a bit of encouragement, but we all know there are good members out there that just need to be asked to be a Lion.





LVRF - SERVING THE LOW VISION COMMUNITY

One of the primary goals of the Multiple District 22 *Lions Vision Research Foundation* (LVRF) is to help people who suffer from low vision. We are actively pursuing this goal through a number of programs which include:

- The Lions Low vision Center at the Wilmer Eye Institute (Johns Hopkins University)
- Funding of the Lions Vision Rehabilitation Fellowship at the Wilmer
- The MD-22 LOVERNET program

The goal of these programs is to minimize the disability caused by low vision and blindness to the greatest extent possible. While we have had notable success with these efforts it is currently estimated that only 20% of those suffering from low vision are currently seeking and / or receiving rehabilitation services at this time. One of the goals of our LOVERNET project is to significantly increase the percentage of people receiving such service. Individual Lions can help us achieve this goal through you support of LVRF and by helping to provide outreach within your own communities.

What is Low Vision?

In the most basic sense low vision simply means that even with regular glasses, contact lenses, medicine, or surgery, people find everyday tasks difficult to do. For people with low vision everyday activities such as reading the mail, shopping, cooking, seeing the TV, and writing can seem challenging.

A more technical definition of low vision Low vision specifies a visual acuity of 20/50 or worse in the better eye while wearing glasses or contact lenses and/or blind spots or loss of peripheral vision that interferes with the performance of everyday activities that cannot be improved by glasses, surgery or medication. It is interesting to note that the exact level of acuity associated with "low vision" varies from as low as 20/40 to as high as 20/70 depending on what group / government agency is making the determination.

- Diabetic retinopathy
- Glaucoma
- Macular degeneration

To a large degree all of these causes are can be age related so as the population ages we can expect low vision to become a more and more of an issue for our society. It is currently estimated that over 5,000,000 people within the United States suffer from low vision. Using the 20% service number noted above that means that over 4,000,000 people are not receiving needed vision help at this time.

What can be done?

By definition low vision cannot be improved by glasses, surgery or medication. However, that does not mean that those who suffer from low vision cannot be helped. Among the things that can be done to assist those with low vision are to:

- Help them learn how to make the optimum use of what vision they have;
- Make them more aware of the vision aides that are available and help them to select those that will help them the most;
- Help them to develop new skills that will foster their independence; and
- Assist them in making changes in their home / office environmental that will allow them to more fully function.

Learning more about Low Vision Services

Over the next several months I will be addressing some of the programs that LVRF is providing and further explore how we, as individual Lions, can help those that suffer from low vision in more detail. In the meantime, I encourage all of the clubs in District 22-W to continue their support of the Lions Vision Research Foundation. We set an all-time record for our financial support last year and I would like to see our support continue at at least that level going forward.

I remind you that we have an LVRF presentation available for a club meeting program. If you are interested let me know and I will arrange for myself, or one of the District 220W LVRF Trustees, to present it for your club.

Peace Poster Winners Announced!

Kayla Crigger, an 8th grade student at Boonsboro Middle School in Boonsboro, Maryland, has taken a major step to becoming an internationally recognized artist by submitting the winning poster in the Peace Poster Contest.

Winners of the Peace Poster Contest were announced on November 25th at the Terra Rubra Lions Club Park Building by the contest chairman, Lion Allan Chrest of the Silver Run-Union Mills Lions Club. There were 16 entrants from schools throughout District 22-W. Kayla's poster, submitted by the Boonsboro Lions Club, was among more than 350,000 entries submitted worldwide in the annual Lions International Peace Poster Contest. Lions Clubs International is sponsoring this program, which is celebrating its 30th anniversary this year, to encourage young people worldwide to express their visions of peace. Chrest said he was impressed by the expression and creativity of the students who entered the contest. "It is obvious that these young people have strong ideas about what peace means to them. I'm so proud that we were able to provide them with the opportunity to share their visions."

The winning poster will compete with the winners from Districts A, B, C and D. If her poster is the winner at that level, her poster will be entered into international competition where posters from districts all over the world will be judged with the grand prize winner receiving \$5,000 plus a trip to the United Nations on Lions Clubs Day at the United Nations on March 24, 2018. In addition to the grand prize, 23 merit award winners will receive \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

Doing the judging were two outstanding artists and educators. Ms. Ann Hess is currently a free-lance artist in the Frederick area and Mr. Gene Ganssle is an artist in Carroll County.

This was not only an event to pick the winners of the contest but also an educational moment. Chrest asked the judges to not only select a winner, but to critique each poster in an academic way so that the young artists would benefit and learn from this experience.

The second prize winner was Margaret Gouker whose poster was submitted by the Frederick Lions Club. She attends the 8th grade at St. John's Regional Catholic School in Frederick. As the second prize winner, she will receive \$60 and a certificate.

The third prize winner was Chloe Boykin whose poster was submitted by the Thurmont Lions Club. She is in the 8th grade at Thurmont Middle School in Frederick County. As the third prize winner, she will receive \$40 and a certificate.

In addition to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd place awards, two Honorable Mention awards were recognized; one went to Jane Orellana, a 6th grade student of Thomas Johnson Middle School; the other went to Callie Mackay a 6th grade student of the New Life Christian school. Both will receive \$25 and a certificate.

SUCCESS CHRISTMAS PARTY FOR THE KIDS WHO SORT EYEGLASSES Submitted by Lion Bob Martin – Chair Sight Conservation Region III

Hello Family, Friends...and Friends Who've <u>BECOME</u> Family! I hope this finds all of you exceptionally well!

As most of you know, I began my collaboration with the SUCCESS Program in 2001 (and we only had 5 students!). SUCCESS is a 3-year job-and-life-skills training program for (very!) "challenged" 18-21-year old students that's sponsored by Frederick County Public Schools. Since I began working with it, the program's expanded significantly and now educates a population of between 40 and 50 students! I spend 3-6 days each month with the students sorting the used-and-reusable eyeglasses donated to the region's Lions Clubs. Generous members of the Myersville Lions Club also now attend many of the "Bob Martin Days" (no vanity here...for YEARS, that's what the students have called the days I'm with them..!) and help the students, too. I'm REALLY grateful for their assistance!

Since we began, the students have boxed in excess of 600,000 pairs of eyeglasses. Ten days ago, we shrink-wrapped 43 pallets containing about 1000 cardboard boxes with over 220,000 glasses and more than 103,000 eyeglasses cases. Very soon these pallets will be trucked to Florida and then sent by container ship to Mexico to supply <u>TWO</u> new clinics I will be opening in the next few months. Those clinics - like the first one I started in 2007 - will provide vision exams and free eyeglasses to indigent people, this time in the cities of Cancun and Chetumal.

Once again this year I'm taking Santa to visit the SUC-CESS Students in Walkersville. Each year at Christmastime, I've asked friends and family for donations that are given to the students and the SUCCESS program to help the kids. The last couple of years your generosity has enabled me to give each student a \$30.00 cash gift (there were 41 students last year). When I've asked the students after Christmas what they did with the money...MOST reported buying their parents or siblings presents or saving it! The first year I gave students a gift, each got \$10.00. After opening his envelope, one student's eyes got as big as saucers. He yelled "TEN DOLLARS! I'm rich! I'M RICH!" He wasn't being funny... Even today, the memory of that young man's excitement makes me tear up... Ten bucks!!

OPIOID DEATHS Submitted by DVG Gerry Beachy

Grantsville Lions had a great program on Medical Marijuana and Opioid Abuse in Garrett County at our first meeting in November.

Kendra McLaughlin from the GC Health Department spoke about the new medical marijuana program just started in Maryland. We were told about the process to obtain medical marijuana.

There are 3 steps: Grower— Processor—Dispenser. A doctor that is certified writes the prescription that is taken to a dispenser. There is only one in our area located in Cumberland. Patients also must be registered for a \$50 fee.

The patient must be 18 or older. Presently there are 13,000 in MD. Certified prescribers can be physicians dentists, nurse practitioners, midwifes and podiatrists.

Certain conditions must be met and prescribers can issue a 30 day supply. But, there are implications that have not been addressed to date. Gun permitting, veteran benefits, and driving under the influence, are just a few of the implications.

Another big problem is illegality defined by the Federal Government. Therefore, all the transactions must be in cash. Other problems include unscrupulous Prescribers, overdosing by children, and auto accidents.

Lisa Welch discussed the opioid and education problem. Many think the problem is from overprescribing. Fentanyl overdosing has become a new problem. There have been more opioid deaths from overdosing than heroin.
